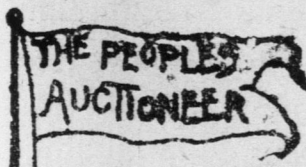

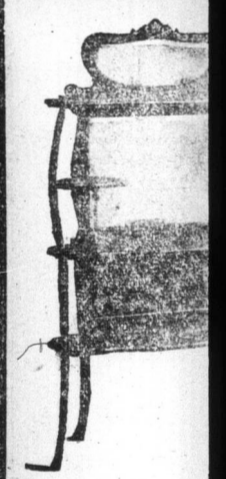

His wife was horrified. "Just think of that," said she, "he was going to leave me for two whole days. You can imagine how heartbroken I felt."

Household Notes.

Put pieces of heavy cardboard, cut to fit, into the heels of rubbers if you would save them from wearing out quickly.

For pumpkin pie use one egg and three tablespoonfuls of fine cracker crumbs to a pie. It is better than when more eggs are used.

When the hemstitching on bed linen breaks apart, cover it with a row of feather-stitched braid, neatly stitched on at each side.

To get rid of mice, hunt out their entrances to cupboard or pantry and plaster them with a mixture of soft laundry soap and red pepper.

When children's shoes are wet dry them and apply a little glycerine with a bit of absorbent cotton. They will be quite soft in the morning.

When it is hard to get the bread to rise in cold weather, put a hotwater bag filled with hot water on top of the carefully covered bread pan.

Soups and stews should be planned at least a day before they are wanted and the soups should not be thickened till just before they are used.

Scour kitchen boards and tables with a paste made of 1/2 lb. soft soap and 1/4 lb. lime. Use as you would soap and wash the wood with plenty of water.

To clean white wool yarn, sift warm cornstarch through it and roll in a towel. In two days shake the starch out of it and it will be perfectly white.

A cutlery holder of strong denim with pockets stitched into it to hold the various sized forks and knives is a handy thing to tack above the kitchen table.

A warm quilt for winter is made of a pair of bordered cotton blankets with cotton put in as for any other quilt. The wool the same color as the border.

Housekeepers in hotels and other places where there are large quantities of linen to darn are apt to do them by machine, simply stitching back and forth.

After washing quilts and comfortables, and while they are still on the line, but nearly dry, beat them with a carpet beater and they will be wonderfully light.

A good lemon flavoring is made by grating the yellow part of the rind on enough granulated sugar to absorb the oil. Mix thoroughly and put in a tight bottle.

No Selling Out.

It was no surprise to find the editor of the Evening Chronicle confused, mixed and muddled in his attacks on us yesterday. It is ever so with him. That he should contradict himself excites no surprise. On the contrary, it would be surprising if he was logical.

In one article he charges us with making preparations to "sell out" Sir Robert Bond, and in the other he charges us with refusal to publish a letter because it is inimical to Sir Robert Bond.

The charges are mutually destructive, and could only be made by a mind which lacked the perception of the bearing of one charge on another, or was careless, indifferent and reckless in the indicting of others.

So far as Sir Robert Bond and those who are intimately associated with us and our doings, and indeed so far as the supporters of the Liberal Party generally, are concerned, it is needless for us to deny the charge of plotting against the Liberal Leader. They know the charge is absolutely untrue, and poles apart from the truth.

We can go further and state that no one knows better than the President of the Fishermen's Protective Union that we are at one with the general body of electors in the country in maintaining that the leadership and statesmanship of Sir Robert Bond are needed at the present time.

The country to-day is tired of the Premiership of Sir Edward Morris. The people fear the course he is pursuing. They are apprehensive of breakers ahead, and they want the man at the helm who weathered the storm of 1895. They want a firm, determined and wise statesman in charge. Has the Hon. P. T. McGrath forgotten what Sir Edward Morris (the Hon. E. P. of those days) said of him? The people have not. As he has evidently forgotten it, we will remind him. This is part of what Sir Edward Morris said then:—

"They had assembled for the purpose of tendering to Mr. Bond the thanks of the people of this country for the able manner in which he had discharged the onerous duties connected with the mission from which he had just returned. When Mr. Bond left here, two months ago, a dark cloud hung over Newfoundland, and few could be found to believe in the ultimate success of his mission; but to-night they knew that that mission had been crowned with success; that by the successful raising of a loan on advantageous terms for the Colony he has removed a dark cloud,

or at least given it a silver lining. He has converted despair into hope, and waited that hope all over the land. In a word, Mr. Bond has cut the Gordian knot of our difficulties, and Newfoundland is once more out of danger."

We would also remind the Hon. P. T. McGrath of another reason why we have the strongest desire to do what in us lies to support Sir Robert Bond as leader of the Liberal Party. He will appreciate it, as we shall give it in his own words.

They occur in a letter which is well known, which was written at a time he was opposing Sir Robert Bond, not very long, however, before he "sold out," to use his own style, to the Liberal Party. Here they are:—
 "The Hon. Robert Bond, an able and honest colonial statesman, sufficiently independent in point of wealth to be able to resist the inducements of rich capitalists like Reid, has undertaken to do battle against the northern Goliath, and the young and patriotic elements are rallying to Bond's standard for the battle of the ballots in November next, which will decide the destinies of the island."


History is repeating itself. The young and patriotic elements in public life are joining hands with the middle-aged and old patriotic elements in the land to rally round the old Liberal standard to put back in power Sir Robert Bond, the honest and able statesman, of tried capacity and unflinching integrity, who will "sell out" to anybody, and whom it is our delight to support; and we can tell Mr. McGrath, surcharged as his mind is with sales and purchases, the Evening Telegram is not on the market.

The Government can spend all the money they like in all the districts. The Morris party can do what they like to muzzle the Press, but the people will find the Evening Telegram out in the fight against the Government of Sir Edward Morris and fighting under the old Liberal standard, with Sir Robert Bond leading the fishermen and all who work for a living to a glorious victory next November. The fishermen are determined to oust Morris and put in Bond. Money may talk, but the fishermen's votes will talk louder. What they say and do goes in Newfoundland.

Judgment in Condon vs. Council

At noon to-day in the magistrate's Court Judge Knight handed down the written judgment of Judge Conroy in the case of John K. Condon versus the Municipal Council.

The judgment was in favour of the plaintiff for \$145.00, the full amount claimed being \$200. This was an action taken by Condon to recover damages on account of injuries to his property and loss and inconvenience suffered by himself and family. The facts briefly are:—

In October, 1907, the plaintiff had a sewer laid down from his house on Pennywell Road and connecting with the main sewer, the work being under the supervision of a Council official. During the first rain storm following the construction of the sewer the plaintiff's house became flooded. Those floods continued periodically for three years and were caused by a fractured pipe as a result of negligence on the part of Council employees.

In dealing with the question of damages His Honor awarded them as follows:—

Damages to retaining wall and repairs to basement . . . \$75 00
 Damages to linoleum, etc . . . 25 00
 Cost of plumbing and removing sewer to upper flat . . . 25 00
 Loss of use of basement, inconvenience to family, damage to coal, etc . . . 20 00

Total \$145 00
 Mr. B. Dunfield was counsel for the Plaintiff; F. J. Morris, K.C., for Defendants, gave notice of appeal.

The Rev. J. Walsh, P.P.

Editor Evening Telegram. Mr. Editor,—As several mistakes the late Rev. John Walsh, appearing in error into the account of the death of the public press, I would be thankful if you would please publish the following more exact account.

The V. Rev. Father Walsh was born in May, 1842, in Cappagh Hayden, in the County of Kilkenny, about three miles from Callan. He was consequently seventy years and six months old at the time of his death. In his early days he went to school to the Augustinian Monks at Callan, walking every day three Irish miles to and from. He made his Philosophical and Theological studies at the world-renowned Missionary College of All Hallows, Dublin. There he was a contemporary of the late Fathers Morris and Fitzpatrick and of Monsgr. Beardon, Fr. Douthey and others. He was Ordained by the late Bishop Power, on Sept. 10th, 1871. He was sent first as Curate to his uncle, the late Venerable Archdeacon (James) Walsh, at St. Kyran's. The Rev. Michael Walsh, of Placentia, who died in 1871, was his brother. After a few years he was removed from St. Kyran's and sent to Fermuse as Parish Priest.

Being a man of very large mind and progressive views, he soon saw that there was no room for expansion in the little "Admiral's Cove," in the Harbour of Fermuse, so he determined upon removing to the neighbouring harbour of Rencuse where his far-seeing judgment desecrated a more open and imposing site for the Establishment of Ecclesiastical buildings. He secured the ground and commenced the erection of that magnificent group of edifices, consisting of Convent, Church, Hall, Schools and Presbytery which now crowns the beautiful hill and forms a striking object to all who enter the Harbour, a group not surpassed by any other in the country outside St. John's. He did not, however, forget the old original Mission at Fermuse, but, in later years, erected a beautiful church in a more central part of that settlement. He proved himself the "good servant," leaving after him a Parish fully equipped with schools and churches, and we may be sure that when called by the trumpet-sound, he heard the consoling "Engel Serve here," and that he was able to answer "Domine, quinque talents, tradidisti mihi, ecce alia quinque superlucratum sum."

Eight Killed

Four Missing and 24 Injured in Hospital as a Result of Explosion in Illinois Mills.

Waukegan, Ill., Nov. 26.—The number of dead, injured and missing as a result of the explosion in the plant of the Corn Products Refining Company, here yesterday, was found to be smaller than at first believed.

Early to-day eight persons are known to be dead, four are missing, and there are 24 in hospital, nearly all of whom are in a precarious condition. Only one of the dead remains unidentified.

The fact that all of the persons in or directly outside of the building at the time the explosion occurred were not killed made the blast appear freakish; the heaps of debris, twisted iron and shattered wooden beams was proof that those who were not instantly killed had escaped as if by a miracle.

A Discussion on the Rise on the Price of Milk.

And Other Matters of Interest at Tucker's.

Delaney arrived at Tucker's Sunday night after prayers, and as the Cute Man, Tucker and Mrs. Tucker were present we had one of the old-time chats that makes a fellow feel that all the old-time social gatherings are not a thing of the past. It was by such discussions as we had on Sunday night that Governments were made or broken in the days gone by, and many a lively debate that would do credit to our Legislature were indulged in, in the good old days when men and women loved their quiet firesides, and knew more about their family requirements than they do in those days, when men only use their homes to eat and sleep in.

After filling his pipe and knocking fog out of it for a moment or two, Rise in the Price of Milk. "It seems Delaney opened up the subject of the to me," said he, "that the farmers are bound to soak us this winter, for I've heard that they have raised the price of milk to forty-eight cents a gallon and they give the reason for such a rise as being caused by the high price of feed. Now," says Delaney, "I fail to see the justice of such an argument for I've heard that cattle feed can be bought at thirty cents a sack less than it could be bought for last winter, and the Government have taken the duty off hay and that article can be purchased for twenty-six to twenty-seven dollars, this fall, whereas they had to pay twenty-nine or thirty dollars for it last year."

"There is no redress," says Tucker, "for the workingman. Our politicians are catering to the farmers until now they are beginning to believe that they are martyrs. The workingman got the name of getting better pay, and we hear a great deal about the prosperity that abounds, but the way things are going on in this country the workingman has reached the stage where he simply gets his pay to hold on while he is lugging it home, and on Monday morning he's dead broke again.

We hear it belled all over the town when any of our Unions look for an increase in pay, people outside of the Unions turn up their eyes and put on long faces and ask in doleful tones: What are the Unions men going to do with us? But yet all the folks that sell to the Union men can raise the price of their goods and not a syllable is spoken, and things are allowed to go on without any one raising a hand to check it.

We hear some fine morning that the price of coal is gone up, for an hour or two there's a grumble heard on all sides which soon dies away, and the workingman dives in his pockets for his seven dollars and twenty if he wants a ton of coal. Then we are quietly but sternly informed by the House owner that he must 'rise' the rent and gives his reason that the rates are increasing, we kick with him and tell him that we are paying all we can afford, but he jingles a bunch of keys in his trousers pocket and quietly tells us: "If we don't like it we can get out." The workingman again dives in the coin for the required spondulice, and the landlord retires satisfied with himself that he has done his duty like a man. And this is the way the whole fitout is today, says Tucker, even the price of a pound of fish is on the rise and all coming out of the tradesman, the laborer, and the clerk.

"It's about time," says Tucker, "that the Government appoint a Commission to inquire into the way we are being treated, for we have industries in this town that are protected by high duties, and they can just rise the price of their goods just when they feel like it, and there's no one to say boo to them. Why 'tis an open secret that a manufacturing concern in this town is receiving money to keep its doors closed from others who are in the same business, and at the same time these concerns are protected by a high duty on goods coming into the country that would rival them in business. We hear of the curse of trusts in the States, we hear of poor people being bled by monopolists, but let us here ask ourselves if it isn't time to wake up for now is the time to be on our guard whilst the thin edge of the wedge is being put in."

Raising the workingman's wage is only a farce, if everything else goes up accordingly, and in the end he is no better off than he was at the start.

"Yes," says Mrs. Tucker, "that's the kind of stuff I like to hear ye discussing, boys, and as for the milk question, well, all I have to say is that instead of the Councillors trying to do away with the goats we ought to send an invitation to the herds which were drafted to the interior about the time that Higher Education and Microbes first struck this country, and induce them to come back again, and when we get them back, hold a torchlight procession in their honour, for we've had nothing but soaring prices since the goats were transported to fatten on the coal areas of the interior."

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., Dec. 2. Bishop McDonald, died this morning, after an illness of two years.

MONTREAL, Dec. 2. That there would be no General Election for three or four years, was the opinion expressed by Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, to-day. The minister said the elaboration of the permanent naval policy would take up most of that time, and an election was impossible until it was ready to submit to the people.

HALIFAX, Dec. 2. Four steamers will search for the missing Marconi to-morrow. The Douglas H. Thomas has been out over a week without reporting. She may have the disabled steamer in tow. The cruiser Canada left Halifax yesterday for Lunenburg, and after coaling will join in the search to-morrow. The City of Sydney left at noon to-day. The Lady Laurier left yesterday in search of the steamer, but reported late to-day from "Sable Island" her failure to locate the steamer sighted by the Mexicans.

BERLIN, Dec. 2. Dr. Frederick Franze Frieman, a Berlin physician, after a decade experimenting, has given to the world a tuberculosis cure, which such men as Professor Schleich, of the Vuchov hospital, declare will mark one of the greatest epochs in the history of medicine. A correspondent visited and interrogated numerous patients who have been treated by Dr. Frieman, and they all asserted they had been cured after from one to three injections of the new serum. Several of these cases were tuberculosis of the bone of long standing. Numerous physicians and tuberculosis specialists are on the way to Berlin from Australia, the United States, South America, and other countries to study the new discovery. Australia is said to be sending a Government commissioner. English physicians are already here.

JACKSONVILLE, Florida, Dec. 2. Richard Hume, an aeronaut, was killed here to-day.

GENEVA, Dec. 2. A British protectorate over Egypt is likely to be announced shortly, according to the Egyptian representative of the Swiss Popular Bank, one of the largest financial institutions. He telegraphs from Cairo that it is considered in official circles here that the British protectorship has been definitely decided on. It is understood that it will be proclaimed in January. This step, he added, will affect business favourably.

LONDON, Dec. 2. A Saloniki despatch to the Times, says that Macedonia is being drenched with blood as the result of atrocities committed by Bulgarian irregulars. It is lamentable that responsibility for so many of these atrocities lies

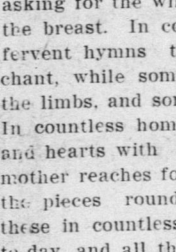

at the door of the Christian race. The Bulgarians needing regulars in Thrace, have practically left Macedonia in care of irregulars. Besides the massacres already reported at Kalava and Serres, there has been an enormous amount of killing in the district of Averhasar, where scarcely a Moslem has been left alive. Mohammedan bands have added their quota to the general destruction, and whole villages have been depopulated as a result of the Turks and Albanian bands taking part. The Servians hold a better record, apart from the slaughter of a number of Moslems by irregulars of Uskub, little complaint having been made against them. I have been unable to trace any massacre to the Greeks, but it is stated that their bands are getting into action. Up to the present they have been able to control their auxiliaries, but there is reason to believe that strong measures must be taken to check the movement, before it has any chance to make progress. Further light on the Kavala massacres shows that Armenians, who joined the Bulgarian Army as volunteers, committed them, being led by a man whose family was killed in the Adna massacre.

LONDON, Dec. 2. Telegraphing from Sofia, the correspondent of the Daily Mail asserts that the Allies will demand from Turkey a war indemnity of £240,000,000. Its Constantinople correspondent says that after the armistice is signed an interval of a week will elapse for the appointment of plenipotentiaries to negotiate peace. The Bulgarians have shown considerable conciliation the last few days. They are beginning to realize that they are too exhausted to ever break the Tchatalja lines. Also, the Allies are commencing to dispute among themselves, which is an additional reason for wishing to finish the war quickly.

BERLIN, Dec. 2. The Bulgarians alone have lost 10,000 killed and 60,000 wounded since the beginning of the war. A newspaper correspondent on his way home from the front, while passing through Sofia, declared that he saw this report at the Bulgarian war office.



Nearly Joined the S. Army.

Mr. Henry Stead, son of the late Mr. W. T. Stead, speaking at the Browning Institute, Walworth, Eng., recently mentioned that his late father nearly joined the Salvation Army. "My father," he said, "admitted that he had often been tempted to leave his work and join the Salvation Army, and he had no hesitation in saying that he had not met half a dozen men whom he could class with General Booth. He described the work of the Army as a miracle. At the close of "darkest England" the General acknowledged the great assistance of one who, though not in the Army, was a great sympathizer with it."

Circular Letter. Here and There.

We have been asked to publish for the information of the Congregation the following copy of a "Circular note," recently addressed by His Grace the Archbishop, to a few members of the Congregation: We are requested to add that the notes have been signed, more than sufficient, for which His Grace begs to return his most sincere thanks.

"THE PALACE," St. John's, November 1912.

Dear Sir,—
I beg to call your attention to the following statement:—
Some seven or eight years ago (1905) a sum of \$25,000.000 (twenty-five thousand dollars) was borrowed from the Royal Bank on very favourable terms, for the repairs and completion of the Cathedral and other church works. The result of the expenditure is visible to all in the improved state of the building. Published may be mentioned:—
Among the improvements accomplished:—
The entire removal of the old plain surfaced ceiling and the replacing of the present beautiful panelled and coffered ceiling with enrichments after the style of the Roman Basilicas.
The instalment of the electric light, and the remodelling of the heating plant, with introduction of new boilers, &c. The setting back of the High Altar.
The setting of the new floor, of maple, and the furnishing of pews of American oak. The remodelling of the organ (which cost one thousand pounds sterling). The enlargement of the organ gallery and construction of two new galleries in the transepts. The purchase of five new bells to complete the chime, the illuminated clock, the removal, and enlargement of the arch of St. John's, &c., &c.
This is all exclusive of the external mason-work, renewing of the towers, and nearly the whole exterior ashlar work. In all there has been spent on the Cathedral during the past seventeen years over one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. There remains still a great deal of work to be done, to put the building in a state of completion. The following are some of the principal items:—
The completion of the coping wall and railings around the front yard or piazza.
The setting of the new steps at the entrance; the making of new doors (for which the money has already been subscribed by our Catholic Societies). The tiling, wainscoting and ceiling of the atrium or vestibule.
The tiling or paving in parquetry work of the chancel, and the substitution of marble rail and sanctuary steps for the present wooden one.
The erection of new oak choir-stalls and throne, the replacing of all the clerical windows, &c., &c., and finally, if the funds allow, the general decoration and embellishment of the building.
As the greater part of this is interior work, it could be proceeded with during the winter season, if the money be procured at once. The loan, of which I spoke above was procured in the following manner:—
The Sunday collections at the Cathedral were accepted as a principal security by the Bank, and were formally hypothecated or pledged for the purpose. The collections were lodged weekly in the Bank and credited to fund for payment of interest and reduction of principal. The Bank also required as a collateral security certain notes signed by some of the congregation. The result was that in less than seven years, the whole of the debt, including interest is wiped out; and the notes returned to the signatories.
The Bank is now prepared to give us another loan on the same terms. I may say that latterly the Sunday collections show a marked tendency to increase; and with a better organized system of collection which I intend to introduce immediately, I feel confident that the present loan will be paid off in four or five years.

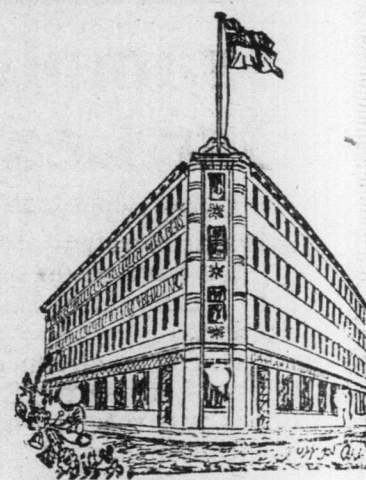

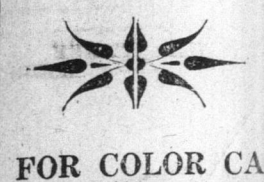

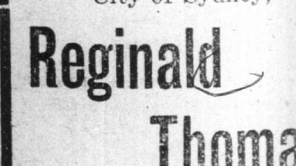
