He is now eighty years of age hale and hearty. When he was asked why he worked so hard and lived like a workman, he replied that it was not a matter of money at all.



Barry is without a doubt one of the most finished scullers that ever sat a best-boat, his body form and sliding work being quite first class. On Saturday he outpaced a man who is some eight years his junior,

who is nearly 2st. heavier. Barry was born in London in 1882. he was apprenticed as a watchman on the Thames, and won Doggett's Coat and Badge in 1903. His success in that race and in handicaps, attracted the notice of Mr. H. T. Blackstaffe and other sportsmen, and eventually he was matched to meet the veteran George Towns, of N. S. W., in a race for the championship of England, which Towns had won since 1899. Barry won easily and in 1911 he defended the title successfully in matches against the late William Albany, a River Lea sculler, and W. H. Fogwell, of Aus-

In the meantime he had sculled his first match for the championship of the world in 1910, when he met Richard Arnst, of New Zealand, at the regatta on the Zambesi River arranged by a number of sportsmen in Rhodesia. After a very hard race Arnst won. Barry challenged the big New Zealander in 1912, and eventually the latter agreed to come to England, and the match was sculled or July 29, 1912. Another fine struggle was witnessed, but Barry lasted bet ter than his rival, and wore the latter down before the finish. It was notable occasion, for no Englishman had held the championship since the defeat of J. H. Sadler by Edward Trickett of N. S. W., in 1875. Be fore the war Barry defended his title successfully in three matches, beating Edward Durnan, of Canada, in the autumn of 1912: Harry Pearce, of Australia, in 1913; and James Paddon, of Australia, in 1914. On the Saturday Barry won his fifth world's championship match, a record equalled by Robert Chambers, (Tyne). Edward Hanlan (Canada). James Stanbury (N. S. W.), and Richard Arnst (New Zealand), and beaten only by William Beach (N.S.W.), who won seven consecutive matches between 1884 and 1887, and then re



#### The Work of the Grenfell Hospital.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,-I am venturing to send you for the information of the public a copy of the work of this Association for the past year, which has just arrived. It may be that you will not care to publish the whole thing, but I want you especially to allow me to draw your attention and that of the public to the hospital work. The number of patients treated has increased steadily every year, and already this year by the end of August more patients had been treated both in and outside of the hospital than any previous year. The actual cost of St. Anthony Hospital alone rose to nearly \$29,000 last year, though that only allowed \$2.42 per day for hospital care. The staff at the present moment includes: Dr. Charles Curtis, M.A., Harvard, Surgeon-in-Chief; Dr. Hayden, College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York, House Officer; Mr. Washburn and Mr. Richards, Harvard, Laboratory and bedside assistants; Dr. C. Mullineaux, Dental Surgeon, Dr. Joseph A. Andrews, California, Eye Specialist; Miss Hosmer, X-Ray expert with the General Electric Co., New York.

I have done most of the orthopedic work while in residence. Eight trained nurses, with occasional assistants, form the nursing staff. There has been added to the hospital a new portable bedside X-Ray apparatus, large new fleurscope and a large house has been secured for additional tubercular patients, together with our big tent. Including the patients in the wards of the hospital itself, 70 to 80 patients have been treated at one time. ### Where Pianos Are Public Property

The situation with regard to pianos in Bolshevik Russia is described in an enlighting article in the Frenci paper Musique et Instruments, which reaches this country in the form of 4 translation in the London Musical Opinion. The article, written by M L. Abbiatt, at one time professor of violincello at the Imperial Conserva torie in Petrograd and just returned to France, constitutes one of the rare authentic reports on matters musical in the dark and distraught land.

"All the pianos in the town are

registered," writes M. Abbiatt. "The are public property. Naturally the piano is the instrument mostly in use for the innumerable workmen's cluba barracks, schools, etc., must be provided with them. Nobody has the right to sell them or to move them. at least not without special permission from the commissary. Pianos necessary to the needs of the people are requisitioned, for with the nationalization of the factories and warehouses new supplies are no long. er available. In addition, all pianos left in homes abandoned by their owners are seized, and the number in considerable. However, I know of no case where the piano of a private person has been taken. It goes with. out saying that no repairing or tuning is done, and consequently all pianos are in a deplorable condition.

In the matter of stringed instruments, according to this observer, the situation is even worse. Lack of repairs is fatal to such instruments, yet luthiers who 'remain at work make such exorbitant charges that people find it better to discard their broken violins and guitars, in the expectation of buying better ones from those formerly rich but now compelled to sell at starvation

#### How Lincoln Dressed.

Mr. T. P. O'Connor has written an interesting study of Abraham Lincoln's personality. He gives a quain picture of the great man in his early

His hat was brown, faded, and the nap usually worn or rubbed off. He wore a short cloak, and sometimes a shawl. His coat and vest hung loosely on his gaunt frame, and his trousers were invariably too short. On circuit he carried in one hand a faded green umbrella, with "A. Lincoln" in large white cotton or muslin letters sewed on the inside. The knob was gone from the handle, and when closed a piece of cord was usually tied round it in the middle, to keep it from flying open. In the other hand he carried a literal carpet-bag, in which were stored the few papers to be used in court, and underclothing enough to last until his return to Springfield.

He slept in a long, coarse, yellow flannel shirt, which reached half-way between his knees and ankles. It was probably not made to fit his bony figure as completely as Beau Brumfigure as completely as Beau Brum-mel's shirt, and hence we can appreciate the sensation of a young lawyer who, on seeing him thus arrayed for the first time, observed afterwards that "he was the ungodliest figure I ever saw."

One other little touch to complete the picture; it is the story of Lincoln's hat. The hat of Lincoln-a silk plug-was an extraordinary receptacle. It was his desk and his memorandum book. In it he carried his bank books and the bulk of his letters. Whenever in his reading he wished to preserve an idea he jotted it down on an envelope or stray piece of paper, and placed it inside the lining. Afterwards, when the memorandum was needed, there was only one place to look for it.

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
