METROPOLITAN BANK

Toronto, July 23—The amalgamation of the Bank of Nova Scotia and the Metropolitan Bank, two of the largest chartered banks in Canada, was announced this afternoon. The merger has progressed as far that circulars embodying the basis of the amalgamation have been prepared and approved by the directors of the ooth institutions and are being mailed to the shareholders of each.

Under the agreement, as outlined, the shareholders of the Metropolitan Bank will receive \$100 in cash and one-haif share of Bank of Nova Scotia stock, for each share held. The negotiations which led to the adoption of a practicable basis of amalgamation have been in progress for a considerable period.

As the result of the merger the Bank of Nova Scotia will take its place as the fourth largest bank in Canada, with a paid up capital of \$6,500,000 and a reserve fund of \$11,750,000. The total deposits will aggregate \$67,043,789 and the total assets \$94,142,284. The net profits of the combined institutions in 1913 were
