

### NOW FOR THE BIG LAND FIGHT.

Latest dispatches from the seat of war denote a temporary lull in the fighting, although unofficial dispatches say a third naval battle has been fought off Port Arthur, in which seven Russian warships and four Jap torpedo boats had been sunk or destroyed. Russia is pulling herself together after the terrific hammering of the Mikado's fleets, but so far as the sea is concerned she cannot take the aggressive for some time. Recognizing this, Japan is pouring troops into Korea, one army by way of Gensang on the east coast, and the other by way of Chemulpo on the west coast. These two armies are expected to converge in the vicinity of the Yalu River and drive back the invading Cossacks who are already massed on the south bank of the stream. The Japs plan is to form two lines of defense. Ping-Yang is likely to be the scene of the first battle or if the Mikado's first line are unable to cope with the Russians a decisive contest may be fought in the vicinity of Seoul.

The strength of the Russian forces is believed to be greatly overestimated. It is thought they have not more than 35,000 men with which to tackle the Japs. The imperial court at St. Petersburg is greatly depressed at the defeats. Much anti-British feeling prevails in the Russian capital. Later details of the Chemulpo fight show that two hundred men perished in the destruction of the cruiser Variag. Reports that Japs attempted a landing at Port Arthur are denied at Tokio.

There is more talk of the Russian Baltic fleet being dispatched to the Far East. The battleships Czarevitch and Retvizan have been floated. Lloyds are insuring against war between France and Great Britain within six months.





## JAP ENSIGN WHO

Heroic Self-Sacrifice During War With China.

### DIRECTED TORPEDO WITH HANDS

Remarkable Story Illustrating Fearlessness of the Men Who Ventured Into Port Arthur.




