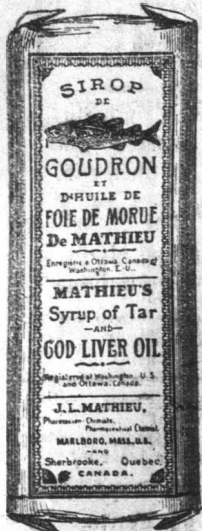

**Paulhan's Story of His Flight to Manchester.**

In Paulhan's narrative in the London Mail, of his London-Manchester flight, he says:

"London is a difficult place to fly out of. It is so huge, so confusing. I know the way from Hendon to Manchester, but I do not know the way from Hendon to St. Paul's, nor could one learn it without practice. There are so many districts all alike, and such a bewildering number of railway lines running in every conceivable direction.

"Without my map, I could never have found my way out, but I had well impressed myself with all the signs of the particular railway tracks I wanted, and I was soon flying directly to the north.

"I had to fight the wind all the way from London. Not a moment's rest came to me in my battle against the gusts.

"After the start I was going north for a long time before I sighted the special train which was accompanying me, but there was no mistaking it when it caught me up, with three loud hoots of the whistle and a big white signal cloth flowing from the window of the rear coach.

"I shouted and I sang. I do not think my voice is particularly fascinating, but nobody seems to mind that in the upper air.

"A pelting rain storm lashed me for twenty minutes while I was in the neighborhood of Rugby. I kept on flying at a steady pace, although my altitude varied remarkably.

"I came down rapidly from 300 metres to 100, so that I could be more certain of my direction. Then came the most exciting moment of my flight. Darkness had fallen and before me I saw the lights of Lichfield. I decided to alight in some convenient meadow before reaching town, and to do this I sank down to 150 feet. I was immediately above what looked like a large factory with a chimney. I am now told it was a brewery. And so, to alight safely in a field with no damage done, I made a fish-hook turn and my machine was now pointing toward Manchester.

"I had an imperceptible fraction of a second in which to make up my mind, and I decided to risk the telegraph wires. As I sank I made a sharp twist right back on the line of my course, and was lucky enough to lift myself over the wires."

Hamard, chief of detectives in Paris, has accomplished one of the cleverest pieces of detective work in recent criminal annals in the arrest of the murderer of a poor street girl, whose atrocious murder had baffled the police for six weeks. The girl's head was found in a sewer, and subsequently her hands, feet and other portions of her body were discovered in different places.

**An Anachronism.**

We believe that the great majority of the English speaking people of the Empire will read with satisfaction that the British Cabinet has decided to introduce a bill to remove the offensive wording of the test which every King is called upon to submit himself under the provisions of the Bill of Rights to prove to Parliament that he is not a member of the Church of Rome. This declaration is a relic of the intolerant days of Charles II, for its terms are those which were prescribed by an act of that reign, entitled "An Act for the more effectual preserving the King's person and Government, by disabling Papists from sitting in either House of Parliament."

It is a small mercy merely to put the declaration in words which do not outrage the religious sensibilities of millions of the King's subjects. To us the whole test appears an anachronism. The repudiation itself is offensive to a large body of the King's subjects. It is also unnecessary.

Granting that the will of the people is that their King shall be a member of the Church of England, the Coronation Oath administered by the Archbishop of Canterbury is sufficient for the purpose without this additional declaration of what is historically a test of non-Popery and a repudiation of doctrines of another church. It is surely possible to provide words by which the King declares his adherence to the church of England without making reference to doctrines held by another church.

The late King on Monday, the 14th February, 1901, when he met his first Parliament in the presence of the two Houses of Parliament made and signed this declaration:

"According to the Lords' record—The King, being seated on the throne, and the Commons being at the bar with their Speaker, His Majesty made and subscribed the declaration against transubstantiation pursuant to the Bill of Rights, and afterwards made a most gracious speech to both Houses, and then retired."

Hennessy and was dressed in crepe de chene with picture hat and plumes. The bridesmaids were dressed in pale blue and chiffon hats. A wedding feast was served after the ceremony. The groom is a brother of Rev. Fr. Fyfe of this city, and the bride is a sister of Mr. John O'Dea and Mrs. J. Maher, also of this city.

**King's Test Act to Be Amended.**

LONDON, May 10.  
John Redmond, leader of the Irish Party, has written to Premier Asquith, reminding him of the favourable expressions used in Parliament on the question raised by the Duke of Norfolk, about abolishing from the declaration which the monarch must make before a new Parliament of the old words abjuring the Church of Rome, which Mr. Redmond declares are most offensive to all members of the Church of Rome. The cabinet to-day decided to introduce a bill amending the declaration against Transubstantiation, Adoration of and the Sacrifice of the Mass, substituting "are contrary to my belief" for "are superstitious and idolatrous" and omitting all reference to the Pope. The majority of the members of parliament are believed to favour this change but the Orangemen and extreme Protestants will oppose them. The Roman Catholics wish the entire declaration abolished, but the law officers of the Crown consider such a safeguard necessary.

**Charlotte Young a Total Loss.**

Job Bros. & Co. had a wire to-day saying that their iron barque, Charlotte Young, which went ashore on the Point, the entrance to Pernambuco, was a total loss. The vessel had on board 6,000 qts. fish in drums, and we learn vessel and cargo were insured. The vessel was built in West Hartlepool in 1867, and was therefore 43 years old. Early in her career she ran between England and West Africa. Her crew, all Newfoundlanders, except the colored man, are: Captain, S. N. Halford; mate, Capt. Waite; cook, R. J. Hay; bosun, J. **Festival of Empire Meeting Last Night.**

Mr. W. G. Gosling occupied the chair at the meeting held by the General Committee of the Festival of Empire last night at the Board of Trade Rooms. Mr. Gosling read a cable from the Premier saying that the question of the postponement of the Festival of Empire had not yet been decided on account of the death of the King. The Premier's suggestion that specimens of Newfoundland products be sent was considered, but although there was a long discussion no decision was reached. The Manufacturers' Association will meet in a few days to consider the project of sending specimens of their products of the local factories. Hoses, twines, boots and shoes, tobacco, soap, paint, oil clothing, candles, biscuits, canned codfish and lobsters. It was announced that 4,860 feet of film kinematograph pictures had been taken in the city and at Grand Falls, which would be sent to London. The cost of this would be about \$1,000. Mr. Chambers of the Bell Island N. S. S. Co. will not send a pillar of iron ore, as the weight was so great the idea had to be given up. The suggestion of having a Nfld. fish restaurant at the Festival will be taken up, as it is deemed a good way to advertise the fisheries of the Colony. A meeting will be held to-night to outline a programme. Several bills were sent in for payment and were referred to committees or returned. After some financial statements had been read the meeting adjourned.

## Rev. G. H. Hewitt, M.A. Takes Exception

To Remarks in Archbishop Howley's Sermon on the King's Death.

Editor Evening Telegram: Doubtless I am expressing the feelings of a large number of our people when I state that I take great exception to one (at least) of the utterances of Archbishop Howley in his sermon on Sunday night concerning our late lamented King.

While he praises the King as "a just, good King," acknowledges him as "God's Minister" and reveres as a Catholic his memory, he deprecates the fact that "this great King and good man" "should have died outside the fold of the Catholic Church." Knowing as the Archbishop does, the King's position in the Church of England and that Church's claim to be part of the Holy Catholic Church (as our Creeds state) a claim which we substantiate historically, his remark is an insult to the English Nation since the Church to which our King belonged and in a way represented is the State Church.

To drag such a remark into an eulogy on the greatness and goodness of our King was unnecessary (and almost inconsistent) and to give utterance to such a thought in a tribute to a dead man's memory, was to say the least, unkind and uncharitable.

I think members of all the Catholic Church, the Church of universal love should be the last to deplore publicly any doctrinal views (when it is too late to alter them) held by a man whom the Lord hath blessed, for our dear King, whatever faults he may have contracted, certainly earned out of our Lord's own blessings "Blessed are the Peace-makers."

While, too, the Archbishop asks for the prayers of his congregation these words of his seem very likely to detract from the value and earnestness of those prayers, seeing that so many of our Roman brethren with so little Catholic love and broadmindedness believe that there is no salvation outside the Roman pale; and anything that is likely to diminish our earnestness in praying is much better left unsaid.

As a Catholic of the Anglican branch I take exception to the phrase of the Archbishop, and as a patriot and son of the Empire, I lament the fact that any man living under the British flag could publicly express such a thought concerning the British Sovereign.

In spite of this seeming misfortune that he was not a Roman and therefore not entitled to a share in public offices of the Roman branch of the Catholic Church may our dear King rest in eternal peace.

## Tor's Cove Affairs.

The Wreck of the Normandy—Roads and Wharves, etc.

Editor Evening Telegram: Dear Sir,—I presume a few notes on the events of the past few days, and other local items may find space in your popular paper.

The news has already gone abroad of the wreck of the S. S. Normandy that met a watery grave on the "back" of Great Island off here.

For several days, no observation could be taken, a dense fog prevailing all the while. At 1 a.m. Saturday the ship struck, and at 2.30 she went to bottom, the crew and passengers scarcely having had time to get into the boats. In fact one boat was up set by the sinking vessel and the crew thrown into the water, but they were rescued after some difficulty. So dense was the fog and darkness of the hour the land, though only a few yards distant, was not seen for some time. All was lost except a trifle of clothing at hand. After an hour or so the boats reached safety at St. Michael's, a small settlement about 10 miles above Tor's Cove and all the shipwrecked people were taken care of by the kind people of the place, who, though not much experienced in wrecks, know how to show practical sympathy with those in such distress.

In the early morning skiffs were on the scene of the wreck, but nothing was saved as the vessel was entirely under water, and everything that floated from her deck or saloon had been brought to sea by the changed wind.

Early on Saturday morning we were paid a visit by one of our representatives, Mr. M. P. Cashin, who calls around occasionally to look after the interests of his constituents in these parts, and was incidentally attracted by the prospect of salvage. In the meantime Bowring's, Lloyds' Agents were wired and necessary provisions made to take the wrecked crew to St. John's. After somewhat anxious waiting the Portia arrived about noon at Tor's Cove, leaving again at 1.30 p.m. Several people having business in the city took passage by her because the long and rugged road to town, and also to show that a steamer calling here occasionally would be a great advantage to the people. 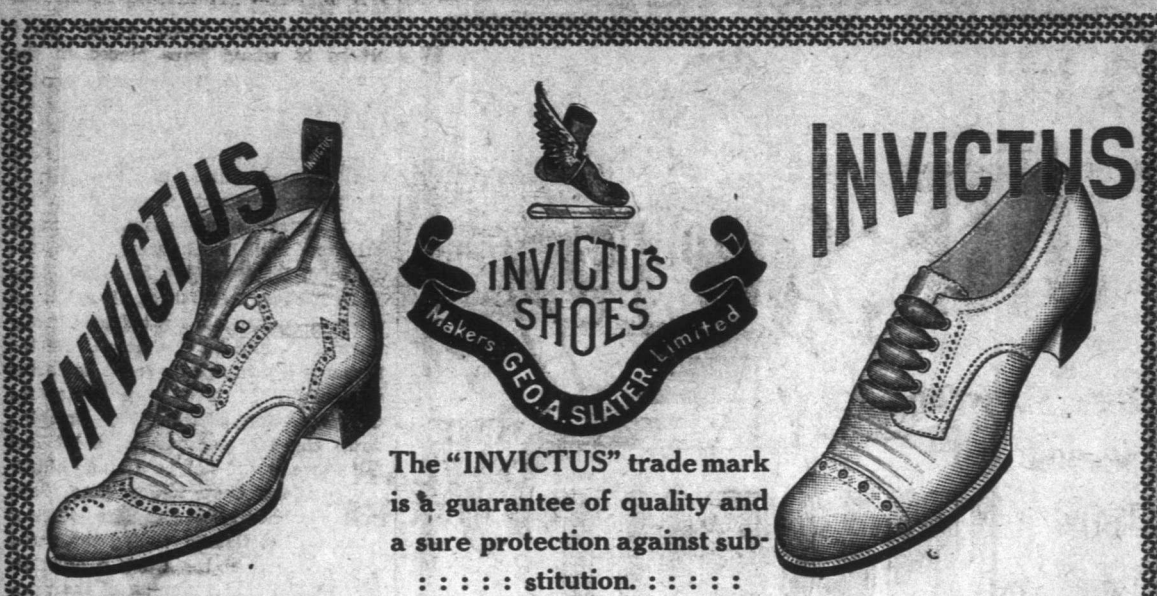

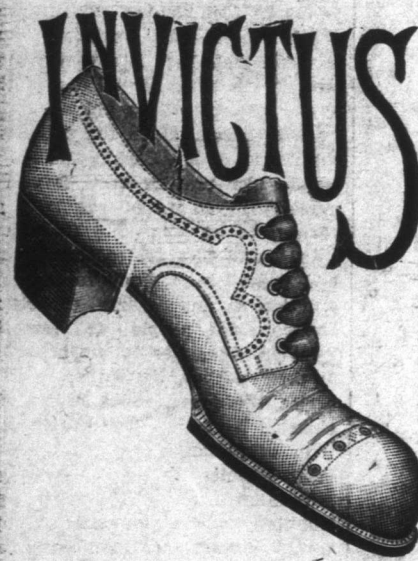




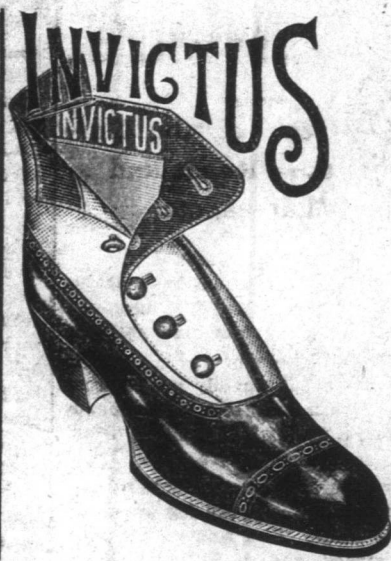

The Peruvian Government believes that it has no table information that an effort is being made by Ecuador to obtain an alliance with Bolivia, as against Peru. To this end it is asserted a member of the Moudorian Cabinet left Guayaquil today for Lapa, Bolivia under instructions to negotiate with the Bolivian Government and the Chilean Minister at that Capital.

In the Throne Room.

Late tonight the body of King Edward enclosed in an oak casket was transferred to the Throne Room of Buckingham Palace, where it rests on a catafalque, covered with the same purple pall which enshrouded the coffin of Queen Victoria. A silken Royal Ensign has been spread over the pall.

Mayor Gibbs Retires.

A meeting of Mr. Gibbs' old committee took place last night in the Star Hall to hear him give his reasons for retiring from the Mayoralty contest. Owing to the many other duties that he had to attend to he said that he was unable to give that time and attention to the City Council which in his opinion would be necessary in order to secure the best results. Many of his friends had asked him to seek re-election and he had called the meeting in order to satisfy them that the reasons he had for not taking part in the coming contest were such as they also would agree with. About 500 voters were present and Mr. J. Giles occupied the chair. The Mayor's address was a lengthy one. He gave an interesting statement of the financial condition of the Council and showed up all the difficulties that had to be contended in carrying on the work with such limited means. The total civic revenue is now about \$175,000, while the expenditure is nearly \$160,000. This leaves a small amount for the many requirements of the city. The exact figures of the city debt are:—

The recent loan had put the amount of interest to be paid yearly by the city up to \$46,302. The total amount of revenue which the Council estimated might be collected this year from the property tax was only \$55,325. Mayor Gibbs then went on to speak on the sanitary condition of the city. Improvements were necessary but there was no money to make them. The high death rate, especially amongst children, could only be checked by having more civic improvements as regards sanitation. The City Council had no money to do the work and the citizens were not taking that interest in the situation which its gravity demanded.

From the St. John's T. A. & B. Society. Yesterday afternoon William J. Ellis, President, and George Coughlan, Secretary of the St. John's T. A. & B. Society, waited upon His Excellency the Governor and submitted the following Resolutions of Condolence for transmission to the Royal Family. His Excellency received the deputation very kindly and promised to forward the resolutions as soon as possible: To His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams, K.C.M.G. Your Excellency— Whereas it has pleased Providence in its wisdom to call from amongst his devoted and loyal subjects our Most Gracious Sovereign, King Edward VII., by whose demise the British Empire is deprived of a wise and prudent Sovereign, whose virtue and statesmanship had earned for him the recognition of the world at large; And whereas this Colony of Newfoundland, the most ancient and loyal dependency of the British Crown, feels itself particularly bereaved by the loss of a Sovereign, who had in a special sense endeared himself to its people by the keen interest he had always displayed in its affairs since his memorable visit here fifty years ago; Be it therefore Resolved that the St. John's Total Abstinence and Benefit Society in full meeting assembled hereby desire to place upon record an expression of the sincere sorrow at the sudden and untimely demise of our beloved King, and to express in common with British subjects throughout the vast dominions that encircle the globe, its poignant grief at the loss of the nation and the world will sustain in being deprived of the benign influence for domestic government and international concord of the great and kindly soul now at rest; Be it also Resolved that the Society request His Excellency the Governor
