were right in your suspicions or not."

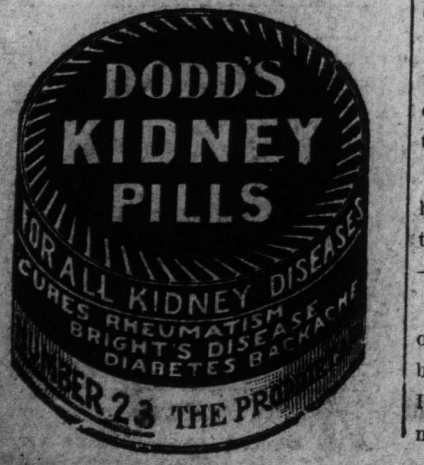

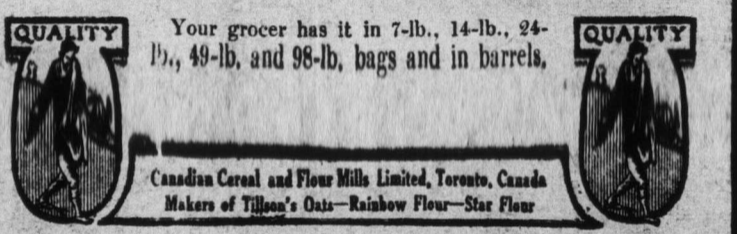

Abraham Lincoln once said that God must have loved common folks because he made so many of them. I wonder what Lincoln would say if he could come back to earth now. For sometimes it seems to me that common folks now-a-days are one of the rarest things in the world.

A few years ago I went, early in May, to a summer place to spend the summer. I was almost the first arrival at the house at which I stayed, and I inspected all the later comers with even more than the keen and personal interest that the first arrival always feels in his successors. You see I hoped there would be some "common folks" among them.

Now in the course of that summer there must have been at least fifty guests at the house, and yet among the fifty I don't believe there were more than half a dozen "common folks."

What do I mean by "common folks"? Why simple folks, common every-day folks; folks that aren't trying to appear anything that they are not; folks who don't have to prove their importance by wearing expensive and elaborate clothes all the time, but are able to dignify simple and even shabby and old-fashioned clothes by the selves inside of them.

What do I mean by "common folks"? I mean folks who have no special pretensions to distinction, and who don't try to make up for that by telling us about their relative pretensions; folks who can even talk for some few minutes without telling you that "my brother is just making his fourth trip abroad," or "my sister-in-law has a rose bush that she paid \$200 for."

What do I mean by "common folks"? I mean people who don't affect to disdain all kinds of simple pleasures, who like to listen when a good burdy-gurdy comes round, who are pleased when there's ice cream for dessert, who don't pretend to have outgrown their taste for such national institutions as ginger-ale and ice-cream soda.

I mean folks who have neighbors and are neighbors in the good old-fashioned way, instead of taking pride in not having even a speaking acquaintance with "the other families in the apartment."

What do I mean by "common folks"? I mean folks who don't call other folks "common" in that disagreeable, snifty sense which that word has lately acquired.

And now that you know about what I mean by "common folks," search your acquaintance and see how many you know.

I'm afraid you won't need more than two hands to count them.

Old-Age Pension Impostors.

Some of Their Little Tricks Exposed.

The Old-Age Pensions Act has now been in operation for some time, and it is alleged there are thousands of persons in receipt of pensions to which they have no valid claim whatever.

Said a "pensions" officer in Wales to the writer the other day: "There are scores of small farmers in my district in receipt of old-age pensions to which they are not entitled. I am quite satisfied of this, but I have to work night and day to get through my ordinary duties, so that I have no time to look into these cases and bring the offenders to book."

Some little time ago a very artful fraud was exposed in a provincial police-court in the prosecution of a man for preferring a bogus claim.

Family Bibles as Evidence. As evidence of age he put in a Prayer Book containing an entry showing that he was born in the year 1839. But, unfortunately for him, it was shown by expert testimony that the ink in which the entry had been made was composed of a dye that was not invented until some twenty-eight years later.

The consequence was that, instead of a pension, the claimant received a sentence of fourteen days' imprisonment.

More frequently than the Prayer Book, the family Bible is put forward in support of bogus claims. From remote times it has been the sacred receptacle of the date, hour, and, in some instances, even the minute, of the birth of each member of the household. In numbers of cases it has been made to lie sadly in connection with applications for old-age pensions.

Family bibles has been forthcoming from houses in which their presence would never have been suspected and certainly could not be accounted for by the piety of the inmates.

ancient Bibles in second-hand book-shops had quite a brisk sale during the first few months of the operation of the Old-Age Pensions Act. They were bought for the purpose of receiving fictitious entries in support of bogus pension claims.

In the absence of a certificate of birth, the next best evidence of age is the production of a certificate of baptism. Although this rite has, in some cases, been performed when the baptized has been of adult years, the entry in the church register of baptisms has usually contained the age.

Rather Inquisitive. But even the baptismal certificate has, in more than one instance, lent itself to fraud. By accident such a case was recently brought to light in a northern town.

The party concerned had been born in a country parish in one of the eastern counties, from which he had migrated in early youth. In those days it was no uncommon practice for parents who had lost a son in infancy or early youth to give his Christian name to an offspring subsequently born.

The consequence was that they had two sons baptized in the same name; and such was the case in the instance referred to. Although seven years short of seventy, it struck the individual in question that this identity of name might be made to secure him his pension at once.

He accordingly wrote for and obtained a certificate of the baptism of his dead brother. This was duly accepted as evidence of age, and the applicant not quite innocently given himself away. It would have secured for him a pension seven years before he was really entitled to it.

Applicants have even gone the length of putting in baptismal certificates of other persons as their own. The vicar of a country parish in the West of England recently informed the writer that he had received letters from two different towns asking for a copy of the same entry in the register of baptisms.

In each case the applicant claimed to be the person to whom the entry related, and stated in so many words that the certificate was required for pension-claim purposes. It would be interesting to know how each applicant fared.—T.H.B.

The Torch Fish.

Remarkable fish have been captured in depths of from 1,000 to 2,000 fathoms in the Atlantic and brought to the surface. The majority of those living at great depths were jet black.

Their luminous portions which light up the dark regions which they inhabit are marvellous. These fish glow through the dark water like flaming torches, says the New York "Press."

Some have elongated snouts, with luminous tips emitting great volumes of light. Others have rows of luminous cells on top and below their bodies, with reflectors and lenses which serve the function of projecting light in definite directions. This light serves the purpose of illuminating the surrounding water to avoid foes to recognize their own kind or to capture prey.

Household Notes.

Ripe tomatoes are said to be good for taking ink stains out of dark cloth; sponge with cold rainwater after using.

A little raspberry juice added to the currant juice which is to be made into jelly improves the flavor decidedly.

Net corset covers with shields inside of them are ideally light and comfortable to wear with lingerie dresses.

To keep butter cool while camping, tie the butter crock in a cloth and suspend from a tree limb so it just touches the water.

A red brick kitchen floor will keep beautifully clean and red if a drop of paraffin oil be used in the water it is washed with.

Rice-water is made by boiling 1/2 cup of rice in 1 quart of water till well done; then strain through cheese-cloth and serve cold.

To renovate a white enamel bedstead, rub the iron parts all over with a cloth dipped in paraffin, then paint it with white enamel paint.

To make toastwater for invalids, toast very brown a slice of bread, break it in bits and pour a cup of boiling water over it. Chill before serving.

Blouses of net or chiffon do not need to be dried out of doors. Roll in a towel after rinsing or wash through the air and iron with a cool iron.

A pretty salad is made of lettuce leaves shredded, sliced red radishes and young onions sliced thin. Mix together with a good French dressing.

A sewing kit is an excellent gift to a boy going to camp. It should hold strong needles, coarse black and white thread, buttons, pins and scissors.

A pretty amusement for the children in summertime is the stringing of wild flowers, kernels of corn, young acorns, maple seeds or tiny hemlock cones.

To clean white kid shoes, soak a clean white cloth in gasoline, then dip in powdered prepared chalk. Rub till all dirt is removed, and dry the shoes in the air, not in the sun.

Tender feet should be bathed every night in warm water, with a tablespoonful of vinegar added; then powder them with a foot powder. All hard skin should be rubbed with pumice stone.

To remove varnish stains from white goods, moisten the stain with ammonia put on a few drops of turpentine and roll it up for twenty minutes. Wash with soapy water, rinse and dry in the sun.

The Bait Act.

We notice that the Board of Trade reverts to the matter of Bait Protection. The Council in its report says: "Last year the Council of the Board of Trade felt that it was its duty to comment very strongly upon the manner in which the Bait Protection Service was being conducted. The Council believes that the Officer in charge of this Service should be given a free hand to carry out the provisions of the Bait Act and has therefore passed the following Resolution which will be forwarded to the Governor in Council:—

"Whereas in the opinion of the Council of the Board of Trade it is a matter of the first importance that the Bait Act should be continuously and systematically enforced;—

"Resolved, — The Council recommends that the Legislature, when next assembled, should appoint an officer with full powers to enforce the Bait Act, having the same relation thereto as the Auditor General has in relation to the Audit Act."

The meaning of this is that the Council of the Board of Trade cannot trust the Morris Government to carry out the Bait Act. The plain remedy is

clear: Turn out the Morris Government and put in a Government which can be relied on to enforce it. The Council of the Board of Trade however, suggests another remedy, and that is to place the enforcement of the Act in the hands of an official whose

appointment is not at the will of the Governor in Council, and who would not be subjected to the direction of the Governor in Council.

This remedy might be well enough if the Bait Act was an absolute law and not conditioned on the discretion of the Governor in Council. The Bait Act is hinged on the Governor in Council. It is a prohibition of the sale of certain fishes, except under licenses issued under the authority of the Governor in Council. Further, the Governor in Council may from time to time, by proclamation, suspend or limit the operation of the Act, and the issue of licenses thereunder, in relation to any district or part of this Colony, or the coasts thereof, and for such periods and in relation to sale or exportation to such places or purposes and in such quantities as shall appear expedient and as shall be declared defined in the proclamation.

Again, there is the matter of treaty relations to be taken into consideration.

Under all these circumstances it would be absurd to make a law empowering the Governor to appoint an officer free from the control of the Executive, to carry out an Act which depends solely on the discretion of the Executive and in which treaty relations are involved.

It appears to us that the Council of the Board of Trade will have to depend on the plain remedy and that is to look out for an Executive which will live up to the intent of the Bait Act.

The Civil Service

According to our Constitution the Legislature is supreme and for some years this fundamental principle of self-government was maintained. Reluctantly by the Executive Government of the day and no appointment made or even increases in salary given that were not provided for by the Legislature. But the exigencies of Party have created new and dangerous precedents. Now we find that Executives can promulgate orders in Council setting aside laws made by the Legislature. Of course Executives have no more right to set aside the laws which govern the Post Office, or the Crown Lands' Department, or the collection of Revenue than to set aside the Criminal law, but they do it all the same. Two manifest evils result. Carelessness and indifference on the part of officials who are not allowed to act independently of partisans, as they are wherever there is a properly constituted Civil Service as in England; and a flooding of Departments at enormous expense with unnecessary and incompetent officials. The arrival of John Lind, the man whose mysterious mission to Mexico was the direct cause of this public manifestation in support of Huerta's attitude towards American mediation, has of itself been devoid of any thrills. When Lind, the personal representative of President Wilson, alighted from the train last night there were only a few persons about who seemed curious to watch the movements of the numerous newspaper photographers, who were on hand to subject him to the ordeal of the flash lights. Lind posed for many pictures.

PHILADELPHIA, August 11.
 Annes Murphy was killed by lightning, baby James McNameel, eleven months old, was crushed to death by falling trees, and scores of persons were injured by flying debris during a wind, rain and electrical storm which swept over the city. Trees were uprooted, telephone and electric poles blown down, windows broken, and eight buildings unroofed by the wind which blew at the rate of sixty miles an hour. Before the rain came, five deaths were reported, due to heat prostrations.

LONDON, August 11.
 The sudden departure of the King and Queen of Spain from England, has surprised the public with whom King Alfonso was a favorite. It was known Alfonso was going to make only a short visit, but he was booked for seven weeks, and the Queen was expected to remain for the rest of the summer. No doubt conditions in Spain are responsible for the change of plans. Many plots were discovered in 1909 and 1910, due to discontent at the war in Morocco, and organized chiefly by disappointed extreme Socialists and Republicans. This discontent seems to be quieted, but the discontent has apparently spread to higher and more influential circles. No such development is looked forward to, but the Carlists, having frustrated Republicans, have spoiled the King's holiday and robbed the Cowes Regatta of the week's most popular figures.

LONDON, August 11.
 Queen Mary seemed fated to have trouble with the occupants of Royal residences. The latest to be

brought in is no less than Princess Christian, aunt of King George, whose husband lives at Cumberland Lodge. For a couple of months the Princess has been adding to her husband's rather slender income by selling bottles of perfume made by herself at Cumberland Lodge. She has been aided by Princess Patricia, of Connaught. Princess Christian recently began putting labels on the bottles, telling that the perfume was made at Cumberland Lodge, and when this reached the Queen she ordered Princess Christian to cease selling.

LONDON, August 11.
 The alleged great prevalence of malingering under the Insurance Act, which introduced compulsory insurance of workmen against sickness, infirmity and old age, created much interest in a paper read on that subject by Sir John Collie, at the International medical congress to-day. Sir John, who is a member of the Government Advisory Committee on the National Insurance Act, thought the accusations brought against the workmen of malingering were exaggerated and premature. He thought it would be unscientific to attempt to form any estimate based merely on results of three to six months' working of the Act. It might be thought necessary to take special precautions against the prevalence of malingering when dealing with thirteen million of people, nearly half of whom before the passage of the Act had not been insured against sickness.

LONDON, August 11.
 Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons to-day that a Royal Commission would be appointed to enquire into the causes and treatment of venereal diseases. This step has been taken by the Government as the result of prolonged agitation by the British Medical Organizations.

PARIS, August 11.
 The Ministry have given approval to a scheme for wide development of the aeroplane to co-operate with the navy. M. Bardin, the Minister of Marine, will ask Parliament for an immediate appropriation of \$1,750,000 for this purpose. It is believed that battleships and large cruisers will be able during battle to use aeroplanes to throw explosives as powerful as those now used in torpedoes. French naval designers are taking into account the necessity of additional overhead protection from aerial torpedoes.

On Friday night next the Regatta Committee will meet at Wood's store to finish up the season's business. A protest against the crew who won the Naval-Reserve Race will be considered and a decision reached. The cause of the protest is that one of the winning crew was not eligible to row in that race.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, August 11.
 A number of the foreign delegates to the International Medical Congress to-day occupied front seats at the weekly meeting of the Women's Social and Political Union Militant Suffragette Organization. Mrs. E. Pankhurst was present, attended by a nurse and Miss Annie Kenny, another leader, was on the platform. Both were given an ovation. Mrs. Pankhurst made a brief speech which lacked the fire and militancy of her previous utterances. She welcomed the doctors by saying she supposed our foreign friends are trying to understand the strange movement which is sweeping the whole world and making the so-called weaker sex able to go through experiences which would have been deemed incredible a few years ago. Remarking that both her own and Miss Kenny's licenses had expired, Mrs. Pankhurst attributed their immunity from arrest to a desire on the part of the Government to avoid such experience while the medical congress was in session.

MILAN, August 11.
 Yesterday was the seventh day of the general strike here. Although a state of siege has not been proclaimed, workmen's quarters are occupied by the military forces, and martial law is practically in full force. Fifty thousand strikers held a meeting yesterday, and after listening to speeches decided to continue the general strike, and also decided to organize a movement throughout the Kingdom to proclaim a one day strike in every city and town some day this week.

Amherst Chief Rounded Up Burglar.

Amherst, Aug. 6.—Chief Carter, made an important arrest this morning which it is to be hoped will put an end to the numerous burglaries which have been so prevalent in Amherst, and other towns during the past few months. The party arrested was Lewis Luby, who some years ago was sentenced to a term in the Reform School, and who since that time has made his residence in Amherst. Luby has practically confessed to having been involved in no less than eight burglaries, one in Truro, one in New Glasgow, two in Pictou, and two in Sackville, as well as numerous similar crimes in Amherst. In all the different burglaries committed, Luby claims that a young man, Walter McKinley, was associated with him. McKinley was up before the Court last week on a charge of stealing money from Bliss Wells, and Judge Patterson placed him under bonds of \$200. Failing to secure bonds he was for two or three days in jail, and Chief Carter heard of his release too late this morning to secure him as he left town on the morning express. Officer Burbine was out on his trail to-day but so far has not located the lad.

Luby, the police state, admits breaking into the Victoria Bakery on 2 occasions, and on circus night they broke into the offices of the Canada Electric Light. Other places touched by Luby were the City Fruit Store, Miss McEachern's store and Smith's bookstore. In all Luby and his associates must have been involved in a full score of daring burglaries if any credence can be placed in his statement. The chief of Police has recovered a small portion of the stolen goods.

Judge Who Went to Prison.

Night With a Gypsy King.
 How he was sent to prison as a boy was related by Mr. Justice Duckhill recently when he distributed the prizes at Market Bosworth Grammar School, Leicestershire. His father was born in Market Bosworth, he said. His grandfather—a very good grandfather, who was called "The game chicken" because he always wanted to fight, because he was small, and because he nearly always won—made only one mistake in his life. That was in sending him (the judge) to prison. The judge told how as a little boy he had been invited to go to Bosworth Park to see the "King" of the gipsies, and how late in the evening "this nasty little boy" left home and found himself in the retinue of the gypsy King. He was afterwards taken by a policeman to his grandfather, who next morning as a punishment took him to the lock-up. He was only in custody for one hour, and as he began to cry he was liberated.

ROLLER SKATING COMMENCED.
 The Roller Rink opened for the season last night and quite a crowd of the younger folks engaged in the invigorating pastime. The rink will be kept open during the autumn season.

News From Davis Inlet

Sickness Prevalent—Poor Fishery.
 Mr. R. Ford, of Bartlett's Barber Saloon, received a letter yesterday saying that his mother was recently stricken with a severe attack of paralysis at Davis Inlet, Labrador; also that his cousin, John Dickers, who was a carpenter with the Hudson Bay Company for several years, died at Davis Inlet in April last. Deceased was well known here. As there is little hope held out for Mrs. Ford's recovery, her daughter, Mrs. A. Watson, leaves by the S. S. Kyle for the Labrador port mentioned. Mr. Ford also received the intelligence that sickness is prevalent at Davis Inlet just now. A number of people are down with severe colds but there is no fitness of a contagious nature amongst the livers. The weather is unusually bad all the summer at Davis Inlet. The fishery there is a blank to date with no sign of an improvement.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
 Sweden was yesterday conceded the right to send wool, pulp and paper into the States free of duty.
PARIS, To-day.
 Farnce, yesterday, gave back to Russia the great bronze bell, taken from the Cathedral at Sebastopol and brought to France as part of the spoils of the Crimean war. Since that time it has been in one of the towers of the Cathedral of Notre Dame, Paris. The bell, which weighs upwards of three tons, was formally presented by a representative of the French Ministry to a Russian Ambassador this afternoon, and will shortly be sent to St. Petersburg.

N. E. Storm Raging North.

Along the northern outports to-day a heavy north east gale raged. Owners of Ship Depend on Cat.

It may be Factor in Proving Ownership of Vessel.
 Montreal Gazette, Aug. 5.—An interesting point in maritime law has been raised by the discovery of a live cat on board the abandoned Norwegian steamer Glenmark. It will be recalled that the Glenmark, after having been dismantled, without having righted herself from a bad list due to the cargo having shifted, was finally abandoned by her crew on June 13th. The vessel was afterwards sighted by the G. P. R. liner Montezuma, and the tramp steamer Fishpool and Wearpool, a menace to navigation, as she was right in the track of the St. Lawrence route steamers going to or returning from the ice-fields. At the instance of underwriters, H. M. S. Donegal was despatched to seek and seize the Glenmark, the warship finally towing her into Ploverville. Although the Glenmark had been floating about for a month or more, a live cat was found on board. It used to be held that a vessel still belonged to the original owners if a live cat or log was found on board by salvors, and the question is being discussed in both legal and maritime circles as to whether this still holds good. The cat would seem to be the only hope the original owners of the Glenmark have that the vessel may still be declared to be their property.

Tube Transit Extraordinary.

A new method of transporting coal by water pressure through a pipe has been discovered by Mr. G. G. Bell, engineer to the Hammersmith Electricity Works. By this system from 30 to 60 tons of coal an hour can be discharged, he is claimed, through an 8 in. pipe leading from the Thames and electricity works, a distance of 600 yards. If the scheme is adopted, a large mixing tank will be erected by the coal wharf. A mechanical "grab" will lift the coal from the barge and after passing into an automatic weighing machine, the coal will be filtered into a mixing tank, which will contain 15 per cent. of coal and 85 per cent. of water. A powerful electrically-driven pump will hurl the mixture of coal and water at high velocity through the transmission tube to a reception tank at the bottom, and another pump will drive the water through a return pipe to the mixing tank, while another "grab" will lift the coal of the reception tank into the storage department. Thus the whole process is automatic, and the water is used over and over again. Though the initial cost of the plant is approximately £10,000, it is estimated that in time the money would be saved over and over again. At present the cost of transport is approximately 7d. a ton, or about £729 for the 25,000 tons used in a year.

Sea Monster Weighs 30,000 Pounds.

Capt. Charles H. Thompson's giant sea monster, weighing the modest sum of 30,000 pounds, has so far been unclassified in natural history. Scientists proclaim it the most remarkable specimen ever captured. The genus of species is unknown. The following facts cover the monster's history, as stated by Capt. Thompson:
 The monster was captured June 1, 1912, in the vicinity of Kulgata Key, Fla., after a fight lasting 30 hours. Five harpoons and 151 bullets were required to subdue the monster, and it took five days to finally kill it. It was a boat, into thousands of pieces; knocked the rudder and propeller off a 31-ton yacht; had to be towed 110 miles by a tug; length 45 feet; circumference, 23 feet; 9 inches diameter; 8 feet 3 inches mouth (width); 31 inches mouth; 38 inches depth; 43 inches deep; tongue 10 inches long; liver weighed 1,790 pounds; several thousand teeth. The monster had swallowed an animal weighing 1,500 pounds.
 Characteristics of fish and animal—contrary to all laws of natural history, tail measures 10 feet from tip to tip; pectoral fin, 5 feet long; 2 feet wide; dorsal fin, 3 feet long; 2 feet 9 inches wide; gills, 4 feet long; hide, 3 inches thick, no scales. The specimen was mounted by J. S. Warnebel and sent to Miami, Fla., by the Smithsonian Institute. Over 5,000 people saw the monster dragged on the steamship ways at the yards of the Miami Yacht & Machine Co. This report is authenticated by city officials, judges, ministers, chief of police, bankers and public generally, who saw the monster within an hour of its death. The fish of its fight for life was witnessed by at least 500 people. —N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

Insuring Highwaymen.

In the history of business and commerce there is no more romantic chapter than that which concerns Lloyd's that great English organization of brokers and underwriters, which conducts all the maritime insurance of the world, and as a side line, so to speak, accepts all sorts of freak insurance, against almost any conceivable risk—against twins, bad weather, appendicitis or other illness, earthquakes and what-not.
 Curiously enough, these queer insurances played an important part in the early history of Lloyd's, which was so named after Edward Lloyd, a man who kept in Tower street toward the close of the 17th century, a coffee house which was the great meeting place at that time for persons interested in shipping and matters connected with shipping.
 Lloyd was a man of great enterprise, and he was really the originator of the great system of maritime and commercial intelligence which had been so developed that to-day Lloyd's agents are to be found on every coast in the world. Day by day they report by electric cable and wireless telegraphy the passing or arrival of vessels in their particular corner of the globe, and it is thus that the world, through the medium of Lloyd's, is able to keep in touch with the movements of every ship.
 As an illustration of the gambling in speculative insurance which was carried on at Lloyd's coffee house, it might be mentioned that the lives of highwaymen who had fallen within the clutches of the law, if were likely to do so, were frequently insured. One insurance is still recorded of the posthumous of the execution of two Jacobite Scotch peers after the 1745 rebellion at a premium of one and one-half per cent. The chance of war with France was insured against at a premium of 50¢ and a dissolution of Parliament at a premium of 75¢. Travellers might insure their return from foreign countries at various rates.

One Girl's Heartbreak.

From Russia to Edmonton to marry the man to whom she was engaged, and then to learn that her intended husband had died two months ago, was the experience of Maria Strakoff, from the Province of Baranau, who arrived in Edmonton the other day to be wedded to Paul Krasnoff.
 She arrived in Edmonton, expecting her old-time sweetheart to meet her, but no one was at the depot, and on enquiry the next day the young woman, who is but twenty-two years of age, learned that Krasnoff had died while working for a construction company in the west.

The grief-stricken girl is now waiting to receive sufficient money to take her back to Russia, and a subscription is being circulated among the Russian population of Edmonton.

All Twins or Triplets.

Remarkable Family of 25 Children.
 Washington, Aug. 4.—Probably the most remarkable family record in the archives of the United States Government was brought to light to-day by the Pension Bureau in the case of Wm. Warren, 1915 Locust St., St. Joseph, Mo., who served in C. I. 15th Kansas Cavalry.
 As sworn to by Warren, the statistics were:
 His father married in turn three sisters, the first two wives being twins and the third being one of a pair of twins.
 To the first wife was born one set of triplets, all boys, of whom William Warren was one.
 Between them, the other two wives gave birth to 24 sets of twins, making a total of 25 children. No single children were born in the family. Of the 25 children, 12 were boys and 13 were girls. Finally, all 25 boys served in the Union Army. William Warren was the sole survivor at the time he applied for his pension.

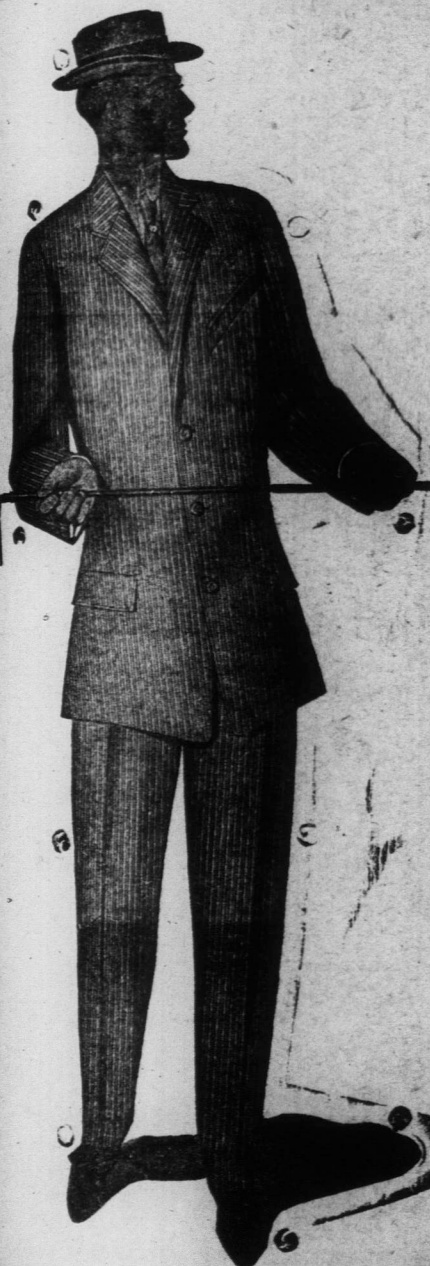

The Cook Stove



The cook stove is a horrible example of man's inhumanity to woman. Sometimes, when placed in the hands of a young bride who learned everything at college except how to hash brown potatoes, it becomes an object lesson of woman's inhumanity to man. The world is full of ambitious husbands who married some prize winner in the Latin course, and woke up later to find that while she could pin the shoulders of a Greek root to the mat three times out of five she didn't know whether a cook stove could be started from the seat or had to be cranked with a half hitch.

In a newly established home which is filled with love and installment furniture the cook stove is used for the first few years as a domestic science experiment station. As nearly all cook stoves are made of sheet iron, they do not feel these experiments nearly so much as the rest of the family. If there were more sheet-iron stomachs in existence, there would be fewer round trip tickets sold to Reno, Nevada, with six months' stop-over.

The cook stove is a simple affair, and seldom requires any more care than a six-cylinder automobile. It is so constructed that anyone can start a fire in it the first time by the simple expedient of substituting gasoline for kerosene. As a rule, the cook stove has to be fired up every morning, and this is a wifely duty which should be included in the marriage ritual along with love, cherish and obey. In summer the cook stove does not heat water or anything else, which accounts for the increasing popularity of the bathing beach and the four-minute sponge off.

Extreme Heat Detrimental to Fish.

Messrs. Lind and Conto, of Oporto, wrote the Board of Trade as follows: "The consumption of British fish is less active this week. We had hoped that stocks of the old fish would have been all sold before the arrival of the new fish, but the arrival of the Antoinette with another cargo of old cure upset our calculations and now that the Annie E. Banks and Little Mystery have arrived with mixed cargoes of new and old, this latter quality will doubtless have to suffer a further reduction in prices in order to facilitate sales. Prices opened for new fish are relatively high, but the sale is dull. The stocks of Norwegian and other qualities are fairly heavy for this time of the year, and the demand is not very brisk. We have been having very warm weather since the beginning of the month, in fact we have to go back to 1876 to find records of such a heat in the month of July. It has been very detrimental to the old fish."

Plenty Squid at Carbonear.

At present the southwest coast is dotted with bankers which are looking for a squid bathing. Word has just been received that squid are very plentiful at Carbonear, the fish having struck in there on Sunday evening. Bankers seeking bait can be supplied at Carbonear.

Dutchess Report.

The Reid Nfld. Company had this message last night from Captain Parsons, of the s.s. Duchess of Marlborough, which reached Lewisporte at nine o'clock last night:

The Kaiser's Present to Norway.

The unveiling at Balholm, in Norway, by the German Emperor of the great statue in honor of the ancient Viking, King Bele, took place recently. During his first visit to Balholm many years ago the Kaiser was struck by the humble character of the Bele mound, as compared with the interest which ought legitimately to attach to the tomb of a great Viking. He expressed himself strongly and enthusiastically to his friend, Hans Dahl, a well-known painter, as to the possibilities of the situation. Finally, the project took shape, and the Emperor commissioned the design and construction of an immense statue, symbolic of the old Viking power, and bought a tract of land on the slope of a hill commanding a striking panoramic view of the approaches by water and the surrounding mountains.

Gloucester Prospects Bright.

New York, July 25.—No matter what they do with the tariff in Washington, the supply of fresh fish is going to be plentiful next fall, according to Arthur E. Rowe, of Gloucester, Mass., says the New York Times. Mr. Rowe outfits many of the fishermen of Gloucester, and is in the fish business himself. And Gloucester, in spite of its woes of last autumn, has good prospects of making a little money still, in the words of its visiting citizen.

The chances for making a dollar or two in Gloucester are now brighter than for a long time," said Mr. Rowe. "I would say this is on account of the fact that large bodies of mackerel, and other fish are being seen on the grounds near the South Shoal Lighthouse and the Channel, indicating that there will be plenty of fish in the fall. Last winter and spring our vessels did well, and the outlook is encouraging for the captains and others paying up their obligations. You see, in 1912 everybody had got pretty well tied up. There was a terrible amount of bad weather and high seas, and fishermen were not able to make big catches. People have taken to eating a great deal more fish nowadays, as one direct consequence of the fishermen's loss of money is this: true in households, but they tell you in restaurants that their patrons are ordering fish every day. Instead of the one day in the week when it was considered the thing to take something that was not meat. Then the facilities for transporting fish have been so improved that the fish may be delivered in any city in far better condition than used to be possible. In Gloucester the fishing fleet has diminished considerably over the past few years. Because so many vessels have been sold, the reason for that being it was next to impossible to get captains and crews. So many skippers and sailors deserted the water last winter. Those that stuck to their craft through the winter have made money.

"New York is a big market for Gloucester halibut and other fresh fish," admitted Mr. Rowe, "but our salt fish go all over the country. One question that is agitating Gloucester just now is that of the gill netters. Some assert that gill nets are injurious to our general fishing interests, because they catch the mother fish when they are in spawn. I understand that a fish will not bite at a hook when in that condition. The fishing with gill nets began in Gloucester waters two years ago, when fishermen came from the Great Lakes where it is claimed they had destroyed the fishing grounds by this kind of fishing. Another question that is being agitated is that of auto-trawling—whether dragging scrapers over fishing grounds is not a disadvantage to fishing. This is to be settled by the United States Fishing Commission. Local opinion is much divided on the subject."—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.

It cannot be hoped that any material good will accrue to the Colony from the paltry few dollars paid by sportsmen for the privilege of getting abused by them.

There is nothing more crude or more over and over again than the Beaver and the moose, our present "Game Laws," and the moose they are substituted by a system that will have in view, principally and chiefly, the good of the people, and the comfort and convenience of the homes of the people, the better will it be for all concerned. "Uncle George" is a reliable authority on matters of this nature and the opinions of men like him ought to be taken before such laws receive legislative sanction. It has been proved over and over again that the Beaver Preservation Act is nothing better than a surprising legislative absurdity.—Com.

Thus it is with every evil from lumbago down to weevil; all things pass, and so to peevish never help us out a bit; better say, when things are rocky, when the world seems jasperwocky, and all our mules are acting balky; "All our troubles soon will fit!" Mundane things are ever passing, so there is no use aching, and there is no sense in sassing Madame Fortune day by day; all the ills we rant and kick at, all the grieves we stall and stick at, soon, full soon, will pass away. When we're hot, we surely show it, saying things to shock a poet, rude things—then, before we know it, summer has gone up the flame; having quit this thing of frying, we, with blizzards round us, flying, watch the wintry weather, sighing in a brand new kind of gloom.

AMUSING ERRORS in Official Reports. To the list of misprints in official documents must be added the delicious sentence which appeared in the final report of the Visitation Commission issued last year: "We now see a marmot, the spinal cord of which had previously been divided by a virivector." This should have read according to a Parliamentary paper circulated subsequently: "We once saw a marmot, the spinal cord of which had previously been divided, bite a virivector." A little slip in the 1907 edition of the Royal Warrant detailing the various Army rates of pay also necessitated the printing and promulgation of an official correction. In that warrant, under the heading: "Daily Rates of Pay," appeared: "Field Marshal Commanding in Chief Mediterranean, £5,000." This gave to the Duke of Connaught the generous remuneration of nearly £2,000,000 a year until the correction explained that "daily rate" in this case should have been "yearly rate."

Doctor Poisoned, Nurse Accused.

Utica, August 6.—Miss Emma E. Krill, a professional nurse, arrested on a charge of murdering Dr. Stanley E. Tron, fainted when she was taken in custody at her home at Cornwall-on-the-Hudson. After listening for a half hour to the depositions read by the Judge when arraigned here, she again fell unconscious at the feet of the District Attorney Fuller, and the deputies who arrested her.

She was taken to a couch and after being revived lay and listened to the remainder of the depositions. A plea of not guilty was entered for her pending the arrival of her attorney, Mr. Abel Morris, of New York, and she was committed to jail without bail.

Nearly all afternoon, Miss Krill lay in her bed in the hospital ward of the jail with her head covered. She refused to talk or answer questions.

Dr. Tron died on June 22, and it was believed that he had committed suicide. He and Miss Krill had lived here, having become acquainted at a hospital in New York.

The authorities made an investigation and decided they had enough evidence to warrant the arrest of the woman. An analysis of the physician's stomach showed traces of morphine.

Tron was a Harvard graduate and a son of a clergyman in Italy. He formerly was connected with the Lyng-in-Hospital, New York. When he came here he started work among the Italians, although his practice did not seem to be lucrative. Miss Krill, who said Dr. Tron had promised to marry her, asserted that the physician was not discouraged, although he had at first thought of going back to Italy.

Excellent Local Productions.

Mr. George Gulliford, of Lady Cove, Trinity Bay, has just completed two splendidly modelled motor boats, one for Mr. R. A. Squires and the other for Messrs. Steer Brothers. Both were launched last week. The length of the first is 40 feet and her breadth about 7½ feet, she is constructed on perfectly scientific lines having proper regard for displacement, water lines and the least possible resistance in agreement with comfort, accommodation and the greatest possible speed. She sits very gracefully in the water, and makes rapid speed under a 16 h.p. engine. She has accommodation for several passengers with water tank, fittings and other toilet conveniences.

The boat for Messrs. Steer Bros. is called an auxiliary fishing vessel. She will measure about 35 tons, carrying a 30 h.p. engine and showing the constructive genius as the boat built for Mr. Squires.

Mr. Gulliford has had some years of experience in boat and yacht building in the United States and besides he belongs to a family of expert builders who caught their inspiration from one of the foremost building mechanics—the Pittman brothers—that ever contributed their genius towards the improvement of this island's local sailing fleet. Mr. George Gulliford is a worthy successor of a worthy family and he has made it very clear that Newfoundlanders can take their part well in mechanical and constructive operations, with any other people with whom they from time to time came in contact. There is plenty of room for improvement and encouragement in motor boat construction in this island and it is not too much to hope that in the future suitable legislation will give an impetus to this industry.

Heroic Scotsman.

Death Rather Than Desert Chinese. The heroism of a Scotsman who chose death rather than the desertion of three Chinese who looked to him for protection, is described by Reuter's Peking correspondent, who writes giving particulars of the fate in Mongolia of Mr. Grant, of Skelmorlie, Ayrshire.

Mr. Grant, an employee in the Chinese telegraph service, was arrested by Mongols near Tabol when he was in the act of photographing a Mongol camp. When reports of Mr. Grant's death arrived at Kalgan a party consisting of Mr. Henningsen, a Dane, in the employ of the Chinese telegraph service, Dr. Wolf, also a Dane, and Mr. Giles, an English journalist at Peking, set out to investigate. The party was stopped by Mongols, who took them to a chief. They described Mr. Grant, and the chief said: "Such a man is at the camp of the great chief some forty miles further among the hills. You can go there and see him." With a Mongol escort they went to the camp, where the "great chief" said:

"There is a foreigner here who answers to your description of your friend. But he has joined us. He is now a captain, commanding fifty men."

A Mongol attendant shouted, and out came a man exactly answering the description of Mr. Grant. But he was a Russian. The party were bitterly disappointed. The Russian said he knew nothing of Mr. Grant. The Russian's feet were bare, and Mr. Henningsen said to him, "Have you no boots?" "Oh, yes," replied the man, and walking back into his tent he showed several pairs of boots. "I have everything I need," he said, "here are my clothes, here is my saddle." "Where did you get the saddle?" asked Mr. Henningsen, who recognized it as one he had given to Mr. Grant. "The Mongols captured it from the Chinese," replied the Russian. Mr. Henningsen's hopes fell to zero.

Mr. Grant's Cart.

Then he saw a cart which he recognized as one he had bought for Mr. Grant. Inside the cart were Mr. Grant's pipe, tobacco pouch, and other personal belongings.

Mr. Henningsen became angry and upbraided the Mongols. "As you have all my friend's belongings, you must know what has become of him. I shall go and talk to the Great Chief." One of the Mongols drew Mr. Henningsen aside and urged him not to ask further questions. "Your life and those of all the party depend on your discretion," he said. "You will not find out any more here, but I can tell you that Mr. Grant has been killed. Go away in peace. If Mr. Grant had done that he would not have been killed."

The party decided that they could do no more. Other Mongols, however, told them that Mr. Grant and three Chinese had been captured, and that the Mongols had decided to kill the Chinese. Mr. Grant was told that he could go on to Kalgan after his camera had been destroyed, but he refused to abandon the Chinese.

The Mongols gave him the choice of going away at once or being shot with the Chinese. Mr. Grant chose the latter. As he stood in front of the firing party he taunted the Mongols with their cowardice, and laughed in their faces until the Mongols wondered at his bravery.—Daily Mail.

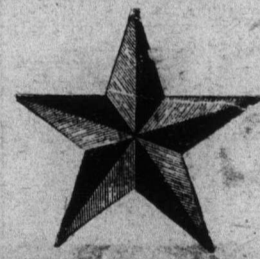

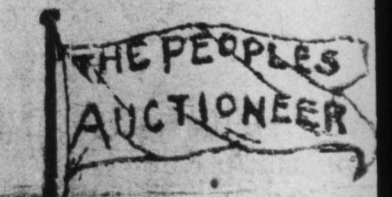
