"Let me read to you, Hugh," she pleaded earnestly.

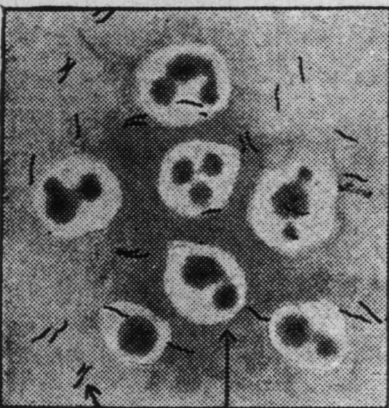

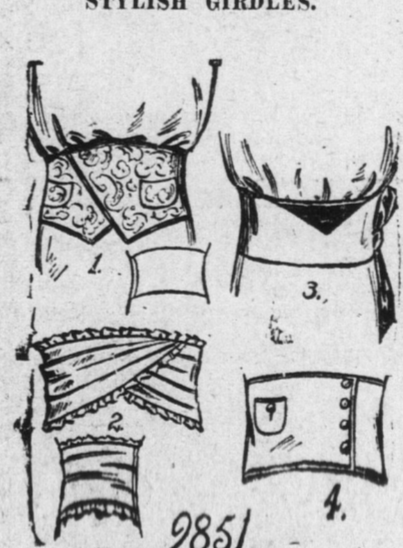


Ladies' Negligee or Dressing Sack and Cap.

The Hospital Enquiry.

The correspondence tabled yesterday in the House of Assembly fully justifies the action of Mr. Coaker in directing attention to the supplies received by Dr. Keegan from the General Hospital. It is true that Dr. Keegan claims these supplies as a matter of right. But we do not see how the Government could have come to any other decision than to direct the Superintendent to refrain from receiving such supplies for the future. The Colonial Secretary in his letter of March 2nd, says:—

"When you were appointed to the Hospital you will remember that those who discussed with you the terms of your appointment before you went to the Institution, made no reference to any such emoluments or perquisites, nor was there any reference to the same in the records of your appointment. Furthermore, you never made any formal claim upon the Government at any time for these perquisites. You were given the salary agreed upon, and in addition your house, fuel and light, salary for stable attendant, upkeep of horse, repairs to carriages and harness, etc., and it was upon these terms that the late incumbent of the Institution was pensioned."

We hear also that Dr. Shea states positively that he did not receive supplies of milk, vegetables and meat when he was Superintendent; and we also learn that the salary of Dr. Rendell was settled on the basis of receiving as salary an equivalent of what Dr. Keegan received as Medical Superintendent of the General Hospital, and that in assessing this salary the receipt of milk, vegetables and meat by Dr. Keegan was not taken into consideration.

The remarkable feature of the situation is that those perquisites should have been received by Dr. Keegan for so many years without coming to the knowledge of the Government. It is most regrettable that this correspondence was not tabled earlier so that an opportunity would have been afforded for the discussion of the matter in the House instead of at the last minute, when the House was waiting for the Governor to propose the Assembly. As will be seen the matter was drawn to the attention of the Government on February 2nd. Mr. Bennett's first letter is dated February 4th; Dr. Keegan's first reply February 6th. Then there is a long interval and Mr. Bennett's second letter is dated March 2nd and Dr. Keegan's second reply on Friday last, March 6th. The result of the enquiry has been asked for frequently. Jail Editor up For Trial.

Berlin, March 7.—Ernest Meyer, "jail editor" of the Socialist newspaper, Vorwaerts, was brought up for trial to-day on charges of treason and libelling Crown Prince Frederick William. The offense was committed in an article satirizing the farewell order issued by the crown prince when he left the command of the Death's Head Hussars at Danzig. The crown prince then said: "If ever the king calls and the bugle sounds the charge then think of him whose fondest wish it was to love this moment of a soldier's highest happiness in your company." Hans Leuss, editor of the weekly Die Weltam Monig, was on Thursday sentenced to six months' imprisonment on a similar charge, and a third suit against another paper is to be tried next week. Every paper in Germany bears the name of a man who takes responsibility for all articles contained in the publication and he is known as the jail editor.

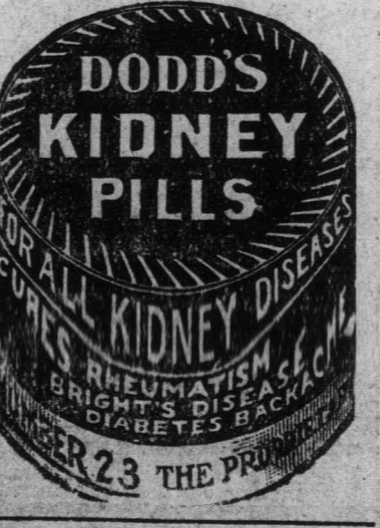

Closing of the House.

H. E. THE GOVERNOR PROROGUES LEGISLATURE.
The prorogation of the twenty-third General Assembly took place yesterday. His Excellency Governor Davidson performed the closing ceremony of the session, which was one of the busiest for many years because of the remarkably strong opposition.

At 2 o'clock His Excellency, accompanied by Mrs. Davidson and A. D. C.'s Davenport and Goodridge, reached the Assembly grounds, where detachments from the Police Constabulary, Naval Reserve and City Brigades formed a guard of honour. The entire squad received the vice-regal party with a general salute amid the rendition of the National Anthem by the City Band.

Following a brief inspection of the guards, His Excellency, attended by his A. D. C.'s, commander and officers of the Brigades, I. G. Sullivan and Supt. Grimes, entered the Legislative Council, which was filled to its capacity by a representative gathering and amongst whom were His Lordship the Bishop of Newfoundland, attended by Rev. Canon Bolt, His Lordship Chief Justice Horwood, Mr. Justice Johnson and many others prominent in church and state.

After the Usher of the Black Rod had summoned the hon. members of the Legislature to the Bar of the House, all the Bills that were passed during the session were read and assented to by His Excellency, who made his closing speech as follows:—

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council; Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I am glad to be able to relieve you from your sessional duties at so early a date, a circumstance rendered possible by the diligence with which you have applied yourselves to the business considered by you, and by the harmonious character of your deliberations. I sincerely hope that the various measures passed by you, many of them of exceptional importance, will produce the benefits expected from them.

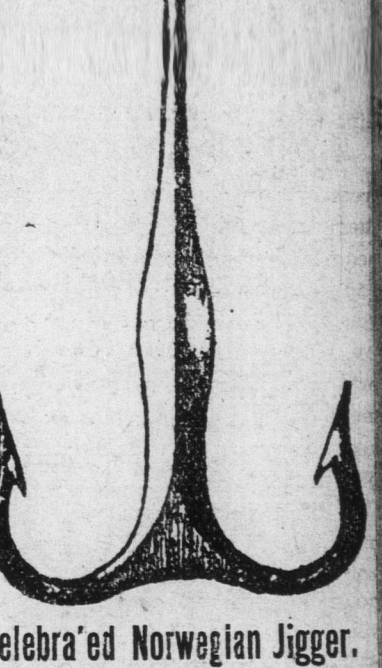
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

In taking leave of you, I earnestly pray that Providence may guide you and our common country along the paths that lead to greater material welfare and prosperity.

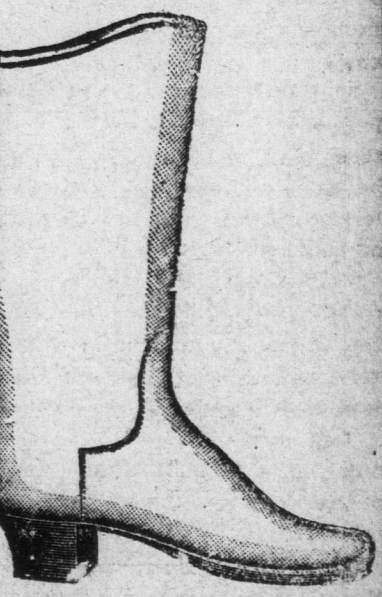

Weil, J.P., of Griguet, and stated that ten men went adrift from Sacred Islands on Tuesday, that Bartlett had died, and that the remaining nine men landed at Cape Onion at 3 o'clock yesterday in an exhausted condition. Seals were reported plentiful in that vicinity and it is supposed that the men were seal hunting.

In 1853, the British Navy consisted of 339 sailing and 161 steam vessels. In 1854, the British Navy cost 62 million pounds; in 1894, 15½ million; 1904, 37 million. Whilst Germany could claim 306 ships in October, 1912, Great Britain could claim 353. At peace strength the British Navy numbers 146,000 men; the Navies of Germany, Italy and Austria together muster 128,889.

The Passing of the Hon. W. J. S. Donnelly.

There passed to his rest at noon yesterday, a gentleman who had played a prominent part in the public life of Newfoundland, in the person of the Hon. W. J. S. Donnelly. He had attained the full span of man's life and was in his seventieth year. For some years his health had been failing and intimation was given to him that the Government was prepared to consider the matter of a pension on his retirement. That course, however, was not agreeable to Mr. Donnelly, and he preferred to continue his work as Inspector of Customs, and he did so and died in harness. This office he held from 1898 and his work was much appreciated by the several governments he served. His financial knowledge and skill were found most useful to these administrations. In the same year Her Majesty Queen Victoria conferred upon him the title of "Honourable," as a recognition of his valuable services to his country. One of his earlier labours in this office was the compilation of a history and an analysis year by year of the Public Debt of Newfoundland from the inception of the Debt in 1834, until December 31st, 1900. The debt was for the erection of a light house at Cape Spear. When he completed his history in 1900, the Public Debt was \$17,278,194.67. With the loans authorized this session, it will soon be about \$32,000,000. Before he accepted a permanency, he had served many years in the House of Assembly and was in more than one Administration Receiver General. One of his former colleagues expressed the opinion that "Mr. Donnelly was the ablest financier, and the most reliable authority on financial matters, that ever had a seat in the Assembly, or the Executive Council of the Colony." His speaking powers were also exceptional and he was regarded as a most graceful polished and effective speaker. Mr. Donnelly was born in Spaniard's Bay. His father afterwards conducted a most extensive business at Harbor Grace, to which he succeeded. His generosity and service to the Roman Catholic Church; particularly to its Diocese of Harbor Grace, are held in most affectionate remembrance. He is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Devereaux, of Harbor Grace, one

daughter, residing at home, and five sons; William J., Assistant Auditor General; Frank, Secretary-Treasurer of the City Club; Arthur, at Balne Johnstone's; Harry, Local Manager of the Railway Passengers' Accident Company; and Dr. Fergus, Veterinary Surgeon. To these we extend sympathy in their bereavement. The funeral takes place to-morrow afternoon from his late residence, Devon Row.

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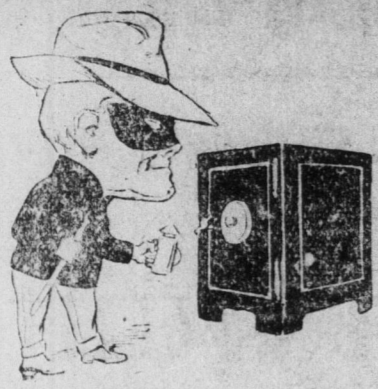

Not long ago I dropped in to call on a friend of mine, a widow who is about to build some apartments with her husband's insurance money. As she rose to greet me she laid down a big book. I commented upon the size of it and she laughed and showed it to me. Much to my surprise, it was a book on plumbing. "No, I'm not learning to be a plumber," she said, "but I think I can oversee the plumbing of those houses better if I just learn enough about the whole thing to know what the plumbers and architects are talking about. I got this book out of the library, and I've sent for a lot of catalogues so as to get comparative prices. I think I can learn from them all enough to know what I want, and what it's worth to me."

Now, don't you admire that woman's common sense? I certainly do. For she has the rare intelligence to make use of the great mine of power which is open and accessible to all of us, and yet which few of us take the trouble to use. which is to be launched at Belfast shortly, it may be believed that she will be slightly over 50,000 tons, exceeding the new Cunarder, Aquitania, which is scheduled to make her first trip to New York on May 30, by about 2,000 tons. The Britannic is the largest boat yet built in the United Kingdom, and, in this connection, it is of interest to note that her namesake, launched forty years ago from the same yard was the wonder ship of her day, surpassing all records in speed and luxury. During her career she steamed over two million miles, and carried 400,000 passengers across the North Atlantic. Yet she was only 5,000 tons register.

THE COMING SEASON.

This is to be a very special season for London society people. For the first time for many years the Court is to be a Court of young people. That is to say, that all the private entertaining will be largely devoted to the amusement of the young Princesses—our Princess Mary and her cousin Princess Maud of Fife—and the Prince of Wales. When amusement is said it means also more serious things. But there is no doubt that the youthful element at the Palace will give a note of gaiety to the rather severe festivities of Court circles. Princess Mary will not, of course, come out this year, but she will be present at some small and early dances at the Palace, where the Prince of Wales will go into society as soon as his university career will permit. Among the general public of the social world likewise there are to be many very important debutantes, and already the lists for presentation to Their Majesties are more than full. The principal dances of the season will this year be mainly for girls, and the young person will occupy a more prominent position than she has done for a long time. Even Royal house parties will in future include her, for it is obvious that the youthful daughter of the King and Queen will want companions of her own standing. Our English Princesses have far more of a natural and pleasant liberty than their foreign cousins, who often see no society till they are married. Already there are rumors of an extremely interesting engagement in English Royal circles which this season may verify.

LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, Feby. 25th, 1914.
BUSY ROYALTIES.

There will be few spare hours for either the King or the Queen during this week. Their Majesties began an interesting round of engagements on Monday by visiting the London docks and inspecting the wine, tobacco, feather and other warehouses, following up the same night by dining with the Archbishop of Canterbury and Mrs. Davidson at Lambeth Palace, there meeting the Bishop of Yukon and his wife. On Tuesday, His Majesty held the second levee of the season at St. James' Palace while the Queen attended a matinee at the Palace Theatre in aid of the movement to assist the Schools for Mothers existing in various parts of the Metropolis. Friday night will be given up to the King's dinner to members of the Ministry, the Opposition leaders, who were entertained at Buckingham Palace on Friday last, being simultaneously "dined" by the speaker. On the last day of the week Their Majesties will be present at a concert at the Albert Hall in aid of the funds of the Railway Benevolent Institution. In another month, after several town engagements, including two further Courts, the King and Queen will begin their first country tour of the year, proceeding by way of Chester to visit the Earl and Countess of Derby at Knowsley for the

cellent as constitutional rulers. King Albert, of course, is not a son of his late Majesty of notorious memory, but his nephew, like King George, he lost an elder brother, Prince Baldwin, of Flanders, who should have succeeded to the throne, and it is said that warned by the various rather scandalous upheavals in his family circle, he aimed above all things at domestic stability, and he has certainly found it. The King and Queen are the real leaders of Brussels society, a society which is still run on the old lines, recognizing only the noble families who are born into the Court circle, and ignoring all the new and vital elements which have brought wealth and reputation to the country. The Court, however, has a charm which more comprehensive ones have not. The young girls making their entry into society at the beginning of the winter season make their curtsies to the King and Queen as the latter pass through the ball-room of the Palace, and the Queen stops a minute to speak to them, and in this homely way the Court presentation is made. The little sons of the union are being taught the two languages of the country, French and Flemish.

THE NAVAL MANOEUVRES.

Whilst there are to be no naval manoeuvres on a large scale this year, the fleets will be given a greater amount of exercising as their complete units. This change of plans, there is good ground for stating, does not result from a desire to effect economy, but in order that the admirals in command of the respective fleets may have an opportunity to command their forces under something approaching war conditions. That some saving will be effected is, however, certain though it is understood that a greater allowance of ammunition, especially for the heavier guns, will be provided this year. There is to be another review of the ships in home waters by the King, and a general feeling is manifested in naval circles that if this takes place during the Cowes week the interruption to the training of the fleet would be reduced to a minimum, since by that time the greater part of the exercises will have been completed.

NO LIMIT FOR LINERS.

One would imagine by some of the merchant ships that have of late been put into service, and those now in course of construction, that the limit in size has by no means been reached. It is well known that in shipping circles, but for the inadequate accommodation at many of the leading ports, both in this country and elsewhere, the 1,000-foot liner would be running by now. As it is, the Hamburg-America Vaterland, of 935 feet, which will be completed in April, is the longest steamer so far built, while her 58,000 tons also make her the longest afloat. Next in size is her sister ship, the Imperator, of 52,171 tons, and a length of 920½ feet over all. Though much secrecy has been maintained respecting the dimensions of the White Star Liner, Britannic,

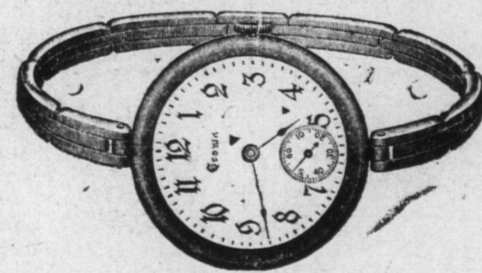

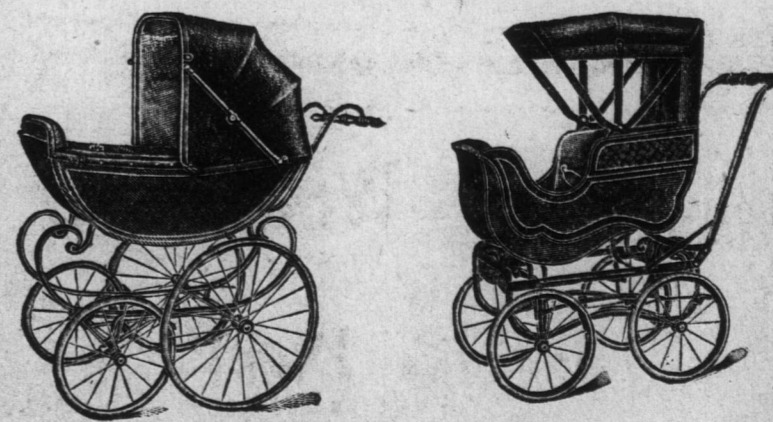

Hospital Enquiry.

Correspondence Between the Colonial Secretary and the Medical Supt. of the General Hospital.

In the House of Assembly, yesterday, the Hon. John R. Bennett, Colonial Secretary, tabled the correspondence between himself and Dr. Keegan, on the matter of the representation of Mr. W. F. Coaker, member for Bonavista, that milk, vegetables and meat were being taken from the institution and used in Dr. Keegan's house. Dr. Keegan admits that the statement is true, but he claims them as legitimate emoluments which the Government does not admit the claim as well founded, and has directed him to refrain from receiving them from the Hospital. The following is the correspondence:

COLONIAL SECRETARY TO DR. KEEGAN. Department of Col. Secy. St. John's, Nfld., Feb. 4, 1914. Dear Sir,— In the course of the debate in the House of Assembly on Monday, February 2nd, Mr. Coaker, M.P., A. C. one of the representatives for the District of Bonavista, made the statement that he had been informed by an anonymous correspondent that defalcations were taking place in the General Hospital, and that milk, vegetables and meat were being taken from the institution and used in Dr. Keegan's house, which were charged to the General Hospital account. The Prime Minister, who was present in the House, immediately drew the attention of the House to the seriousness of the charge, and asked Mr. Coaker to be good enough to put it in writing in order that Dr. Keegan might have an opportunity of answering the same. The Prime Minister also stated that he was not aware that there was anything to justify the same. Mr. Coaker replied by saying that he was prepared to give the information in writing, and later in the evening handed the Prime Minister a letter, copy of which I now enclose.

Before bringing this matter before Council, I would be thankful if you would let me have any reply which you may choose to make in relation to the same. Yours faithfully, (Signed) J. R. BENNETT, Colonial Secretary.

DR. L. E. KEEGAN, Medical Superintendent, General Hospital, St. John's, Nfld., Feb. 6th, 1914.

Dear Sir,— In answer to your communication of February 4th, I beg to state that Mr. Coaker's statement re the supply of milk, vegetables and meat to me from the General Hospital, is perfectly correct. I considered that these things came to me as legitimate emoluments, and I claim them as such. When I gave up a large and lucrative practice, to undertake the Herculean task of re-organizing the General Hospital, I believed that my salary would either be increased or supplemented sufficiently to enable me and my family to live in the same degree of comfort as had been made possible by the practice of my profession.

I based my emoluments on the knowledge I possessed of a similar position at the Lunatic Asylum, where as Superintendent (at a time when living was much cheaper than now) I was supplied by the Government with a horse, vehicle, and their upkeep, as well as a cow. I also had as an emolument vegetables of every description, as well as fruit, and raised on the farm, others supplied me from the institution. As to the legitimacy of these particular items in my present position, I submit there can be no doubt and may further add that in other countries where a medical man of experience and standing gives up his freedom and all chances of private practice to become a Resident at an institution, he is granted many other emoluments, such as furniture, bed and table linen, etc., unnecessary to enumerate.

When I was taking office, I represented to one of the Executive members of the Board, Hon. Mr. Gibbs, that I ought to get my meat supplied in lieu of the emoluments I enjoyed at the Asylum. He agreed and made all arrangements in connection with this item. I never had the slightest desire to conceal this fact.

Valuable emoluments which my predecessor enjoyed in the shape of fees, (to give one instance, in the case of attendance on miners from Bell Island) were immediately cut off, by order of the Government, when I took charge, this making a very substantial reduction in my salary.

It will be remembered in order to allow Dr. Shea to go abroad, my appointment was hurriedly made, and I had to take up residence at a day's notice in the middle of December, without winding up my business, collecting my bills or fulfilling my professional engagements, sustaining thereby a severe pecuniary loss.

This hurry accounts for the fact that my emoluments were not defined in a more formal manner, and when once I had assumed office, the rush of work, professional and executive day and night was so tremendous that I put the matter aside with the intention in my own mind, that when I brought the Institution to the state of perfection at which I aimed, and which I felt confident of being able to accomplish, I would ask at the hands of the Government and the public, a salary commensurate with the work I had performed.

This state of perfection I had hoped to arrive at in a period of three years, and would have done so but for my illness which upset all my calculations.

I am now at my work again, and am perfectly willing that that work should be investigated by the Government or the public, and that my salary and emoluments should be arranged on a proper basis.

REPLY FROM DR. KEEGAN. Colonial Secretary, General Hospital, St. John's, Nfld., March 6, 1914.

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of March 2nd in reply to mine of Feb. 6th, in which you inform me that you had placed my letter before Council, and that the Council decided that the contentions set forth in it were not sufficient justification for my continuing to receive meat, vegetables and milk as part of the emoluments of my position as Superintendent of the General Hospital.

You furthermore state in your communication that I made no formal claim on the Government for the perquisites.

If I did not do so it was for the reason that I believed in all good faith that the articles were as much my right as the fuel and light, for which I made no formal claim, and which were never specifically allowed me till the last few weeks.

When I assumed office I made no inquiries within or without the Hospital as to what my predecessor had received. Possibly I ought to have done so, but I had no doubt in my mind as to the position carrying with it emoluments at least equal in value to those I had enjoyed as Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum, where emoluments being a substantial increase to a salary, which, without them, would not be sufficient to induce any man in good practice, and detached from outside work, to accept it.

As proof that at least some of this was, to my mind, neither an inquiry enjoyed by my predecessor, nor understood that amongst other items that entered into his claim for pension, was an amount for vegetables.

As to the matter of my supply, this was, to my mind, neither an informal nor temporary arrangement. The Hon. Mr. Gibbs, one of the Executive members of the Board of Works, agreed to this item, and made all the arrangements in connection therewith with the then contractor of the Institution, in the manner that Hon. gentleman did all the business in connection with my horse, carriage man, etc., and I was quite satisfied without asking for any further official confirmation, although I now see and agree with you that it would have been much wiser for me to have had these things established on a more formal basis.

While recognizing the right of the Government to nullify any or all of these arrangements, and the duty incumbent on me as a civil servant to accept their ruling, I must respectfully urge on their consideration the fact that the discontinuance of these emoluments, which I honestly consider my right, and of which I would never have availed myself had I not done so, means a considerable diminution in my income, and in view of the increased cost of living and the daily increasing work and responsibility of my position, I respectfully request at the hands of the Government, a further consideration of my claims for these emoluments or an equivalent to them. Photographing Moving Bullets. Moving pictures have unlimited possibilities, apparently, for the study of rapidly-moving objects. An apparatus capable of making pictures at the rate of 100,000 a second has been made. With it seventy-two pictures of a revolver bullet were taken while moving 10 in. Pictures of a bullet passing through a stick of wood showed a curious condition. The bullet passed completely through the stick, and was well on its way beyond before the wood gave any sign of distress. Then some tiny splinters started out, following the bullet, the stick began to split, and after the bullet had proceeded some distance the stick suddenly fell to pieces.

No camera shutters are fast enough to take pictures at anything like this speed, so no shutter was used. Instead a series of electric sparks was flashed, the sparks following one another at the rate of 100,000 a second, each spark making a picture. The film was mounted on a wheel about 1 ft. in circumference, and the wheel was revolved at the rate of 9,000 revolutions a minute. When all was ready the bullet was shot, the spark flashed, and the wheel revolved; the actual exposure being limited to a fraction of a second, so as not to pile up pictures one over the other.

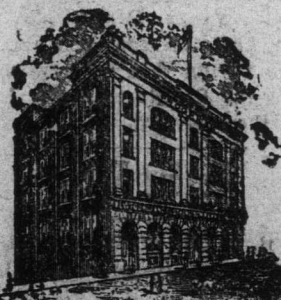

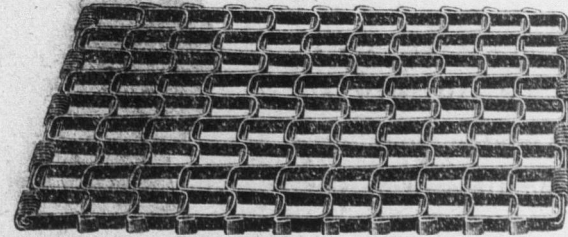
