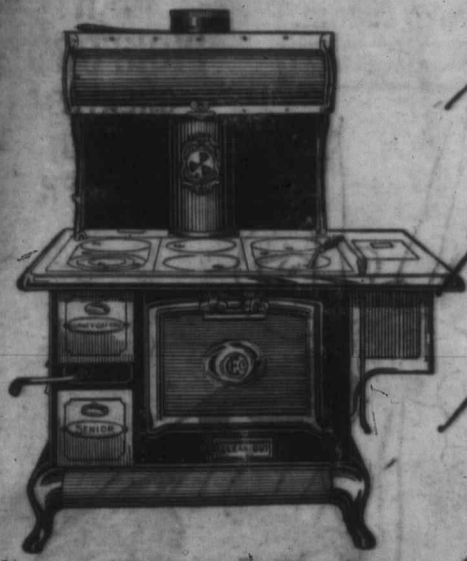

Increase in Subscription Price

As most of the Provincial newspapers have set the time of January 1, 1917, as the date they will advance subscription rate to \$1.50 we have decided to adopt the same date.

The Slump in Potatoes

The predicted slump in the price of potatoes has come, says a Montreal correspondent. On Friday the wholesale quotation was \$2.25 per bag for green mountains. On Saturday dealers stated they would not pay \$1.50. This state of affairs was brought about by the sudden cessation of exportation to Cuba and the turning of supplies to the Montreal and the Ontario markets.

Nova Scotia Apple Prices

A recent report of the fruit branch of the department of Agriculture, has the following concerning Nova Scotia apples: Apples shipped from Halifax to Nov. 11, 125399 barrels and 588 boxes. Prices for ordinary winter stock \$1.50 for No. 3, to \$3 for No. 1. Choice lots of No. 1, \$3.25 to \$3.75. Large quantities of apples being shipped West.

German Destroyers Again Raid Coast of England

London, Nov. 25.—A raid by 6 German torpedo boat destroyers on the English coast, which took place on Thursday night was announced officially today. The raid was ineffective, according to the statement, which declares that the six German destroyers participating in it steamed away quickly after a dozen rounds, one shell striking a small vessel, but causing little damage, and no injury to the crew.

Freights on Apples Too High

London importers are protesting strongly against the raising sometime ago of the apple rate from Halifax to \$2, as against \$1.25 last year 78 cents in 1914-15, 66 cents in 1915-16, and 60 cents in 1916-17. This places Nova Scotia apple rates on a level with those from New York and Portland, which, towards the close of last season, had already reached \$2. It is to be hoped that it will be possible to bring some pressure to bear upon the steamship company to secure a reduction, as rate treble the normal one will prove a very serious handicap on our exporters.

Brigadier General Borden Wounded

Word has just been received at Halifax that Brigadier General Allison H. Borden, of the Highland Brigade, has been slightly wounded. The cablegram states that Colonel Borden is on the firing line. Though it will be heard with regret that Colonel Borden has been wounded, the entire Province will rejoice that his injury was not a serious one. As the man who raised the Highland Brigade Colonel Borden has a very large place in the hearts of the people of Nova Scotia.

The Hero of Courcellette Returning to Kings Co.

Mrs. E. R. Hiltz of Kingsport has received word that her son Lieut. Harry W. Hiltz, has sailed from England and will be arriving in Canada early this week. This will be an opportunity for our citizens to do honor to the young hero who did such noble work all through the campaign and especially at Courcellette. He should receive a right hearty welcome home, so that others may see how we honor those who make sacrifice for us.

Canadians in New York Cheer Announcement That Canada is in War to Finish

New York, Nov. 20.—Canada's determination to wage to a triumphant issue, without truce or inconclusive peace, was emphasized by SSir Robert Laird Borden, premier of Canada, in a speech at a dinner of the Canadian Club of New York in this city tonight.

Outlining the great cause for which Canadians had thrown themselves into the struggle—alone of humanity and civilization, the premier said he had been commissioned to bring this message to Canadians in New York.

"We are as resolute and determined to maintain that cause to the end as we were on the day of August 4, 1914."

Potatoes Were Frozen

There was a fleet of sixteen or more Island schooners in port this week all loaded down with potatoes for shipment, for the most part to Upper Canada. The schooners were crowded into the railway dock in order to unload their cargoes into cars. There is a scarcity of cars and many of the freight trains bound to Upper Canada have not been moving very fast, with the result that there have been thousands of bushels of "spuds" frozen during the recent cold snap. A Montreal paper reports that the dealers there allowed the potatoes to remain in cars and be frozen, while they paid demurrage, sooner than have them go on the market and break the price. We hear that most of the potatoes were bought f.o.b. Montreal or wherever they were to be delivered. In that case the shipper at this end would suffer the loss. It seems a pity that in a year when food products are needed so badly, there should be such heavy losses.—Picton Advocate.

Brothers in the Belgian Army Paris, Nov. 22.—Two brothers of the new Austrian Empress, Princess Xavier and Sixte of Parma, are serving in the Belgian army. President Poincaré recently decorated both princes with the War Cross.

**Canadian Casualties Exceed Enlistments by About 15,000**

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—Canadian casualties since the first of June a little over 42,000, or a little over twice the total of casualties from the time the Canadian first got into the trenches until the end of last May. In August, 3,079, in September, 9,051 and in October, 14,321. The casualties this month have been so far decidedly lighter than in September or October but will still average several score per day.

The casualties and the wastage, through rejections of men found physically unfit on the second medical examination during the past five months Total approximately 15,000 more than the total number of enlistments.

In September and October total casualties were double the total of new recruits. The figures show the need of government action to systematize and speed up recruiting.

**Russian Dreadnought Sunk**

Petrograd, Nov. 23, via London, Nov. 24.—Russia officially announces the loss of the dreadnought Imperatritsa Maria. A statement issued tonight reads: "The Russian dreadnought Imperatritsa Maria has been sunk by an internal explosion. Two hundred of the crew are missing."

**Minister of Militia Appointed**

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—Hon. A. E. Kemp, M. P., for East Toronto, minister without portfolio, in the Borden cabinet and chairman since May, 1915, of the war purchasing commission has been sworn in as minister of militia in successor to Major-General Sam Hughes. The new minister was sworn in by His Excellency, the Governor-General at Rideau Hall this afternoon.

**A Large Estate**

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 21.—The will of Lieut.-Gov. MacKeen bequeaths his estate, valued at \$500,000 as follows:

An amount in trust to give an annual income of \$5,000 to his wife for life and \$2,500 to his daughter. Mrs MacKeen also is left \$20,000 and each son \$50,000. The sum of \$5,000 is left to the Presbyterian church and \$500 each to the School for the Blind, Infants' Home, Industrial School, School for Deaf and Old Ladies' Home. The residue to be divided in equal shares among his children.

A Port Wade correspondent in the Courier says: "Mr. Isaiah Wallace, gave a lecture in the hall on Friday evening, the 17th, relating his experiences of nearly two years in the war. Mr. Wallace was in New York when the war broke out and while taking a glass of beer in a saloon one evening, saw some Germans trampling down the English flag. He threw his beer in their faces and at once a fight was on, but as there were twelve to one, he was badly beaten that night and as soon as he was able he came to Nova Scotia to enlist, to have his revenge. As he was past fifty years of age he found some difficulty, but at last he succeeded and from Nov. 1914 to Oct. 1916 he has been doing his part until sent home for three months' rest from shell shock and shrapnel wounds."

**Freight Handled at New Halifax Terminals.**

Halifax, Nov. 26.—The first train of freight for overseas to be landed at the Halifax new ocean terminals arrived on Saturday. The train consisted of fourteen cars from the west, which was brought to the new shed.

Recently thirty car loads of "Rangoon" beans from India arrived in New York, for the Canadian trade. These and all other kinds of beans on the market for domestic use, cost in car lots \$6.50 per bushel.
