MILNER'S LOCK TO BE GOVERNOR OF RE-ORGANIZED S. A. COLONIES... Chamberlain Has in View the Ending of Guerrilla War, Then the Institution of Crown Government, and Finally the Giving of Self-Government.

Don, Dec. 7.—The Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, announced in the House of Commons today that the civil government would be established soon in the Transvaal and the Orange River colonies.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—(Special.)—It has been said that lightning never strikes twice in the same place, but Quebec is an exception. As a result of the elections to-day, the Conservatives carried but eight seats out of 74, and this constitutes the party's strength in the new Legislature.

Denon Duncan, who was the military Crown prosecutor for Kimberley during the siege, and who came to London as one of the delegates of the South African Vigilance Committee assigned to lay before Mr. Chamberlain the committee's views concerning the settlement of the South African question, said to the Record correspondent to-night that a large section of the Dutch population between Zambesi and the Cape would welcome the interposition of Rhodes in the capacity of peace-maker.

Mr. Duncan, a Delegate of the South African Vigilance Committee, Says Withdraw Military Rule, Govern as Crown Colonies, and Finally Give Self-Government to Colonies.

Mr. Duncan expressed himself as follows regarding the settlement which he thought ought to follow the war: "Our committee has laid its views before Mr. Chamberlain. In favor, first, the withdrawal of military rule as speedily as possible; second, the Crown colony Government pending the settlement and political readjustment of the country; third, full self-government rights for all civilized races in South Africa as soon as the Transvaal and the Orange River Colony shall be fully restored to tranquility."

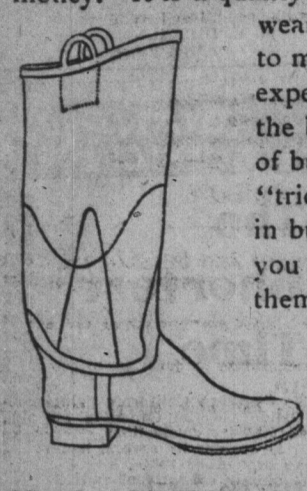

Winston Churchill, M.P., Will Lecture—Beechich Will Stage—Chambrine Will Play—The Great

DEEP WATERWAYS REPORT

The Great Project Has Now Been Placed Before Congress, With Estimates of Cost.

CANAL FROM LASALLE TO LEWISTON

Will Be a Part of 12-Million Involved in Building and Millions in Maintenance.

Washington, Dec. 7.—The complete report of the Deep Waterways Committee was sent to the House of Representatives by Secretary Root. The project before the committee is one of vast magnitude for the deep waterway and route between the Great Lakes and Atlantic seaboard. The estimated cost of a 21-foot waterway is \$20,000,000, and of a 30-foot waterway \$307,250,000. An additional estimate is made for deepening the harbor at Chicago and Duluth, making the total aggregate for the 30-foot channel \$230,000,000. The cost of the annual maintenance of the 21-foot waterway is given at \$2,343,476, and of the 30-foot waterway at \$1,800,000. The most favorable route, the committee states, for a 30-foot waterway from the lakes to the sea is from Lake Erie to Lake Ontario via La Salle and Lewiston, and from Lake Ontario to the Hudson River at Oswego and the Mohawk Valley, and that the same route is practically as favorable as any for the 21-foot waterway.

A QUARTER OF A MILLION.

Will of the Late Charles H. Hubbard, Manufacturer, Entered for Probate Yesterday.

The Toronto Probate Court yesterday applied in the Surrogate Court for probate of the will of the late Charles H. Hubbard, manufacturer, who died on Nov. 18 last. The entire estate amounts to \$240,623. Of this \$270,000 was in real estate, \$120,000 cash in bank, \$130,000 stock in bank, and \$30,000 in bonds. In his will, Mr. Hubbard left \$100,000 in cash to his wife, Mrs. W. Hubbard, and the residue of his estate to his children, Mrs. W. Hubbard, Mrs. C. C. Hubbard, and Mrs. M. Hubbard. The late Mr. Hubbard was a well-known manufacturer in Toronto, and his estate is one of the largest in the city.

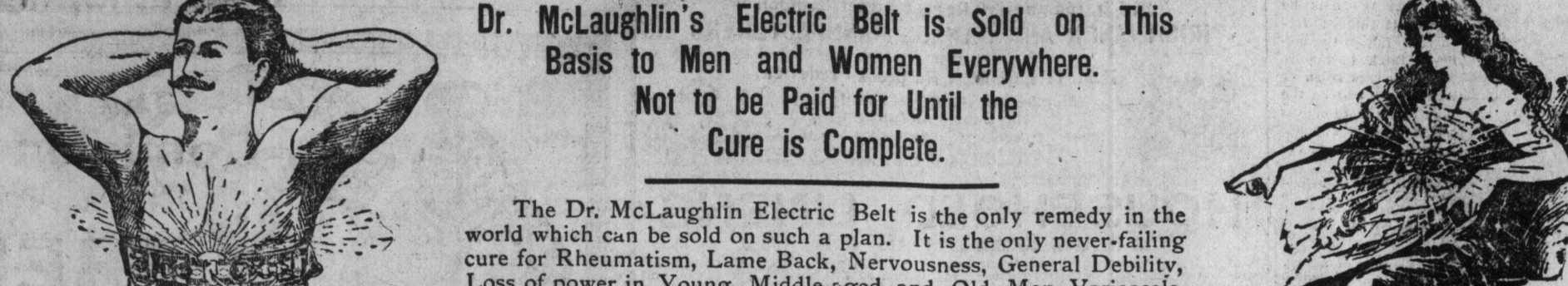

Cables Came Steady and Unchanged From Liverpool and Higher From Paris-Corn Steady-Local Grain, Produce and Live-Stock Notes and Goings.

In Liverpool today wheat futures closed unchanged to bid over yesterday's close. Main options rose $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{5}{8}$ per cent. In Paris wheat advanced $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ per cent, as did also flour options. Chicago wheat futures made a net gain of $\frac{1}{2}$ cent per bushel today. Corn futures advanced $\frac{1}{8}$ to $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent.

London, Dec. 7.—The Board of Trade returns for the 11 months ending Nov. 30 show the following British imports from Canada:

St. John's, Nfld., Dec. 7.—Mr. Bond, the Premier, has secured the consent of Mr. Joseph Chamberlain to an enlargement of the Newfoundland Cabinet, owing to the importance of the problem associated with the Red contract, announced the following as the personnel of the reconstructed Ministry:

Treasurer and Colonial Secretary, Mr. Robert Bond; Minister of Justice, William Bond; Minister of Finance, Edward Jackson; Minister of the Interior, George Keating; Attorney-General, Arthur Bond; Minister of Education, August Harvey; James Pitts, Heavy Weapons and Ordnance; Joseph Bond, Agriculture; Mr. Bond, Minister of Public Works, George Bond; Messrs. Daw, Murphy and Gauhan are not in the Cabinet.

Proportional Representation.

The Proportional Representation Society met yesterday evening at the Forum Hall, and a list of 14 new members was read as having joined since the last meeting. The society's progress was reported in obtaining signatures to the society's petition, in circulation of literature and in the distribution of the proportional election. Part of a letter from South Australia was read, and a telegram had been received from there regarding the proportional representation bill. The society will hold a public meeting on Wednesday, 12th inst., and will go towards the maintenance of a hall in India.

Tunnel in Payne Mine.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—(Special)—Advices from the Payne mine, which is being driven to the top one of a depth of 800 feet, show that the tunnel has been driven to the top of the mine, and will require to be driven 300 feet before reaching the surface. The progress is very slow owing to the hardness of the rock, and it is expected to take about 100 days to complete the shaft. The mine is owned by the Payne family and is one of the largest in the province.
