## NEW WELLS IN TILBURY

Maple City Co. Shoot Two New Wells Yesterday Afternoon

Well On Robertson Farm Produces Both Oil And Gas

Tuesday afternoon a party, consisting of Messrs. J. P. Dickson, Mike Eagan, J. M. Pike and J. W. Aitkin, left for the Tilbury oil fields in one of the large cars recently built by the Chatham Motor Car Company. They went out to witness the shooting of the Maple City Company's new well on the Robertson farm, which is situated on the south-east quarter of lot 11, Middle Road South, Tilbury East. They also saw the No. 7 well on the Irwin farm shot.

The new well on the Robertson farm was shot Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock, said Mr. Pike, while in conversation with a Planet reporter. "After the well was shot, a column of oil 75 feet high spurted up above the derrick, and the strong breeze which was blowing at the time carried the yellow stuff over the farm for some distance. According to the testimony of a number of experienced oil drillers who were present, the Robertson well is one of the best in the field both for oil and for gas. The gas capacity of this well is estimated at 750,000 cubic feet per day, and the oil production will run between 100 and 200 barrels daily.

The well on the Irwin farm proved to have a capacity of 10 to 15 barrels per day, and is making good.

Both of these wells are owned by the Maple City Oil and Gas Company. The well shot on the Robertson farm yesterday was the first drilled on this fifty acres, and shows that the Maple City Company made no mistake about the location. Mr. Dickson, who represents eastern capitalists, expressed himself as highly gratified with the field and the immense possibilities it shows. Every day there appears to be greater activity in the field, and more wells are being sunk in every direction.

Tuesday night was to witness the Maple City Company's first illumination at Merlin. (Field Superintendent Curry informed the Chatham party Tuesday afternoon that they had had three more feet of piping to lay to Merlin. The gas is being piped to Merlin from the Burgess farm, and the company have received orders from almost every household in the village.

## NEW FACTORIES ASSIST TO REDUCE THE TAX RATE

Ald. Westman Finds That Twelve Factories, Alone In Chatham Contribute Annually Above All Expenses To The City, A Sum Of \$7,426.26—

Wolverine Proposition A Good One

The chairman of the Industrial Committee of the City Council has been looking up some statistics in reference to the amount of revenue the city receives annually from the different industries in the city. He finds that twelve of the industries already located in the city are paying to the city in taxes, over and above what it cost the city to get them here, an annual sum of \$7,426.26.

This money is devoted each year towards reducing the city tax rate. He also finds that the industries receiving concessions from the city are always prompt in their payments of money loaned to them, both principal and interest. At present there is not one cent coming to the city from any industry. This is a good record, and disproves the arguments which have been advanced in some quarters, that the people have no guarantee that the money loaned to these companies will be paid back. There has never been any trouble in this respect with Chatham industries.

This is gratifying information, and should settle all doubt in the minds of certain persons who have been inclined to doubt the solidity of the Wolverine Brass Company proposition. Ald. Westman reports that the men who are working for the Brass Works By-law are meeting with great encouragement. At present, there seems to be no doubt that the by-law will carry. It is seldom that a citizen takes a stand in opposition to it, after he has heard all of the terms of the city's agreement with the company. It is generally recognized that this is the very best proposition ever offered to Chathamites.

This company was started in Grand Rapids by Mr. Cornelius, one of the members of the present firm. He started up in a basement with only one lathe. Inside of ten years the company has grown to such proportions that they now employ in their American factory 150 hands. Last year they did half a million dollars' worth of business. They are now doing \$150,000 worth of business in Canada each year, and their business is growing all the time. The workmen of Canada should receive the wages for manufacturing that \$150,000 worth of goods each year, in preference to the workmen of Grand Rapids.

## PLANS COMPLETED FOR NEW TELEPHONE OFFICE

W. D. Sheldon has sold one of the frame houses located on Sixth St., and it has been removed to the corner of School and Centre streets. Mr. Sheldon is now making arrangements to dispose of his warehouses and office buildings.

It is understood that the arrangements for the erection of the new Bell Telephone central station are about completed. Architect Carmichael, of Montreal, has completed the plans, and tenders for the work will be advertised for. The building will occupy the whole of the seventy-five foot frontage, an archway being built over the present driveway to the barns at the rear.

The new building which Mr. Sheldon will erect and lease to the Telephone Company will greatly improve the appearance of Sixth street.

## TO GET THE CIRCUS MONEY

The case in question is against George S. Hull, a tea and coffee merchant of Owen Sound. The police discovered that Hull was soliciting orders in Chatham, and shipping his merchandise from Owen Sound, which is contrary to the Transient Trader by-law. The defendant said that he would plead guilty to the charge of selling the tea and coffee and shipping it from Owen Sound. This will probably make a good test case to prove whether the Transient law holds good or not.

WOMEN WAGE EARNERS.

Bulletin No. 1 of the Census and Statistics office of Canada, which makes a report on and statistics of wage earners in Canada by occupations, compiled from data of the census of 1901, contains matter in classified form of a most valuable nature. It shows at that period a total of 922,591 persons in the Dominion were enumerated by occupations embracing 735,549 males and 186,042 females. But of this number the records for 75,064 males and 32,597 females were incomplete. Full statistics were compiled for 861,485 males and 153,445 females, and more than 99 per cent. of these were under 65 years. In 1901 the population, 15 to 64 years inclusive, comprised 1,652,990 males and 1,569,637 females, and therefore about 40 per cent. of the former and ten per cent. of the latter were fully enumerated as wage earners.

In considering the earnings of female employees the compilers quote from the work of John A. Hobson on the "Evolution of Modern Capitalism," in support of the view that the question of the employment of women in industrial occupations has other interests than the earning of wages: "When industry was chiefly confined to domestic handicrafts," John A. Hobson says, "the claims of home life constantly pressed in and tempered the industrial life. The growth of factory work among women has brought with it inevitably a weakening of home interests and a neglect of home duties. The home has suffered what the factory has gained. Even the shortening of the factory day, accompanied as it has been by an intensification of labor during the shorter hours, does not leave the women competent and free for the proper ordering of home life. Home work is consciously slighted as secondary in importance and inferior, because it brings no wages, and if not neglected is performed in a perfunctory manner, which robs it of its grace and value. This narrowing of the home into a place of hurried meals and sleep is on the whole the worst injury modern industry has inflicted on our lives, and it is difficult to see how it can be compensated by an increase of material products. Factory life for women, save in extremely rare cases, saps the physical and moral health of the family. The exigencies of factory life are inconsistent with the position of a good mother, a good wife, or the maker of a home. Save in extreme circumstances no increase of the family wage can balance these losses, whose values stand upon a higher qualitative level."

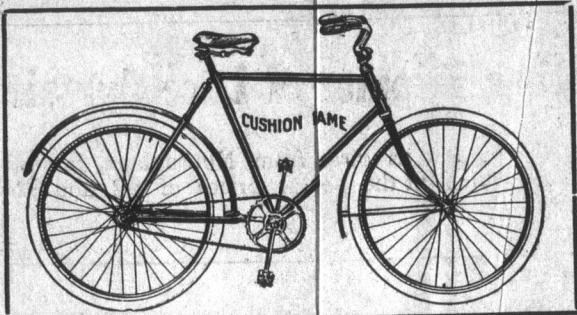

## TRIAL TO BE OPPOSED

Counsel Will Object to Indictment of Douglas.

Public Feeling in Province Still at Fever Heat—It is Said Douglas Will Go Free—Was Witness for Crown—Counsel Says It Would Be Breach of Honor—Case to Be Called To-day.

Orangeville, May 29.—The Douglas case will go on to-day at 10 o'clock, with E. F. B. Johnston of Toronto chief counsel for the accomplice of Jackson. He will arrive this morning, and it is understood will at once go to the court house, where he will fight tooth and nail the crown's evident purpose of bringing Douglas to trial. Public feeling is still at fever heat, but it is generally understood that despite all protests from the citizens and the country at large, Douglas will go free, in fact, it is openly stated that the trial will not last half an hour. Mr. Johnston stated that he had been retained in the case from the first, and that he intended to take the stand that Douglas should not, nor could not, come to trial after he had been used as a material witness against Jackson, first at the inquest, again at the extradition, and again before the grand jury.

"Never," said the lawyer, "in the whole history of the crown has such a course been pursued. Why, it would be a great breach of honor on the part of the crown to hear and use a man's statement against him. It has never been done in any case before where an accomplice was afterwards tried on his own story. I don't believe the crown will attempt to bring Douglas to trial, and I certainly will object to any trial at all. "I have too much confidence in Mr. Whitney as Attorney-General of this province to think that he would go against all precedents in this country and in England, by ordering a trial. It would be a great breach of honor on his part, and I am sure that he will not listen to the clamor of public opinion. He is too shrewd a man to use a statement given in confidence to the crown against a man in Douglas' position. "If it were not for Douglas the crown would have had no case against Jackson."

## DOCTOR GETS BOMB.

Police Now Inspect Infernal Machine Left By Blackhand.

New York, May 29.—Detectives are trying to obtain a clue to the sender of a dangerous infernal machine, which was received yesterday by Dr. D. D. Darrian, a local physician.

When the machine was opened at police headquarters, it was found to contain three shells, loaded with shot, arranged to explode when the lid of the box was opened. On the inside of the box was drawn a crude skull and crossbones, with the following scrawl: "We hope this will kill you. If it does not, we will get you yet. (Signed) Blackhand."

## EDITOR'S NARROW ESCAPE.

Slashed by Italian Who Was Looking For Revenge.

Pittsburg, May 29.—An unknown Italian made an attempt yesterday to assassinate M. Cancellieri, prior and editor of The La Triunferia, an Italian paper. The man had slashed Cancellieri across the right side of the face with a small stiletto. Cancellieri had been vigorous in his denunciation of several Italians who had been swindling their countrymen.

## Will Protect the Japs.

Washington, May 29.—Secretary Root yesterday received from the Governor of California a wire stating that he would call the attention of the chief of police of San Francisco at once to the matter and request him to use every effort to protect these people. He thinks the assaults were due largely to uncertain conditions existing in San Francisco by reason of the labor troubles.

The State Department has taken notice of their action in the matter, but undoubtedly will communicate Governor Gillett's telegram to the Japanese embassy, and belief is expressed that it will satisfactorily meet their complaint.

## Japs Look For Revenge.

San Francisco, May 29.—For a murderous assault committed by Japanese armed with knives on Horace Hazell a young dentist, and Randolph Merriweather, an electrician, Monday the police have taken M. Tugimova, Niki Kapiro and S. Hama into custody. They are held pending the outcome of the victim's injuries.

The theory of the detectives is that the Japanese believed Randolph Merriweather was Richard Merriweather, who was arrested a week ago for assaulting a Japanese.

Resolution Condemning Terrorism. St. Petersburg, May 29.—Advantage was taken yesterday of the absence of Conservative members of the Lower House of Parliament to bring up the resolution condemning terrorism, and the House decided, by 219 to 146 votes, to table indefinitely the whole discussion, which is one of the most burning questions before Parliament.

Czar Again Congratulated. St. Petersburg, May 29.—About 20 Conservative members of the Lower House of Parliament, headed by Count Borinsky, were received in audience by Emperor Nicholas yesterday at Tsarskoye-Selo and congratulated him on his escape from the recent plot against his life.

Attack Wealthy Towns. Swatow, China, May 29.—The revolutionists are now attacking Chung-tung and Tunching, wealthy towns in the Chinese district. Many of the inhabitants have fled to this city. The rising is attributed to excessive taxation.

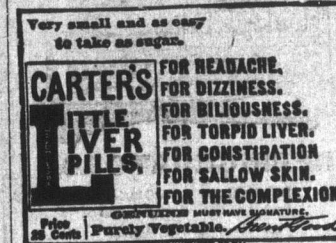

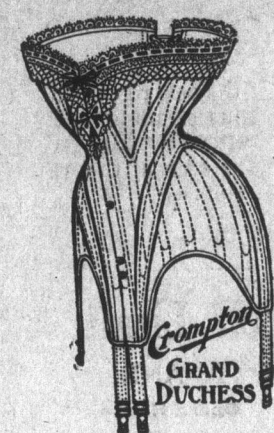

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**THEY FOUGHT WITH THIEVES**

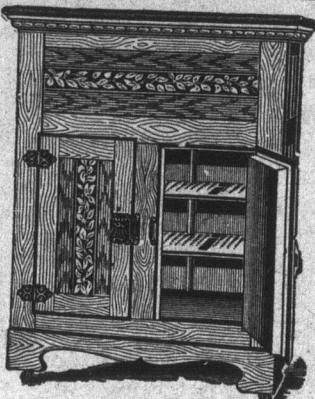

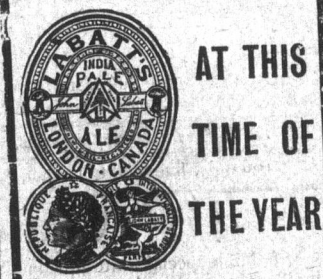

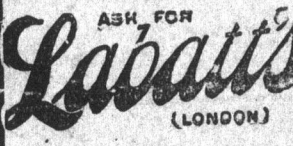

## ROBBERY THE MOTIVE?

Victim of Trunk Murder Was  
Carrying Large Sum.

Father Vartarian Too Cautious to Be-  
long to Secret Society—Believed to  
Have Been Murdered in Hoboken  
—Would Not Entrust His Hoard  
to the Bank—Police Suspect Three  
Men.

New York, May 29.—With the police  
of a score of cities searching the Ar-  
menian colonies in their jurisdiction  
and every available man on Captain  
McCarthy's staff working in New  
York City, it is expected that the  
three men suspected of the murder of  
Father Kaspar Vartarian, whose body  
was found in a trunk on Sunday, will  
soon be in custody.

It is believed now that Father Kas-  
par was murdered in Hoboken. The  
last time he was seen alive in Man-  
hatten he was walking towards the  
West 42nd street ferry with a man an-  
swering Ermoylan's description and  
a woman.

Robbery is now considered the sole  
motive for the crime. Deliberate at-  
rocious murder for the sake of two  
thousand or more dollars the miserly,  
itinerant, begging priest carried is  
the sole theory on which the police  
are now working or have been work-  
ing from the start, as a matter of fact,  
Vartarian was too cautious to involve  
himself with any of the Armenian  
revolutionary societies who carry on  
continuous intrigue against the Tur-  
kish Government.

Friends said Monday that he must  
have had about \$2,000 in his posses-  
sion when he was killed, for he could  
not be induced to entrust his hoard-  
ings to any bank. When he got too  
much money to safely carry he would  
send it home.

## HAD GAMBLER IN STOCKS.

Reason For Double Tragedy At Bright  
Found.

Woodstock, May 29.—It is now al-  
most an established fact that the tra-  
gedy at Bright Village, in which Wil-  
liam McKie, the druggist of Kalamazoo,  
Mich., who returned unexpectedly  
and killed his aged mother, and  
then suicided, was the result of finan-  
cial difficulties.

McKie only bought a single-fare  
ticket, was in a very non-communi-  
cative frame of mind when he arriv-  
ed, and burned all the late letters  
which he had written to his mother,  
and which might have told of his un-  
easiness over the growing seriousness  
of his position relative to the mine  
speculations.

He had lost all his mother's money  
as well as his own, had mortgaged  
the home, and was in the hole with  
his business for nearly two thousand  
dollars, and had contracted large  
loans from friends in Kalamazoo,  
which he never hoped to recover from.

It was the Pearl Mining Company  
of Boise, Idaho, that McKie was con-  
nected with, he having been a director  
and vice-president. He had gotten  
friends to invest in the stock also.

## KILLED BY WIFE AND SON.

Took Their Revenge For Years of  
Torture.

Parkersburg, W. Va., May 29.—  
Word was received here Monday night  
of a murder in Ritchie County, near  
McFarlan, in which a mother and  
son killed the husband and father  
while he lay asleep in his bed. The  
victim was Harvey Yohe, farmer.  
According to the reports, Yohe, after  
a quarrel in which his wife and son  
John participated, went to bed. It  
is alleged that they stole to his bed-  
room and fired two shots from a re-  
volver, one entering his head and the  
other his body. Mrs. Yohe and the  
son gave themselves up to the au-  
thorities, and are now in jail at Par-  
kersburg. They acknowledge the mur-  
der, and say they are ready to pay  
the penalty. They say they had been  
subjected to torture for years.

## ASSAULT AND MURDER.

The Shocking Confession of Lawrence  
Gowland of Killarney, Man.

Killarney, Man., May 29.—Lawrence  
Gowland yesterday confessed to the  
horrible crime of assaulting and mur-  
dering Georgina Brown, near here,  
last week. He is nearly recovered  
from the effects of his own wounds,  
and will receive a preliminary hear-  
ing to-day.

## Lunatic Fires House.

Brockville, May 29.—An insane man  
named J. Deschamps, attempted to  
burn his wife and family, near Ray-  
mondville.

Getting up in the night he sprinkled  
coal oil about the house and barn,  
then touched the match. Fortunately  
the inmates awoke in time to escape.  
Nothing was saved in the house or  
barn except one horse.

## Judge Accused of Murder.

Covington, Ky., May 29.—Judge W.  
G. Loving was yesterday indicted for  
the murder of Theodore Fests, whom  
he charged with wronging his daugh-  
ter. Judge Loving pleaded not guilty  
and was bailed in \$7,000, the surety  
being Judge John D. Horsley of  
Lynchburg.

## Shoots Mother, Then Suicides.

Chicago, May 29.—Miss Philander  
Swinnen, 30 years old, believed to be  
demented, shot and killed her mother,  
attempted to kill her father, and then  
set fire to her garments and was  
burned to death early yesterday.

## French Battleship Launched.

Bordeaux, France, May 29.—The  
new French battleship Verite, of 14,  
635 tons and 18,000 indicated horse-  
power, was successfully launched here  
yesterday.

## A Million Dollar Plant.

Bellefonte, May 29.—The Lehigh  
Cement Co., whose works will be situ-  
ated at Point Ann, about four miles  
from here, have begun active opera-  
tions.

#### MILK MUST BE PURE.

Dairymen's Association on Track of Dishonest Farmers.  
Toronto, May 29.—Thomas Ballantyne of Stratford, and J. Paget of Cambridge, representing the Western Dairymen's Association, waited on the Hon. Nelson Monaghan, Minister of Agriculture, yesterday afternoon, to request that the Government inspectors of cheese factories should not only inspect the milk coming in, but should institute prosecutions against those found supplying milk which might not be up to the standard. The Minister could not promise that the inspectors would undertake those duties, but willingly gave his sanction to the suggestion of the deputations that the association should engage men both to test the milk and press cases against delinquents. The duties of these officials will, of course, not conflict in any way with those of the Government inspectors.

#### FRANCE AN JAPAN.

Signature to Be Attached to Convention This Week.  
Paris, May 29.—In accord on the Franco-Japanese convention is complete. The Japanese Minister, M. Kurino, and Foreign Minister Pichon will exchange signatures before the week-end in order to prevent the possibility of a misunderstanding. The terms of the agreement to Washington, with assurances that it is in no way directed against the United States. The American Government, after an examination of the terms replied that it had absolutely no objection to the convention. The impression prevails in diplomatic circles here that despite the Monroe doctrine the United States diplomats are negotiating a treaty with Japan along lines similar to those of the Franco-Japanese agreement.

#### MRS CADBURY SUICIDES.

Wife of Chocolate King Takes Life At 54.  
Vancouver, B. C., May 29.—Mrs. Richard Cadbury, widow of the famous chocolate king, committed suicide on board the steamer Empress of China on her way from Yokohama to Vancouver on May 21. She and her daughter had been traveling in Palestine. Mrs. Cadbury suffered greatly from sea sickness and general depression on the way out from Yokohama, and when a few days later port jumped from the promenade deck to the after deck, where Chinese passengers were quartered. She sustained injuries from which she died in a few hours and the same day was buried at sea.

#### FISHING SCHONERS LOST.

Cruiser Sent Out Returns With No News.  
Sydney, N.S.W., May 29.—The French cruiser D'Estaing, which arrived at St. Pierre and reports having failed to find any trace of the two fishing schooners, the Blanche and Laffemme, which sailed for the banks about two months ago. The warship on her return picked up the French barge Hurdelle, which was badly damaged in a collision at sea with the brig Anna Maria. The collision occurred during a heavy fog on the banks and both vessels were badly damaged.

The warship report considerable ice on the banks and very little fish.

#### Alarm Has Subsided.

Winnipeg, Man., May 29.—Hon. Frank Oliver, Minister of the Interior, arrived in Winnipeg from the West yesterday morning. He said the throughout the western provinces the seeding is now well advanced, and in many sections is practically completed. The alarm that was first raised regarding the unseasonable weather conditions, because of the lateness of the spring, has now subsided.

#### Cook's Hard Experience.

Port Huron, Mich., May 29.—Margaret Kelly, a marine cook, lost both her feet through amputation here yesterday. Mrs. Kelly was cook on the barge Lilly Smith, which was beached in Georgian Bay last Friday. When the boat struck rock a tank of boiling water was thrown over the woman, which scalded her feet and legs. She lay for several hours in the small boat in which the crew made their escape.

#### Mining Prospector Killed.

Cobalt, May 29.—Patrick Leclair, a mining prospector, who came here from Buckingham, Que., was killed by a yard engine on the T. and N. O. Railway. Leclair was standing against a coal dock, and the vibration of the ground caused by the motion of the engine knocked the dock so that it collapsed.

#### Almost Poked to Death.

St. Catharines, May 29.—Neil McCann of Merrifield had a narrow escape from death. He had been eating some corned beef, and a good particle came lodged in the esophagus. Dr. Herod of Thorold was called in and succeeded in probably saving his life by forcing the obstacle out of his throat.

#### To Live With Mrs. Wm. Shaw.

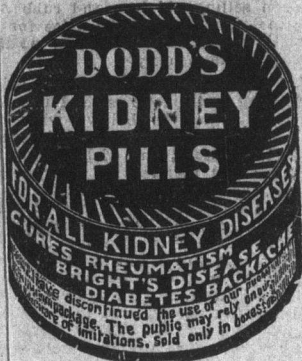

#### Bribery Employing Police.

San Francisco, May 29.—Assistant District Attorney Hensley said yesterday that it had been discovered that the police force was being used in an attempt to reach prospective jurors and witnesses in the prosecution of alleged bribery.

#### Snow At Ottawa.

#### Nation's Loss Through Drink.

Sir Thomas Whittaker, M.P., was one of the chief speakers at the annual "At Home" of the Keighley and District Chamber of Commerce, held in the Temperance Institute, Keighley, Eng., recently. Speaking of the large gathering of the commercial and trade leaders of the district, he gave some striking illustrations of the large expenditure of the nation on drink. He said: "The £175,000,000 we are now spending on intoxicants represents an enormous drain on our national resources. In view of the increasing keenness of present day competition. To illustrate: This same amount of money would either pay for all the flour, bread, milk, butter, cheese, and eggs we consume; or it would pay all the rates and taxes that we levy; or, if we preferred it, the amount would be enough to pay everybody's rent, or it would frank us all over the rails and trams and leave £60,000,000 over. Our people cannot afford to throw away their money on liquor. No wonder we have overcrowding, under-feeding, sickness, poverty and incompetence. Invested from the age of 30 years the same expenditure would provide at the age of 60 not a pension of 5s a week, but one of £2 for life."

#### Deadly Common Plants.

The things that give the most pleasure in life frequently can also cause the greatest pain. Among flowers, for instance, the beautiful snowdrop, the hyacinth, jonquil and narcissus are all poisonous, and to eat the smallest part of the root of either of them would produce fatal results, while the juices of the leaves will cause violent vomiting. The berries of the yew tree have killed many people, and the poppies have also claimed its victims. Lady's slipper and lily of the valley are both dangerous, and if the blossoms of crocus are chewed they will cause vomiting. Flowers from bulbous roots, however, seem to be the most dangerous, and it might not be out of place to dealers in these to label them with a crossbones and mark them poison.

#### The Iron Crown.

The famous iron crown of Lombardy was of gold and precious stones set in a thin ring of iron which was believed to have been formed from the nail of Christ's cross. It was made by order of the Queen of the Longobards in 591 and presented to her husband. With this crown Charlemagne was crowned and after him all the emperors who were kings of Lombardy. It was this same crown that Napoleon put on his head at Milan on May 26, 1805, exclaiming as he did so: "God has given it to me! Who to him who touches it!"

#### BAPTIZING OF SHIPS.

Origin of the Custom Found in Human Sacrifices.  
If fair young women sponsors who take a great deal of pride in breaking a bottle of champagne over the prow of a ship as she slides into the water for her first float knew something about the origin and significance of the custom, they would be so eager to see the bottle crash and the foaming liquid wet the sides of the vessel.

It is a survival of a barbaric custom, when sacrifices were made to the gods, and some living victim or offering was held up, when it was cut so that the blood flowed over the prow of the ship being launched. The vessel was baptized in warm blood. Now sparkling wine or pure water is used, and the change has many advantages, though the symbolism remains.

There is another curious custom aboard ship that is interesting in the way it has been handed down to us. When a dignitary visits a foreign country, the moment that his ship enters port a formal salute is fired as a signal of welcome. This custom was observed years ago, when it was considered the correct thing for a port to fire its guns to show the visiting stranger that the citizens and authorities placed such confidence in his friendliness that it was not considered necessary to keep the guns loaded, so all the shot was discharged.

#### Sea Serpent Angry.

A young Scotman named McNaughton, of Weston-super-Mare, Somerset, claims to have had an encounter with a sea serpent. He had taken a small boat out of Clevedon, and his story of his adventure is as follows: "I was conscious of a splash and sort of gurgle at the rear of the boat. I turned suddenly and uttered a cry of horror. Scarcely twenty yards away I saw—but really, I don't know how to describe it. It looked more like a huge mummy, the same as you see in the British Museum. From what I saw of the creature it appeared about ten or twelve feet long. It had large, sunken eyes, enveloped in a sort of hairy flap—I can't describe it better. At first I felt a kind of petrified sensation. I was transfixed with terror. Everything seemed so unreal. Then the snake-like creature dived straight at me. I was beginning to think it was a product of my imagination, a pure hallucination, when the water around the boat seemed to bulge and heave. The same black mass floated to the surface; the boat commenced to toss and whirl. I thought my day of reckoning had arrived. Then the creature dived again and again, many times, the boat every minute appearing about to capsize, then righting itself in the most remarkable fashion. What happened after I can only dimly recollect. The fishy monster seemed to leap out of the water as straight as an arrow for me. I hardly know what I did. I think I must have ducked and crashed the oar into the creature. At any rate, I was flung violently into the water. When I regained the surface I managed to get to the water's edge, and I clamber into the boat. My day of reckoning was now my night. In a dazed condition, scarcely knowing what I was doing, I succeeded in reaching Portishead." It is suggested that the serpent was nothing more dangerous than a porpoise. But Mr. McNaughton claims that his account is corroborated by witnesses on the shore.
