

The agreement of sale contained a clause that defendants would not engage in the canning business for a period of ten years within twenty miles of tidal waters in the province of British Columbia. The plaintiffs claim that defendants are shareholders in the Northern Cannery Company, which, it is conteuded, is a breach of the convenience.
