London, June 9.—The approach of the first serious parliamentary crisis in the free trade-protection fight filled every seat in the House of Commons this afternoon.

### EARLY WIND-UP OF LEGISLATURE

But Little Business Left to Be Considered.

#### RAILWAYS AND ESTIMATES

The Principal Items—Loan Company Legislation—Gamey Report Lay Have Short Debate.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, June 8.—The winding-up of the Legislature is in sight, judging from utterances dropped by the party leaders on the floor today. Saturday next was mentioned as a possible day for prorogation, but it is likely that this is an over-sanguine view which will scarcely be realized. The middle of the month, however, will probably witness the closing hours of the session. The only matters of importance awaiting discussion are the railway resolutions, the supplementary estimates and the report of the Gamey commission.

Before the orders of the day were reached Colonel Matheson said that a very serious charge was being investigated by the public accounts committee. The disclosures made as a result of the investigation prompted him to ask the House to pass the following resolution:

"That the grant of timber limits on islands in the Georgian Bay to Messrs. Cane Bros. and the grant of timber limits in the Township of Capriol to Messrs. Chew Bros. and all matters in any way connected with the said limits and the consideration given therefor be referred to the committee on public accounts for investigation, and that Messrs. Thomas Chew, George Chew, John Chew and Edward Leathersby of Midland, be summoned to appear before the committee on Wednesday next, at 10 a.m., with all books and papers relating to the said limits, including the books of the former firm of Chew Bros. relating to the limits in the Township of Capriol."

The Attorney-General opposed the passage of the resolution. The Cane Bros. matter, he said, had already been before the House. It had its genesis in the Government's purchase of the islands of the Georgian Bay in their wooded condition. Mr. Gibson did not think that an inquiry should be held at this late date. If one were held he did not suppose that an inquiry could be satisfactorily conducted under two or three weeks. The rate of progress the public accounts committee was making.

The Premier announced that it was in order to project an inquiry such as Col. Matheson proposed.

"Then why not have an inquiry?" Col. Matheson asked.

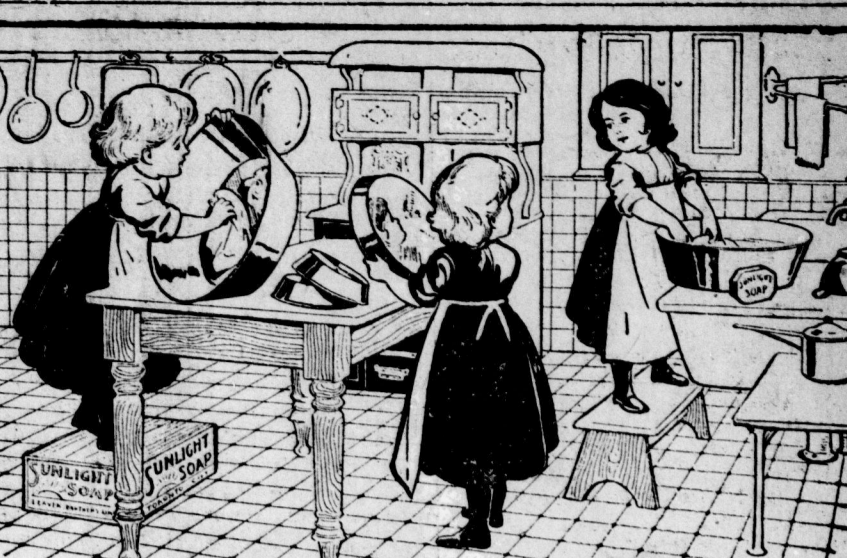

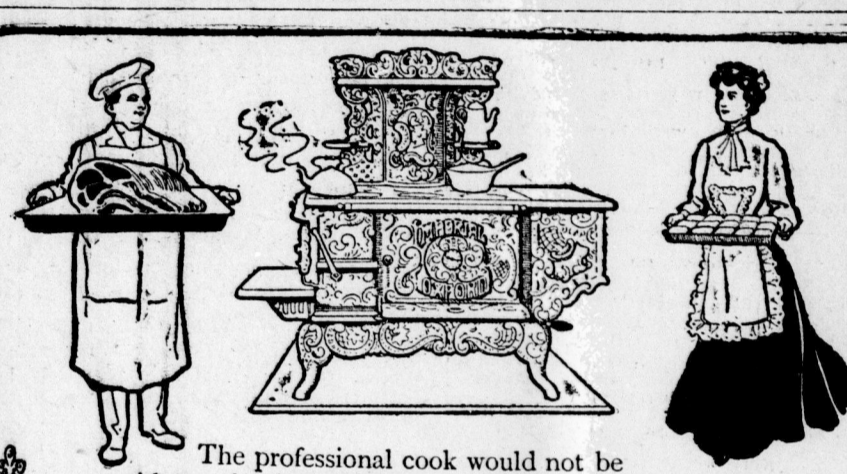
