

A deputation of city hotel-keepers waited upon the Government on Friday to protest against any increase. James Haverson, on behalf of the deputation, said that the hotel business in Toronto did not pay now, that most of the hotels were in the hands of the hrewers, and that there were mortgages on all of them. An increase in the fee would embarrass the hotel-keepers very much. The object of the deputation was to ask the Government to leave the license fee where it was. "It may be that the time has now come

Mr. Kennedy said that the hotel-keepers were under heavy burdens already. There were a great many unlicensed dives selling liquor, causing much trouble, for which the hotel-keepers were blamed, but for which they were not responsible. The business was no gold mine, and it was not so good as it used to be.

Mr. Mowat—What would you suggest in order to get rid of the places where liquor is sold illicitly?

Mr. Kennedy said those convicted of selling liquor without a license should not have the option of a fine, but should be imprisoned, because they say they can make up the fine in a short time. Men get drunk at these places, and the hotel keepers are blamed for it. He thought these illicit places should be raided more frequently.

Mr. John McGee said the hotel business was not so good as it used to be, because there was not the same amount of drinking. They had tried to increase the price of whisky after the change in the tariff, but people stopped drinking it, and the price ad to be reduced again. Besides, under the present law every hotel keeper was beliged to occupy a much larger house than he needed.

A large deputation, representing the Oncario branch of the Dominion Alliance, waited upon the Government at 5 o'clock. Among those who attended were: Messrs. J. J. Maclaren, Malcolm Gibbs, James Dobson, Rev. Dr. Thomas, James Forster, W. G. Storm, S. James, Mrs. Forster, Mrs. R. Galley, Mrs. G. Walker, Dr. Sparrow, Dr. Oronhyatekha, F. S. Spence, Henry O'Hara, Rev. A. Dowsley, Rev. J. V. Smith, James Hughes, W. M. McMillan, G. S. Youle, D. F. Milne, Dr. Emery, W. P. Page and A. Coxhead.

Mr. J. J. Maclaren submitted the following as the legislation which the last meeting of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance decided to ask for: 1. That the majority of electors in a polling subdivision should have the right to prevent the reissue of a license. 2. That all sales to persons under 21 should be prohibited, and no minors be allowed to loiter in a bar-room. 3. That penalties for violation of the law, tespecially in the case of license believer should be made worn. Temperance Deputations.

3. That penalties for violation of the law, tespecially in the case of license-bodders should be made more severe.

4. That all second and subsequent confictions should be punished as such, and the increased penalties inflicted. 5. That ilicense should be forfeited and the holder iisqualified for repeated violations of the law, even if the offenses schould not be the same.

6. That fines should be made available. isqualified for repeated violations of the law, even if the offenses should not be the same. 6. That fines should be made available for prosecution where the prosecutor is a private party. 7. That any person should have the right to apply for the cancellation of a license wrongfully issued. 8. That the signatures of petitioners for a license or the transfer of license should all be genuine and bona fide, and should be published. 9. That no druggist should sell iquor except on a certificate. 10. That bars should be abolished. 11. That the sale and disposal of liquors in clubs should be restricted. 12. That the time limited for the laying of informations should be extended to three months. 13. That no shop or saloon licenses be issued. Mr. Maclaren pointed out that when a license was once granted, no matter how great a nuisance it proved to the neighborhood, the public were practically helpless in suppressing it. Quebec, which was not always held up as a model, was ahead of Ontario in this respect, as there a majority of the electors in any subdivision could prevent the reissue of any license to which help were opposed. Nova Scotia, British Columbia and other Provinces were also thead of Ontario. They trusted that the Government would respond to the prayers that were being sent in for a more extended local option law. Then the temperance people, were opposed to any cneouragement of the idea that a license had any value beyond the amount paid annually for the right to sell.

Mr. Maclaren instanced a case in Tomoto, in which the proprietor, he believed, had not only made the house pay, but had made money out of it. There ought to be, he thought, legislation encouraging temperance hotels, so that the trave ing public might know that in such houses their persons and property might be safe. There were many temperance hotels in Quebec, and he understood they were all carried on successfully. The law at present discriminated in favor of license holders. The same ponalties he considered should be moted out to those holding licenses as to those charged with illicit selling.

was required for quanties of liquor under six ounces, and the tendency of this was in some instances to turn the drug store into a bar. With regard also to clubs, they desired to have something done to lessen the consumption of liquor in these places. Where clubs wished to sell liquor, he thought it might be a desirable thing to compel them to take out a license and thus contribute to the revenue of the country.

They wished the Government to make explicit provisions for the operation of the local option law, as much litigation might be avoided by legislation saying when by-laws shall come into force—and also providing that bylaws for local option shall not be set aside on technical grounds provided the spirit of the law was observed.

Mr. F. S. Spence strongly urged that the penalties for violation of the license laws should be made much higher. He instanced the case of selling liquor to minors, the penalty for which is lower than nearly all the other Provinces and many of the States of the Union. They also desired a limitation of the number of wholesale licenses granted, and an increase of the fee from \$250 to \$500. They also wished to have it set forth that brewers should not have power to open offices or warehouses wherever they chose. At present he believed they might open up in almost any place they liked without contributing any idense fee or having any special authority.

Mr. Mowat pointed out that the law hardly justified such an interpretation on this point.

Mr Spence—"Well, I'm glad to know that the law doesn't mean what it says." (Laughter.) He concluded by again urging that penalties should be made much higher and that disqualification should follow a second offense.

Mr. Mowat promised that the views of the deputation would receive the considera-tion that their importance demanded, al-though he remarked smilingly the points were so numerous as to require almost a double session of the House for their full double session of the House for their fair consideration. Mr. Spence rejoined that they had made cut a draft bill embodying all their requests, which would save the Government any trouble, and the deputation then withdrew.



IN LABOR'S FIELD

A Million of Men May Be Affected

By the Impending Coal Miners' Strike Coal Rapidly Advancing.

London, Feb. 29.—It is estimated that 460,000 miners will cease work in a fortnight in their efforts to prevent the masters from putting into effect the scheme to reduce wages. The mining industry throughout Great Britain will be greatly affected. The only members who stand aloof from the movement being those employed in South Staffordshire and East Worcestershire. Should the present intentions of the South Staffordshire and East Worcestershire. Should the present intentions of the miners be carried out and the strike inaugurated the branch industries will also be adversely affected, and it is estimated nearly 1,000,000 men will feel the effects of the struggle. The agitation is due to the action of mine owners in Wales and Cumberland who gave intimation of their intention to reduce wages on the sliding scale principle owing to the decline that had occurred in the price of coal.

The men refused to accept the reduction and declared the mine owners must make the cossumers pay. The men offered to make an aliance with the owners and form a ring of miners and owners to maintain

a ring of miners and owners to maintain rates. The Owners' Association declared this rates. The Owners' Association declared this would be impossible as the mine owners outside of the association are cutting rates. The men then offered if the present rate of wages was maintained to strike in all collieries where the prices were reduced below the rates of the Coal Mine Owners' Association. The miners declare that they have forced up wages 40 per cent. by hard fighting, and they do not intend to have them dropped any lower. The prices of coal are rapidly rising in London, the figures to-day showing an advance of 3 shillings a ton above Saturday's rate. It is expected that at the end of the week it will sell at 2 shillings per 100 pounds, which will be almost double the former prices.


