



War Imminent.

Special to Evening Telegram. LIMA, Peru, May 10. Active preparations are being made for a possible war with Ecuador. Volunteers are enlisting daily and the war fund is being constantly increased by private donations in this city and its immediate vicinity. Some 24,-000 soldiers are quartered, while 10,-000 additional troops are stationed near the frontier. The Peruvian Government believes that it has notable information that an effort is being made by Ecuador to obtain an alliance with Bolivia as against Peru. To this end it is asserted a member of the Moudorian Cabinet left Guyeaquil to-day for Lapas, Bolivia under instructions to negotiate with the Bolivlan Government and the Chilian Minister at that Capital.
