LOWER FREIGHT RATES.

U. S. Interstate Commerce Commission Orders Reductions in Territory Between Denver and Pacific

Washington, D. C. July 25 .- In what are known as the Spokane-Reno-Pacific coast cases, the Interstate commerce commission yesterday ordered material reductions in freight rates from the east to points between Denver and the western terminals of the transcontinental railroads, For many years the railroads have

exacted from shippers to intermediate points such as Spokane and Reno

The commissioners recognize lays down what it considers would be fair and just rates to various freight zones in the west, and gives the rail-roads until October 15 to adjust their ariffs accordingly. The commission also lave down the important principle that hereafter railroads will not be permitted to fix arbitrary market limits, and that hereafter commercial conditions rather than the will of railway and traffic managers shall control rates on transcontinental trans-

The decisions are of far-reaching importance. They affect directly all freight rates between the Atlantic ocean and the Pacific coast. Particularly they affect the rates in the territory lying between Denver and Pacific coast points. Hereafter the rates paid by shippers will be governed by a short haul clause.




