The raid on the Chinamen took place between 3 and 4 o'clock this afternoon, when Sgt. Major Prentice, with five constables, surrounded Lee Gue's grocery store.

It will be foolish for the friends of public ownership to think that all danger is past, just because the game of the electrical trust has been unmasked this once.

Supervised vacation playgrounds. From an article which appeared the other day in The Boston Weekly Transcript, it appears that the Children's Playground League of Rochester, N.Y., and a number of organizations allied for the purpose, are working for a system of supervised playgrounds, similar to that now being advocated for Boston by the Massachusetts Civic League, and its supporters.

Hushed-up resignation. The house of commons has declared that Charles Hyman, M. P., is still a member of parliament. It has adopted the report of the committee on privileges and elections, declaring that his resignation "is wholly inoperative and ineffective."

Before the canal scheme was mooted the overseas imports and exports of Manchester had to pass thru Liverpool, and the heavy tolls levied threatened to strangle her trade.

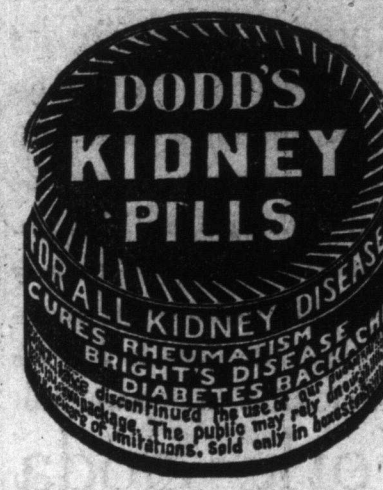

GERMANY AND AUSTRIA TO SIGN BRITISH PEACE PLAN

St. Petersburg, March 17.—Germany and Austria are concentrating their efforts against Great Britain's proposition to include a discussion of the limitation of armaments in the program for the approaching peace conference at The Hague.

Following the audience which Count Berchtold, the Austrian ambassador, had with Emperor Nicholas, Herr von Suenow, the German ambassador, was received by his majesty, and in a long audience made an energetic protest against the British position.

Diplomatic silence is preserved at both embassies and the foreign office regarding the result of these audiences, but it is understood both Germany and Austria recognize that the introduction of the question of armaments is unavoidable.

EIGHTEEN DROWN IN FLOOD AT FIRE

Terrified by Explosion, Tenants Leap From Windows Into Water While Rescuers Save Hundreds With Boats.

Wheeling, W. Va., March 17.—Eighteen persons are known to have lost their lives in the fire that occurred at the plant of the Warwick Pottery Co. in the flooded district yesterday.

Because of the water surrounding the burned district, it was impossible for the fire apparatus to reach the scene. The flames pressed into service all the boats that could be secured and carried the lines of hose to the burning buildings by this means.

They did heroic work, and not only fought the fire, but assisted in rescuing many persons.

All the police that could be spared were rushed to the scene to assist in the work of rescue. The crew of a boat that was moored across the river from the building manned a yawl and rescued about 100 persons.

The men were offered all kinds of rewards for the work they did, but they refused to accept them.

Screams for help from those in the buildings could be heard in places where thousands of persons, unable to lend any assistance, watched the flames.

Had the victims remained in their homes, some of them would have met death.

No sooner had the explosion that started the fire occurred than people commenced leaping from the windows down the water. Five of them were drowned by the upsetting of a boat.

Cincinnati Losses Heavy. Cincinnati, O., March 17.—A stage of sixty-one feet was reached by the flood of Ohio River this evening. Forecaster Bassler has placed the probable crest at sixty-three feet some time to-morrow. Losses cannot be given, altho they are heavy and extensive.

Many thousands have been driven from their homes and the sufferings of the homeless and unemployed will last several days. The Cincinnati administration has asked for authority to issue bonds for \$150,000 for the relief of flood sufferers.

The city suffered a loss of about \$100,000 to-day in the collapse of the Eighth-street viaduct over the railroad of the Mill Creek quarter. Thirty-five-foot spans went down.

500 Homes Surrounded. Huntington, W. Va., March 17.—The Ohio River reached its highest point this afternoon with fifty-eight feet three inches. After remaining stationary two hours, it began to recede slowly. The stage exceeded six feet in a foot the January flood.

Some five hundred homes in Huntington and Centerville are surrounded with water. Cattiesburg, Cereso and Porterville are flooded. The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad has not run a train into Huntington since Wednesday.

Boat Rides on Main Streets. Portsmouth, N.H., March 17.—One-third of the city is submerged. Thousands of people put in the day boating thru the principal streets.

There have been no fatalities and subsequently little actual suffering. The railroads have been the chief sufferers, and dozens of abandoned passengers are quartered at hotels.

Ice Menaces Pittsburgh. Pittsburgh, March 17.—Within 30 miles of ice in the Allegheny River, above Parker, Pa., and a drizzling rain tonight. Local river men are looking forward to another flood stage in this city.

Preparations are being made here to-night to prevent any serious damage when the ice surge arrives here.

It is said that the damage sustained by the railroads will not be fully known for several weeks. Miles of track have been weakened and will need to be replaced. Hundreds of freight cars were swept into the river. The damage sustained by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad between Pittsburgh and Conneville, Pa., will be enormous.

He is a resident of this city for very ill, but his condition is much improved, and he believes that a few weeks of Canadian spring weather will completely restore him to his natural state of good health.

SPREAD OF POTATO ROT STARTS OFFICIAL PROBE

Condition of Ontario Crop Subject of Special Enquiry by Government.

Potatoes are occupying the attention of the Ontario department of agriculture just now, and if reports be true, they are small and few in a hill.

A special investigation is being made into the degeneration of the Ontario potato crop, and the market supplies are such serious questions that this action has been deemed advisable.

H. B. Smith, Wainstead, a graduate of the Quebec Agricultural College, has the matter in hand, and is visiting the various points in the country where the crop is a valuable factor. He has already fully enquired into the market conditions at Toronto and Hamilton and obtained the views of the largest potato merchant in the province.

The potato crop in the various producing counties will be carefully inspected and the results tabulated. The increasing number of reports reaching the department of using the word "rot" among the crops in the ground, and the great increase in the importation of seed potatoes from the United States, has accentuated a situation that has attracted attention for some years.

No results are yet forthcoming from the government inspectors, but it will not be surprising to learn that the stringency of the farmers in neglecting to procure best seed, choosing to let the stock rot down by using the same strain for years, is the main cause of the trouble. Another cause is the use of seed adapted to the soil in which they are sown, and the use of unsuitable soils in general. Much sack of knowledge as to the best methods of cultivation and manuring is very evident to observers. Another point upon which the most successful growers insist is that of the use of a good cutting seed. Any old way suits the average farmer, but there are approved systems to be followed here as in other matters.

MILK AT WINTER PRICES.

Producers Decide to Make No Cut for Summer Months.

The Toronto Milk Producers met at the Albion Hotel on Saturday afternoon to discuss the question of maintaining the present price of milk for the summer months, and, incidentally, took occasion to rap the medical health officer, Dr. Sheard, sharply over the knuckles for an alleged statement that milk carrying less than 3 per cent of butter fat had been adulterated before being sent to the city.

This President Annis regarded as an advance in the price of milk. The president also, on behalf of the retail merchants, objected to a statement by Dr. Sheard that they, the retailers, did not import cream from the country, the inference being that what cream was left on after the farmers got their milk, was taken off by the dealer.

The purpose of the meeting was to test the temper of the members as to an advance in the price of milk. The custom has been to lower the price beginning on May 1st and continuing for the six months of the summer. The price for the winter months had been \$1.15 net to the farmer for an 8-gallon can delivered in the city, and for the summer \$1.00.

Security of labor, high wages and the fact that the farmers have now to feed their cattle during a part of the summer, decided them to continue the old price.

President Annis in submitting the question to a vote on Saturday, urged the members to be loyal, even to the length of going out of the dairy business, if the retail milk dealers of the city refused to increase over that summer's price, which the members practically unanimously stated they willings to do.

Details of arranging the matter between the producers and the dealers was left entirely in the hands of the executive, who will meet on Saturday next.

While the retailers are averse to paying very much about the matter, it is generally conceded that the demand is reasonable and will in all probability be acceded to. If so, it may mean a corresponding increase to the citizens.

LONDON BOYS IN TOLL.

Charles Kennedy and Wellington MacDonnell, two youths who are wanted in London on a charge of stealing \$35, were picked up at the Broadway rink by Detective Guthrie on Saturday night. Both will go back to-day.

WOULD EMIGRATE IRISH IN SHIPLOADS TO CANADA

Peasant Who is Too Lazy to Work Becomes Ignorant of Agriculture.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable). London, March 17.—Giving evidence before the congested districts commission, W. H. Boyd, representing the Irish Landowners' convention, said the Irish peasant who is too lazy to work becomes ignorant of agriculture and he would emigrate the people in shiploads and place them in districts in Canada where land labor can be procured for them. It might be that they would require several years' tuition in agriculture before they would be able to cultivate the land, but his opinion certainly was that emigration was better for Ireland than migration.

The Journal seriously suggests that the Unionists should agree to submit the question of Irish home rule to the arbitration of the colonial conference on the ground that the colonial premiers could speak from experience.

John Redmond, at Liverpool, declared that unless there was deep treachery on the part of the other great powers, the Irish would be able to control the important Irish affairs.

Regarding the education question he said the only fair solution was the Canadian system which Catholics would accept to-morrow.

It requires the presence to predict that Gen. Botha will be here to attend the forthcoming colonial conference. The scene at the Guild Hall next month, when he will be with the other premiers, will be presented with the freedom of the city of London, will be unique, especially if, as it is probable, Lord Curzon will be among the company. According to advices from Pretoria, his salary has been fixed at £400, and other ministers at £300 each.

TO SHUT OFF GRAFT TALES MEANING OF COURT ORDER

Halifax Herald Temporarily Restrained From Publishing Evidence of Land Deal.

Ottawa, March 17.—(Special.)—Great interest is felt on all sides as to the outcome of Mayor McCreath's suit against The Halifax Herald, enjoining that newspaper from publishing a verbatim account of the mayor's testimony before the public accounts committee respecting some land purchases by the I. C. R. at Halifax.

The fact that an interim injunction has been allowed by one of the judges of the supreme court is significant.

Should this precedent be followed it can be used to shut off all tales of graft from coming to the knowledge of the electorate, as in that case the committee, by refusing to report the testimony to the house, can effectually stifle any disclosure embarrassing to the government.

COULD FINISH BY EASTER.

But Premier Whitney is Not at All Certain Legislature Will.

"No doubt the session could be brought to an end by Easter," said Premier Whitney on Saturday, "but it is not all certain that it will be. There are several reasons why it may not."

He was silent as to the reasons, but obviously the chief reason is the lack of devotion to their duty of the members. If they stick to their benches and rise when their bills are called the work can be pushed thru. Otherwise it will not be possible.
