



And many of our most eminent legislators are of Lord Escher's opinion, although few, like him, can choose between their delinquent homes—some in Mayfair, one in Windsor Forest, and a third in the Highlands—for an escape from the world of work and worry.

Among these "home birds" we may rely on Mr. Lloyd George, who is never quite so happy as when he is among his household gods at "The Cloth with a fellow-legislator or two like Lord Haldane, Mr. Masterman, the Master of Elibank to share his hospitality and walk round the links with him. Failing such a rival, he is quite content to chase the ball-ball with one of his sons, who usually beats him. This and motor-cars constitute the Chancellor's ideal holiday.

The Prime Minister's taste lies in a similar happy direction. As soon as Parliament rises he is off to his Scottish home, where he spends as much time as possible on the links, usually in the company of his wife or some political comrade or rival such as Mr. Balfour, varied by an occasional



**Found Drowned.**

**GEO. GORMAN'S BODY BROUGHT TO TOWN LAST NIGHT.**

Yesterday the Telegram gave an account of the report given to the police of the disappearance of George Gorman, who with a man named Walsh went fishing on Tuesday at Western Barrens Pond, near Petty Harbor. Head Constable Sparrow and Constable Faraday, who took jiggers with them and went in the search with the man Walsh, Gorman's friend and companion, were not long finding the body. Gorman, it seems, left Walsh to bathe in another part of the pond Wednesday forenoon, and after Walsh had waited some time, he left the place and arrived in St. John's in the early afternoon. Gorman's failure to come home was reported yesterday, and Hd. Sparrow and Const. Faraday, taking Walsh with them, were not long searching the section indicated by Walsh before his clothing was found. They dragged the pond with their jiggers the body was taken from the bottom of the pond in very deep water and about 40 feet off shore. The remains were nude, and the belief is that poor Gorman while swimming was seized with one of the fainting fits to which he was subject and must have drowned quickly. The remains were brought to the city last night and placed in the morgue. The deceased was a shipwright by trade, was about 55 years old, and leaves a widow and six children to mourn him. Much sympathy is expressed for the family, in which the Telegram joins.

**Fire at Bishop Falls.**

**BISHOP'S FALLS, Last Night.**

**Reciprocity and Fish.**

(Montreal Star.)  
A Maritime Province correspondent writes us as to the effect of these fishing licenses which the American fishermen are to get practically for nothing. After some encouraging words about our fight against the past, he says:  
"And wishing information on that part of the bill dealing with the fisheries, wherein our Government expects to license American fishermen to the tune of one dollar per man each year, can you tell me what privilege is to be included in this license as given to American fishermen?"  
"This one item as pertaining to the fisheries part of the bill may mean, indeed, more than is shown on the face of the deal, and be the beginning of the end of our coastal fisheries. It cannot be that we on the coast must open up to our neighbors the valuable fisheries we now enjoy."  
The answer to our correspondent's enquiry is very simple. The license which will be given the American fishermen for the nominal fee of a dollar a year, are the same licenses which are now granted them under the "modus vivendi" for \$1.50 a ton. We may remark that this rate of \$1.50 a ton, works out at about \$125 a year per vessel for the ninety odd American vessels now using them. Under these licenses, the American fishermen can land at a Canadian port for the purpose of purchasing ice, bait and supplies, for shipping crews and the trans-shipment of the "catch." In short, they get for a dollar a year every right in our ports which Canadian fishermen have, with the single exception of selling their fish, free of duty.  
Thus we not only give the Americans our fish market in exchange for theirs—a poor trade, as we shall show—but we bonus their fishermen to the tune of nearly \$125-a piece in competition with our fishermen. And we do this when the Hague Tribunal has declared that we have the right to keep them out of our ports altogether.  
But, talking of bonuses, what of the present Canadian bonus to our own fishermen? That is a very handsome item. It amounted in 1909 to \$155,221 paid to some twenty-five thousand

fishermen. Now the Americans want that bonus abolished. Senator Lodge proposed an amendment to the Reciprocity agreement in the American Senate prohibiting it. The Lodge Amendment was rejected because President Taft would not imperil the bargain by allowing any changes; but it was clear enough that American feeling is against our bonus system. Should Reciprocity come into force, it will not be long before Senator Lodge or some other Massachusetts Senator will make a great outcry over compelling American fishermen to compete in their own markets with "bonused Canadian fish," and we will be confronted with the demand that we stop subsidizing our fishermen or take the consequences! Anyone imagining that this is an imaginary danger, will kindly take note of the fact that the bonus on steel rods appeared at the same time that Reciprocity in steel rods was proposed. Now as to the value of "free fish"—that is, free access for our fish into the American market. Of course, free fish is reciprocal. We give our markets for theirs. What a kind of trade is it? Let us see. In the year ending June, 1910, the Americans imported and paid duty on fish to the value of \$9,008,350. But, of that amount, \$3,229,222 came from us. The fish they took from us were largely fish they needed very badly; and it is an unjust inference to suppose that we paid that duty. In any case, that leaves only \$5,679,128 worth of fish that they got from other countries. Again, it is not at all likely that all these fish could be purchased from Canada. Possibly they are not caught here. But let us take the figures as they are.  
"Free fish" in the American market means for us a chance to displace fish to the value of \$5,679,128.  
For this, we pay—what? First, we give our market. That amounts to \$16,000,000 a year. They get a fighting chance for sixteen millions in exchange for less than six millions. Is that a good trade—for us? Secondly, we "pay" the opening of our market to the twelve most-favored nations which export annually something like \$30,000,000-worth of fish. Thirdly, we neutralize the value of our export-privilege of fish from the Maritime Provinces to Montreal and the West. To-

day that assistance, joined with the duty, nicely enables the Maritime Province fish to beat Gloucester fish in the Montreal market. Remove the duty, and Gloucester fish will win in spite of the express assistance. Moreover, when the Americans stop our fish bounty, they will probably forbid that Government express assistance at the same time.  
Now what do you think of that bargain? It looks to us as if the cute New Englander had beaten our representatives all along the line. And, on top of all this, we get no amelioration of the hard conditions under which our fishermen enter American ports, save that of the duty. We will still be forbidden to clear direct for the fishing grounds, as our American rivals can. We must sail back to a Canadian port to "clear," and so will be beaten to the grounds by our competitors. Nor can a Canadian-built fishing vessel be sold to an American fisherman. They are careful to patronize only "home industry." We are selling ours out; and Uncle Sam will soon be coming over to buy the rest at the same price.

**Abolish Private Doctor**

Teach Sanitation — British Scientist Writes Book on Advantages of State Supervision By Civil Employees.

Dr. Benjamin Moore of the Biochemic Department of the University of Liverpool has a plan to do away with all private physicians. He wants the Government to safeguard the health of everybody in Great Britain, the doctors being on the basis of civil service employees. He predicts a great saving of life and money, and a lessening of suffering and sorrow by his plan.

That this scientist is very much in earnest is evidenced by the fact that he has written a volume of some 204 pages on the subject. His book is called "The Dawn of the Health Age," and has proved of sufficient interest and importance to provoke discussion in the medical publications on both sides of the Atlantic.

Here are the advantages to the medical profession as pointed out by Dr. Moore:  
"An assured income; a settled provision for the future as a retiring allowance; relief from clerical work, bill collecting, etc.; relief from the dilemma of a charge of neglect on the one hand or of 'making business' on the other; equal opportunities for the training; consequent on hospital work; compactness of work, leisure, and study time; abolition of professional jealousy; the breadth of training and opportunity from being moved about from place to place; the abolition of cheap practice and of hospital abuse.

"For the public, competent attendance under all circumstances, no scamped work, no worry about fees, leading to unnecessary and possibly dangerous delay in seeking aid, prevention of cheap practice and of hospital abuse, and consequent saving in money as well as distress mental and material."

### Fads and Fashions.

Hat crowns may be high or low; the majority of hats showing high crowns are narrow of brim, a feature which emphasizes the height.

There is a great feeling for having all dress accessories to match, even the hand-bags following the fashion and the uppers of shoes as well as the stockings.

For elegant day dresses white embroidered nets are fashionable, the skirts being very chic when finished with a band of black net, outlined in white.

For children little coats of taffeta are in vogue. A pretty little model of dark navy blue silk has collar and cuffs of brighter blue, edged with silver buttons.

Pale-colored parasols are much seen in lace or plaited mouseline de soie, edged with a wide silk border, or with one of flowered pompadour ribbon, or of black velvet.

Very thick rouleaux of satin finish the waists of one-piece dresses and are twisted and arranged as ornaments at the top of the back panel, usually fastened at the side.

Pierrot millinery shapes in velour, scratch beaver or French felt with high round-topped crowns and slightly rolled brims will be a popular feature of this fall's millinery.

The loose panels which finish so many of the newest skirts are caught up at one side with a pretty ornament the hem. At the top flat and

perfectly narrow lines still prevail. Broderie de laine or woolen embroidery is still in strong favor. Crepe chetive flowers, ranging from the tulle forms to immense roses or poppies, are used on girdles, hats, umbrellas and bags.

Long chains, hitherto referred to as fancy chains, but now called coat chains because they are generally worn over the outer garment, are obtainable in the fashionable cut crystal of the hour and are charmingly beautiful.

Very few feather wraps or scarves are now worn in the evening. They are replaced by voluminous scarves of painted gauze or mousseline, or, if the night is fresh, by lovely double ermine stoles, with no black tails to them.

In neckwear the prominent French novelties are fucus in Marie Antoinette and Charlotte Corday styles and the one-sided effects in jabots. These jabots are noted as the finishing touches on the costumes of the most smartly-dressed women.

Laces are being worn on everything—semi-tailored dresses, afternoon and evening gowns. And the laces are arranged in such ways that they give a very elaborate effect. As an example, Venise lace is worn "flat" over black or a bright color.

In millinery many turban shapes are noted with upright or coronet brims of almost every dimension and design, many of which extend around only part of the crown, while in others the ends of the applied coronet brim, usually of different heights, overlap.

Some of the silk walking suits show unusual trimmings. The collars and cuffs are braided and fringed with linen or raffia. Striped silks

are used for pipings. Tortoise-shell buttons are used and the application of string and yarn in embroidery is one of the dominant features.

### Cecil Amendments Lost

VETO BILL GETS ON.

"Home Rule" is the fear of the Unionists—Churchill hints at the King Favoring it. London, Aug. 8.—Lord Cecil's motion that consideration of the Bill be postponed was rejected 348 to 209, and a motion to commence consideration of the Lords' amendment to the veto bill was agreed to. Sir Edward H. Carson, in the debate, devoted himself to the home rule phase of the situation, and promised the Government that their intention of passing a home rule bill by force would be resisted by force. "The home rule contest will be settled by Balfour and not by Westminster," he said.

At one point Carson nearly caused an outbreak by referring to Mr. Asquith's communication to Mr. Balfour on the subject of the King's guarantee as "a blackmailing letter." The Speaker let it pass.

Home Secretary Churchill followed, strongly deprecating the resort to disorder and riot advocated by Cecil and Carson saying:—

"There are 70,000 dockers on strike at this moment in London. Some of them are hungry. Should some of them who are suffering break out in riot, you would be the first to ask that soldiers be sent to the scene."

King and Home Rule. Mr. Churchill also stated that when the Ministers conferred with the King in November in regard to guarantee, he was made fully acquainted with all matters in dispute between the parties, "among which Home Rule was one of the most important." The impression which the speaker evidently sought to convey was that the King was in favor of Home Rule for Ireland.

Lords' Amendments. Proceeding to deal with the Lords' amendments to the veto bill, the Home Secretary announced the minor concessions which the Government was prepared to make. They had concluded that in order to lighten the burden of the Speaker in deciding the character of bills, to determine if they were purely financial measures or otherwise, he should consult the chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means and the chairman of the Committee on Public Accounts.

It would also be adopted providing for the exclusion of provisional orders—bills from the term "public bills"; and a new clause providing that no extension of the duration of the life of a parliament beyond the prescribed five years could be made. In advising the rejection of the other amendments made by the House of Lords, and referring to the suggestion that the Protestant succession should be safeguarded by referendum, Mr. Churchill sarcastically remarked:—

"We do not stand in need of any Jacobean or Napoleonic device of this sort, or even of a Venetian plan of a tribunal of superior persons."




