We have a strong impression based upon the accused's conduct in the past and as it is known to the public he has been charged with murder that the accused is not in a mental condition to understand what s going on. 





Inspector Tustin Claims Delay Due to Lack of Humane Society Car.

FIFTEEN CALLS DAILY

ehicle Essential to Guard Health of Community, Says Officers.

From cases which are brought to the attention of the local Humane Society, it is very evident that Inspector Tustin has most excellent backing for his statement that a conveyance is an absolute necessity in order that humane work may be arried on effectively in the city.

The inspector reports a case of a dog which has bee nlying dead on Richmond street, near St. Joseph's Hospital for two days. Mr. Tustin stated that this was the first case of the kind which he had not been able to attend to promptly in two years, but owing to so many de-mands on his time and the lack of any conveyance whatever, it had been impossible for him to attend to the matter. He further asserts that the average number of calls sent in the Humane Society each day is fifteen, and without any means of conveyance whatever he is unable to at-

"Some means of conveyance which could be relied upon in the case or animals lying dead on the street is absolutely essential,' said the spector. "It is not only a benefit to humane society work, but an absolute necessity in safeguarding the health of the public. If that incident had occurred in June or July the stench would be unbearable."



At the present time 350 boys and girls in the two provinces were being cared for by Kiwanans. As the result of the Chicago convention he expected that the movement would also spread to all parts of the United States.

Left To Women. "The appeal of Kiwanis to men," was the subject of an inspiring address by Mr. Mowat. The Kiwanis movement, Mr. Mowat said, open ways for community service to men which hitherto had been closed or undiscovered. Community work in the past, he said, was left chiefly to women, but now through their club activities men were taking a genuine interest wherever there were Ki-

wanis clubs. The movement, he said, appealed to the business instinct of men and so by harnessing the masculine power of the country community work and service had been given a tremendous impetus.

The act provides that milk be paid for on the basis of butter fat instead of by the pound,

We have been urging the farmers to produce higher quality milk for years, but we have not been paying for it. The result is that the butter fat content of milk averaged lower in Ontario last year than it did twenty years ago.

Was Unaware of Authorization Until After Telegram Was Published.

WHY MONTAGU RESIGNED

Gave Permission for Announcing Message Without Consulting Prime Minister.

LONDON, Eng., March 13. - Lord Curzon, the secretary for foreign affairs, was unaware that Edwin S. Montagu, as secretary for India, had authorized the publication of the Indian government's recent telegram on the Moslem attitude towards Turkey until after Mr. Montagu had sent his message granting permissio for the publication, said a statement issued at the foreign office today on behalf of Lord Curzon, who is ill with neuritis at his country home. Lord Curzon was not notified until it was too late to prevent publication,

the statement said. Did Not Consult Premier.

When the house met this afternoon had nothing to do with the merits of the policy advocated by the government of India, but only with the publication, on his sole responsibility, without consulting the prime minister or the cabinet, of a telegram which raised questions, the importance of which extended far beyond the frontiers of India.





#### RUSSIA ASKED TO FREE SOCIALISTS

Soviet Authorities Receive Indignant Protest From Social Democratic Party of Sweden.

5,000 GEORGIANS JAILED

Held in Prison For Failure to Submit To Communist Occupation of Their Country.

STOCKHOLM, March 13 .- The Social Democratic party of Sweden, of E. Day, explains his reason. which Premier Branting is the head, the imprisonment of 5,000 Socialists in Georgia and Russia. The message, which was sent to

Moscow by a special courier, asserts: "The working class of Sweden has received reports regarding the treatment by the Soviet government of Russian and Georgian Socialists, which have aroused stupefaction and anger. More than 200 Russian Socialists of different groups have been forced to resort to hunger strikes in order to call the world's attention to the sufferings to which hey are exposed and in order to obtain forcibly an improvement of their conditions.

Five thousand Georgian Social Democrats are now in prison on account of their not having voluntarily submitted to the force of Russian oc cupation. Others are deported by thousands or are forced to keep hiding in order to escape the fate of

those already arrested. 'It ought not to be possible that government, that has repeatedly de clared itself to be following a policy Deputy District Attorney C. W. founded on socialist principles, sub-Fricke yesterday in the opening argu- mit its Socialist antagonists to such a treatment. U. S. Will Not Allow Allies To Take All German

> Payments. MAKES PRONOUNCEMENT

Washington Authority Claims Some Recompense for Rhineland Occupation Sought.

WASHINGTON, March 13.-It was stated on highest authority today that the United States government does not intend to allow the Allies to take all that Germany can pay in reparations and leave nothing for the United States as recompense for expenses incurred in the occupation of the Rhineland.

This pronouncement of the United States government policy was occasioned by a press dispatch from Paris to the effect that Allied governments contemplated deferring payments to the United States for the Rhineland occupation, on the ground that the United States gov ernment had not ratified the Versailles treaty.
