On Thursday last, Mr. James Moore, farmer, con. C. Minto, Harriston, met with a sad and severe accident, which will maim him for the remainder of his lifetime, and render him incapable of performing many of the duties to which he has hitherto been accustomed. He was drilling out a charge of powder from a stone which he had previously unsuccessfully tried to blast, when the powder ignited, it is supposed by a spark of fire from the drill or chisel, and his left hand was nearly all blown off by the discharge which followed. It was found necessary to amputate the hand about six inches above the wrist, an operation which was neatly and expeditiously performed by Doctor Cowan, of this village. Mr. Moore had succeeded in getting part of the charge dislodged, or it might have resulted far more seriously than it did. Several other individuals were in close proximity, and it is said that two or three boys were sitting on the stone at the time of the accident; but while the remaining portion of the charge had strength sufficient to break the stone into three pieces it lacked the power sufficient to throw the detached portions out of place, and no one else was injured. It may be stated that previous to the drilling process having been commenced, water was poured into the bore, but it does not seem to have penetrated far enough to damp the powder.

On the same day, Mr. Robt. Bennett, of this village, while engaged in framing, ran a carpenter's adze into one of his knees, inflicting a very severe wound, and laying him aside for a while from work. Dr. Cowan attended to all these cases, and the patients, as yet, are doing well.

Canada Presbyterian Church Synod.
On Monday afternoon the report of the Committee on Home Missions was read. Connected with the Committee's operations there are ?? mission fields, with 170 preaching stations and 64 supplemented congregations. These represent 6,222 families, 7,177 communicants, and an average attendance of 19,613—almost 20,000. These mission stations contributed for the support of gospel ordinances among themselves \$27,828, and received in aid \$11,752. That is, the amount raised locally is two and one-third times as great as the aid received. As compared with last year, we find the number of mission fields is the same, but we have an increase of 20 stations and 8 congregations, with 1,713 families, 1,022 adult members, and 4,522 of average attendance. \$7,435 have been paid to supplemented congregations, being an increase of \$2,145 on last year, while mission stations have received only \$24 more than last year, notwithstanding an increase in the rate of grants, and have received supply for only 1,835 Sabbaths, as against 2,096 last year. The total income for the year including a balance of \$2,167 from last year is \$12,366. The expenditure for the year is \$10,929, leaving on hand a balance of \$1,436.

The total amount of collections and donations received by the General Agent of the Church for the year ending 30th of April, 1869 from all sources is \$30,-411.07.

LONDON, June 15.—The Times in an article on last night's debate in the House of Lords says the spirit of Lord Stratford DeRedcliffe's and the Archbishop of Canterbury's speeches leave no doubt as to the result of the Bill. While they dislike it and are unable to persuade themselves that it will have a beneficial effect, they advise the House to give its assent. The practical good sense and patriotism of the speeches contrast strongly with the

The *Telegraph* says that after the evening's debate on the Irish Church Bill the issue cannot be doubted.

The *Star* thinks that since the speech of the Archbishop of Canterbury everything appears immediately favourable to the passage of the Bill.

Mr. Bright has written a letter to a meeting in Birmingham, in which he says if the House of Lords delay the passage of the Irish Church Bill, they will stimulate the discussion of subjects which might slumber for years. The value of a Constitution, which gives a majority in one House in favour of, and in the other House against a given policy, may be questioned. Why is it that when Crown and Commons are in harmony with the nation, the Lords are in direct opposition? As long as the House of Lords act in harmony with the country, they may go on for a long time, 'but when they thwart its course they may meet with unpleasant accidents. Mr. Bright concludes with the hope that the counsel of a few good and wise men in the House may prevail.

The *Itimes* today has another article on the *Alabama* Claims. It says that it cannot be denied that the work of building the *Alabama* was done knowingly by British builders in a British port. 

Duliness is still the report both here and elsewhere. There is but little activity in the city markets, although the receipts appear to be larger than they were at this time last year. Toronto pays 95c, for fall and 92c, for spring wheat; Montreal is from 5c. to 8c. higher. The supply of grain on the Guelph market is very light. This foreinon not more than half-a-dozen loads of wheat were offered. The price has been steady during the last two or three days, and stands same as the time of our last weekly report. Oats, peas and barley are unchanged, perhaps for the simple reason that there is scarcely any coming in. What the figures would be if there was a fair supply of these grains cannot be conjectured. Hay is not so high as it was last week, probably in consequence of the inferiority of the quality offered; the demand, however, is active. Butter and ergs are steady, the tendency, if there is any, being downwards for the first mentioned article, although it is somewhat scarce. Won is at present the chief staple of the market. Since the commencement of the season, about two weeks ago, some 80,000 lbs. have been brought in. One day saw 16,000 lbs. changed hands. 
