POULTRY SHOW

The Annapolis County Poultry Association will hold a Poultry Show at Lawrencetown, December 2nd and 3rd., entries open to the County only. There will be a special opening on the evening of December 1st, with prominent men from the Government at Hailfax as speakers. At the present time it is not possible to name these gentlemen as arrangements are not complete.

gentlemen as arrangements are not complete.

The most pleasing feature of the Show is the Junior Farmer section, open to boys and girls of sixeen years and under. It is realized that the children of today are the poultrymen and Nova Scotians of tomorrow, and that it is the duty of every citizen to assist in checking the rural migration to the United States and to our own cities. Hence, there is a special class for Junior Farmers in the Prize List. Moreover, the afternoon of December 3rd will be devoted to the young folk, when Professor Landry will talk to them on roultry, using his five motion pictures to illustrate with. Doctor Hall, of Lawrencetown, will give a prize to that school having the greatest percentage of attendance at this special session, due regard being taken in distance from Lawrencetown according to a scale in B.C. It is expected that there will be a cup presented to the school winning the greatest number of points from the exhibited poultry.

Professor Landry, of the Agricultural College at Truro, will give addresses on the Care and Management of Poultry, illustrating with his films. Flock Selection and Marketing Problems will be discussed by Mr. A. F. Curran the District Poultry Promoter, who also will use motion pictures. Further, he will hold demonstrations on the killing and dressing of fowl, the candling of eggs, and the cuaing of the flock.

The growth of the industry in the prairie provinces has been remarkable, particularly in the case of Saskatchewan, which only a few years ago was regarded as entirely grain-growing territory. For the first six months of the current year the butter production of that province was 6,392,462 lbs., exceeding the figures for the corresponding period of the previous year by 25 per cent. Manitoba's increase was even greater, being 52 per cent higher to the end of May last. Alberta, which in 1915 imported 4,116,000 lbs. of butter and last year exported 4,100,000 lbs., expects to increase its output by 20 per cent this year. The outstanding reason for this growth, doubtless, is that the farmer is realizing, as never before that dairying provides a steady source of revenue and affords relief from many of the carts which go hand-inhand with the production of grains alone.

The figures of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics covering the export of dairy products for the year ended 31st July last, compared with the two preceding years, are as follows: 1925—Butter, \$10,317, 819; Cheese, \$27,894,665; Milk (fresh and cream), \$6,006,615; Milk (condensed, etc.), \$5,500,010.

1924—Butter, \$5,278,479; Cheese, \$23,702,976; Milk (fresh and cream), \$5,453,782; Milk (condensed, etc.), \$5, 269,871. Total Value \$39,705.108

AUSTRALIA IN THE LEAD

The British Dominions have been slow to initiate a campaign of Emptre propaganda. At last, however, Australia has taken the initiative, and the campaign is beginning with the moving pictures. In every moving picture programme in the theatres of iVctoria after June 30th, 1926, not less than 1,000 feet of British film must be shown. An amendment to the censorship bill, which was given its third reading last month, provides from 1,500 pounds to \$1,945 pounds for the encouragement of the "movie" enterprise. Australia is thus setting a worthy example for Canada, where very few Canadian or British films are seen, but where everything American is well advertised.


