CANADIANS HONORED. London, Aug. 13 .- The visiting Canadian artillerymen paid a visit to Windsor Castle yesterday, and by special permission of the Queen, were shown through the state and private apartments of the castle.

ANDREE'S AERIAL VOYAGE. Stockholm, Sweden, Aug. 13.-The following telegram from Virgos Harbor was dispatched by Prof. Andree on Aug. 3: "The balloon has been filled for several days, and all is ready for the ascent. Thus far everything has occurred as anticipated. The wind is still northerly, otherwise all

is well. NO JEWELS FOR MR. HILL. London, Aug. 13 .- At the Birmingham assizes, Viscount Hill, who was formerly engaged in farming near Florence, Kansas, and now of Burford, Ont., sued the Dowager Countess Hill, his step-mother, to recover the family diamonds and jewelry, which he claims as heirlooms under the will of his grandmother. Judgment was rendered in favor of the defendant.

TROUBLE AHEAD IN ASHANTI. Accra, Gold Coast Colony, Aug. 13 .-It is feared that serious troubles are impending in Ashanti. It is reported that the Inkoranzas and other tribes have joined Chief Samory with the object of expelling the British from Kumassi. The British cruiser Phoebe and the British gunboat Magpie, with a large force of Haussas on board, have gone to Elmina, from whence these native troops will be hurried to Inkor-

anza and Kumassi. CANADIAN TRADE WITH ENG-

LAND. London, Aug. 13 .- Exports to Canada increased 6 per cent in July, 1896, as compared with July, 1895. Exports from Britain to all countries increased on the year 4 per cent. Imports from Canada increased 7 per cent, and imports from all other countries de-creased 2 per cent. Wheat and flour from Canada increased £44,000; bacon and hams, £18,000; fish, £31,000; copper, £18,000; wool, £75,000. declined £45,000. Imports from Cheese Imports from Canade during the seven months increased 25 per cent, while imports from all countries increased only 5

per cent. IN A QUEER POSITION. London, Aug. 13 .- In the House of Commons yesterday when all the amendments had been considered a small committee was appointed to formulate the reasons for not agreeing with the Peers. These reasons were submitted to the House of Lords, which postponed their consideration

until Friday. Mr. T. P. O'Connor's Sun says that Mr. Gerald Balfour's statement places the Government in a critcal position adding, however, that it is improbable that the Lords, having once shown their strength, will compel the Gov-ernment to adopt a course which would probably involve three Minis-

terial resignations. JOHN DALY. London, Aug. 13. - The Exchange Telegraph Company asserts that the Government is about to release John Daly, the dynamiter, who is confined in Portland Prison under sentence of life imprisonment, and that his brother James has left Limerick for Portland to meet him when he is set at liberty. It is supposed that the Government decided to release Daly because of the bad condition of his health. It is likely that he will make a tour of the continent with his brother James as soon as he is given his freedom. The news that he was to be released caused great rejoicing in Cork and Limwhere bands played,

gathered in the streets, and many bonfires were lit to celebrate the occasion. THE CRETAN SITUATION. London, Aug. 13.-After getting through with the Irish Land Bill in the House of Commons, Mr. James C. Monck, "Unionist" member for Gloucester, urged that Great Britain should annex Crete, and thus put an end to the unfortunate condition of affairs existing in that island. Right Hon. Mr. Curzon said that there was nothing to indicate that Crete or Greece, nor any of the other powers were in favor of annexation of the island by Great Britain. The Government, he added, was trying to keep the balance between the concerned in the struggle, and hoped it might yet be arranged. Right Hon. Sir Henry Fowler de-nounced the Government for being, as normally neutral towards

Turkey, but in actual sympathy with Right Hon. Arthur Balfour repudiated the charge. He said that the Turkish question was inextricably bound up in European politics; power could possibly rush in and try alone to settle it. Hasty steps would have infinitely more terrible consequences than the events in Crete.

MASONRY IN NEW ZEALAND.

London, Aug. 13.-Free and Accepted Masons of England met in special Grand Lodge last week for the purpose of considering a message from the Prince of Wales, expressing the opinion that with a view to promote the harmony and union of the various Masonic bodies in New Zealand, and to end all sources of differences, the period had now arrived when recognition might be properly accorded to the Grand Lodge of that colony as an independent sovereign Masonic authority. The Earl of Lathom, pro-grand master, presided, and moved the resolution, requesting his Royal Highness to take such steps for the recognition of the Grand Lodge of New Zealand, and for the establishment of fraternal good-feeling with the brethren there, as he might consider consistent with the honor of the Grand Lodge of England, and with just consideration for those lodges which might desire to retain their connection with it. The motion was seconded by the Earl of Onslow, provincial grand master for who, as a late Governor of New Zealand, knew the state of Masonic feeling in that colony, and said the recognition, which had been previously sought and refused, would be highly prized there. Amendments were proposed by Mr. S. R. Baskett, and Mr. Richard Eve, and long and animated discussions on each took place but the motion was strongly supported by two old colonists, Messrs. Dargaville and Greenwood, and ultimately it was carried almost unanimously.

Montreal, Aug. 13.-Representatives of the Patrons of Industry, the live stock, butter, cheese, fruit and other exporting interests had an important conference today with the Premier, Mr. Mr. Fisher; the Minister of and Commerce, Sir Richard Cartwright, and Mr. Dobell, with reference to the application of the subsidy granted by Parliament for the improvement of steamship communication with England. The object of the deputation was to impress upon the Government the advisability of providing Parliament with all pertinent information procurable before any further subsidies are granted to any line of ocean steamships. Such information should include a detailed description of the system of steamship communication between England and other countries, especialbetween ly the United States, Argentina, Australia and New Zealand. President Grant, in introducing the deputation, pointed out that the farmers would make \$1,000,000 extra profit

He would leave the matter to the consideration of his collagues, especially since he had found a practical farmer for Minister of Agriculture. Mr. Fisher, as a farmer, had suffered along with other farmers, and he was therefore willing to abide by what Mr. Fisher approved in the way of

improving their condition. (Applause.) Mr. John Torrance, of the Dominion Line, pointed out that cold storage for 600 tons had been provided at a cost of \$20,000 in their last steamer for two years, and it was never used once, and they had it taken out. The Allans had the same experience with the cold storage apparatus on the Mongolian and Numidian. The Dominion Line was ready to put cold storage in their new vessel, which would be the fastest and largest coming to the St. Law-

He sympathized fully with the deputation and was glad to find from a number of conversations and also from the Premier's remarks at this meeting that cold storage would be supplied to the farmers. (Applause.) He was willing to place his own experience at the disposal of Mr. Laurier and also to give it to the farmers of the country. The low price of Canadian butter in England was due, not to its manufacture, but to the difference in the method of mark-eting it. During the present season the Government, through Prof. Robertson, had made arrangements for cold storage in two vessels of the Elder-Dempster line. This he saw the agents of the line and asked them to provide additional insulated compartments, because the amount provided under the original contract was insufficient to meet the demands of the trade. He was glad to hear Mr. Dunlop's remarks about the fruit trade, because there was room for great improvement. The indications were that there would be a large crop of apples in Canada and a poor crop in England. He trusted that when the crop was ready some trial shipments might be made in coldstorage so that the people might reap some of the benefits of that exception-

al opportunity. (Applause.)

Of Frank Robinson, a Grand Trunk Teamster.

Thrown From His Wagon on York Street and Almost Instantly Killed-His

Francis Robinson, of 351 Hill street, a teamser on the G. T. R., met death in a tragic manner about 7 o'clock tast night. He had driven to the freight sheds with a load, which he got at D. S. Perrin's establishment, which, as usual, was his last calling place. He unloaded, and then started for the stable to put his horses up for the night. He was seated on a box, and when near the corner of Waterloo street on York, the box tottered, and Mr. Robinson fell from the wagon over the right side, alighting on his head with sufficient force to break his neck and fracture his skull. The unfortunate man was picked up by Ald Skinner and James Shand, foreman of the Shedden Company, who saw him fall. They carried him to the lawn, bolstered him up on a chair, and sent for Dr. Drake, the

company's surgeon.

The doctor pronounced life extinct upon his arrival about five minutes later. Over the left temple there was severe scalp abrasion, as though he had fallen on a stone. The body was removed to Ferguson's undertaking for burial and taken to the family residence about 9:30.

Mr. Shand says after Robinson had fallen he tried to rise on his hands and knees, but sank down again. On Wednesday last deceased had a sunstroke, and only started to work again the following Monday. He was not altogether able to work, and about 4 o'clock on Monday he thought o giving up again as the heat was in-tense, but would not yield.

The horses know when their day's work is done and are apt to start off with a jerk. The news of Mr. Robinson's tragic death prostrated his wife and family with grief, and many sympathizing friends called at the house last night to console the bereaved ones. Mr. Robinson had always been a hale and strong man up to a year or so ago, when he became a little feeble. He was 54 years of age, and a native of Durham, England, where he had nine brothers and one sister. Deceased Deceased leaves a wife and four children-two sons and two daughters. 

Bradstreet Summarizes the Situation

The Cleveland Strike. Bradstreet's Weekly Review says: Labor is more disturbed than usual. The great strike of garment workers here has much extended; the strike at Cleveland has broken out again, and involves several other branches of labor; the iron furnace men of the Shenango Valley resist a reduction to the wages of May, 1895. though Mahoning Valley workers do not; the iron works throughout the country are striving to cut down cost in order to keep in operation; the iron mines of the Gogebic range are stopping; the suspension of cotton mills has become more general, and over four million spindles are said to be idle at Fall River alone, and probably three-eighths or more of the entire producing capacity in the country; the rubber works have mostly stopped, and, notwithstanding the light-weight opening a number of woolen mills are cutting down the working force, and also wages have

The strike or lock-out at the Brown oisting works, Cleveland, is practically at an end. Of the 800 men who went out on strike, 500 are now engaged in other employment. The Brown Company has 335 men at work, and has received 25 applications for em-

New York, Aug. 13.-A special from Pittsburg, Pa., says: The Penn-Railway Company is giving its employes a strong object esson in silver. The company pays here by check on the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Bank, of Pittsburg. Toronto, Aug. 13 .- The first meeting of the new Executive of the Dominion Alliance was held at the Confederation Building yesterday afternoon. Dr. J. J. McLaren, Q. C., President of the Ontario branch, acted as chairman. J. C. Aikins, Ald. F. S. Spence (secretary, Messrs. W. H. Orr, H. O'Hara, and went about preparing a light iunch. Dr. Maclaren having been elected Mrs. Pressey, her son Frank, and president of the Provincial Alliance. left the chairmanship executive formerly held by him vacant. > The resolutions of the recent Dominion Alliance Council and Prohibition Convention in favor of a deputation to the Dominion Government to ask for prohibitory legislation and respecting the plebiscite, and a deputation to the tive legislation, were considered and early convenient dates, the arrangements being left to the chairman.

The decision of the Privy Council having cleared all doubts regarding the local option clauses of the Ontario license law, it was considered desirable to take steps to stimulate local option contests in a number of municipalities this fall, and in this connection the secretary was instructed to prepare a manual on local option.

Two committees were appointed, on printing and distribution, consisting of Dr. Maclaren, Ald. Spence and Mr. W. H. Orr; and a finance committee, composed of Mr. J. T. Moore, Mr. H. O'Hara and Mr. W H. Orr. The printing committee was instructed to print and distribute a digest of the report of the Royal Commission on the Liquor Traffic, manual on local option and the minutes of the prohibition convention. The members of the executive were unanimously of the opinion that the outlook for the enactment of a prohibitory law for the Dominion as a result of the Dominion plebiscite was most hopeful.

Its Baleful Effects in New York City.

Twelve-Hundred Deaths in Five Days-A Drop in the Temperature.

New York, Aug. 13.-Yesterday was the eighth day of the present torrid wave. The total deaths caused directly by heat during the seven preceding days of the present hot spell, from Wednesday up to and including Tuesday, was 326. Tuesday's record of 140 deaths was the largest. A policeman has, with several other Canadians, fell dead while getting a glass of water for a prostrated woman. Another officer dropped dead at his post on Allen street. A third died in a hospital last night. A fireman fell while crossing the street. A workman on a high building was sunstruck and rolled to the ground dead. Business men were stricken in their offices. Women fell to the floor while shopping. driver fell off the seat of his truck dead. All sorts and conditions of men

are among the victims. Estimates of Wednesday's deaths in New York city range from 90 to 100. New York, Aug. 13 .- The heated term in New York and vicinity has not come to a close, but its violence has subsided appreciably. o'clock this morning the thermometer in the weather observer's tower indicated 82 degrees, against 85 degrees at the same hour ysterday.

The records at police headquarters showed ten deaths from heat between 2 and 9 a.m. and seven prostrations. A statement prepared by the Bur-eau of Vital Statistics of New York city covering the period from midnight of Saturday to noon today (five days) shows a total of 1,200 deaths, of which 434 are attributed to the heat. An unofficial estimate of the num-ber of deaths from heat in New York, Brooklyn and the neighboring cities and towns in New York State and New Jersey, which covers the period from Aug. 5 to 12 inclusive, is 621. The prostrations for the same period are said to have numbered 1,255.
