LONG MISSING, NOW and Americans in this country celebrated America's partnership in the world war by a religious service today in St. Paul's Cathedral, attended by the official heads of the nation and a great congregation which included hundreds of Americans and many prominent British men and women. There was a great display of American flags in London, and all other English towns and a popular demonstration by the crowds which surrounded the cathedral. The Stars and Stripes floated from the highest tower of the Parliament Buildings at Westminster—the first time a foreign flag was ever displayed on that eminence—and flew above all Government buildings in the British capital. and Americans in this country cele-In Historic Church.

The service in the historic cathedral, where the most momentous occasions of nation rejoicing and mourning have been solemnized for centuries, was unprecedented in being the commemoration of an act and decision of another nation. Overhead in the dim arches hung the dust-weighted and battle-torn flags of famous British regiments.

The cathedral seats nearly 4,000 people and was filled to its furthermost recesses with hundreds looking down from the balconies and niches high in the vault. All seats were occupied when King George and Queen Mary entered, followed by the mayors and aldermen of the 26 boroughs of London, who formed a vivide block of color in their scarlet robes of office. The American embassy robes of office. The American embassy and consular staffs occupied front seats with representatives of the Pilgrims, the American Society, the American Luncheon Club, and the American Chamber of Commerce. In the diplomatic section were officers in the uniforms of France, Russia, Italy, Belgium, Serbia, Montenegro, Rumania and Japan.

The royal party came from Windsor for the service, and drove from the station to the cathedral in open carriages. The King returned to Buckingham Palace afterward, the crowds along the route cheering him heartily.

At 11:30 o'clock those waiting in the square heard a great volume of cheering from the distance, up Ludgate Hill, and knew that this heralded the approach of the royal party.

FURTHER GAINS FOR GEN. NIVELLE'S TROOPS BRINGS FRENCH CLOSER TO LAON FORTRESS; ENEMY ATTACKS ROUTED WITH BIG LOSSES

THE WAR SITUATION

The French made further progress last night in the great battle along the Aisne and in the Champagne.

This is notably true of the region northeast of Soissons, where the lines of envelopment are gradually being drawn nearer to the important railway centre of Laon, the strategic objective in this division of the front.

The French here gained ground in the vicinity of Laffaux, the advance being characterized in the official statement as "considerable." The Germans reacted strongly on this front, but were unable to make any impression on the new French lines.

Forcing Germans Out.

General Nivelie's pressure here is calculated to force the Germans speedily out of the salient to which they have clung, projecting toward the Aisne in the direction of Conde.

The advance towards Laon also was continued on the Vauclere plateau, almost directly south of this city, where the French are pushing northward west of the Rheims-Laon road. On the plains north of Rheims, where the Germans are clinging stubbornly to their strongly-entrenched positions, several of their trenches near Courcy were carried in grenade attacks. In the Champagne, notably near Moronvilliers, the Germans launched their expected violent counter-attacks, which the French troops, their artillery brought up, were amply prepared to meet. The artillery and machine guns cut loose on the advancing columns, reinforced by the fresh contingents recently thrown in from other fronts and from the reserves. The result was that the Germans, although their attacks had been prepared by heavy bombardments, were badly cut up, and failed to attain their ojective.

PROFITING BY EXPERIENCE.

Thrift has a much broader application than just making one penny do the work of two, or working over "left-overs" into appetizing dishes. There is such a thing as thrift of time, strength, opportunities and in the use of the experience

One woman bemoaned to a friend the fact that she had a besetting sin, forgetting her teakettle and letting it boil dry. "I can't seem to remember to fill it and I am always getting interested in something else and leaving it on the gas or range until it is burnt. I have lost many a teakettle spout in that

Making a mistake once, twice or three times may be excusable, and accidents will happen, but continuing to make the same mistakes again and again and to suffer the consequence is, to say the least, an extravagance and un-The carcless one in regard to teakettles wondered herself that she wasn't

cured, because of the penalty that her family, as well as herself, is always obliged to suffer for a day or so following a boiling-dry episode.

"No matter what I do," she complained, "the water always has a burnt taste for two or three days, and it gives the tea such a peculiar flavor.

"What do you do?" asked the friend.
"I usually take the kettle from the range and plunge it into cold water. Frequently I put a big lump of washing soda in the kettle, almost fill it with water, and let it boil and boil, then rinse it thoroughly. But the taste seems

"You don't need to go to all that trouble," said the friend. "Just take the kettle from the fire and put it in a dry place to thoroughly cool before putting in any water. You will find you can boil the water in it for your very next cup of tea and it won't taste burnt at all."

The woman who lets kettles boil dry compressed her lips and answered:

The woman who leds kettles but dry competence."

"Really, I think I have tried everything within reason."

"But have you tried my plan?" persisted the friend.

"I can't say that I have," was the reply, "and I don't really see how the kettle can be free from a taint of the burning for so simple a treatment. Their customers can afford to pay. They have always been accustomed to what are considered the "best cuts," and they still keep ordering them. Between 200 and 300 pounds of meat a week finds its way to rendering plant

in the "bone baskets" collected at the butcher shors. This is entirely apart from meat wasted in hotels, restaurants and homes through ordering in too large quantities, improper cooking and carelessness.

Meantime England is having "meatless days" and famine conditions prevai A correspondent who uses the nom-de-plume "Economize." suggests that the butchers might organize an exchange by which the poorer districts could get the chance to purchase the cheap cuts, and leave the choicer, higher-priced

ones to those in more favorable atroumstances. Since it is stated that it is necessary to shove up the price of meat in order to cover the waste if business is to be continued, the suggestion of "Economize" is one to which the civic high cost of living committee might well give serious

attention, following the success met in the gardening campaign. TO TEACH COOKING THIFT.

A butcher in one of the "bigh-toned residential districts" said the other "If only my customers would occasionally buy the less expensive cuts, I am sure they could prepare them just as appetitizingly as the dearer and find in them equal, if not greater, nourishment."

The less choice portions naturally require more care in cooking if they are to compare favorably with the "first cuts." Ingenuity is demanded to make a boiled dinner as inviting as one in which the chief dish is a sirioin roast, a leg of lamb, or a porterhouse steak. Also, the taste of a finicky family needs cultivating. Funny, isn't it, the way people who are capable of great sacrifices register protests against minor self-denials?

The value of lectures and demonstrations in awakening interest and bringing results has been strikingly illustrated in London in the gardening epidemic resulting from the educational campaign in progress since last fall.

Why not a similar campaign along the lines of thrift in purchasing and

Not a general haranguing on the subject, a preaching at the housewives to be more economical, but a course of practical lessons in marketing to the best advantage, selecting food on scientific principles and cooking it to obtain the maximum of flavor and nutriment.

When a household science expert recently gave a series of lectures of furnishing the home, shopping and kindred themes in this city, fair matrons and maids turned out daily in such hrongs in cold, stormy weather that not more than half who wanted to hear

SUMMER HEAT AND MEAT EXTRAVAGANCE.

A number of London butchers state that weather conditions have a marked effect on the choice of meat by consumers. In warm weather, from now on, the demand for shanks for soups and boiling pieces decreases. Taste becomes more fastidious. One butcher says, "I sometimes wonder what I'll do in the summer time. All my customers want steak, steak, steak, sirloin and porterhouse, and

it is almost impossible to sell anything else."

In view of the fact that meat is such a large item of expense in the household account book, this seems the very time to arrange for those war-time thrift in marketing and cooking lectures and demonstrations.

If anybody says it is poor economy to use fuel to make soups and cook meats in a manner requiring a long time over or in the heat when the range meats in a manner requiring a long time over or in the heat when the range isn't required for warmth, just advise trying a fireless cooker, which will soon save its cost in fuel, and start in earning money. For that matter, a fireless cooker can be made at home, not to serve so many purposes, perhaps, as the purchased one, but quite satisfactorily, nevertheless. Full instructions for making one are published in the cookbook issued by a local drug firm.

METHOD OF CLEARING LAND OF COUCH GRASS

Harrowing and Plowing Almost Completely Exterminated Weed.

When the land for the experimental station now located at Morden, Man. was purchased in 1915, it was found to be badly infested with couch grass (also called quack, twitch or quick grass).

In an effort to exterminate this weed 55 acres of that part of the farm which appeared to be the worst infected was reated as follows:

About the 1st of June it was plowed our inches deep and well harrowed. The spring-tooth cultivator was then used, serving to draw the roots well to the top of the ground. Next a chain harrow was employed. This instrument prought all the loose grass to the surface and left it in large rolls all over the field. These rolls were then forked into heaps to dry and were burned about August 1.
