GERMANY WITHDRAWS PEACE TERMS

KAISERLAND DRIVES LENINE WARNS TOWARDS THE ROCKS TEUTONS WAR AS FACTIONS FIGHT MAY RESUME FOR POWER TO RULE Declares Germany and Allies

German Empire Close To Collapse As Internal and External Difficulties Pile Up-Militarists and Socialists Clash In Reichstag-Russian Ideas Spreading In Germany. Bolsheviki Premier Possibly

Amsterdam, Jan. 11.-Germany was never in such danger of collapse from internal and external difficulties as at present, says the correspondent in Germany of the Tijd in an analysis of the existing situation. The political struggle concentrated around Foreign Secretary von Kuehlmann has been reflected in violent scenes in the main committee of the Reichstag. Public action of the Socialist minority cannot longer be resisted, and even should militarism gain a temporary victory, the correspondent thinks reaction will follow quickly.

Russia's example is said to already have infected popular and military circles. The food question, national mourning, the dislocation of industry, the growing desire for peace and fear of a new offensive on the west, threaten to lend a tragic phase if the negotiations at Brest-Litovsk fail, and in that case a domestic explosion is inevitable.

WEALTHY CLEVELANDER SHOOTS AND KILLS MAN DISCOVERED IN HOUSE

German Foreign Secretary Announces To Brest-Litovsk Conference That Negotiations Are Off Through Non-Acceptance By the Allied Powers.

Amsterdam, Jan. 11 .- The Central Powers have withdrawn their peace terms made public at the Brest-Litovsk conference on December 25, it was announced by Dr. von Kuehlmann, the foreign secretary, in his speech at the Brest-Litovsk conference with the Russians yesterday.

Owing to the non-acceptance by all the enemy powers of those terms, Dr. von Kuehlmann stated, that document had "become null and void."

They expressed willingness to conclude "a general peace without forcible annexations and indemnities," and that it was not the intention of the Central Powers to deprive of political independence those nations which had loss it during the war, but stipulated that the question of the political independence of nationalities not now possessing it would not be solved internationally, but must be left to each government and its peoples.

This qualified recognition of the right of self determination was made use of in the concrete terms for a treaty later proposed to Russia by the Central Powers, in which it was claimed that this right had already been exercised in Poland, Courland and Lithuania.

Alexieff Turns Against Bolsheviki, But Clashes With Kaledines.

London, Jan. 11.—A majority of the Cossacks and the population of the Don district are grouping themselves around the Don military government under Gen. Kaledines, according to a special dispatch from Petrograd tending to give an authorized account of conditions in South Russia. Gen. Present Measles Outbreak With 133 Cases in Week Caused, Says Dr. Hill, by Lack of Field Men-Three Doctors and Nurse Ar e Required.

No less than 133 new cases of measles were reported last week, according to the health bulletin of M. O. H. Dr. Hill.

There were 130 cases isolated at home and five in the hospital at the end of the same week, and there were 94 houses in which cases were quarantined at that time.

In reply to the question, "How is it that there are so many new cases, and why is it that the epidemic has been allowed to get such headway?" Dr. H. W. Hill, M. O. H., declared that there were several reasons. "In the first place," says he, "measles are highly infectious for four days before the appearance of the rash. During that time the child apparently has a bad cold, with red eyes and sore throat. Examination of the mouth would show spots, but the general public does not know this. Taking it for granted that the child is only suffering from cold, it is allowed to go to school, Sunday school, and to play with other children. The disease is intensely infectious at this stage and consequently is contracted by playmates and other children. The estimated value of field crops for 1917, based upon prices received by rmers, has reached the highest figure ever reported, being \$1,089,687,000, as impared with \$886,490,000 in 1916, and \$825,370,000 in 1915. Measured in bushels the harvest of last year has not been in excess of the average of the past five years, but owing to the high prices it has had a greater money value. The in-

fact that this prosperity is almost entirely due to meeting needs caused by the war, and is largely abnormal in its character. The orders now in hand are sufficient to continue activity in nearly every branch for several months to come. "NOT AN END. BUT A MEANS."

It is a prominent man of the city, a member of one of the civic boards, by the way, who writes as follows this week to the Consumers' League Department:

Dear Miss Armstrong.—I am very much interested in the child welfare exh.bit to be held in the city the beginning of February. Think it is a splendid thing, and a fine way to start out the new year. I am so interested, in fact, that I have started investigating the subject of child welfare, and finding out what is being done in other places. It seems to me London is very much behind the times, and that it is high time we were wakening up to the serious responsibility not only of saving the lives of babies, so many of whom die unnecessarily, but also of building up a robust citizenship. I like particularly the idea of the baby clinics and the giving of record cards to the parents, showing exactly how the babies measure up to standard efficiency for youngsters at their ages. I would like to see this carried still farther. I am sure the giving of prizes and blue ribbons to the babies who conform nearest to the standards of perfection will stimulate much interest. But this should not be allowed to die away afterwards, or where is any lasting benefit of the baby welfare week and exhibit? I would suggest that clinics be held again in six months, say at Victoria Hospitai or the Institute of Public Health, and that blue ribbons be then given to the babies who show the greatest progress in that time. Progress and development would be arrived at by comparing in each case the first score card with the second. Of course, only the babies presented at both clinics would be second. Of course, only the babies presented at both clinics would be eligible for the second blue ribbon contest.

"What I really am hoping is that London will show its wisdom by having one (or more) permanent baby clinic established long before

A large proportion of mothers, who in ordinary times would not be employed in any trade, but would be at home looking after their children. any trade, but would be at home looking after their children, are now absent, for many hours a day, doing war work, which in itself, from its strenuous nature, has a prejudicial effect upon births.'

IMPORTANT NATIONAL SERVICE.

"The last part of this quotation refers more to conditions in the old country than in Canada, and our own city, but at the same time it seems to me that we can scarcely render a more important service to the nation and empire at this time than putting forth every effort to save

"I trust the child welfare exhibit will meet with great success, and be instrumental in awakening a real, lasting, practical interest in child welfare work, not only in this city, but throughout Western Ontario. "I think that is another fine idea about a Western Ontario day. I hope the committee will succeed in making some arrangements about convention or excursion rates on the railroads, which will make it pos-
