



What Canada Is Carrying

With its tremendous increase in national debt and annual expenditures, it is imperative that Canada should utilize every resource to develop domestic trade, increase production and capture foreign markets. In five years the net debt of the Dominion has increased from \$335,996,860 to \$1,420,000,000, which means an increase of from \$43.49 to \$160.72 for every man, woman and child in the Dominion. The carrying charges on this debt, including interest and sinking funds, have advanced from \$1.96 per capita in 1913-1914 to an estimated \$12.16 per capita for 1919-1920. During the war expenditure on consolidated fund account has risen from \$127,384,473 to an estimated \$351,-785,491 for the current fiscal year. In the same period capital expenditures have jumped from \$37,180,176 to an estimated \$85,893,581, exclusive of war expenditures, which are estimated for the ascal year at \$296,696,614. Further, during the period 1900-14 Canada borrowed \$2,713,300,000 in excess of revenue for federal, previncial, municipal, industrial and other purposes.
