TIMBER DUES FOR QUE. CROWN LANDS

Force on September First.

The following information was give out at the Quebec Parliament Buildings last week in connection with the new dues for cutting of timber on the Quebec Crown Lands.
"The Honorable Minister of Lands

and Forests, in a report dated August 19, 1920, states that it would be prop-er to rescind order in counci, No. 765, dated June 12, 1918, which amended the order in council No. 295, dated April 26, 1910, and also the latter. He therefore recommended that from the 1st of September, this year, the following tariff of dues for the cutting of timber on Crown Lands under license be adorted and put into force: to adopted and put into force:

1. On all square lumber or flats:

A. White pine, oak, carya and wal-

nut, 15 cents per cubic foot. B. Red pine, elm, ash, cedar, white wood or linden, wild cherry, maple and tamerac, 12 cents per cubic foot. C. Fir and North Amercian fir, grey pine or cypress, spruce, birch, aspen and poplar, 10 cents per cubic foot. 2. Sawed logs or bark and large timbers, and rough heavy timber A. White pine, oak, carya, and walnut; \$5.00 per 1,000 feet B. Red ping, elm, ash, white wood or linden, wild cherry, maple and tamerac, \$3.50 per 1,000 feet.

C. Fir, North American fir, gre pine or cypress, spruce, birch, aspen, poplar or cedar, \$2.70 per 1,000 feet. 3. Poles of more than 18 feet and not exceeding 10 inches in diameter at the thin end.

A. 30 feet or less in length, 0.75 cents each.

B. 30 feet to 40 feet, \$1.50 each. C. 40 to 50 feet, \$3.00 each, D. 50 feet or more, \$6.00 each. 4. Railway ties of not more that feet, 0.15 cents each 5. Other articles of value, 15 p.




