How we Sell to Great Britain -But Buy from the United States - Our American Friends are Good Sellers But Bad Buyers-Preference Which Does Not Prefer.

The trade returns of the Dominion for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1906, show a large increase in Canadian commerce But there are some features in the business of the year which one would like to see different.

BRITAIN IS OUR BEST CUS-TOMER.

We sold Canadian merchandise to the value of \$214,381,282. Of this Great Britain took \$127,466, 471, and the United States only \$83.247.406.

On the other hand Canada imported for consumption goods to the value of \$290,342,408, of which Great Britain supplied us \$69,176,180, while we bought from the United States \$175,865,-418, or a good deal more than twice as much.

No doubt this is due in part to the character of the goods themselves, but the discrepancy is quite remarkable. Our imports of free goods from Great Britain were last year valued at \$16,578,863 and those from the United States at \$86,341,295, or about five times the amount. BUT WE ARE CUSTOMERS

Comparing last year with the year before we find in round figures an increase of \$36,000,000 in our total exports of Canadian merchandise. The United States took \$13,000,000 more than the year before and Great Beitain \$30,000,000 more than a year before. There was a considerable falling off in exports to Germany and some other countries.

But while our sales to Great Britain increased much more than our sales to the United States, Canadian purchases from the United States increased more than those from Great Britain. The increase of our imports for consumption from Great Britain was less than \$9,000,000 and that from the United States more than \$13,000,000.


