David Glass, Ex=M.P., Dead; Former Mayor of London

Hon. David Glass, at one time one of the best known public men in Canada, is dead, at his home in Spokane, Wash. A message received by Mr. Samuel Glass, of this city, last night, announced the passing of his brother. He

was 76 years of age. The deceased had been an invalid for the past two years, as the result of a paralytic stroke, and his death was not entirely unexpected.

Interment will take place in Spokane, and it is understood that the widow, with the two surviving children, Mr. Chester Glass and Miss Eva Glass, will return to London shortly to reside.
