Before commencing the business, devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. Dr. McTavish; Mr. R. Donald was requested to act as chairman, and the Secretary of the Managers was appointed Secretary to the meeting.

The report of the Session for the past year was presented by Dr. McTavish, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. H. Meldrum. Carried.

The adoption of the annual report of the Managers was moved by Mr. Donald, seconded by Mr. Petry and carried.

Reports of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations connected with the church, were presented and adopted, and it was decided that these, in addition to the reports of the Session and Managers, should be printed in pamphlet form and distributed among the members of the congregation.

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers during the next two years, viz., Messrs. A. R. Creelman, A. D. Crooks, R. Donald, A. I. Forster, R. G. A. Paton, C. J. Peter, R. W. Spence, and T. A. Stephens.

Votes of thanks to the members of the choir and auditors for valuable services rendered during the year, and to the ladies of the church for providing the excellent entertainment which preceded the meeting, were unanimously passed.

Messrs. John Ferguson and Peter McCulloch were reappointed auditors for the ensuing year.

After the Pastor had briefly addressed the congregation, pointing out the inutility of all church work unless undertaken with the proper end in view, the meeting adjourned.

The Session begs to report that the work of the congregation under its care, has gone on steadily and with some degree of success and prosperity. The financial depression which is so general, has brought sore trials to some of our esteemed members, and in those trials we beg to assure them of our deep and heartfelt sympathy. Death has visited a number of homes in our congregation, and we have been called upon to mourn the removal from our midst of some beloved and valued members. Besides the following members, viz., Mrs. George F. Burns, Miss Forbes, Miss Janet Calder, Miss Fanny Clarke, Mrs. Payne, Miss Lizzie Peters and Mrs. George Smeall, several esteemed adherents have also been taken away. We deeply mourn the loss of our beloved friend and brother, Mr. W. H. Howland, who was a regular worshipper with us during the past two years or more. In common with thousands of others we would place on record the very high esteem in which he was held as a large-hearted philanthropist, a devoted friend to the poor and suffering, and a pure-minded, consecrated genial christian. "Taking him all in all we ne'er may meet his like again." His widow and family have the prayers and sympathy of all our people in their heavy affliction.

Some anxiety was caused for a time by the alarming news that our missionary in India, Rev. N. H. Russell was dangerously ill. We are thankful to our Heavenly Father, that he is fully restored, and that he and his esteemed wife are again at the post of duty.

The reports we have received from time to time of our domestic mission in Elizabeth St., have on the whole been very encouraging. The services, conducted by Mr. Eakin, have been highly appreciated, and we trust very much blessed.

All departments of the church's work appear to have been carried on with faithfulness and efficiency, and we again express our gratitude for the large amount of voluntary service that has been so cheerfully rendered during the year.

We regret that distance from the church has necessitated the removal of one of the most valued members of our Session, Mr. James P. Donald. His intelligent interest in the Sabbath School, Missionary, Christian Endeavor and other departments of the church's work, and his deep sympathy with every form of aggressive christianity made his services as an elder peculiarly valuable.

The Session in accordance with the directions of the General Assembly have appointed a Committee on Temperance, and an effort is being made by that committee to put the

matter upon a proper footing.

During the year 91 new members have been added to the roll—53 by certificate and 38 by profession of faith. After deducting removals by certificate, death and otherwise, the present membership on the roll is 580 or a net gain of 22.

The attendance at the various communions was as follows: February, 335; April, 320; June, 315; August, 230; October 304, and December 226. The names of those who have received the sacrament of baptism and those who have been removed by death, will be found on following pages of this report.

An effort is being made to introduce the daily reading of the International Bible Readings Association into our homes, and we hope it will be taken up heartily by the people.

With gratitude to God for the past, and with hope for the

future we press forward.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MANAGERS FOR 1893

In submitting their report for 1893 with the usual accounts, the Managers have pleasure in stating that it was found possible to close the year much more satisfactorily than was anticipated in the early part of December. The apecial appeal made in that month was responded to so libersly that it provided nearly \$200 additional money, which with other unexpected receipts reduced the deficiency to \$265.79, the amount to be carried forward to 1894 as an adverse balance.

An examination of the statements now presented shows that the expenditures for Congregational purposes during 1893 exceeded the receipts by nearly \$155, the year having opened

with a deficiency of \$111, and that the weekly offerings for 1892 and 1893 are almost identical, the difference being slightly in favour of the year just closed. From the details of expenditures given, it will also be seen that there are increases in several items which were apparently unavoidable. The special item of interest, \$319.37, was a necessary outlay owing to the creation of a floating debt to complete the payments for the improvements made to the Church in 1892. The other payment of interest, \$973.34, is upon the mortgage debt of £4,000 sterling, at the reduced rate, five per cent., conceded by the mortgagees.

There are now on the contributors' list the names of 210 members and adherents, giving weekly the sum of \$92.64, as against 219, giving \$101.08, reported a year ago. The amounts

As the payments for the church improvements have all been made and the expenditure account closed, a short resume thereof will not be inappropriate here. The actual outlays for improvements amounted to \$7,878.39, of which \$2,838.44 have been paid by contributions and collections, leaving a balance due as against the church of \$5,039.95. About \$2,000 of the latter sum is covered by subscriptions promised by members of the congregation, leaving about \$3,000 to be met

voluntarily by others who are not under promise. The indebtedness indicated has taken the form of a floating liability to the Imperial Bank, on which interest at current rates is

The Managers believe that the members of the Congregation generally will join them in regarding this report as an extremely gratifying one. Notwithstanding the depression in the business world, the receipts have been well maintained, and would have been more than sufficient to meet the engagements of the year, including the deficit at its opening, but for the special interest charge already alluded to. It may be confidently hoped that, when the times improve, little or no difficulty will be experienced in connection with the finances of the Church.

The following Managers retire by rotation, but are eligible for re-election :-

Messrs. Creelman, Spence, Paton, Donald, Campbell, Crooks, Stephens and Forster.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

Another year has run its course, and the Officers and Teachers of the Sabbath School again submit their annual report, the 19th in the history of the School.

The average attendance was 159, an increase of 5 over the previous year. MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION REPORT.

The Missionary Association have much pleasure in presenting their annual report. When we look back over the year that is just passed we have many reasons for thankfulness to our Heavenly Father for the way he has led us and blessed us. Our contributions for missions, although not amounting to as much as the previous year, are on the whole satisfactory, when we take into consideration the great depression in business which has been felt all over the country, and by our own members to a certain degree. When we take from our total contributions of 1892, the special contributions, the actual amount collected for our missionary objects is not so much in excess of 1893 as appears at first sight. A number of our members have been compelled to reduce the amounts given, but the number of contributors has kept up very well. We trust, however, that in the year 1894 more of our people will give towards these objects, as we know there are many who do not use the mission envelopes. Let us each one make this a subject of prayer and give as we can afford.

We have held our monthly missionary prayer-meetings as usual, and have had some very interesting and instructive talks

on different mission fields during the year.

Our own missionary, Mr. Russell, has kept us well posted on his work in India, while Mrs. Russell has also sent us very interesting letters about the work. We expected to get a report from Mr. Russell, to be incorporated in our printed church

report, but it has not yet arrived.

The missionary in the home field whom we as a congregation are supporting is Mr. Muirhead of Whitewood, N. W. T.; he has sent us a letter giving a little account of the district he is working in, and certainly he has a great deal to do. He says his field consists of four stations; the people belong to 17 distinct nationalities, and each one has a distinct settlement of their own, thus making Whitewood quite a missionary centre. The people are very scattered and he has a great deal of travelling to do to visit them and hold services as requested. There are three Sabbath Schools in connection with the field. Mr. Muirhead says that Whitewood has a very hard name and is a very drunken place, the foreigners becoming almost crazy with liquor and fighting, etc., with one another.

Our own domestic mission, in Elizabeth St., is also doing

good work, as will be seen from the report.

REPORT FROM MR. RUSSELL.

MHOW, CENTRAL INDIA.

"Forward Central India for Christ" has been our motto, and to this end have we labored, but it has been in the face of many difficulties. This has been a year of trial by fire; please God, a year of preparation for great usefulness. Two of our men with their families were bought over by the Roman Catholics to turn and work against us. One man grew turbulent and had to be dismissed. Two others sinned and their positions in the service had to be taken from them. Your missionary fell ill and was laid aside from the work for four months.

By God's grace, however, it has been a year of much blessing. Eight souls have been added to our little Christian congregation, seven of whom are from heathendom, and one the child of Christian parents. Of these seven, none are at present in mission service. One of them is a relative of the man baptized in Barwai a year ago. His wife is now asking baptism, as are also several others of the same connection, all, I truly believe, the fruits of the first convert's efforts and good life. Another was the lowest servant on my compound, the maitre who has long been learning the truth. He now works as my chowkidar and goes to school in the day to prepare for mission service. Four were from one family—grandfather, son, son's wife and child—all baptized at once. In the enquirers' class, several others are preparing for baptism.

The work in Barwai is very promising; twenty-five villages are reached regularly, and among these many enquirers after the truth, especially in the caste from which we have had the two baptisms.

Manpur has had many trials. The Roman Catholics bought over the man who was laboring for us there and set him to preach against us. They acted in such a way as to cause all the people to despise the name of "Christian," and, unfortunately, the Protestant had to suffer for the Roman Catholic's faults We have persevered prayerfully, however, and in this cluster of villages have many eager listeners, though we have had only one baptism.

The work in Mhow itself has been equally blessed. Our congregation now numbers over forty members, and is daily growing in grace and in the knowledge of the Lord. In the summer we had excellent Bible classes, for several hours daily, and since then I have gathered the men together for two days monthly for a regular drill in the Bible and examination on their month's study.

Sunday school work has been pushed vigorously and many hundreds of children have been taught the Word by our Christian teachers. Between three and four hundred people at present attend our large Sunday School, held in the church on Sunday morning. At the close of this all the Christians, mission workers and others, go out and hold Sunday Schools

in different parts of the camp.

Our school work flourishes. In our largest school the roll is nearly 150 and average attendance about 100. The work has been thorough in all subjects, especially the Bible. Our boys took first prize in two out of three departments, in competition with other mission schools for the Murray prize. Mrs. Russell has the boys' Bib'e class in English, and is very much encouraged by the interest shown in the Truth. We are at present looking to the Cantonment authorities to give us some help in the secular part of our school work.

Two branch schools, one with about 35 and another with about 30 pupils, are being successfully carried on, and through them the Bible is systematically taught. It is surprising, the grasp these heathen boys get of the Bible and its truths. have been surprised, during the late examination, to find they know the Scripture better probably than boys of the same age

at home.

We have just held, in Mhow, a large convention of Christians from all our stations. It was a grand success. papers and addresses showed that a newer and more developed spirit is creeping into our native church, and that soon we will have a grand body to lean on, rather than support. It will need much care and labor, however, for years to come, and for this we need more help. Above all else, we require more men to develop the big unopened field to the west of us, where millions of people are waiting for light.

We have a few minor wants, in which we ask your assistance: a home for heathen women who come to us from lives of evil; several such we have had to turn away lately, for want of some place to put them. We also want small and inexpensive buildings in our out-stations, to enable us to better carry on the work. We need a man capable of instructing our youth in the common trades, carpentering,

blacksmithing, etc.

We ask your prayers, your sympathy, your interest and efforts on behalf of this the noblest and grandest work to which our church has ever been called.

It is a hand-to-hand battle with the powers of heathenism; some of us will go down in the struggle, but you must be ready to carry it on.

We would convey our thanks to the many friends who have so substantially aided us by their generous contributions to the special collections as well as by private subscriptions. One special sum given us to be expended in "Christmas comforts for some of the old people," was used to supply some of them with extra fuel.

We regret having to record the death of Mrs. Geo. F. Burns, for many years one of our most active workers, who entered into her rest after a long and painful illness.

Many thanks are due to the indefatigable exertions and untiring zeal of our President and other officers, who have done all in their power to make our Society an efficient and useful one.

We now go hopefully forward into a new year, feeling certain that we will be aided in the good work of the future as we have been in that of the past.

During the year ending December 31st, 1893, the work of this Society has been successfully carried on. The active members number about one hundred and twenty, and the associate about ten.

The practical work undertaken and carried on by the Society is to contribute toward the support of the missionary, Mr. Russell, to furnish workers for the Elizabeth Street Mission, to maintain two cottage prayer meetings in St. John's Ward, to look after the spiritual welfare of the young members of the congregation, to see that young strangers are welcomed to the church, and generally to promote christian fellowship among the members of the Society.

The financial position of the Society is good. During the past year the receipts from all sources, including a balance from last year of \$11.00, but excluding missionary contributions, amounted to \$136.33. The expenses amounted to \$126.24, leaving a balance on hand of \$10.09.

The Junior C. E. Society meets every Sunday at 4.15 p.m. for half an hour. About twenty-seven attend each meeting. Miss Irish is now Superintendent, and under her guidance the Society is increasing in numbers and interest.

REPORT OF ELIZABETH STREET MISSION WORKERS' ASSOCIATION.

(Embracing all its Branches.)

In looking back over the year that has closed, our hearts are filled with gratitude to our Heavenly Father for having so abundantly blessed us in all our work. Most earnestly and prayerfully has the seed been sown, and we have been encouraged at times by seeing that the good seed has not altogether fallen on stony ground, but has taken root in some hearts, and is now bringing forth fruit unto the harvest.

SABBATH SCHOOL.

The officers and teachers have much pleasure in presenting the thirteenth annual report of the Sabbath School. After careful examination, we find the number of scholars on the roll at the close of the year to be 130, and officers and teachers 23. Average attendance of scholars, 80; average of teachers, 21; making a total average of 101. This shows a slight falling off compared with last year; the largest attendance of scholars was 125, and the smallest 50. The first half of the year shows an average attendance of 90 scholars, but during the three months of summer, we suffered quite a falling off in the attendance of the boys; we have, also, lost several scholars by change of residence, still, notwithstanding these hindrances, our school shows continued advancement, for which we thank God and take courage. Three of our scholars, two girls and one boy, made public confession of their faith in Jesus Christ as their Saviour, and are now members of the Central Church.

The collections of the Sabbath School amount to \$55.72,

an average of about \$1.05 per Sabbath.

The annual picnic was held on the 7th July, to Long Branch, and the Christmas social on the 28th December, at both of which the scholars and their parents and friends had a time of social enjoyment. For these pleasant times, the officers and teachers return most grateful thanks to the friends who so kindly aided them with money and refreshments, thus enabling them to meet all expenses without a deficit. Our cordial thanks are also due to the friends who sent us valuable donations of books for prizes and for the library.

We are sorry to say that during the year we suffered the loss of several valued teachers, but we are thankful to say that

others have been found to take their place.

As compared with the previous year, the amount outstanding at the credit of depositors is \$11.85 less, while the deposits for the year were \$132.22 in excess. The financial statements of the Treasurer appended hereto will fully exhibit the position of the affairs of the bank.

The directors and management have had their attention specially drawn to circumstances connected with the depositors, which go far to indicate that the objects which led to the establishment of the Savings Bank no longer exist. It appears that the majority of the depositors do not belong to the Mission, so that the work is largely carried on for the benefit of persons in whom, as a Mission, we are not especially interested. It also appears that very many of the depositors are children who deposit a few cents and draw the amount out again in such a way as to preclude the hope that they are being taught habits of saving. It would also appear that the establishment of branches of chartered banks with savings bank departments very fully meet the want on account of which the bank was started.

In view of these circumstances, it is the intention of the management to bring the matter before the Session at an early date with a view to the discontinuance of the bank.

A number of our young men have been very faithful in their attendance to the requirements of the bank during the year, and deserve cordial thanks.
