ALMOST A CATASTROPHE.

The Engine of an Express Train Leaps Into the Lake at Lacbine.

Montreal, Dec. 5.—Montreal yesterday experienced one of the worst snow-storms in its history, and it has caused great inconvenience to railway travel. The western express that should have left here at 11:55 Wednesday night did not get away until 5:30 yesterday morning, and had a narrow escape at Lachine. When the train reached Lachine the switchman, Dubois, mistaking it for the regular Lachine train, switched it on to the wharf. Engineer Joe Birse, who was charge of the engine, did not notice the mistake until the station was passed, and then turned off the steam and shut down brakes just in time to save the lives of the passengers. The engine went into the lake, with the engineer and fireman, and sank in fifteen feet of water. Birse was killed, but Edward, the fireman, managed to get out of the debris and swam to the top, when he/was rescued. There were nearly 100 passengers on the train, including a number from Toronto and the weat, and they were badly shaken up, but fortunately they escaped a terrible death owing to the engineer streking to his post. Birse was for over 30 years in the employ of the company, and had been many years on the western line. The passengers were brought to the city and left for the west this morning.

### VOICES OF THE PEOPLE.

Prison Bunday.

To the Editor of the Advication:

As Suriday next, Dec. 7, is to be observed in this Province as Prison Sunday, the time seems opportune for calling attention to some giaring defects in our method of dealing with crime and criminals. As you are aware, a commission was appointed in June last by the Ontario Government to look into the prison system of the Province with a view to the adoption of a better system, and one more in accord with the best system of other countries. The shadous of this commission have been held in different parts of the Province, and the evidence received—from sheriffs, failers, etc.—has been published in the daily press and is now public property. It must have been a surprise to most persons to find that our penal system is in such a bad shape.

Take, for instance, our country jail system. It would appear, from the evidence published, that the country jails, instead of being a terror to ovill doers and a praise to those who try to-do well, are really the very reverse. There is little up no work, no proper system of classification, and in many cases they are actual schools of crime. They appear to exert no deterrent effect on orime, and to the young and to first offenders jail life appears to have a most disastrous effect.

In 1889, out of a total of 12,531 commitments to the common jails of the Prevince, there were 4,777 committed for drunkenness. "This has no good effect on the drunkard," says Inspector Christie. "If he is a beginner, it debases him, and every time an old offender is committed the possibility of his reformation grows weaker." For the vagrants and the organized army of lazy tramps that infest the country, the county jails simply afford a friendly shelter where they spend the time in associated idleness and in dragging each other down to a lower depth of degradation.

Another evil in our jail system is this: In a majority of the counties there are no poorhouses, and in many of these counties the jail is actually used as a poorhouse, and the dependent poor, honest and respectable, are forced into association with the ordinary jail population.

From this it will be seen that our whole jail system is not only faulty, but actually vicious and requires to be either completely remodeled or blotted out allogether.

At the Prison Conference held in Toronto about a year ago a resolution was adopted in favor of erecting sufficient re-

At the Prison Conference held in Toronto about a year ago a resolution was adopted in favor of erecting sufficient reformatory prison accommodation in the Province to completely relieve the jalls of tramps and habitual drunkards, to classify them, give them work and to bring them under reformatory influence. Should the Prison Commission report favorably to this change, to carry out the recommendation will involve the expenditure of public money, and this the Government might of the public should be researched to do, unless it appeared that such expenditure would meet the approval of the best sentiment of the Province. Hence the necessity of keeping these matters a before the public and agitating for these reforms.

It is of the utmost importance that the public should be brought face to face with these vital questions, and we look to the press and to the pulpit to aid us in this. On prison Sunday we desire the prayers of all Christians in behalf of prisoners, prison officials, Prisoners' Aid Association and in behalf of prison reform.

GIVES BLACK MILK.

Singular Habit of an Otherwise Well-Disposed Milker.

Mollie, as she is called, is a pretty little dow, with nothing unusual in her appearance, and has borne already five young ones, which have thriven well on her black milk. It produces a fair amount of cream, which is a trifle lighter in color, and which, when churned, makes butter resembling coal tar, but as palatable as though of golden yellow. Mr. Hansborough says that at first they were afraid to drink or use the milk in any way, but overcoming their prejudice now enjoy it as any other.
