## Arts Department.

The work of Morrin College is carried on by means of daily recitations to the professors. At the close of each month, there is an examination on the studies of the month, when the standing of each pupil is marked.

At the close of each term, there is a Review Examination on the whole work of the term, when prizes are given to the successful students. The prizes consist of Scholarships : *First-class* of \$15, and *Second-class* of \$10 each. To obtain a Scholarship, a student must pase each of the three examinations of the term in *six* subjects. The aggregate of the marks thus obtained will be divided by *six*, and a First-class Scholarship be given if the average be 85 per cent. or over, and a Second-class one, if the average be 70 per cent. or over.

Students attending Morrin College, purposing to graduate, have, in addition to attendance on the regular classes, to undergo three important examinations : the *Matriculation*, at Entrance; the *Intermediate*, at the close of their second year's course; and the *Final*, or Degree, at the close of their fourth year.

The following are the subjects of study for the session 1885-86 :---

## For Matriculation.

In Classics.—Latin.—Latin Grammar; Cicero, Orations I. and II. against Catiline; or Virgil, Æneid, Book I.

> Greek.—Greek Grammar; Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I.; or, Homer, Illiad, Book I.

In Mathematics.—Arithmetic, Algebra, to Simple Equations, inclusive; Euclid's Elements, Books I., II., III.

In English.—Writing from Dictation. A paper on English Grammar, including Analysis. A paper on the leading events of English History.

2. Candidates not matriculated in the College, or Partial Students of the First Year, may be admitted to the standing of students of the Second Year, provided that they pass the Sessional Examinations of the First Year, or an examination in the following subjects at the beginning of the Second Year :--

Greek.-Grammar and Prose Composition ; Homer, Book VI ; Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I.

[An equivalent amount of other books or other authors in Latin or Greek than those named above, may be accepted by the Examiners, for entrance into the Second Year.]

Euclid.—Books I., II., III., IV., VI., with defs. of Book V, (Omitting Propositions 27, 28, 29, of Book VI.)
Algebra.—To end of Quadraticequations. (Colenso's Alg.)
Trigonometry —Galbraith and Haughton's Trigonometry, Chaps. 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, to beginning of numerical solution of Plane triangles.

Arithmetic.—Elementary rules, Proportion, Interest, Discount, &c., Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, Square Root.

In English Literature.—Writing from Dictation, English Grammar, including Analysis, English Composition, British History (Collier.)

In French.—De Fivas, Grammaire des Grammaires; or (instead of French) German—in which, knowledge sufficient to enable the Candidate to join the regular class, will be required.

# Theological Department.

#### REGULATIONS.

1. Students who desire to enter the Theological Department of Morrin College, with the view of studying for the Ministry, must forward to the Registrar on or before November 1st of each year:

> 1. A Presbyterial certificate of church membership and of recommendation to the Senate for Admission.

> 2. Evidence that they are graduates of some University recognized as such, by the Presbyterian Church in Canada, or that they have completed their attendance on the first three years' course of study in such University, or in Morrin College.

II. Divinity Students who have attended other Theological Seminaries will, on presenting Presbyterial certificates of standing and recommendation, be admitted *ad eundem*.

III. The Course of Study throughout, is that recommended by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Degrees in Divinity.

By an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, Morrin College has been authorized to grant Degrees in Divinity.

The Degree of D.D. is conferred *causa honoris*; that of B.D. as the result of examination on prescribed subjects.

The following are the regulations under which at present the B.D. can be obtained :

1. The Candidate must be a Graduate in Arts of some University recognized by the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

2. He must have taken the full Theological Course prescribed by the Canada Presbyterian Church for her Ministers.

3. One year at least must intervene between the completion of his Theological Course and the conferring of the Degree.

4. The subjects are arranged in a two years' course, the first of which may be taken during the last year of attendance on the ordinary Theological Course, while the examination for the second cannot take place for twelve months later.

## Special Intimation.

The NEIL STEWART PRIZE of \$20, given by McGill University, is open to all Graduates or Undergraduates of Morrin College, who may be students of Theology, under the following regulations:—

1. The prize will not be given for less than a thorough examination in Hebrew Grammar passed in the First Class, in reading and translating the Pentateuch and such poetic portions of the Scriptnre as may be determined.

2. In case competitors should fail to attain the above standard the prize will be withheld, and a prize of Forty Dollars will be offered in the following year for the same.

[Course for the present year :--Hebrew Grammar (Gesenius); Translation and analysis of the first ten chapters of Genesis; the Prophet Habbakuk (the whole book); and the first five Psalms.

3. There will be two Examinations of three hours each; one in Grammar and the other in Translation and Analysis.

# Students' Missionary Society

Has for its object, Mission work, mainly within the bounds of the Presbytery of Quebec. This is carried on by the Theological Students in winter time—so far as their College duties allow, and in summer time, constantly, supplying with the means of grace needy localities in in the neighborhood of Quebec.

Morrin College offers special advantages to young men in the Province of Quebec, who may seek Collegiate education. Being affiliated to McGill University, Montreal, attendance at its classes ranks as equal to attendance at Montreal, and as the course of study pursued in either Institution is identical, a Student may, at any time, if he desire it, pass from one College to the other without loss, while at the completion of his course in Morrin, he can obtain his Degree in Arts from the University. By the Will of the Founder, the Governors must belong to the Presbyterian Church, but in all other respects this College is undenominational. Its educational advantages and Arts scholarships are open to Students of any religious persuasion.

Quebec is a singularly healthy city, while the grandeur of its situation, the quaintness of the old French town, and the historic importance of many of the events connected with it, invest it with an interest far beyond that pertaining to any other city on the continent. Protestant churches of all communions are numerous, while the social advantages open to the Morrin College Students are very many.
