"The Province of New Brunswick, like some other communities, has been smitten by the craze for public ownership. It has developed a water power on the Musquash River, and left the appraisal of the value of private lands until after its dams have been erected and the plant is in operation. A heavy claim is now pending in the courts. Despite impassioned declaration on behalf of the government that the Musquash is in need of steam standby, it has been admitted during the hearing of the case that the estimates of the engineer who originally had charge have been entirely wrong, and that when the communities to which electric current has been sold are in a position to demand the full amount of their contract, the Musquash will be unable to supply it continuously throughout the year.

Legless War Veteran Coming Here on 5,000 Mile Journey

Economy and Lower Taxation Features of Coolidge Address

Promotion of Peace Is Stressed by Country's Leader

FOR WORLD COURT

Voices Opposition to Policy
Of Competitive Armaments

WASHINGTON, March 4—Calvin Coolidge came today to the beginning of a four-year term as President of the United States by direct and overwhelming mandate of the people.

With him came Charles G. Dawes, to fill the office of Vice-president, left vacant 19 months ago when Calvin Coolidge first took the presidential oath in the family homestead in Vermont, upon the death of Warren G. Harding.

Simple Ceremony.

The ceremony of inauguration, exemplifying the tasks of both men and the frugal policy they have pledged themselves to pursue in the conduct of the nation's affairs, was arranged at the President's direction, on the simplest scale in a century, beginning about 11 a.m., with the 68th Congress entering its last hour, and continuing for almost four hours.

President's Address.

In his inaugural address Mr. Coolidge dedicated himself and his admiration to the lightening of the tax reden at home and to the promotion of the tax through mutual understandings den at home and to the promotion of peace through mutual understandings with the nations of the world.

These two purposes were outlined in high relief by Mr. Coolidge just after he had taken his second oath of office, as President of the United States.

Dividing his attention almost equally between affairs and home and problems abroad, and between things accomplished and achievements hoped for, Mr. Coolidge spoke with assurance as to the future, declaring that because of action already taken, an era of prosperity lay ahead and a firmer courage and a higher hope inspired the heart of all humanity.

of all humanity.

Accord with this purpose, he asserted, demands the conduct of government along certain definite lines.

These lines in the field of domestic affairs point, first, to the exercise of greater economy in government, and, second, to reduction of taxation, he continued. The recent election, he said, had demonstrated that "the policy that stands out with the greatest clearness is that of economy in public ex-

ness is that of economy in public ex-penditure, with reduction and reform of taxation." Economy and Taxation.

Economy and Taxation.

"I favor the policy of economy, not because I wish to save money, but because I wish to save people," he continued. "The men and women of this country who toil are the ones who bear the cost of government. Every dollar that we carelessly waste means that their life will be so much the more meagre. Every dollar that we prudently save means that their life will be so much their life will be so much more abundant."

The practice of such economy, he declared, has brought the time when there can be further tax reduction and "when, unless we wish to hamper the people in their right to earn a living, we must have tax reform." He declared his opposition to extremely high tax rates because "they produce little or no revenue, because they are bad for the country, and, finally, because they are wrong."

"The verdict of the country has been given on this question," he added. (Continued on page 11, fourth column)



# PUGSLEY LOSES Moosejaw Women Attend Meeting To Hear Maritimes Claims

When Hope Was High For Recovery, Takes Sudden Turn For Worse and Succumbs to Pneumonia

TORONTO, March 4.—The long and brilliant career at the bar and in the service of his country of Hon. Dr. William Fugsley, K. C., former Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick, ended here at 11.15 o'clock last night, following a turn for the worse in his brave battle to throw off an attack of pneumonia with which he was stricken here recently. Rallying after his condition had become serious enough to summon relatives to his bedside, the veteran statesman seemed on his way to complete recovery, despite his being in his 75th year. A change was noticeable late yesterday, soon after he breathed his last.

Accompanied by Mrs. Pugsley, Hon. Dr. Pugsley came here enroute to Western Canada where he was to hear several claims as commissioner for the Federal Government. Two weeks ago Sunday, he took ill. His son, John A. T. Pugsley, St. John, was summoned to Toronto but left for home on Friday, thinking the danger was over. Mrs. Pugsley was with Hon. Dr. Pugs-ley when the end came.

IF William Pugsley had lived until the 27th of September next he would have been seventy-five years of age. He was not so old a man as years

the 27th of September next he would have been seventy-five years of age. He was not so old a man as years go, but his life has been one of great energy and activity. He left his native place in Sussex, Kings county, when he was fifteen years of age to attend the University of New Brunswick, from which he graduated three years later in 1868, winning many honors, among them the Douglas Gold Medal, and being second in the race for the famous Gnehrist Scholarship, which entitled the winner to a course at the University of London, England. Pugsley as a boy and youth—for between the ages of fifteen and eighteen when he earned his degree, he had not arrived at the age of manhood—gave promise of Pugsley, the man who in later years served his province and the Dominion of Canada so well and was considered among our national leaders.

After his university course, William Pugsley studied for the bar and four years later, in 1872, was admitted to practice. He entered into partnership in the city of St. John with his brother and Hon. J. Herbert Crawford, another Kings county man, who was for a time Solicitor-General in the government of New Brunswick. The firm of Pugsley, Crawford & Pugsley continued until the death of Mr. Crawford, who passed away early in life. During that time William Pugsley was, however, also reporter of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, a position which he held for ten years. He did not enter politics until 1885, but during the forty-year period that has elapsed since then, William Pugsley has always been in the public eye, first in New Brunswick, where upon his election in Kings county to succeed Hon. Dr. Vail, he almost immediately began to make his mark in the provincial legislature. He was re-elected by the people of Kings county in 1886 as well as 1890 and it was a considerable tribute to his parliamentary knowledge and skill that in 1887 he was chosen as the Speaker of the House, a position which he filled until 1689. It, is said of Dr. Pugsley that he made an ideal presiding officer. His decis that he hade an unitary that he hade a like his decisions were fair and a Speaker in those stormy political days, when the passages across the floors of the House were not always good tempered required an equable disposition as well as a firmness of demeanor to impress those who were under his control. It was at that time that William Pugsley won the reputation for courtesy that has always remained with him. I've men were privileged to rival him in this respect. Whether on the floors of the legislature or in the House of Commons, whether examining a witness in the court room or arguing a case on appeal, whether on a campaign platform or addressing public audiences as the Chief Executive of New Brunswick, Dr. Pugsley was always a genas the Chief Executive of New Brunswick, Dr. Pugsley was always a gentleman. He could criticize and analyze the arguments of political opponents and hold some of their statements, it may be, up to ridicule, but he never adopted a personal attitude that could be regarded as offensive. In his lifetime William Pugsley had many opponents, but all or nearly all of them, were political and not personal.

DR. PUGSLEY'S career in the Legis-DR. PUGSLEY'S career in the Legislature was a brilliant one. When he resigned the Speakership in 1889, he was invited by the Premier of that day, Hon. A. G. Blair, to accept the Solicitor Generalship which had been vacated by Hon. R. J. Ritchie, magistrate of the united cities of St. John and Portland. Hon. Mr. Pugsley was re-elected by the people of Kings county in 1890 and he held the office of Solicitor-General until 1892 when he resigned to give that attention to his law practice that it demanded.
