**Japan Protests to France; Fleet Ready**

**Momentous Five-hour War Conference at Tokio Results in Strongly Worded Missive of Objection to Protection Afforded Baltic Squadron at Kamranh Bay.**

London, April 19.—According to one Tokio correspondent a momentous war conference lasting five hours was held there on Wednesday, attended by the elder statesmen, the Premier and Ministers.

Other Tokio correspondents state that Japan has addressed a protest to France on the Russian squadron's presence in Kamranh Bay, but that France has not yet replied.

The Daily Telegraph's correspondent declares that a Japanese fleet is ready to sail for Kamranh Bay.

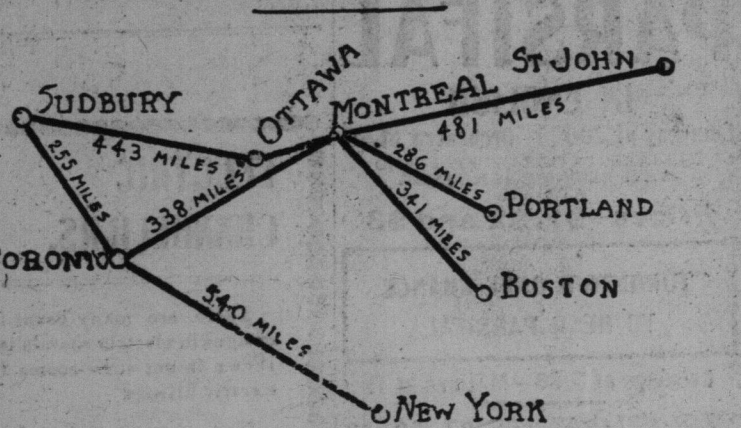

**HEADS FOR PHILIPPINES BUT MAY BE TRACKED WITHIN NEXT 24 HOURS**

Semi-Official Information at Tokio Places Probable Early Fighting Northeast of Paracels Islands.

Tokio, April 19.—There is practically official information for the statement that the Russian battleship and cruiser fleet on Sunday night departed north-east from Galleo Bay and probably is anchored south of the Triton Islands, in the Paracels group, awaiting the arrival of the Jibuti squadron. The intelligence department of the admiralty board, which has kept in touch with the Russian ships since their departure from Madagascar, announces that the battleship, under command of Kozlovsky, sailed from the Bay of Galleo shortly after dark on Sunday night on a course due east.

One report is that the traffic has increased to such an extent as to justify two trains a day each way, and that the company will run one train from Montreal to the coast by the present route, and the other from Montreal to the coast via Toronto. The other report is that the C.P.R. propose to establish a transcontinental service between the City of New York and the Pacific coast, and that Toronto will be on the direct route of this service. A glance at the map, which The World publishes herewith, will show that a transcontinental service between New York and Vancouver via Toronto, or between Montreal and Vancouver via Toronto, is a very attractive one and compares very favorably with the present connections with Montreal, Boston, Portland and St. John.

Judge Winchester Inflicts Fine of \$2500 for Maintenance of Nuisance.

The Toronto Railway Company was yesterday fined \$2500 by Judge Winchester. This is the outcome of the action commenced against the company by Crown Attorney Drayton last September.

There had been numerous street car accidents, but no one could be held responsible for them except the motor and conductors. A corporation could not be brought into the courts on a charge of manslaughter, Mr. Drayton determined to get at the company in some way. He had them indicted on the charge of "maintaining a common nuisance" and he succeeded in having the company found guilty in the general sessions. They went to the court of appeal, which also decided against them.

She then fled to the door and called for help.

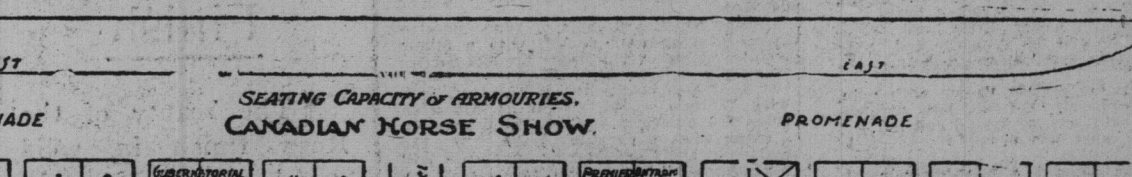

BUYING A CANADIAN PREFERENCE. Lord Stanley Says It Wouldn't Be Fair to Home Manufacturers.

London, April 19.—Lord Stanley of Alderley, in a letter to the Westminster Gazette on the colonial preference, says he fears that in the consideration of a policy of colonial preference, its advantages and its disadvantages, too much attention has been paid to the question of food and raw materials.

His lordship asks if we would be prepared to import an article of wood pulp to limit the paper making supplies from other countries in order to encourage Canada.

In 1903 we imported 12,500,000 worth of wood pulp, of which 668,000 came from Canada. A five per cent. duty on wood pulp other than Canadian would raise the revenue ninety thousand a year and give a subsidy of about 200,000 year.

It is understood that the exceedingly high price of paper makers would gain 500,000 a year, English pulp consumers being taxed 150,000 a year.

If we taxed wood pulp we should have to tax other paper making materials such as rags, esparto fibre and other materials imported to the value of about 200,000 in 1903. Thus the whole trade of paper makers would be disturbed and the cost of materials enhanced for the purpose of buying a Canadian preference.

MUST PAY THE BOND OR FAILING GO TO JAIL. When Abram Abraham, who was charged with theft, failed to show up for trial, his two bondsmen, Peter Rosenbergs and Lazarus, were left behind. They were on the bail bond for \$100 each.

Rosenbergs yesterday asked Judge Winchester not to estreat the bail. It is understood that Abraham, before leaving "free" both his bondsmen, as the judge told Rosenbergs to pay up or go to jail.

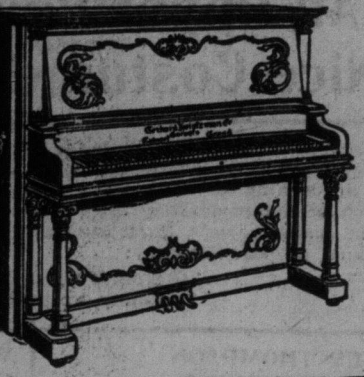

### SPOLIS SYSTEM IN ASYLUMS.

**Montreal Doctor Denounces Practice at American Convention.**  
San Antonio, Texas, April 18.—The 61st annual meeting of the American Medical-Psychological Association is in session here. About 100 alienists are in attendance. The meeting will continue three days. It is presided over by President T. W. Burgess of Montreal, Quebec.

The feature of yesterday's first day was the annual address of President Burgess, on the history and conditions of the insane asylums of Canada. He said that the rate of increase in mental disorders is so great as to call for stringent measures to suppress it.

President Burgess denounced the spolis system of making appointments to positions in asylums as a reward for party service.

Some doubt is entertained here about Germany's attitude on the subject.

Wiesbaden, Germany, April 18.—"Americans are shorter lived than Germans," was the conclusion reached by Dr. B. LaQue in his paper on social hygiene in the United States, submitted to the 11th International Congress of Medicine, now in session here.

**Newark, N.J., April 18.—**The jury in the case of the four state asylum attendants accused of the murder of Patrick Corrigan, an inmate of the asylum, has returned a verdict of not guilty.

## EXPORT DUTY ON WHEAT. NO COUNTRY BUT CANADA SEES IT

London Standard Discusses the Proposal Which it Does Not Altogether Endorse—Mr. Maclean's Speech Criticized.

London (England) Standard. A few weeks ago we dealt in our leading article columns with the proposal which a day or two previously has been brought before the Canadian house of commons for an export duty upon Canadian wheat as an answer to the American government's remission of the import duty upon that wheat when made into flour in the United States for export. We have since had an opportunity of reading a verbatim report of the speech in which this proposal was brought forward, and as it opens up the whole question of export duty on raw material, the occasion is opportune for an examination of the subject.

**Labour Spent on Wheat.**  
With the doctrine underlying the proposal we have no quarrel. That doctrine may be stated as follows: It is the advantage of a country that as much labour as possible should be expended in the preparation of an article for final consumption within the country of its primary production. Thus, Canada produces wheat, and the production of it employs a certain amount of the labor of her own people, and creates a certain amount of wealth. But before wheat is ready for consumption more labor has to be spent upon it. It must be ground into flour. If that process were also performed in Canada in respect to the Canadian wheat, more labor would be employed in that country and more wealth would be created than if the wheat were exported in grain to some other country there to be ground into flour. Let us take another example. Cotton is grown in the Southern States of North America and its cultivation employs a certain amount of labor, and creates a certain amount of wealth. If it were also spun into yarn in those states, clearly more labor would be employed, and more wealth created than if it were exported in its raw condition for the inhabitants of other states to consume. In the case of other states cotton is not employed and wealth is not doing the work. And if, as well as spinning and cotton into yarn, the cotton is also manufactured into cloth and fabrics, and performed the bleaching, dyeing and other operations which go to the manufacture of a bale of raw cotton into the articles which stock a draper's shop, so much the better for the labor and wealth production of the Southern States. All this is too obvious to admit of dispute.

**The American Rebate.**  
Mr. Maclean was primarily concerned with the export of wheat, and in his passages of his speech he showed how, with the wheat belt in the North American continent, the wheat of Canada was being exported to the United States, and the American millers were in a better position to fight the Canadian millers for the English market than the Canadian millers were in their own country. The American rebate of 50 per cent. of the import duty on wheat in the form of flour, even though mixed with native wheat in the inter-continental mill, was a great advantage to Mr. Maclean's object, and proposed an export duty upon Canadian wheat, which would effect the export to the United States, or by making the wheat dealer, would handicap the American millers who would be unable to compete with the Canadian millers. Nor would it be only the Canadian millers who would be handicapped in Canada, but the Canadian millers in the United States, and it is not surprising that Mr. Maclean proposed an export duty on wheat to be ground in Canada, and not an export duty on flour, which is the product of the mill in Canada.

But to this it should be pointed out that it is not the action of the American government, but that of the Canadian government, and that the mills of the United States which were especially aimed at by Mr. Maclean's proposal, that the export duty shall be confined to wheat going to that country. In his speech he said: "In London, England, they are putting up the largest mills in the world, and I have been asked, 'Would you export a duty on wheat to be ground in London?' I would. At first sight this statement looks like a complete confession of failure, but on closer examination, however, there appears less cause for alarm on this side to take alarm. Even assuming and it is at the moment a fair assumption, that the Dominion millers should institute a general export duty on wheat, its effect upon us would be no way different from that of the existing import duties; it would tend, like them, to keep a certain amount of trade in the Dominion which otherwise we might have lost. But as in the case of the Canadian import duties, so in the case of the export duty, so far as it hampered our trade it would be subject to discussion for the purpose of reducing it to a minimum. At the same time we would advise Mr. Maclean to find more acceptable arguments for his proposal than that which he used in his speech when he said that "large mills were being built just as much to the mother country and to Canada if they were located on the Lake of the Woods." To Canada, yes; hardly to the mother country.

**Power as Well as Wheat.**  
And Mr. Maclean would not stop at what he referred to as the water-power of Niagara, generated on the Canadian side of the Falls, being exported to the United States, there to be used to build up immense industrial concerns. An export duty on electrical energy would prevent that. He intimated also that we have to export to the province of Ontario the greatest supply of nickel ore in the world. Today a large number of men are employed in developing those ores; but by reason of our present laws, and in view of the policy of the present government, we are allowing the nickel matte, that is to say, the article which is sold in the United States, to be exported to that country, so that for one interest of the country it is in the hands of Canadian workers, twenty dollars are paid in wages to the United States workmen. I do not think that it is in the interest of the country if an export duty on that nickel matte going out of this country would keep it here.

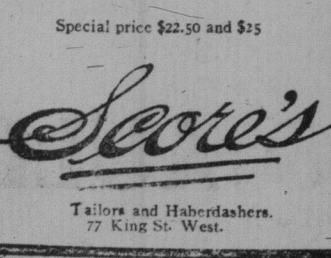
