SENTENCED TO FINE AND IMPRISONMENT

Drury's Ex-Aid Given Term and Assessed \$100,000

Canadian Press Despatch.

OTTAWA, May 30.—Release on ticket-of-leave has been granted to Peter Smith, former Provincial Treasurer of Ontario, now confined in Portsmouth Penitentiary. A telegram which provides for the release of Peter Smith forwith, was sent tonight by the Under-Secretary of State. The case has been under review by the cabinet.

Peter Smith was convicted and sentenced on Oct. 24, 1924, to three years in Portsmouth Penitentiary, years in Portsmouth Penite tiary, Kingston, on charges of conspiring to defraud the Province of Ontario in connection with the purchase of bonds when he was provincial treasurer. He is 49 years of age, was born at Stratford, Ont., and has farmed most of his life. He was prominent in municipal affairs in Dounie Township when he was elected U. F. O. member in the general provincial election of 1919. He ernment of Premier Drury in the general election of June 25, 1923.

Mr. Smith was arrested on April 24, 1924, at the Ontario Parliament Buildings in Toronto shortly of the University of th ings in Toronto shortly after his re-fusal to give evidence before the pub-lic accounts committee of the Ontario lic accounts committee of the Ontario Legislature which was then inquiring into provincial bond transactions.

Bail of \$100,000 was set and Mr. Smith came up for trial on Oct. 20, 1924, with Mr. Jarvis. The hearing lasted four days. Chief Justice Meredith sentenced Mr. Smith to three years in the penitertiary and Aemilius Jarin the penitentiary and Aemilius Jarvis, who was tried jointly with him, to six months at the jail farm and imposed a joint fine of \$600,000. They were to remain in custody until the money was paid. Later this fine was reduced by the Appeal Court to \$200,000 for Mr. Jarvis, which he has paid and is now seeking to have returned, and \$100,000 for Mr. Smith. The latter's fine was to be paid at the termination of his the year sentence or else he would have to serve an additional five years.





Engaged Girls are Anxious to Marry Because They Believe They Will Live Happy Ever After the Wedding -But Wise are the Young Men Who Refuse to Marry Until They Can Afford Matrimony.

"WHAT'S the matter with girls that they are in such a hurry to get married?" a number of young men recently asked me. Then these harassed youths go on to say: "We are anxious to marry the girls to whom

we are engaged, but we are just getting a start in life. We are making small salaries, not enough to support a family on in any decent comfort, and we want to put off marrying for two or three years until we have saved up a little money and have worked up into better jobs and can feel that we are not running such a foolhardy risk when we take wives unto ourselves.

"But the girls are not willing to wait. They want to rush into matrimony whether we are ready for it or not, and it puts us in a darned awkvard position. Makes us seem slack lovers to be standing with cold feet, shivering on the brink and afraid to take the plunge into matrimony when the girls are all for shutting their eyes and taking a header into it.

BELIEVE me, it is the girls who are responsible for most of the foolish, premature marriages. Left to themselves, the men would have waited until they were ready to marry. But the girls wouldn't wait, and we wonder why?"

Probably the first is because when they are in love they are possessed by the delusion that every other woman is equally enamored of the men on whom they have set their affections, and that the only way to keep them is to put their matrimonial brand upon their foreheads.

OF COURSE, this is utterly silly, for the man who won't stand hitched before marriage will slip the bridle and jump the fence after he has been coralled into the holy estate. Also women's tastes differ in men, and because one girl thinks that a certain youth is mother's white-haired angel boy is no indication that he looks that way to other feminine eyes.

Another reason why girls are in a hurry to marry is because they have been led to believe that her wedding day is the great moment in a woman's life.

IT IS the hour she has dreamed of ever since she was old enough to have a conscious thought. She looks forward to it as eagerly as a child does to going to the circus, and she can't bear to wait two or three years for the big thrill of walking up the aisle with orange blossoms in her hair and a trailing veil, and having the spotlight turned upon her.

And, curiously enough, every girl believes that a miracle is going to be wrought in her behalf and that, no matter what marriage has brought other women, it is going to bring her nothing but unadulterated happiness.

All her life she has seen how hard her mother has had to work and what sacrifices she has had to make. She has seen her sisters dragged down by babies and worn with the struggle of trying to make one dollar do the work of five. But she is not warned by their fate, and she rushes into matrimony because she is convinced that, somehow, things will be different with her and that marriage will be the open door to paradise.

MANY girls are in a hurry to marry because they are lazy and self-indulgent. They don't want to earn their own bread and butter. They want a husband for a meal ticket. They don't want to punch the time clock of a morning. They prefer to lie abed and snooze along until noon. They don't want a job in which they will have to be sufficient. They want one on which they can loaf and from which they cannot be fired. Therefore as soon as they get their clutches on a man they hurry him off to the parson as quickly as they possibly can.

Perhaps the chief reason of all why girls are more in a hurry to marry than boys are is because women are more given to acting upon impulse than men are, and women are less forward looking than men are. A woman seldom counts the cost of what she does until after she has done it and she has to pay the piper.

SO WHEN she falls in love she wants to marry right then and there, without giving a single thought as to how she is to be fed and clothed and housed, or taking a look at the future and trying to forecast what it will bring to her.

Worse still, she does not perceive that in her greediness which makes her snatch at green fruit she is throwing away the perfect thing that she might have if she had only the patience to wait for it to ripen.

For innumerable marriages are failures only because they were entered upon too soon. They would have been successes if only the man and woman had waited until they were prepared to marry.

No young couple need wait until they are rich to marry, but they are courting disaster if they marry before they have enough to live upon in a fair degree of comfort.

THERE is no happiness in a household over which the gaunt specter of want eternally hovers, where little children cry for food and where a shabby man and woman are torn with never-ending anxiety about where

Nor does any man long love the woman who has dragged him down to poverty and who has balked his ambition and blighted his cageer by having inveigled him into marrying her before he had got his feet firmly planted on the ladder. When he sees his fellows who stayed single forging ahead, while he is crushed by the burden of supporting a family, he hates the wife who has been his undoing.

There is no truer proverb than the old one which says that if we marry in haste we will repent at leisure. Young men engaged to girls who are in a hurry to marry will do well to reflect upon this ancient saw and lay its wisdom to heart. So shall they protect themselves and the girls against the folly of marrying before they can properly finance matrimony.





Rev. J. S. Bonnell Preaches On Subject in St. Andrew's

CHRISTIAN WORLD WATCHING CANADA

Visiting Clergymen in Saint John Pulpits On Sunday

"One Year of Church Union" was the subject of the sermon delivered by Rev. J. S. Bonnell in St. Andrew's church last evening. He took his text from the prayer of Christ, "That they all may be one." He quoted from Richard Baxter, an Anglican divine of the 17th century; Marcus Dods, of Scotland, and other great religious leaders to show that the divisions of the Christian church are stumbling blocks in the way of its effectiveness. He said that while this fact was recognized no church was ready to undertake the risk or adventure of uniting with different denominations. He pointed out that every advance humanity had made in matters material or spiritual involved risk and he cited the discoveries of the New World, the aeroplane and the steamboat.

GREAT ADVENTURE, HE SAYS.

Three great denominations in Canada undertook this great adventure, Mr. Bonnell said, and their risk had been abundantly justified, he claimed. bundantly justified, he claimed.

In proof of his assertion that each of
the three uniting churches had conributed richly to the common life of the United Church he spoke of the procedure of the United body.

the United Church he spoke of the procedure of the United Church which, he said, had been retained by all the Presbyterian churches entering union. Then he referred to the right to call a minister. Former Presbyterian churches extended to United Church which previously did not possess it.
