The Best up to \$6,000,000--An Analysis of the Half Yearly Statement. MONTREAL, April 25--The bank of Montreal to-day declared a dividend of 5 per cent, added \$200,000, and divided it up to \$6,000,000, and carried forward \$275,000 to contingent fund.

On the announcement of these figures the stock fell 1 per cent. According to the last annual statement of May 31, 1883, the bank had a net profit of \$750,000, and a contingent account of \$322,194, showing that the net earnings for the year after interest on loans and discounts were \$922,668.
