your despatch No. 61 , of the 29 d of November, 1837, on the sulject of the questions controverted between that Body and the Ilouse of Assembily, during the
last Sessizu, aud I have received Her last Sessitu, and I have received Her
Majesty's conmands to return the followMajesty's co
ing answer.
The Queen deeply regrets the inconvenience to which Her faithful subjeets in Newfoundland will be exposed by the loss of the bill of supply for the current
year, and regards wihh lively concern the year, and regards wiit liyely concern the
jealousies between the two branches of the Local Legislature which led to that unfortanate result. The Queen, however, indulges the hope that Her meoiiation will be accepted by both the parties co this discussion, and that it will be el
fectual for re-establishing a good understanding between them, especially as their conflicting claims appear to originate rather in a mutual misapprehension than in any deeper and more settled
cause. The constitution of the Legislature of Newfoundland is avowedly modelled on that of the Imperial Legislature, - with regard to money grants however, a distinction prevails. In the Honse of Com-
mons no grant of money can be initiated except oy the Crown. This rule practically does not exist in the House of Assembly, nor indeed in the Houses o Assembly of the British Provinces on the Continent of North America. In the lotter a substitute has been devised, not
less effectual in its operatior, and more less eliectual in its operatior, and more
consonant with the general spirit of the Provincial constitution. It consists in the practice of either granting the sup-
plies for the year by a series of bills, each of whech is in turn sent up to the Council for acceptance, or in granting the supplies by separate Resolutions, in each of which succeessively the concur-
rence of the Council is ohtained before is included in the general appropriation act. In this respect the Assemblieg are sul.ject to a restriction from which the House of Commons is exempt-a restriction which has still in view the same object, that of affording to the people
security against the misuse of that high securty against the misute commits to
