Sight of Funerals From Damaged Houses Is an Awesome Sight.

A. R. Galpin, license inspector, received a letter today from his cousin in Seaton, Carew, England, which contains a graphic account of the bombardment of the English coast.

The letter, in part, says: "We had just sat down to breakfast, when I heard what I thought was a very distant gun, then a louder one, and then several quite close. I ran to the window, but it was too misty to see any ships; we could only do that when they were lit up by the lashes from the guns, as they fired their proadsides. The rear was terrific and continuous for about 30 minutes, when stackened a bit, and finally died away

DEFAULTING CORPORAL INDIA HAS GIVEN 200,000 SOLDIERS

in France, Egypt and East Africa.

[Canadian Press.] Delhi, India, Jan. 13—Via London 4:05 p.m.-The vice-regal council opened today. The Viceroy, Baron Hardinge, in a speech before the council, disclosed the number of troops which India has contributed to the war, which, he said, amounted to 200,000 men. These soldiers are distributed in France, Egypt, East Africa, and along the Persian Gulf. Baron Hardinge spoke feelingly of India's proof of patriotic sentiment.

Dover, Jan. 13 .- Via London, 4:55 p.m.-Two German submarines were fired upon and sunk by the coast batteries off Dover, according to persistent rumors current in the city this af-

The presence of hostile airships over the English Channel during the past night has been reported today from various points on the coast. These reports, however, have not as yet been confirmed.

Dover has been assailed by the Germans from the air on no less than two occasions, and ships in Dover harbor are believed to have been the objective of a raid by German submarines. The bombs from above never did much damage,

was the attack from the under-the-water successful. Three days before Christmas, a German aviator, according to a Berlin dispatch, flew over Dover, threw bombs, and reconnoitered the positions of British warships. Two days later, another hostile aeroplane appeared over the city and dropped a bomb which exploded harmlessly in a garden. This aviator eluded a British airman, and flew saiely to sea. The submarine attack was reported December 11. That morning a vessel supposed to be the tender of a submarine appeared off Dover, but retired when fired upon. Shortly after, submarines were seen at sea. The channel forts opened fire and kept it up for almost half an hour. At the same time a flotilla of destroyers put to sea, and the submarines were
