Union by the Mucklejohn family, and we are glad to record that their enterprise has so far been attended with success. The vessel was sold for a good price at Sydney. The New Zealander says:—"Among the passengers by the Sybil, are Captain Mucklejohn and family, whose adventurous enterprise in the building, outfit, and equipping of the Brig. Union, (constructed by himself at Prince Edward's Island) was long since recorded in these pages. The brigantine has been sold in Sydney, and the Mucklejohn family, impelled by the spirit of enterprise which has been their characteristic, have come to Auckland to cast their lot amongst us. We bid them heartily welcome, wishing their industry that full measure of success it so well deserves.

Dr. Livingston has arrived at the Cape of Good Hope. A proposition is under discussion to send a steamer to Patagonia, as a coasting vessel.
Hary, the horse-stealer, has given an exhibition of skill before the Queen.
It is rumored that the French Admiral Hamelin will resign as Chief of the Marine Department, and will be replaced by Prince Napoleon, already Minister of Affairs and the Colonies.
Fidelity persists in demanding indemnity in the affair of the "Leviathan."
The transformation of sailing ships into steamers is going on with great activity in France.
LATER FROM INDIA.
The latest telegraph advices from India are of considerable interest. Sir Hugh Ross has captured Calpee. He was assisted by Captain Harrison, and a rapid report of them was made, resulting in the capture of large stores of gun, elephants, gunpowder and camp equipage.
Several disturbances had occurred in the Bombay Presidency, as Constables of Calcutta and other places.
A political agent, with his escort, had been murdered by eight hundred rebels. Fort Copal had been stormed and taken by assault. Newsboys, likewise, had been stormed and taken.
The Nizam country was much disturbed by Arabs and Rohillas.
Sir Colin Campbell drove back the rebels to Shahjehanpore and captured Mohades, the daughter of George Oude was still in rebellion.
A strong rebel force was approaching Lucknow, but the city is strongly defended and garrisoned.
Sir E. Legard had defeated the rebels at Jhadsapore, with great slaughter.
Gwalior had been seized and plundered by the rebels.
THE LUCKNOW PRIZE MONEY.—The prize property discovered at Lucknow is said already to amount to a million and a quarter sterling.
