

In spite of the fact that millions of producers are in the army the savings of the people enormously increased. In 1912 and 1913 they were saving, per year, about \$20,000,000. In the first five months bition they saved \$60,000,000. In 1915 the banks under Pro took in \$265,000,000. For the first half of 1916, the Russian people saved \$300,000,000 !

Russia Prospers

Help to Enforce Prohibition

Permanent Prohibition in New Brunswick demands strict enforcement between now and the day when Prohibition may again be voted upon after the war. The whole task of enforcement must not be left to the ficers of the law alone. Everyone should help. Eternal vigilance is the watchword.
