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PROGRAMME OF EXHIBITION.

Monday, October 1. All exhibits, except live stock, to be in their places by noon. Persons entitled to free admission to apply at the Secretary-Treasurer's office for tickets and badges

Tuesday, October 2. Judges for all classes other than live stock and bands to report at the Secretary-Treasurer's office at 11 a.m. to commence their duties. All live stock to be on the grounds not later than 11 a.m. The exhibition will be formally opened at 1 o'clock by the President of the Board of Agriculture, in the presence of the Lieutenant-Governor, the members of the Provincial Government, and other distinguished guests. The main building will be closed till the judges complete their awards.

Wednesday, October 3. Grounds and all buildings will be fully open to the public. Judges on live stock will report at the Secretary-Treasurer's office at 11 a.m. to commence their duties. The live stock will be paraded in the ring while being judged. The competition for band prizes will take place during the afternoon.

Thursday, October 4. Grounds, &c. open as on Wednesday. Grand parade of prize animals at 2 p.m. Band competition will be continued during the afternoon.

Friday, October 5. School children, accompanied by their teachers will be admitted free up to noon. Prize live stock will be again paraded at 2 p.m. Exhibitors will be allowed to commence the removal of their live stock after 4 p.m. Banquet of officials, members of the Board and others in the evening.

Saturday, October 6. The gates will be opened at daylight to facilitate the removal of exhibits. At 10 a.m. an auction will be held for the sale of exhibits, for which entries must be made the previous day at the Secretary-Treasurer's office. Exhibitors will be required to remove all their property during the day. The Secretary-Treasurer's temporary branch office will be closed at noon, and the staff removed to the head office at Winnipeg.

REGULATIONS.

1. Persons desiring to correspond with the Secretary-Treasurer will address their communications to Acton Burrows, Winnipeg. The offices of the Board are at the corner of Broadway and Kennedy streets, Winnipeg, where the Secretary-Treasurer can be seen daily on business connected with the exhibition, between the hours of 11 a. m. and 1 p. m. The offices of the Board in Winnipeg will be closed from the evening of Wednesday, September 26, until October 8, during which time the Secretary-Treasurer and his staff will be found in attendance at the temporary offices on the exhibition grounds at Portage la Prairie.

2. Entries must be in the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer, Acton Burrows, Winnipeg, not later than September 19. They should be mailed at least a week previous to that date, and as much earlier as possible. Considerable time is necessarily occupied in the examination of entry papers, and it is frequently necessary to correspond with the senders for the correction of errors and omissions. The above limit of date for the reception of entries will therefore be rigidly adhered to. In nearly every case it is as easy for exhibitors to make their entries two months before an exhibition, as two weeks before, and promptness in this respect will materially assist the Secretary-Treasurer in his work and enable him to mail admission and entry tickets to the exhibitors, thus preventing the necessity of their obtaining them on the opening of the show, when, owing to the pressure of work in the office, they may be delayed.

3. Entries must be made on the printed forms provided for the purpose, one of which is enclosed in this list. Additional copies of the prize list or entry papers will be mailed to any address on application to the Secretary-Treasurer, or they can be obtained from the Secretary-Treasurers of any of the electoral division agricultural societies. Copies of the prize list can be seen on application to any postmaster.

4. One dollar entry fee must accompany each entry paper sent by any person other than members of the Board, and regularly recognised crop correspondents of the Department, otherwise the entry will not be recorded in the books. The envelope enclosing the entry paper and fee should in all cases be registered to ensure its safe delivery.

5. Only one entry will be allowed to an exhibitor in one section of any class other than live stock. No animal or article will be allowed to compete in more than one section of a class, except herds of cattle and pens

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of sheep or sows, which may be shown separately and with young, and foals, which may be shown separately and with their dams, or animals competing for diplomas.

6. Every article must be entered under some one of the headings in the prize list, when possible; but if any article is of a distinct character from anything specified in the list, it may then be entered in the extra section of that class with which it most nearly corresponds. No article, however, will be allowed to be entered as an extra for want of sufficient quantity or number, or any other similar defect, when of the same kind or variety as anything named in the list; in such a case the article cannot be exhibited for competition.

7. On the receipt of entries a card will be prepared for each animal or article, specifying the class, section and number of entry, which card must remain attached to the animal or its pen or stall or to the article during the whole period of the exhibition. Where postal facilities permit these cards will be mailed to intending exhibitors. Those who do not thus receive them can obtain them at the Secretary-Treasurer's office on the exhibition grounds, on and after Thursday, September 27.

8. The grounds and buildings will be opened on Saturday, September 29. All exhibits other than live stock, etc., must be in the places allotted to them not later than noon on Monday, October 1. Live stock must be on the grounds not later than 11 a.m. on Tuesday, October 2. No exhibits of either articles or live stock shall be removed from the grounds until after 4 p.m. on Friday, October 5. The grounds and buildings will be opened at daylight on Saturday, October 6 to facilitate the removal of exhibits. Exhibitors acting in defiance of this rule will forfeit all prizes awarded them.

9. No exhibits, or sacks or other coverings containing them, will be admitted with name, mark or initials thereon.

10. Articles on exhibition shall not be handled except by the officers of the department to which they belong.

11. Each exhibitor, on being furnished with his entry tickets, will be given four small admission tickets, each of which will admit the holder once, and must be given up at the turnstile on passing into the grounds. If an exhibitor, having used them all, shall still desire admission, he shall pay in the same manner as the general public. The entry tickets upon animals or articles will admit once the persons taking them to the grounds for exhibition, along with the animals or articles, without the use of any other ticket. Afterwards such persons must be provided with proper admission tickets.

12. *Necessary attendants* upon stock and articles belonging to exhibitors will be furnished with admission tickets for each day of the exhibition, with their names written upon them, WHICH TICKETS WILL BE GOOD, TO THE PERSONS WHOSE NAMES THEY BEAR, AT THE EXHIBITION GATE ONLY, and not at the turnstiles. The Superintendent of each department will be the person to whom to apply for orders for such tickets, to be then furnished by the Secretary-Treasurer.

13. Complimentary tickets of admission or badges will be issued to the members of the Board of Agriculture, the judges, representatives of the press, and the authorised crop correspondents of the Department of Agriculture and Statistics. Any of these not having received their tickets prior to the opening of the exhibition, should apply at the Secretary-Treasurer's office on the exhibition grounds.

14. The price of admission to others than those enumerated in rule 14 will be 25 cents each time of entering through the gates during the exhibition. The admission will be by means of registering turnstiles, AND EACH PERSON WILL BE REQUIRED TO BE PROVIDED WITH THE PROPER CHANGE BEFORE ENTERING. Carriages and horsemen will not be admitted. All horses entered for exhibition purposes shall only be ridden or driven while being exhibited, and in the ring. School children, accompanied by their teachers, will be admitted free between 9 a.m. and noon on Friday, October 5.

15. In the classes of blood horses and pure bred cattle, full pedigrees, properly certified, must accompany the entry. No animals will be allowed to compete as pure bred unless they possess regular stud or herd book pedigrees, or satisfactory evidence be produced that they are directly descended from such stock.

16. Live stock must be the bona-fide property of the exhibitor.

17. The age of any animal shall be reckoned from the first day of January in the year of its birth.

18. No stallion shall be awarded a prize until it has been examined by the consulting veterinarian of the Board and certified by him as being free from disease.

19. Brood mares must be exhibited with their foal at foot, or must give evidence of having bred and raised a foal during the current year.

20. Bulls must have a ring in their nose or be otherwise properly secured to the satisfaction of the Live Stock Superintendent.

21. *In case any animal for which a first prize is awarded has been imported since January 1, 1883, the amount of the prize shall be in-*

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creased .35 per cent. Satisfactory proof of importation must be produced. In order to entitle the exhibitor to claim the additional premium, notice must be given of the importation when the entry is made.

22. In all cases where first prizes are awarded to thoroughbred horses or cattle, it is optional with the exhibitor to accept a silver medal of equal value with the cash prize, and in lieu thereof; and for thoroughbred sheep and pigs a bronze medal may similarly be substituted.

23. Arrangements will be made to supply forage and grain on the ground at reasonable rates.

24. Grain, roots, seeds, dairy produce and all other agricultural or horticultural products must be the property of the exhibitor, and produced on his farm or holding in Manitoba or N. W. T. during 1883; a description of the manner of culture or curing to be furnished the Secretary-Treasurer if required.

25. Articles which have been awarded prizes at any previous Provincial Exhibition, shall not be entered in competition for the prizes named in the prize list of this year, but ample space will be furnished them for exhibition.

26. Judges will be appointed by the Council of Agriculture previous to the exhibition, and will receive a circular informing them of the fact, and inviting them to act. Those for classes other than live stock will please report and present their circular of appointment at the Secretary-Treasurer's office, on the grounds, at 11 a.m., on Tuesday, October 2. Judges of live stock will please report there at 11 a.m. on Wednesday, October 3. The circular of appointment will admit judges on their first entrance to the grounds if they have not received a badge. They will then apply for badges at the Secretary-Treasurer's office. No person shall act as a judge in any class in which he may be an exhibitor. The Secretary-Treasurer will supply judges with books in which to enter their awards, and with tickets to attach to the prize exhibits. The first prize ticket will be red, second blue, third white, and highly commended green.

27. In the absence of competition in any section, or if the stock or articles exhibited be of an inferior quality, the judges are instructed to award only such premiums as they think the exhibit deserving of. They will exercise their discretion as to whether they will award any prize. The Council may award extra prizes to exhibits specially recommended by the judges.

28. No person will be allowed to interfere with the judges while in the discharge of their duties. Exhibitors so interfering will forfeit their right to any premiums to which they might be otherwise entitled.
29. Protests against judges' decisions must be filed in writing with the Secretary-Treasurer not later than 6 p. m. on Thursday, October 4.
30. Money prizes will be paid by cheques, which will be sent by mail within a month from the close of the exhibition. Persons whose addresses may be changed from that given on the entry paper should notify the Secretary-Treasurer.
31. Any infringement of the rules may be punished by withholding prize, expulsion from the grounds, or such other action as the Council may determine.
32. The management will take every possible precaution, under the circumstances, to insure the safety of articles sent to the exhibition, and should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, they will give all the assistance in their power towards the recovery of the same; but they will not make any payment for the value thereof, nor will they be responsible for damage resulting from fire.
33. On Saturday, October 6, at 10 a.m., there will be a public auction of live stock and other exhibits, on the grounds, seller to pay auctioneer's fees, the entry to be made at the Secretary-Treasurer's office not later than 4 p. m. on Friday, October 5.
34. The Council of the Board of Agriculture hereby prohibit all kinds of gambling, theatrical, circus or mountebank performances and also prohibit the huckstering or trafficking in fruits, goods, wares or merchandise on the Exhibition Grounds, and any person who violates this rule shall be liable to be reprimanded by the officers or constables of the Board and be subject to the penalty imposed under The Act respecting the Department of Agriculture, Statistics and Health.

TRANSPORTATION.

Arrangements have been made with the Canadian Pacific, Manitoba and Northwestern, and Manitoba Southwestern Colonization railways to convey visitors to the exhibition over their respective lines at greatly reduced rates of fare. Special passenger trains will be run on the Canadian Pacific and Manitoba and Northwestern roads. Animals and articles for exhibition will be conveyed at ordinary tariff rates, and will be carried back to the place of shipment free of freight if the ownership has not been changed.
