Fearful Slaughter in Terrific TWENTY SIGN Battle With Russians

Dead and Dying in Great Heaps Between Trenches -- More Deviltry by Kaiser's Men Reported

London, Feb. 10—The London Daily Mail's correspondent with the Russian armies in the field telegraphs that, according to Russian informants, the Germans in two days, about Gumine, where the fighting was hottest, lost 11,000 dead.

RUSSIAN ADVANCE IN HUNGARY

Geneva, via Paris, Feb. 10 — The Russians are marching into Hungary by the valleys of the Theiss and Ung Rivers, according to advices received here. Taking the offensive at Korosmezo, they are said to have inflicted severe losses on the Austrians, and advanced five miles in the direction of Borkut in the Lyutta Valley. The Russians progressed southward as Turja-Remute and Pereseny on the railroad from Turja to Ungvar, capturing two batteries embedded in the mud in the Polonia-Runa mountain.

LEGALLY RESURRECTED

The eastern battlefront completely overshadows the western fighting line today, as the centre of interest in the military operations. The Teutonic allies are making desperate efforts to advance especially in the region of Galicia to the South of Przemysl and Lemberg, where attempts have been made to gain positions by sheer weight of numbers.

The general offensive movement of Austro-German forces along the Carpathians has been successful at the eastern end of the range, where the Russians are retreating into Bukowina, but London military experts are of the opinion that the Austrians must forge ahead a long way in this direction before they can hope to affect the general Russian position.

The vital point is Dukia Pass, where a short advance by the Russians would compel the Austrians to look anxiously to their communications. At present the battle in the region of Dukia Pass has all the aspects of a draw.

London, Feb. 10—The Chronicle's correspondent telegraphs from Czernonitz that there has been severe fighting during the last few days along the whole southern Galician front. 





Two chauffeurs and two ordnance officers were killed outright, before the cavalry escort could ntervene and drive the Germans away. General Bridoux fell back in his seat with his hand to his breast A bullet had hattered his shoulder, penetrated the body, and pierced a lung.

"We carried him into a log hut in the hicket. 'I suffer,' he exclaimed. 'I feel ery ill,' Then he talked of his wife and aildren to the chaplain, but to us he poke only of the army, of his soldiers, of his corps of cavalry that marches vithout horses and of which all the men re heroes."




