USEFUL HINTS.

To build a chimney that will draw forever and not fill up with soot, says the Manufacturer and Builder, you must build it large enough-16 inches square; use good brick and clay instead of lime up to the comb; plaster it inside with clay mixed with salt; for chimney tops use the very best of brick, wet them and lay them in cement mortar. The chimney should not be built tight to beams and rafters; there is where the cracks in your chimneys come, and where most of the fires originate, as the chimney sometimes gets red hot. A chimney built from the cellar up, is better and less dangerous than one hung on the wall. Do not get your stove-pipe hole too close to the ceiling, but about 18

An excellent imitation of antique bronze has been lately introduced in some of the art work of that class. Repeated applications to copper or brass of alternate washes of dilute autic acid, and exposed to the fumes of ammonia, it is well known, result in giving to the metal the color of antique green bronze; but a more rapid method of obtaining this appearance has long been desired. It is now found that this result may be obtained by immersing the articles in a solution of one part perchloride of iron in two parts of water, the length of the immersion regulating the tone. The same result may also be obtained by boiling the article in a strong solution of nitrate of copper; dipping the articles to be colored in a solution of two ounces of nitrate of iron and the same quantity of hyposulphite of soda in a half pint of water has the same effect. The article is then dried and burnished.

COLLINGWOOD, ONT .- It is said the Dominion Government will short'y send out survey parties to obtain data regarding the cost of deepening Collingwood harbor and removing the obstructions in the ship channel between Lake St. Clair and Lake Huron.

CLAREMONT, ONT .- Tenders for the construction of three iron bridges in the township of Pickering will be received by Mr. George Gerrow, Commissioner, Clarement, Ont., until the 19th inst., at ncon. Measurements, plans, and specifications, are to be prepared by the tenderers.

SARNIA, ONT .- At a pub ic meeting held to consider the advisability of erecting a public hospital, a committee was appointed to solicit subscriptions and obtain general information of the exp-uses and other details with reference to the working of hospitals in different cities and towns.

OTTAWA, ONT .-- The city council will submit to a vote of the ratepayers the proposal of a Toronto syndicate to construct and operate an electric street milway.-It is proposed to extend the Canadian Pacific Railway three miles down the river to the lumber piling grounds.-The proposed new edifice for the congregation of Grace Church will be erected on the corner of Elgin and Somerset street in stone. It will have entrance lobby across the front and corner tower and porch; nave 77 x 46 feet; transepts, 20' x 8' capable of being extended; chancel, 26' 6 in. x 22' 6 in. Choir room with organ loft over, opening into nave and chancel by arches; minister's vestry with vault; two furnace rooms in basement. The tower is 90 feet high. Design Gothic, It is proposed to spend \$12,000 at present; a school and parsonage will be built hereafter. Mr. H. James, formerly of Toronto, has been employed as the architect. Plans will be ready in a few days for tendering on.

MONTREAL, QUE.-The council has been asked to grant a site on the mountain for a new observatory,-The promoters of the elevated railway propose that it shall start at Lachive, run, via the upper Lachine road, to St. Henri, into St. James street, thence along St. James to Little Craig, along Craig either to Notre Dame at the jail or leave Craig at the East End and run over the houses in order to tap St. Catherine street, continuing along that as extended, into Maisonneuve.-The Board of Trade has appointed the following Committee to advertise for plans for the new building, arrange finances, etc.: Messrs, R. Archer, chairman; H. Montagu Allan, J. A. Cantlie, E. B. Greenshields, C. P. Hunt, E. Judge and R. Reford.—The estate F. X. Beaudry is about to erect a large building for stores and offices at the corner of St. Lawrence and St. Catherine streets. Messrs, Roy & Gauthier are the architects.-At a meeting of the congregation of Erskine Church it was decided to hold the land comprising the proposed site for a new church for the period of three months, when a full congregational meeting will be held to decide whether or not the enterprise shall be entered upon.

TORONTO, ONT .- A sufficiently signed petition has been sent to the Works Committee for the construction of a granolithic sidewalk 24 ft. wide, on the east side of Spadma Avenue, immediately north of Queen st.-The municipality of North Toronto intends to construct a water works system capable of supplying the needs of the town. It is proposed to construct a reservoir on the high lands near the town and pump the supply of water from a creek which has its source at springs east of Yonge st .- Plans have been completed by the architects of the Militia Department, Ottawa, for the proposed new drill shed. - A sub-committee of the Public School Board has been instructed to select a site for a new school in St. Mark's ward.-Mr. B. B. Osler, Q. C., has given notice that on Sept. 9 next he will in convocation move a resolution that the new law school building should be of a moderately ornamental character, with this accomodation. One hall with seats for 200, two lecture-rooms with seats for 100 each, a library, a students' reading room, cloak rooms, closets, four lecturers' rooms, principal's room and ante-room, two examiners' rooms. The heating to be independent of Osgoode Hall. The architect to submit plans next term, and the expenditure on building to be about \$50,000 .- I'he completion of the Garrison Creek sewer from College to Bloor street, which has been delayed for three years owing to difficulty about the right of way, will probably soon be proceeded with.—The City Engineer recommends a new sewer on Davenport road at an estimated cost of \$10,500; a stone flag sidewalk on Yonge street between Queen and College streets at an estimated cost of \$15,070; the widening by six feet of the granolithic sidewalk on the west side of Spadina ave., between Nassau and Oxford streets; the construction by day labor of a scoria pavement in the King St. subway and the space between the street car tracks 3,000 feet easterly from Dufferm street at an estimated cost of \$48,982, the remainder of the roadway and the slopes of the subway to be paved with tamarack blocks on a concrete foundation at an estimated cost of \$8.880; and a stone flag sidewalk to be laid on both sides of the subway.—The following building permits have been issued: J. K. Kerr. alterations to Montreal House, King St. west, cost \$2,800; Sig. Francisca

Glionna, 2-storey and attic bk, dwelling, 118 Edward St., cost \$3,000; A. Willis, pair 2-storey and attic bk. dwellings, west side Jarvis St., south of Carleton St., cost \$8,000. - A sub-committee has been appointed by the city council to select a site for a new fire hall to replace the ore on Brock Ave. A new iron fence is to replace the wooden one surrounding the Normal School grounds, and a new conservatory is to be built. - A sub-committee of the city council appointed to consider the advisability of erecting a garhage cremitory, has reported in favor of the immediate construction of a crematory capable of consuming one-third of the garbage.

WIRE ROPE.

A wire rope manufacturing company gives the following hints: There are two kinds of wire rope manufactured. Ropes with used as hoisting ropes. Those with twelve or seven wires to the strand are more pliable, and are generally used as hoisting ropes. Those with twelve or seven wires to the strand are stiffer and best adapted to guys, ferries, rigging and transmission purposes. Wire ropes are made of six strands, transmission purposes. Wire ropes are made of six strands, laid upon a centre of hemp or wire, the former being more pliable, and wearing better over small pulleys and drums.

Wire rope is as pliable as new hemp rope of the same strength.

The greater the diameter of sheaves, pulleys and drums, the

longer the rope will last.

For safe working load allow one-fifth to one-seventh of ulti-mate strength, according to speed and vibration. Speed increases the wear.

Wire rope must not be coiled or uncoiled like hemp rope. When not on a reel, roll upon the ground like a wheel, to prevent kinking.

To preserve wire rope, cover it thoroughly with raw linseed oil, mixed with vegetable tar, boil well, and saturate the rope with the mixture hot.

Galvanized wire rope should never be used for running rope. One day's use will wear off the coating of zinc, and the rope will soon begin to rust.

Too much care cannot be taken with the pulleys, sheaves and drums over which ropes are run. The grooves should be lined with well-seasoned blocks of hardwood set on end, rubber, leather, or some soft metal. Thus the life of the rope will be greatly lengthened, and greater adhesion secured than when the rope is operated over smooth and hard surfaces.

Iron ropes, operated under proper conditions, will give perfect satisfaction when the work to be done is not too heavy. Steel ropes should be substituted for iron when lightness is required, or when a greater strength becomes necessary. The object in substituting steel for iron is to decrease the wear rather than reduce the size of the rope. In ordering, the purpose for which the rope is to be used should be stated, also what kind of centre is desired, whether hemp or wire, and advice will be given.
