

The daring of the British airmen who raided the Zeppelin factory at Friedrichshafen, making a continuous journey of 250 miles over hostile territory, has received rich commendation from the French authorities. General Smith-Dorrien says: "Tell our women that all these great battles have, day after day, witnessed countless feats of heroism and brave fighting. Large numbers will be given Victoria Crosses and Distinguished Conduct Medals, but many more have earned them, for it has been impossible to bring every case to notice." The story of the "L" battery is one of the most glorious of these incidents. Just before 5 in the morning of Sept. 1st, while the horses were being watered in sections, a German battery of ten guns and two maxims galloped to a crest and opened a murderous fire at point blank

the war, it might mean peace for a thousand years. He said he believed England was fighting America's fight as well as her own, and for that reason should get unstinted sympathy rom America. The Bishop said:

"I am speaking to you both as a Christian and an Englishman. This is a great day of God, and among the things to be decided is the fate of the British Empire, which also involves the future of America. When I was land is really fighting America's bat-

"As an Englishman I would rather die than see England a German Province, and as a Christian I would rather die than see the Germans new God, might is right, and must prevail." The Bishop said that England had her faults, but that she had tried to carry out the ideas of the New Testament, such as abiding by her treaties and protecting weaker nations.

He added: "Our word is our bond. So enormous is the stake in this war that we must fight on with iron sacrifice. It is a crisis of the world's history. To lose would be to lose all that is worth having in the world. To win may mean peace for a thousand years. We must show fortitude, as when such a defeat as that in the

Pacific faces us." It is the opinion of the Bishop that the only hatred felt in England for Germany was for the spirit of militarism, the "Kaiser spirit," whereas, he pointed out, Germany fiercely hated the English nation. He went on:

"We are a nation of gentlemen. who show chivalry to women and giveness. We must be above hate. We must fight our battle with majesty, which is with bigness of soul, and when the gospel of 'might is right' is crushed, we may be better friends with the poorer classes of Germans than ever before."

The Bishop was dressed in khaki. He has taken a conspicuous part in the recruiting work, and an appeal he made in two territorial camps resulted in six battalions volunteering for foreign service. For this he received the thanks of the Commander-in-Chief. The Bishop said he was to address a recruiting meeting to-day, and remarked, "I hope to obtain 1,000

The interview took place in the Bishop's London house in St. James' Square. One conspicuous photograph in the drawing room is that of ex-President Taft. The Bishop spoke warmly of both Mr. Taft and President. Wilson.

Bayonets Win Le Quesnoy.

FRENCH SERGEANT DESCRIBES THE CAPTURE OF AN IMPORT-ANT POSITION.

Paris, Nov. 15.—The Matin prints a letter from a former contributor, now a Sergeant of Infantry, who gives details of the capture of the important strategic position of Le Quesnoy-en-Santerre, last week. It enables the reader to form a picture of the long drawn-out burrowing war between the two strongly intrenched armies

from Arras to Verdun. "We set out at dawn," says the writer, "my company in the second line, supported by artillery fire. The ground leading to the Quesnoy heights is an open plain, across which we advanced by short rushes under heavy fire. Toward evening we were barely 200 yards from a wood occupied by the Germans, but were unable to advance further owing to the intensity of the cannonade. Without pausing for food or rest, we started intrenching ourselves, and by morning reached a point only fifty yards

from the wood. "About 7 o'clock our artillery resumed operations, while reinforcements managed to crawl to our trenches. At 8, the bugles sounded the charge, and, despite the enemy's quick-firers, we rushed the wood, driving out the Germans with the bayonets. Then we easily seized Le Quesnoy Village by a similar rush, and took two cannon and three quick-

"Still we had no rest, and all began mmediately to intrench against a good reason, for toward nightfall the reinforced enemy tried to regain the osition. Thanks to our unremitting work in the trenches, they were unable to prevail, and were forced to retire with severe loss."

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
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
