HISTORICAL SKETCH.

The movement which ended in the establishment of the University of Toronto as the centre of the educational system of the Province of Ontario, is as old as the Province itself, and originated in the mind of General Simcoe, its first Governor. Simcoe, who was himself an old student of Merton, the most ancient of Oxford Colleges, repeatedly expressed his conviction, both before his departure from England, and also during his term of office, that the best interests alike of the Government and of the inhabitants called for the establishment of a University in Upper Canada. It was not, however, during his administration that the project thus for the first time formulated took practical shape.

In the year 1797, the initial step in the path of higher education in Upper Canada was taken, when the home Government gave authority to the acting Lieutenant-Governor, the Hon. Peter Russell, to set apart for educational purposes five hundred thousand acres of the waste lands of the Crown; one-half to be applied to the establishment of a University. But the actual foundation of the University was not rendered possible until nearly thirty years later; when permission was obtained to exchange a portion of these unproductive lands for other lands still vested in the Crown, which had begun to acquire value from settlement under lease. In consequence of this exchange, a revenue was created; and in 1827 a Royal Charter was granted for

establishing at or near the town of York a college, "with the style and privilege of a University," to be called King's College.

But further delay ensued, owing to the attitude towards educational matters of the next Lieutenant-Governor, Sir John Colbourne. Under his influence the Royal Grammar School, then in existence at the capital, was transformed into Upper Canada College; in the belief that the educational necessities of the Province would be sufficiently provided for by such an institution. For twelve years, accordingly, a portion of University work proper was carried on in conjunction with ordinary school training by the Upper Canada College. After several changes in the administration of the Province, a Lieutenant-Governor of more advanced ideas in the matter of higher education, Sir Charles Bagot, concurred in the view that the long expected college should be erected; and on the 23rd of April, 1842, the foundation stone of King's College was laid by Sir Charles Bagot himself, in the Queen's Park, on the site occupied by the Parliament buildings now in process of erection.

Until the new buildings should be ready for occupation, the old Parliament house, vacated by the removal of the seat of government under the Union Act of 1840, was appropriated for the carrying on of lectures and other University functions. Faculties of Arts, Medicine, and Divinity, were established; and in 1843, the first matriculation of students took place, and inaugural addresses and lectures were delivered on June 8th and 9th of that year. A portion of the projected buildings in the Queen's Park was soon ready for occupation,—the only portion ever completed on that site; and thither the professors and students were transferred. A separate school for the medical faculty was

erected further to the west. This building known in recent times as "Moss Hall" has, in its turn, been removed and the site appropriated for the building of the Biological Department and Museum.

In 1849 an important modification of the existing state of things was effected by an Act of the Legislature of Canada. In accordance with this Act the faculty of divinity was abolished and the name changed from King's College to that of the University of Toronto. The University underwent a further transformation by Act of Parliament in 1853, when the medical faculty was abolished, and University College created. All the professors and other instructors became members of University College, under the government of the College Council; while to the University of Toronto, under the management of the Senate, were assigned the granting of degrees and the conduct of examinations in accordance with the curriculum drawn up by that body, to which the teaching in University College was bound to conform.

The model of the newly organized University was stated to be the University of London. The characteristic features of the University of London, which had then only recently been established, were its limitation to the function of examination, and its freedom from denominational restrictions. The University of Toronto, while retaining the latter characteristic unimpaired, has been enabled, by the subsequent progress of events, to resume what is indeed the main function of a university—the work of teaching.

During these early years many changes of habitation took place. The site of old King's College was appropriated for the erection of legislative buildings, which project, however, suffered a delay of more than thirty years; and the newly created teaching faculty of University College were

given accommodation first in the old Parliament house ; then, when this was required for Parliament on its return to Toronto, the small building formerly provided for the extinct medical faculty became their temporary shelter, until the new University building should be ready for occupation. This building, was begun in 1856, and on October 4th, two years later, was completed, the top stone of the turret of the main tower being then placed in position by Sir Edmund Head, the Governor-General, an old Oxford professor, whose interest in matters of higher education had survived his transference to the sphere of politics, and the value of whose sympathy and support at this critical period in the history of the university cannot be overestimated.

For more than thirty years the constitution of the University and of University College remained substantially unchanged. Other collegiate bodies, principally denominational schools of theology, entered into affiliation with the University ; and in deference to their especial requirements, the course of study in Hebrew and other Oriental languages in University College was augmented and improved ; but the faculty of University College continued to do the work of instruction of almost the entire number of students who presented themselves for examination. The minority was made up of candidates for examinations and degrees in medicine and law. Those in the former faculty were trained by medical schools in affiliation with the University, and in the faculty of law the examinations were based merely upon text-books prescribed by the Senate, and no teaching of any kind was done in connection therewith.

In 1887, both University and College were remodelled by the University Federation Act, under whose provisions the University of Toronto again possesses teaching faculties in Arts, Medicine and Law. As is implied by the title of

the Act, the main object of this legislation was to secure the union of the various denominational universities of Ontario with the provincial university. Since the proclamation of the Act, the University of Victoria College, at Cobourg, representing the Methodist body, has resigned its degree-conferring powers and entered into federation with the University of Toronto. The governing body of this institution is now represented on the Senate of the University of Toronto; and its graduates will soon be called upon to elect representatives to the Senate in the same way as graduates of the University of Toronto. Moreover, the removal of the faculty and students of Victoria University to Toronto may be looked for at no distant date; college buildings are now in process of erection on a site to the north-east of the Queen's park, so that the complete fusion of the two Universities has become a certainty.

Under the Federation Act, the Theological Colleges also, formerly in affiliation with the University of Toronto, have become federating colleges, and enjoy increased representation on the Senate as a consequence of their closer relation to the University.

In consequence of the transference of the professoriate in scientific and historical departments to the University, the Faculty of University College has undergone a change. It is in future to consist of professors and lecturers in Classical languages and literature (including lecturers in Ancient History), in Oriental languages, in English, French and German, and in Moral Philosophy. All other portions of an Arts course are assigned to the Faculty of the University. For the maintenance of certain of the departments of science on the scale demanded by modern methods of research special provision has been made by the erection of new and the enlargement of old buildings. The revived

medical faculty of the University, moreover, is enabled by the recent legislation to ensure to its students, in conjunction with those in the Faculty of Arts, the most effective practical training in Physiology, and General Biology, in the new building of the Biological Department.

Since the passage of the Federation Act, also, a teaching Faculty of Law has been created in the University, consisting of three professors and several honorary lecturers.

The expansion of the University has not been limited to the time-honoured Faculties of Arts, Medicine, and Law. In 1888 a stimulus was given to the study of scientific methods of farming by the affiliation of the Ontario Agricultural College, and the adoption of a curriculum of study for the degree of Bachelor of the Science of Agriculture. Similarly an examination for the degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery has been instituted, as a consequence of the affiliation of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario. The last member of the University system is the Toronto College of Music a curriculum of study has been prepared for the Degree of Bachelor of Music.

Some external modifications must be noticed. In 1881 the Government established a School of Practical Science, and a building was erected on University property to the south of the University building. By arrangement with the Minister of Education, the Professors of Chemistry, Biology and Mineralogy and Geology were accommodated in this building, and a temporary relief to the over-crowded state of the University building was thus afforded. In 1888, however, a building for the department of Biology was erected on the site of the old medical faculty building, and to this has since been added a wing for the accommodation of the Natural History Museum.

On February 14th, 1890, the main University building was partly destroyed by fire. The plans for its restoration have provided for larger class-rooms and better facilities for teaching; and the work of reconstruction is now in progress. A separate building for library and reading-rooms will be erected as soon as possible. Plans have already been approved, and the funds provided by subscription. New buildings for the departments of chemistry and mineralogy are to be begun without unnecessary delay, the accommodation hitherto allowed them in the School of Practical Science having become inadequate.

Finally the erection of a Gymnasium and Students' Union has been sanctioned by the legislature, and this will complete the additional buildings at present required by the University for the necessities of its professors and students.

PRESENT ORGANIZATION.

In treating of the constitution of the University and University College under the latest of the legislative enactments which have modified the original Royal Charter, it will be convenient to take up separately the various bodies that share the legal responsibility for the management of the finances of the University and for its internal administration. These are the Crown, the Board of Trustees, the Senate, Convocation, the University Council, and the Council of University College.

I. THE CROWN.

The supreme authority in all matters continues to be the Crown, from whom emanated the Charter that created the University, and by whose bounty the lands destined to support the University were originally provided. Section 4 of the University Federation Act (R. S. O. 1887, c. 130), states this general authority:

"The Lieutenant-Governor shall be the Visitor of the University on behalf of the Crown, and his visitorial powers may be exercised by commission under the Great Seal; and the proceedings of any commission, having been first confirmed by the Lieutenant-Governor, shall be binding on the University and its members, and on all persons whomsoever." A similar section (69) applies to University College.

A more tangible mark of the supremacy of the Crown is supplied by section 5, where it is stated that "the president, professors, lecturers, teachers, officers and servants of the University shall be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor, and shall hold office during his pleasure." As in the pre-

ceding instance, a similar section (78) makes a like provision in the case of University College.

In the way of direct supervision of the internal management, it is enacted by section 40 that all statutes of the Senate must be approved by the Visitor before they have any binding force whatever; and, as before, a later section (75) imposes the same restriction in the case of statutes of the University College Council.

In another sphere also, the Crown is supreme, viz., in the management of the finances. All the property of the University is vested in the Crown in trust for the purposes of the University and University College, and is to be "managed and administered under the orders of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, by an officer to be appointed by commission under the Great Seal of this Province, to hold office during pleasure, and to be called the bursar." (R. S. O. 1887, c. 231, s. 7).

II. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The last section quoted naturally leads to consideration of the second important factor in University administration, the Board of Trustees. By Order-in-Council, dated 16th May, 1878, a Board of Management was created, with general powers as to the management and disposition of the University endowment. The original number of members of the Board was five, viz., the Vice-Chancellor and two members of the Senate elected by that body, the President of University College, and one representative chosen by, but not necessarily a member of, the College Council.

Subsequently the representation from the Senate was increased and the Chancellor constituted an *ex-officio* member. In 1884 an Order-in-Council was passed, by which the name was changed to "Board of Trustees," and

the membership constituted as follows: The Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, and the President of University College, *ex-officio*; five members elected by, but not necessarily members of, the Senate of the University; and two members elected by, but not necessarily members of, the Council of University College. The functions of the Board remain as before.

III. THE SENATE.

The constitution of the Senate as the supreme authority, under the Crown, in the internal management of the University, has varied from time to time. At present, it consists of three classes of members: (1) *ex-officio* members; (2) appointed, and (3) elected members. Among the former are the Minister of Education, the present and past Chancellors and Vice-Chancellors, and the President or other head of University College, and of each federating University or College. Members are appointed by the Councils of the University and University College, the Law Society of Upper Canada, and by the governing body of each federating or affiliated College or School, subject to certain restrictions in the case of affiliated institutions. The Crown has also the power to appoint nine members of the Senate. The elected members of the Senate are representatives of the graduates in Arts, Medicine, and Law of the University of Toronto and any federating University, and of the High School teachers of the Province. They number at present twenty out of a total of fifty-six members of Senate. The body thus composed is subject to change once in three years, when all except the *ex-officio* members must retire, being eligible, however, for reappointment or re-election.

The function of the Senate is the general administration of the University. Section 39 of the Federation Act gives it power to make statutes in reference to various particular

matters, and "in general for promoting the purposes of the University, and touching all other matters whatsoever regarding the same or the business thereof; or for any purpose for which provision may be required for carrying out this Act according to its intent and spirit, in any case not herein provided for."

With regard to the Chancellor and Vice-Chancellor, although in function the latter is merely the deputy of the former, their election proceeds from totally different bodies. The Chancellor is the representative of the whole body of graduates, while the Vice-Chancellor is the Chairman of the Senate, elected from actual members of the Senate on occasion of its inaugural meeting after a triennial election, and ceasing to hold office when the Senate by whom he was elected is dissolved.

IV. CONVOCATION.

Convocation consists of the whole body of graduates of the University, in all faculties. Except indirectly, no part of the management of the University can be exercised by it as a whole. It elects the Chancellor, and, in divisions according to faculty, it elects members of Senate as its representatives in Arts, Medicine, and Law. Any question relating to University affairs, may be discussed by it and a vote taken, but the result of such discussion is only communicated to the Senate for action to be taken thereon.

V. THE UNIVERSITY COUNCIL.

This body is composed of a President, who shall also be President of University College, and the professors in the University. Its functions are to maintain discipline among the students in connection with the instruction carried on in the University, and to exercise authority over the servants of the University.

VI. THE COUNCIL OF UNIVERSITY COLLEGE.

Like the University Council, the Council of University College has control over students of University College, and authority over the servants. It consists of the President and professors in the College, together with the Dean of Residence. It has larger duties and powers, however, than the University Council, being constituted a corporation with a common seal, and power to hold property, and to sue and be sued as a corporation.

The first lecturer under this arrangement in Italian and Spanish was Dr. Forneri. He was succeeded in 1868 by W. G. Falconbridge, M.A., who held the position for a year, being succeeded by W. Oldright, M.A., M.D. Upon the retirement of the latter in 1883, David R. Keys, B.A., was appointed; he was succeeded in 1887 by the present lecturer.

Fellows.

Fellowships in the subjects given below, of the annual value of \$500 each, are open for appointment each year. The selection is made immediately after the publication of the result of the University Examinations in May, from among graduates of the University.

Each Fellow is appointed annually; but he may be reappointed for a period not exceeding in all three years.

Each Fellow is required to assist in the teaching and practical work of the department; to pursue some special line of study therein; and to devote his entire time during the Terms to the work of the department, under the direction of the Professor or Lecturer. The Fellows are selected with a special view to their aptitude for teaching, along with their acquirements in the work of the department to which each Fellowship is attached. Every Fellow on accepting his appointment comes under an obligation to fulfil the duties of his Fellowship during the Terms of the Academic Year in which he is appointed, unless specially exempted.

Candidates must send in their applications annually to the Registrar, not later than the first day of June.

 WINTER SESSION, 1891-92.

SURGERY.

Professor : W. T. AIKINS, M.D., LL.D.

Inflammation, surgical injuries, including fractures, dislocations, injuries to the soft parts, and gunshot wounds. Amputations, ligations of arteries, surgical diseases, including abscess, ulcers, gangrene, erysipelas, pyæmia, tumours, aneurysms, joint diseases, plastic surgery, hernia, urinary calculus.

The lectures will be illustrated by plates and specimens from the museum and by operations on the cadaver.

 PRINCIPLES OF SURGERY.
Professor : I. H. CAMERON, M.B.

This course will embrace lectures on the principles of surgery especially as applied in antiseptic methods, and a series of class recitations.

CLINICAL SURGERY.

Professors : { L. MCFARLANE, M.D.
I. H. CAMERON, M.B.

This course will be given in the Toronto General Hospital, and will embrace demonstrations of minor surgery in the outdoor department, regular clinical lectures, and bedside instruction. The outdoor clinics and the regular clinical lectures will be given in the large theatre, and the bedside teaching will be given in the wards. Special attention will be paid to clinical instruction at the bedside, and wounds, fractures, etc., will be treated as far as possible in the presence of the classes, the surgical dressers being expected to do a large portion of the work in applying suitable dressings, reducing fractures, etc.

THEORY AND PRACTICE OF MEDICINE.

Professor : H. H. WRIGHT, M.D.

This course will be divided into two parts.

The first part consisting of etiology, nosology, symptomatology, pathology, prophylaxis, prognosis, and treatment.

Second part—1st, general diseases; 2nd, local diseases.

Special attention will be paid to those diseases which are most frequently met with in Canada.

The lectures will be illustrated by plates and morbid specimens from the museum.

NERVOUS DISEASES AND DERMATOLOGY.

Professor : J. E. GRAHAM, M.D.

In alternate years, sets of lectures will be delivered on the subjects of nervous diseases and skin diseases. In the session of 1891-92, the subject treated will be nervous diseases.

CLINICAL MEDICINE.

Professor : J. E. GRAHAM, M.D.

The course of instruction in Clinical Medicine will be thorough and systematic. The students will be encouraged to examine carefully all classes of patients both in the out-door department and in the general wards. Demonstrations of all modern appliances in diagnosis and treatment will be given. Out-patients will be treated from 1.30 to 2.30 p.m. Regular clinical lectures will be held in the large theatre from 2.30 to 3.30 p.m., and limited classes will be taken through the wards at 3.30 p.m.

GYNÆCOLOGY.

Professor : UZZIEL OGDEN, M.D.

The lectures on this subject will include descriptions of all the diseases peculiar to women, methods of diagnosis and treatment. Instruments will be presented, and the modes of using them will be demonstrated. The clinical instruction given in the hospital on both in and out-patients will supplement the didactic course.

OBSTETRICS.

Professor : ADAM WRIGHT, B.A., M.D.

This course will consist of lectures and recitations on the science and art of obstetrics. It will be illustrated by diagrams and operations on the phantom. Special attention will be paid to the emergencies of obstetric practice.

PHARMACOLOGY AND THERAPEUTICS.

Lecturer: JAS. M. MACCALLUM, M.D.

This course will deal especially with the physiological actions of medicinal agents and their application to disease. The officinal drugs of the British Pharmacopœia, and other new remedies, will be discussed, and their effects on diseased conditions of the body will be explained.

MEDICAL JURISPRUDENCE AND TOXICOLOGY.

Professor: W. W. OGDEN, M.D.

Human development and decay; personal identity; marriage and divorce; pregnancy; delivery; rape; infanticide; hanging; drowning; etc., etc.

Toxicology.—Under the latter, poisons are grouped according to their effects, the general symptoms of various groups or classes, with general treatment.

SANITARY SCIENCE.

Professor: W. OLDRIGHT, M.A., M.D.

In the course of lectures the wants of intending practitioners will be kept especially in view.

In addition to theoretical teaching practical demonstrations will be given by means of various apparatus and instruments.

The following subjects will be embraced in the course: Air, heating, sewage, hygienic architecture, contagion and infection, climatology, clothing, baths, water, foods, sanitary legislation.

UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO

MENTAL DISEASES.

Professor: DANIEL CLARK, M.D.

(Medical Superintendent of the Asylum for Insane).

A course of eighteen lectures, mostly clinical, will be delivered at the asylum. It will consist of instructions in the various forms of insanity, the treatment of the insane, and the pathology of the disease. The normal condition of mind, in contra-distinction to mental alienation will form a prominent part of the course.

OPHTHALMIC AND AURAL SURGERY.

Professor: R. A. REEVE, B.A., M.D.

Lecturer: G. H. BURNHAM, M.D.

A course of practical lectures will be given on diseases of the eye and ear, illustrated by cases at the Toronto General Hospital.

LARYNGOLOGY AND RHINOLOGY.

Instructor: GEORGE R. McDONAGH, M.D.

A course of practical instruction in diseases of the throat and nose, and the use of the Laryngoscope, will be given, illustrated by cases.

PATHOLOGY.

Lecturer and Demonstrator: JOHN CAVEN, B.A., M.D.

This course will embrace lectures on general and special pathology, surgical and medical: together with demonstrations in both gross morbid anatomy, and pathological

TOPOGRAPHICAL ANATOMY.

Lecturer : A. PRIMROSE, M.B.

The course will consist of a systematic study of the regional anatomy of the human body as applied in medicine and surgery. The lectures will be illustrated by wet and dry preparations; by recent dissections, and by drawings and diagrams. A series of demonstrations of landmarks will be conducted on the living subject.

DESCRIPTIVE AND SURGICAL ANATOMY.

Professors : { J. H. RICHARDSON, M.D.
M. H. AIKINS, B.A., M.D.

A complete course on descriptive and surgical anatomy will be given.

All the various structures entering into the composition of the human frame will be exhibited and described, the lectures being illustrated by freshly dissected specimens, dried and wet preparations, wax models and diagrams.

DEPARTMENT OF BIOLOGY AND PHYSIOLOGY.

Professor : R. RAMSAY WRIGHT, M.A., B.Sc.

Lecturer : A. B. MACALLUM, B.A., M.B., PH.D.

Fellow : E. C. JEFFREY, B.A.

Demonstrator : THOS. MACKENZIE, B.A., M.B.

There will be two separate courses in physiology, one for students of the First year, which will aim at imparting a

thorough knowledge of the elements of physiology, and a more advanced course for Second year students, in which special attention will be given to the relations of physiology to medicine.

In the Second year practical course on normal histology, each student will be instructed in the methods of preparing and mounting histological specimens and will have the opportunity of providing himself with a set of over fifty typical preparations of histology and embryology.

A course of lectures on the elements of biology including botany, will be held for students of the First year during both terms. A practical class for instruction in the use of the microscope, etc., will be arranged for in connection with this class and the class in elementary physiology.

CHEMISTRY.

Professor: W. H. PIKE, M.A., PH.D.

Two courses of lectures on chemistry, organic and inorganic, the former for students of the Second year, the latter for students of the First year.

MEDICAL CHEMISTRY.

Professor: W. H. ELLIS, M.A., M.B.

This course is designed to familiarize the student with the methods of chemical analysis as applied to medical science. The course comprises both lectures and laboratory practice, chiefly the latter, and embraces the examinations of the chemical substances met with in the Pharmacopoeia; quantitative and qualitative analysis of water and air; toxicology and the chemical examination of some of the more important constituents of the animal body and of the secretions.

Matriculated students or graduates in the Faculty of Arts, who have attended during the Arts course any course of lectures or of practical instruction of the character and duration required by the curriculum in medicine, may obtain certified tickets for the same from the Registrar of the University on payment of the ordinary fees demanded for students in medicine.

The hospital has now 400 beds, and during the present year the number of in-patients under treatment vary from 250 to 300. During last year about 3000 patients were admitted, and large numbers of patients received daily treatment in the outdoor department.

The training school for nurses was established in 1882, and all nurses coming into the hospital are requested to take the regular course of instruction given in the school, and to pass the regular examinations at the end of their first and second years.

All the patients in the hospital are, as a rule, suffering from acute medical and surgical diseases; the chronic cases are generally sent to the Home for Incurables or House of Providence, and the convalescent patients are sent to the new Convalescent Home, recently erected on Wells's Hill.

CLINICAL TEACHING.

Clinical instruction is given in the various departments of the hospital in connection with all classes of patients. The out-patients receive their treatment in the two theatres in the presence of the students. Ordinary medical cases are examined by the attending physicians and some of the students, after which methods of treatment are explained. Surgical cases are examined in the same way. Minor operations are performed and suitable dressings applied. The same plan is carried out in the Andrew Mercer Infirmary in diseases of the eye, ear and throat. Special outdoor clinics are given in diseases of women and diseases of the skin.

Regular clinical lectures are given daily over patients brought from the wards to the large theatre by the Professors of clinical medicine and clinical surgery to the students of the third and fourth years.

A systematic course of bedside instruction is given to limited classes of students, several such classes being taken through the wards every day from Mondays to Fridays inclusive. Smaller classes of students receive gynæcological demonstrations on two days of each week. In the Burnside Lying-in-Hospital, in which there are over 200 births a year, students are also allowed to witness and assist in the conduct of labours. Students are also allowed to make engagements with out-patients and attend them in confinements at their own homes.

Surgical operations are performed in the large theatre on Saturday afternoons, or in cases of emergency at any time during day or night when required. This theatre, which has been recently altered and enlarged, is capable of seating 500 students, and in the completeness of its arrangements is not excelled on this continent. The facilities afforded the students situated in all parts of the room for witnessing operations in all their details are unusually good.

CLINICAL CLERKS AND SURGICAL DRESSERS.

Clinical clerks and surgical dressers are appointed to act for limited periods. They are required to take complete histories of cases allotted to them, and receive certificates for the same as required by the Ontario Medical Council. Post-mortem clerks are appointed, and are required to make complete reports of all autopsies made in the post-mortem room, which is situated in the hospital grounds. Clinical clerks and surgical dressers are also appointed in the departments of gynæcology, and ophthalmology, and otology.

RESIDENT ASSISTANTS IN THE HOSPITAL.

Six assistants are appointed annually, and hold their positions for one year. They will be selected from the graduates every spring. They will spend two months each in the surgical wards, medical wards, Burnside, and eye and ear department, gynæcological and extern departments, wards for infectious diseases, and the dispensary and post-mortem room.

REGULATIONS RELATING

TO THE

EXAMINATIONS AND GRANTING OF DEGREES.

DEGREE OF M.B.

There are two ordinary modes of proceeding to the Degree of M.B., viz., (1) by taking a Pass Course; or (2) by taking an Honor Course.

ENTRANCE.

Candidates for a Degree must pass the Matriculation examination, unless (1) they possess a degree in Arts not being an Honorary Degree, from any Dominion or British University; or (2) have already matriculated in the Faculty of Arts or in the Faculty of Law in this University; or (3) have passed an examination entitling them to be registered as Matriculants in the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario.

Before presenting themselves for examination, candidates must produce satisfactory certificates of good conduct, and of having completed the sixteenth year of their age.

The ordinary annual Matriculation examinations (both pass and honor) will commence in the beginning of July.

Supplemental examinations for Matriculation will be held in the latter part of September, at which those who were rejected at the July examinations, as well as new candidates, may offer themselves; but no honors or scholarships will be awarded at such Supplemental examinations.

The fee for Matriculation is five dollars, and must be paid when the application for the examination is made, according to the regulations issued by the Education Department, under whose superintendence this examination is now conducted. The fee for registration of exemption from the Matriculation examination is five dollars.

Candidates may delay presenting themselves for the Matriculation examination until any time before the Final examination for the degree of M.B. ; but no candidate will be allowed to compete for relative standing, prizes, or scholarships, until he has passed the Matriculation examination.

Candidates intending to compete for scholarships are required to notify the Registrar of the University to that effect before June 15th, in addition to the application required to be made as above stated to the Education Department.

No fee will be charged for transferring from the Faculty of Arts to that of Medicine.

For subjects of examination at Junior Matriculation, pass and honor, see Appendix, p. 49.

REGULATIONS RELATING TO UNDERGRADUATES.

Undergraduates are required to attend lectures, and receive practical instruction during each of four years, at any of the schools of Medicine recognized for this purpose by the University. The certificates of attendance upon lectures must mention the precise number of lectures given in each course, and must certify the attendance of the candidates at two-thirds of these at least. The certificates of practical instruction must certify that the candidate has diligently pursued the studies in question for the whole of the time required, and these must be signed by the teachers in the immediate charge of the laboratories where the instruction was obtained.

Each undergraduate, at the end of each of the four years of his course is required to present himself at the annual examination of that particular year, except in the case of those who elect to take Primary and Final examinations ; and those so electing will not be allowed to compete for honours or scholarships.

The annual examinations are styled the First, Second, Third and Fourth examinations, and are to be passed in separate years in the order named. But candidates may, under special circumstances, be allowed to present themselves at the examination for M.B., or at any of the intermediate examinations, without having passed the preceding examination or examinations in the University.

Undergraduates below the standing of the Fourth year, who have been rejected or who have been prevented from attending the an-

annual examinations by sickness, domestic affliction or other causes beyond their control, may present themselves for examination in September at the supplemental examinations. Candidates of any year, who have passed a creditable examination in the majority of the subjects required, may present themselves at the supplemental examinations next ensuing, in the subjects in which they failed, and upon passing at such examinations shall be allowed their year. Candidates who failed to attend at the annual examinations must prove to the satisfaction of the Vice-Chancellor before presenting themselves in September, the existence and sufficiency of the alleged cause of absence. Candidates who were rejected must pay a fee of ten dollars, and those who did not attend, a fee of five dollars, before offering themselves for the supplemental examination.

Graduates in Arts of the University may enter at the Second examination, but will be required to take such subjects of the First examination as they have not taken in their Arts course, though in these subjects they shall not be required to take an honor standing. (For list of equivalent examinations see page 37).

Undergraduates who elect to take the Primary and Final examinations, may take the Primary at the end of the second or third year, and the Final at the end of the fourth year of their course. Graduates in Arts who elect to take the Primary and Final examinations may take the Primary at the end of the second year, and the Final at the end of the third year of their course.

No candidate will be allowed to pass any of the examinations who has not obtained at least one-half of the marks allotted to such examination. Nor will a candidate be considered as having passed in any individual subject who has not obtained at least one-third of the marks allotted to such subject.

The fee for each examination is five dollars, payable when the candidate notifies the Registrar of his intention to present himself

Notice will be given annually, in January, of the days on which the examinations for the year will commence. Every undergraduate who proposes to present himself at an examination must send in to the Registrar a statement (according to a printed form which will be furnished) of the course he is taking, whether past or honor, and such other particulars as the printed form may indicate, together with the original certificates referred to in this statement.

ANNUAL EXAMINATIONS.

Candidates taking honors will be entitled to first class honors if they obtain seventy-five per cent. of the aggregate marks allotted to such examinations. Those who obtain sixty per cent. of the aggregate marks will be entitled to second class honors.

Extra papers on all pass subjects will be set for honor candidates. Candidates who proceed to the degree of M.B., by taking the honor course will be grouped in two classes according to their success in the honor examinations. Only those candidates will receive their degrees with first class honors who have obtained first class honors in the Second, Third and Fourth examinations.

Undergraduates who have taken the First and Second examinations may transfer to the Primary and Final course, the First and Second examinations being considered equivalent to the Primary.

In addition to the mode heretofore provided whereby candidates may proceed to the degree of M.B., candidates may, under special circumstances, and on the recommendation of the committee on the Faculty of Medicine, be allowed to present themselves for examination for such degree or at any intermediate examination.

The committee shall have power to allow any applicant desirous of presenting himself for any of the examinations in the Faculty of Medicine (except the Final examination), any examination which he may have passed in any other University or School of Medicine, upon production of proper certificates showing his standing in such University or School of Medicine.

No undergraduate in the honor course, who shall have degraded into a lower year, shall be permitted, at the next ensuing examination, to compete for medals, scholarships, or relative standing, except by special permission of the Senate, to be granted only in case of illness, or for other grave reasons.

DEGREE OF M.D.

The following are requisites for admission to the degree of M.D., viz. :—Having been admitted to the degree of M.B., being of one year's standing from admission to the degree of M.B. and having composed an approved thesis upon some medical subject.

The writing of a thesis shall not be required of any candidate for the degree of M.D., provided that he shall have been engaged in the practice of Medicine for a period of three years; and any time spent in the post-graduate course at any British, foreign, or Canadian university shall be regarded as equivalent to time spent in the practice of Medicine.

DEGREES "AD EUNDEM."

A graduate of any of the universities in Great Britain or Ireland, if his degree be not an honorary one, may be admitted to the like degree in the University of Toronto. He must send in his certificate to the Registrar at least two weeks before the first meeting of the session of the Senate at which this application is to be brought forward. A graduate in Medicine of any university in Canada, residing in Canada, if his degree be not an honorary one, may be admitted to a like degree in the University of Toronto, if he have taken such a post-graduate or other course after receiving his degree as the Senate shall approve of, or have been engaged in active practice, for a period of not less than ten years.

Every student taking a scholarship is required to sign a declaration that it is his intention to pursue his medical studies for one, two, three, or four years, according to the year in which he has taken such scholarship, and to proceed to a degree in the University of Toronto, and that he is not an undergraduate or graduate in the Faculty of Medicine of any other university.

No scholarship will be awarded to any candidate who has not obtained first class honors in the examination for which it is conferred.

Each scholarship is tenable for one year only, but a scholar of one year is eligible for the scholarship of a succeeding year.

The scholarships or medals are not open to those who are at the same time undergraduates or graduates in Medicine of another university.

MEDALS, PRIZES, AND CERTIFICATES OF HONOR.

A gold medal and three silver medals are offered annually for competition among those students of the Medical Faculty who have succeeded in obtaining the degree of M.B., with honors, and will be awarded on the recommendation of the examiners.

Certificates of Honor will be given those students, who, at any of the examinations, have been placed in the first or second class in Honors in any Department. The fee for such certificate is one dollar.

STARR MEDALS.

The late Richard Noble Starr, M.D., devised certain property for the encouragement of the study of the subjects of Anatomy, Physiology, and Pathology. In fulfilment of this object, the Senate have established one gold and two silver medals, called the "Starr medals." These medals are awarded annually and are conferred upon the three Bachelors of Medicine who have attained, in the course of their annual professional examinations, the highest marks in the above subjects; the relative rank of each candidate being determined by the aggregate number of his marks in all his examinations, written and practical, pertaining to these, viz. :-

The examinations in Anatomy for the First and Second years, and in Surgical Anatomy of the Third year.

The examinations in Physiology, Histology, Physiological Chemistry, and Practical Physiology of the Second year.

The examination in General Pathology and in Morbid Anatomy and Histology of the Third year.

Every recipient of the medal must have attained the standing of First-class in each of the above-mentioned subjects, and must have been classed in honors in the Fourth examination.

In awarding the medals and scholarships, the comparative value of the several subjects is to be estimated according to the following schedule :

University College.

As explained in the historical introduction, p. 9, University College was created by an Act passed in 1853, by which the determination of all requirements for degrees, appointing examiners, and conferring degrees, was assigned to the University; while the Faculty, embracing all the professors, lecturers, and tutors, in Arts and Science, was constituted a College for instruction in accordance with the requirements of the University, under the name of University College, Toronto.

By the University Federation Act, of 1887, the University functions of instruction have been revived in most branches of study in the Faculty of Arts, and in the Faculties of Law and Medicine; and the professors and lecturers in Arts and Science have, with a few exceptions, been re-organized into a teaching Faculty in the University.

The subjects of Greek and Latin, (with Ancient History), French, German, Oriental Languages, and Moral Philosophy, have been excepted from those assigned to the University Faculty; and the professors, lecturers, and other instructors in these subjects constitute the Faculty of University College.

GREEK.

Professor : MAURICE HUTTON, M.A., Professor of Comparative Philology in the University, formerly Fellow of Merton College, Oxford. (Appointed 1887, previously Professor of Classical Literature).

Lecturer in Greek and Greek History : H. RUSHTON FAIRCLOUGH, M.A., formerly Fellow of the Johns Hopkins University (appointed 1887).

LATIN.

Lecturer in Latin and Roman History : WILLIAM DALE, M.A. (appointed 1887, previously Lecturer in Classical Literature).

The first professor in the above subjects was the Rev. J. McCaul, LL.D., who occupied the Chair of Classical Literature, Logic and Rhetoric, from 1843 till his retirement in 1880, when he was succeeded by the present professor of Greek.

ENGLISH.

Professor : W. J. ALEXANDER, B.A., Ph.D., formerly Professor in Dalhousie College, and sometime Fellow of the Johns Hopkins University (appointed 1889).

Lecturer : DAVID R. KEYS, M.A. (appointed 1883).

The first professor was the present professor of History and Ethnology, Sir Daniel Wilson, who was appointed in 1853 to the Chair of History and English Literature. In 1884, the subject of English was separated from that of History, and a lectureship therein established to which Mr. Keys was appointed, he having been Lecturer in History and English combined since 1883. In 1889 a professorship in English was created and Professor Alexander appointed.

GERMAN.

Lecturer : W. H. VANDERSMISSEN, M.A. (appointed 1866).

FRENCH.

Lecturer : JOHN SQUAIR, B.A. (appointed 1884).

In 1863 James Forneri, LL.D., was appointed professor in Modern Languages, including French, German, Italian and Spanish. In 1866 this Chair was abolished and separate lectureships in each of the above subjects of French and German were established. Mr. vanderSmussen was appointed Lecturer in German, which position he still holds, and M. Emile Pernet occupied a similar position with regard to French, until his resignation in 1884.

ORIENTAL LITERATURE.

Professor: J. F. McCURDY, Ph.D. (appointed Lecturer in 1886, Professor in 1889).

The first lecturer in Oriental Literature was Mr. J. M. Hirschfelder, who was appointed in 1843 and retired in 1889.

ETHICS.

Professor: JAMES GIBSON HUME, M.A., Ph.D., Professor of the History of Philosophy in the University, formerly Fellow in Harvard College (appointed 1889).

Until the appointment of the present professor, the subject of Ethics was united with the other branches of Philosophy in a single professorship, the first incumbent of which was Rev. James Beaven, D.D., appointed 1843, died 1871. Rev. George Paxton Young, M.A., succeeded him and died in 1889.

Fellows.

Fellowships in the subjects mentioned below of the value of \$500 each, are open for appointment each year. The selection is made immediately after the publication of the result of the University Examinations in May, from among the graduates of the University of Toronto.

The statute requires that each Fellow shall be appointed annually; but he may be reappointed for a period not exceeding in all three years.

Each Fellow is required to assist in the teaching and practical work of the department; to pursue some special line of study therein; and to devote his entire time during the College Terms to the work of the department, under the direction of the Professor or Lecturer.

The statute provides that "The Fellows shall be appointed from among the graduates of the University of Toronto, on the recommendation of the College Council, and shall be selected with a special view to their aptitude for teaching, along with their acquirements in the work of the department to which each Fellowship is attached." And also that "Every Fellow on accepting his appointment shall come under an obligation to fulfil the duties of his Fel-

lowship during the College Terms of the Academic Year in which he is appointed, unless specially exempted by resolution of the College Council."

Candidates must send in their applications annually to the College Registrar, not later than the first day of June.

SECTION II.

STUDENTS.

1. The regular students include undergraduates of the University, and matriculants, *i.e.*, students who, though they have not passed the prescribed matriculation examinations,* are taking the full undergraduate course.

2. Matriculated students are required to attend the lectures and examinations, on all subjects necessary for students of their respective standings. Certificates of attendance, during one or more academic years, will be given to those matriculated students who have been regular in their attendance on the required lectures, and who have passed the prescribed examinations.

3. Matriculated students are required to reside, during the period of their attendance on lectures, in the College or in houses selected by their parents or guardians, or approved by the President.

4. All interference with the personal liberty of any student, by arresting him, or summoning him to appear before any tribunal of students, or otherwise subjecting him to any indignity or personal violence, is forbidden by the Council. Any student convicted of participation in such proceedings will forfeit the certificate required for admission to the University Examinations; and will render himself liable to expulsion from the University.

5. Non-matriculated students may be admitted to lectures on application to the Professors in the respective departments.

6. Certificates of attendance on lectures in any department during an academic year, may be given to non-matriculated students who have been regular in their attendance, and who have also passed the examinations in such department.

SECTION III.

RESIDENT STUDENTS.

ALFRED BAKER, M.A., *Dean.*

1. The resident students are under the immediate charge of the Dean of the Residence, who is authorized to impose fines for infraction of regulations, insubordination, or disorderly conduct.
2. The authority to suspend is vested in the President, and that to expel in the Council; but at the close of each term the Dean may, with the approval of the President, decline to admit any student into Residence.
3. Each student on entrance shall sign his name in the Dean's book to a declaration that he will conform to the statute and regulations relative to resident students.
4. Graduates, formerly students of the College, may be admitted as residents to any rooms not required by undergraduates; and shall sign a declaration engaging to conform to all statutes and regulations relative to resident graduates.
5. Rooms cannot be vacated without the permission of the President.
6. A register shall be kept of the attendance of the residents at prayers, and also of the hours of passing the gate.
7. Resident students shall wear their caps and gowns during term, both in and outside the College, at the discretion of the Dean.
8. They shall regularly attend morning and evening prayers, unless exempted from so doing in consequence of the objection of their parents or guardians.
9. They shall regularly attend their respective places of worship on Sunday.
10. No student shall be absent from the College after the closing of the gate except by permission of the Dean.
11. No stranger shall be admitted after the closing of the gate, nor remain in the building after 12 o'clock at night.
12. The first morning bell shall be rung at 7 A.M.; second morning bell at 8 A.M.; prayers at 8.05 A.M.; breakfast from 8.15 to 8.55

A.M.; dinner at 2.15 P.M.; first evening bell at 6.30 P.M.; prayers at 6.35 P.M.; tea from 6.45 to 7.30 P.M.; and gate closed at 9.30 P.M.

13. Students may occasionally invite their friends to any meal having previously entered their names in the book kept by the Steward, to whom they shall pay the charge fixed for such meal.

14. The officers of the College and non-resident students can purchase from the Steward tickets for meals.

15. The fee payable by resident students for board and rent of room varies from three and a-half to four dollars per week.

16. All fees of resident students are to be paid in advance, per month.

CIRCULAR OF DEAN OF RESIDENCE.

University College.....

As your son (or *ward*) purposes coming into residence in this College, I beg to inform you that it is the desire of the Council that, where there are no conscientious objections, all the students under their charge should be present in the hall at daily morning and evening prayers, with reading of the Scriptures. It is also their wish that they should regularly attend on Sundays their respective places of worship, and receive such other religious instruction as their parents or guardians may desire. I have to request that you will be so good as to let me know whether you desire your son (or *ward*) to attend such daily prayers in the College, and that you will also mention the Minister under whose charge you wish to place him.

The Council will afford every facility for the carrying-out of your intentions, and with this view, will exercise such control over your son (or *ward*) during his residence, as may be best calculated to effect your wishes. In the event of your not informing me of your desire on the subject, the Council will assume that you have no objection to his being required to attend the daily prayers of the College, and will exercise an oversight as to his attendance on the ministrations of a clergyman of the denomination to which he belongs.

SECTION IV.

FEEES.

Graduates in Arts, who have pursued the undergraduate course in University College, may attend lectures free; but this privilege does not exempt them from laboratory and other special fees.

(a) For regular students in Arts, or for occasional students taking more than three courses of lectures :—

For Academic Year	\$20 00
For Michaelmas Term.....	10 00
For Easter Term.....	14 00

(b) For occasional students taking two or three single courses of lectures..... 11 00

(c) For occasional students taking a single course of lectures 6 00

For each Certificate of Honor 1 00

N. B.—All the above fees are payable in advance to the Registrar, and if not paid during the month of October (or in the case of students attending in Easter term only, during the month of January), an additional fee of \$1 per month will be imposed until the whole amount is paid.

SECTION V.

TERMS.

1. The Academic Year consists of two Terms; the first (*Michaelmas*) extending from October 1st to December 23rd; and the second (*Easter*) from January 2nd to May 31st.

2. The term will not be allowed to students who have been reported to the President by any of the professors as neglecting to attend the required lectures, or who have not conformed to the statutes and regulations of the College; or have been reported to the Council for bad conduct.

UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO

SECTION VI.

EXAMINATIONS.

1. Matriculated students are required to attend all examinations prescribed by the professors and lecturers in their special departments.
2. Prizes and honors are awarded on the recommendation of the professors and lecturers, in accordance with the requirements prescribed by them in their several departments.
3. The examinations for both pass and honors in the University for all students of the Second and Third years, attending lectures in the University and University College will be conducted by the professors, and lecturers, conjointly with associate examiners appointed by the Senate, at the same time as the University examinations for the First and Fourth years.
4. Non-matriculated students are not required to attend the examinations, unless they are candidates for prizes or honors, or desire to obtain certificates of attendance.

SECTION VII.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE.

THIRD YEAR.

The History of English Literature from Dryden to Wordsworth (1660-1793). The lectures presume a careful study of the works of this period enumerated below, and in as far as time permits, these works will be specially treated in the class.

ADDISON : The essays contained in sections I, II, V, VI, VIII, of the Clarendon Press selections.

THOMSON : Summer ; Castle of Indolence, Canto I.

The lectures and practical work in this subject are given in the new building erected in the Park for the University Biological Department.

The following arrangements will be in force for 1891-92:—

1. A course of elementary lectures on Biology will be given three days a week to prepare candidates for the University examination of the First year.
2. A practical class will be formed in connection with the above course of lectures. A laboratory fee of \$3 will be charged to members of the practical class for the use of microscope and material for study.
3. In addition to attending the course of lectures under sec. 1, candidates for Second year honor examinations will attend a special course on parasitic plants and animals, and one on the Zoology of the vertebrata.
4. The practical course for honor students of the Second year will be devoted to the methods of Biological investigation, and to the study of typical forms of plants and animals, such as are treated of in *Huxley and Martin's Elementary Practical Biology*, new edition. Necessary works of reference will be found in the laboratory. There will also be opportunities for the study of the Canadian vertebrate fauna (Text-book *Jordan's American Vertebrates*), and for revision of the Canadian flowering plants; but the student is expected to have familiarized himself with the Canadian flora during the preceding long vacation. (For reference, *Spotton's Canadian Flora*, or *Gray's Manual*).
5. Honor students of the Third year will study the Zoology of the invertebrata three days a week during the Michaelmas Term, and during the Easter Term, Cryptogamic Botany and Vegetable Physiology.

Arrangements will be made for supplying suitable dissecting instruments, slides, cover-glasses, reagents, etc., to students. The cost of these, as well as of the materials for work, and the rent of a microscope will be deducted from a deposit to be paid by the student on his entering the practical class. The deposits will be \$10 for Honor students of Second, \$15 for those of the Third year, and \$25 for students in the Fourth year.

Students of the Third year must provide themselves (in addition to the apparatus of the Second year) with a book of determinative mineralogy, and will pay a laboratory fee of \$2 for minerals, reagents, etc. Students of the Fourth year will pay a laboratory fee of \$4 for assay materials and use of instruments generally.

POLITICAL ECONOMY.

Professor: W. J. ASHLEY, M.A.

FIRST YEAR. (SECOND YEAR IN FACULTY OF ARTS.)

ELEMENTARY ECONOMICS.

Subject of examination: The elements of Political Economy: Value, Price, Wages, Interest, Profits, Rent.

Lectures: The lectures in this course will give a general introduction to modern Political Economy, and are intended to assist both the Honour students of the second year in Political Science, and the Pass Students of the fourth year. While, for the sake of the Pass Students and of those who cannot take a later course in the subject, the lectures will deal in outline with all the main subjects usually included under the head of Political Economy, the Honour students are requested to give their chief attention to the subjects specified above.

The lectures will deal with the following topics among others: The Use of Text-books; Definition and Division of the subject; Wealth; *Production*:—Labour, Causes of Increase in Productivity; Supply of Labour; Land, Law of Diminishing Returns; Capital, Definition and Division; Function of Capital in Relation to Labour; *Distribution*:—Assumptions; Number of Shares; Parenthesis on Supply and Demand; Agricultural Rent, Statement and Criticism of Ricardo's Doctrine; House-rent; Interest and its Causes; Profits and their Analysis; Wages; Criticism of various Wage Doctrines—Iron Law, Wage Fund, Share of Product; Organisation of Labour; Excursus on Co-operation, Productive and Distributive;

Exchange.—Value; Money; Fluctuations in Prices; Gresham's Law; Bimetallism; Paper Money; Foreign Trade; Balance of Trade; Protection and Free Trade; Functions of Government; Methods of Governmental Action; Taxation, Direct and Indirect.

Books recommended: The chief text-book will be that of Symes.

For the application of Economics to the practical life of the time Ely's *Introduction* will be found interesting. Among other manuals which the student would do well occasionally to consult are those of Cannan, Gide, Walker and Andrews.

SECOND YEAR. (THIRD YEAR IN FACULTY OF ARTS.)

HISTORY AND CRITICISM OF ECONOMIC THEORY.

For examination students are required to give special attention to (i.) Adam Smith, *Wealth of Nations*, Bk. I, chap. 10, part 2; Bk. IV, chaps. 1, 2, 3, part 2; chap. 7. (ii.) Malthus, *Essay on Population*, Bk. I, chaps. 1, 2. (iii.) Ricardo, *Principles of Political Economy*, chaps. 1, 6. (iv.) List, *National System of Political Economy* (trans. Sampson Lloyd), chaps. 10, 11, 12.

The *Lectures* will follow in chronological order the development of Economic Theory down to the present time. They will deal with the following topics among others: The Economic Ideas of Plato and Aristotle; the Influence of Roman Law; the Teaching of the Medieval Church as to Usury and Just Price, with especial regard to Aquinas; the Genesis of Modern Conceptions; the Doctrine of Interest; Balance of Bargain and Balance of Trade; Earlier and Later Mercantilism; Mun; Child; Petty; the Physiocrats; Quesnay; David Hume; Adam Smith—his Relation to later economists, his Method and Assumptions; Freedom of Industry and Trade; Malthus—his Doctrine of population in its earlier and later forms; Ricardo—his Doctrines of Value, Rent, Wages, Profits, List and Nationality; John Stuart Mill; the Historical School; State Socialism; Jevons and the Austrian School.

Books recommended: The chief text-book will be Ingram's *History of Political Economy*. Students are also requested to read Ashley, *Economic History*, Preface and §§ 15-17, 20-23, and Toynbee, *Ricardo and the old Political Economy in The Industrial Revolution*. The following books will also be useful: Cliffe Leslie, *Essays* (especially those on Adam Smith, and German Political Economy); Bagehot, *Adam Smith as a Person* (in

Biographical Studies), and *Essays on Adam Smith, Malthus, and Ricardo* (in *Economic Studies*); Bonar, *Malthus and his Work*, Bk. I, chaps. 1 and 2; Marshall, *Principles of Economics*, Bk. I, chap. 4; Keynes, *Scope and Method of Political Economy*, chaps. 1-3, 7, 9.

THIRD YEAR. (FOURTH YEAR IN FACULTY OF ARTS.)

ECONOMIC HISTORY.

The *Lectures* will trace economic history from the early middle ages down to modern times, with especial reference to England. They will deal with the following topics among others: The History and Constitution of the Manor and its relation to Mediæval Husbandry; Mediæval Trade and the Gilds Merchant; Mediæval Industry and the Craft Gilds; Mediæval Foreign Trade—the Teutonic Hanse, the Staple and the Merchant Adventurers; the Domestic System of Industry; Tudor Legislation; the Trading Companies of the 16th and 17th centuries; the Enclosures of the 16th and 18th centuries; the Elizabethan Poor Law and its subsequent history; the Beginnings of Modern Finance; the Industrial Revolution and the Rise of the Factory System; Poor Law Reform; Factory Legislation; the Organization of Labour and Capital; National Insurance in Germany.

Books recommended: The chief text-books will be Ashley, *Economic History*, chaps. 1, 2; Toynbee, *The Industrial Revolution*. Students are also recommended to consult Seebohm, *English Village Community*, chaps. 1, 2, 3; Gross, *Gild Merchant*, chaps. 1-4; Rogers, *Six Centuries of Work and Wages*, chaps. 1-6, 8-10; Cunningham, *Growth of English Industry and Commerce* (ed. 1890) Bks. III, IV, V; Prothero, *Pioneers and Progress of English Farming*, chaps. 1-9; Marshall, *Principles*, Bk. PUBLIC FINANCE.

The *Lectures* will deal with National and Local Finance, and with important questions of modern economic policy from a financial standpoint. They will discuss, among other topics: the History of Public Finance and of Financial Science; the Currency and Banking System of Canada, Great Britain, and the United States; Public Debts and the Policy of National and Local Governments in relation to them; Methods of Extinction of Debt; Sinking Funds; Public Domain—Lands, Forests, Minerals; Railroad Policy, its history in Europe and America; Postal Service; Municipal Monopolies; Business Licenses; Taxation; Repercussion of Taxation; Ethics of Taxation; Direct and Indirect Taxation; Tariff Policy—outline of its history in Great Britain, Canada and the United States; Local Taxation in Canada and the United States.

Books Recommended: The most useful books for this course are Cossa, *Taxation*; Dunbar, *Theory and History of Banking*; Walker, *Money, Trade, and Industry*; Adams, *Public Debts*; Ely, *Taxation*; Hadley, *Railroad Transportation*. Among the works which it will be advantageous to consult are Bagehot, *Lombard Street*; Jevons, *Money*; Leroy-Beaulieu, *Science des Finances*, Livre II, chaps. 4, 5, 9, 10; Giffen, *Essays in Finance*, 1st series, IX; Taussig, *Tariff History of United States*; Sinclair, *Municipal Monopolies* (Toronto Studies in Political Science, 1st series, II).

SEMINARY.

The seminary will meet weekly during the session of 1891-2 for the study of Public Finance, under the presidency of the Professor of Political Economy. All students of the 4th year who are attending the lectures in Public Finance, and who are ready to take their share in the work of the Seminary, can attend its meetings. Each meeting will begin with the reading of an abstract of the papers presented the previous week; two essays will then be read on different sides or aspects of some particular problem; and these will be followed by a general discussion. A programme of essays will be drawn up at the beginning of the session, so that members will have adequate time for preparation. Attendance is strongly recommended; though the Professor in charge cannot engage that all the work will be directly useful for examination purposes.

GREEN, Lectures on Political Obligation; Lectures A, M, N, in Philosophical Works, vol. II.

FIRST YEAR. (SECOND YEAR IN FACULTY OF ARTS.)

ENGLISH CONSTITUTIONAL HISTORY.

J. M. McEVoy, B.A.

Lectures: The lectures in this course are intended to assist both the Honor Students of the second year in Political Science, and the Pass Students of the third year. They will deal with the following topics among others: The Hundred and County Courts; the Witena-

gemot; the Feudal System; the Angevin Administrative Machinery; the System of Estates; the Growth of Parliament; the History of Taxation; Lancastrian Constitutionalism; the Yorkist and Tudor Strong Government; the Rule of the Council; the Struggle between the Stuarts and Parliament; the Growth of the Cabinet; Responsible Government; George III and the Whigs; the Reform Bills; Modern Forces and Modern Practice.

Honor Students are required to show at the examination a textual knowledge of the following documents: *Assize of Clarendon*, *Magna Charta*, *Parliamentary Writs of 1295*, *Petition of Right*, *Habeas Corpus Act*, *Bills of Rights*, *Act of Settlement*, (Stubbs, *Select Charters*).

Books recommended: Taswell-Langmead, *English Constitutional History*; Bagehot, *English Constitution*; Wakeman & Hassall, *Constitutional Essays*, (omitting Essay 1); Introduction to Stubbs' *Select Charters*.

CANADIAN CONSTITUTIONAL HISTORY.

The lectures will deal with the following topics, among others: Character of French Settlement; Nature of European Claims to Territory; Government by Trading Companies; Excursus on Nature and Growth of Provincial Administrative System of France; Growth of Rule by Colonial Policy as distinguished from Trading Company Policy; Displacement of Trading Company Policy; Formal Establishment of Provincial Organization in 1663; Condition and Population at this time; the Sovereign Council; Growth of the Superior Council; Local Government; Land Tenures; Church and State; the Conquest; Rights Guaranteed the French at Capitulation; Treaty of Paris; Proclamation of 1763; Constitutional position of English Colony at this time; Growth of English Colonial Policy,—copied from Counties Palatine; Quebec Act; its Policy; Administration of Justice; Constitutional Act; Struggle for Responsible Government; Growth of Parties in Upper and Lower Canada; Lord Durham's Report; Union Act; Colonial Policy of Lord John Russell and Earl Grey; Policy of Sydenham, Metcalfe, and Elgin; Clergy Reserves; Growth of Responsible Government in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; Quebec Conference and Resolutions; Confederation; Relation of Dominion and of various Provinces to Great Britain; Relation of Provinces to Dominion; Comparison of B. § 4.

THE HISTORY OF ENGLISH LAW.

Professor : THE HON. MR. JUSTICE PROUDFOOT.

SECOND YEAR. (THIRD YEAR IN FACULTY OF ARTS.)

In tracing the history of the English law an attempt is made to ascertain its condition from the Roman Conquest until the Norman Conquest; to discover if any of the original Celtic or Druidical laws continued in force during the Roman occupation; and to what extent, if at all, the Roman law continued after the Saxon invasions; and what were the laws of the Confessor so much cherished after the Norman Conquest by the conquered race.

The change effected in the law, especially of real property, by the Conqueror and his successors,—the introduction or extension of the feudal system,—the special difference between that system as existing on the continent and in England,—the creation of new tenures,—the great charter and its frequent renewals as showing the condition of the people, and the evils to be remedied.

The great changes effected by the legislation of Edward I and Edward III. The creation of entailed estates,—the long struggle to obtain power to alienate them and its final success. The legislation to restrict alienations in mortmain,—the continuous and skilful means taken to evade the law, and their final defeat. The law giving power to devise lands, and the legislation of Elizabeth to pre-

vent frauds upon creditors and purchasers. The abolition of feudal tenures by Charles II, and the laws of his reign for the prevention of frauds and perjuries,—for the distribution of intestates, personal estates,—and in favour of liberty by rendering the remedy by *Habeas Corpus* more effective. The efforts in the reign of George III to ameliorate the criminal law, and the English Statutes after 1792 that have their counterpart in our Colonial legislation are discussed and explained.

Books recommended: Reeve's History of English Law; Hale's History of English Law; Blackstone's Commentaries. Consult also a collection of English Statutes, and the Revised Statutes of Canada, and of Ontario.

§ 5.

ROMAN LAW.

Professor: THE HON. MR. JUSTICE PROUDFOOT.

THIRD YEAR. (FOURTH YEAR IN FACULTY OF ARTS.)

The lectures on Roman Private Law comprise a rapid sketch of the history of the law from the time of the decemviri to the death of Justinian; giving an account of the growth of the unwritten law; of judicial legislation to the suppression of the formulary system by Diocletian, and from that time to the death of Justinian; and treating of the statutory legislation during the Republic and under the Empire; and of the several attempts to form a code, finally terminated by the work of Justinian.

The larger number of lectures is devoted to the substance of Roman Law during the reign of Justinian; embracing a description of the persons and things recognized by the law; and as to the creation, extinction, and exercise of rights, and to the performance of duties; as to the rights of ownership, and the qualification of them; as to the modes of acquiring ownership, and the modes of protecting it. The nature and objects of obligations, the parties to them, and the extinction of obligations by fulfilment or otherwise are discussed. The constitution of the Roman Family is explained, and the laws applicable to its different members, as husband and wife,

parents, children, and slaves, are noticed and commented on. The offices of guardians and trustees, and the rights, duties, responsibilities, and liabilities of guardians and trustees are stated and explained.

The rules of succession to an intestate, the selection of an heir in such case by operation of law, and the changes in the law at different periods, ending in the final legislation of Justinian, are stated and explained. The law of testamentary succession, the various kinds of wills, the duties of the heir, the gift of legacies, and the history of trust gifts and codicils are explained.

The remedial processes for the protection and enforcement of rights are traced from the *legis actiones*, the changes effected by the formulary system, the summary jurisdiction of the prætor, the abolition of the formulary system, terminating in the *extraordinaria cognitio*. The system of judicial administration in the time of Justinian, and the progress of a suit in his time are explained.

The series is closed by a discussion of the law as to specific performance of contracts; of the law as to frauds upon creditors; and an examination of the influence of Christianity upon Roman legislation.

Books recommended: Muirhead's Historical Introduction to the Private Law of Rome; Sandars' Justinian; Institutes of Gaius, translated by Muirhead. The Digest, the Code, and the Novels should also be consulted.

§ 6.

JURISPRUDENCE.

Professor: THE HON. MR. JUSTICE PROUDFOOT.

SECOND YEAR. (THIRD YEAR IN FACULTY OF ARTS.)

In lecturing on this subject the attention of the student is directed to the definition and analysis of *law* and of *rights*, to the sources of law,—to the classification of rights,—to the consideration of antecedent rights *in rem* and *in personam*, and to remedial rights, and to adjective private law,—to the nature of public law and its various divisions,—to international law, and to the application of law.

Books recommended: Holland, Elements of Jurisprudence; Austin, Elements of Jurisprudence (Campbell's Students' edition); Maine, Ancient Law; Maine, Early History of Institutions, Lectures XII, XIII.

ENTRANCE.

Candidates may enter this Faculty by passing the Junior Matriculation examination, (see appendix; p. 1) or the Senior Matriculation examination (First year), or at the examination of the Second year (see page 149).

Candidates for Junior Matriculation must have completed the fifteenth year of their age.

All candidates entering at the Junior Matriculation examination must take the pass subjects in Latin, Mathematics, English, History and Geography, and in one of the following groups: (a) Greek; (b) French and German; (c) French, and either Physics or Chemistry; (d) German, and either Physics or Chemistry.

Candidates intending to take during their University course any one of the following honor departments, viz.: Political Science, Mathematics and Physics, Chemistry and Mineralogy, Natural Sciences, are recommended to take French and German at Matriculation; since these languages must be taken in connection with the above-named honor departments. For a similar reason candidates intending to take during their University course either the honor department of Philosophy or that of Oriental Languages are recommended to take Greek, French, and German at Junior Matriculation.

All candidates entering at the Senior Matriculation examination must take the pass subjects in Latin, English, History, Mathematics, either Greek, or French and German, and one of the three sciences—Chemistry, Biology, Geology, specified below under the title of First year. (Note: Hebrew may be substituted for French or German). Candidates who purpose taking the honor course in Philosophy are recommended to take French and German as well as Greek, in view of the course for Second year prescribed on p. 155; and candidates who intend taking the honor course in Political Science are recommended to take French and German, either instead of or along with Greek, in view of the course for Second year prescribed on p. 154. Candidates for Senior Matriculation may present themselves either in May, and

compete with the undergraduates for honors and scholarships, or at a special examination in September, at which no honors or scholarships are awarded.

An undergraduate in the Faculty of Arts, in any University in Her Majesty's dominions, may enter by being admitted "*ad eundem statum*," on special application to the Senate.

If such application be for admission to the standing of the Third or Fourth year in this University the Senate will, if it sees fit to grant the same, prescribe the subjects of examination in which such applicant shall be required to pass before proceeding to the Degree, having regard to the subjects in which he has already passed satisfactory examinations in his own University.

If such applicant be admitted to a lower standing in this University than he held in his own University, he may not compete for scholarships at the next ensuing examination; but if he obtain honors he shall, at the next succeeding examination, enjoy the same rights and privileges with respect to obligatory subjects, as an original undergraduate of this University who has passed an examination of the same merit.

The ordinary annual examinations for Matriculation (both pass and honor) will commence in the beginning of July, and applications therefor must be sent to the Education Department before June 1st.

Supplemental examinations for Matriculation will be held in the University about the middle of September, at which those who are rejected at the July examination, as well as new candidates, may present themselves; but no honors or scholarships will be awarded at such examinations.

The fee for Matriculation is five dollars, and must be paid when the application for the examination is made.

The special examination for Senior Matriculation, previously referred to, will be held at the same time as these supplemental examinations.

Candidates for entrance must produce satisfactory certificates of age and of good conduct.

The fee for admission "*ad eundem statum*" is six dollars, and must be paid to the Registrar at the time of application.

Until the Senate by resolution otherwise determines, the standing of candidates who have passed, or may hereafter pass, the examinations of the Department of Education for First or Second

Class Teachers' Certificates, is accepted *pro tanto* at any Junior Matriculation examination, provided always that all candidates for scholarships shall take the full Matriculation examination at Toronto, and shall notify the Registrar of their intention before the 15th of June.

First Class Teachers' certificates are accepted *pro tanto* at the Senior Matriculation and First year examinations. Teachers holding Grades A and B are allowed the options granted to honor men in the subjects in which these certificates have been granted: thus those having these grades in Mathematics will be recognized as in the honor department of Mathematics; and those having these grades in English will be recognized as in the honor department of Modern Languages on passing in pass and honor French and German in addition to other necessary subjects.

Certificates of having passed the First examination in the School of Practical Science are accepted *pro tanto* at the Senior Matriculation and First year examinations, *i.e.*, the examinations in Mathematics and Chemistry are not required from the holders of such certificates.

Candidates who desire to compete at the First year examinations for scholarships or relative standing cannot exercise the privilege referred to in the two preceding paragraphs.

Candidates entering at the examination of the Second year, and Undergraduates of First year standing who desire to take the Second year's examination, must, in addition to the subjects required for it, pass examinations on the subjects of the First year, according to the following scheme:—

For all who intend to pursue the pass course:—*Mathematics, History, English, and Chemistry or Biology or Geology.*

For those who intend to enter any of the honor departments, as follows:—

- I. CLASSICS:—*Mathematics; English; History.*
- II. MODERN LANGUAGES:—*Mathematics; Chemistry or Biology or Geology.*
- III. ORIENTAL LANGUAGES:—*Mathematics; Latin or Greek (according as Greek or Latin is taken in Second year); French or German; English.*
- IV. POLITICAL SCIENCE:—*Mathematics; History; Chemistry or Biology or Geology; English.*

- V. PHILOSOPHY :—*Mathematics ; English ; History ; Chemistry or Biology or Geology ; Latin* (if not taken in Second year).
- VI. MATHEMATICS AND PHYSICS :—*English ; Latin or Greek.*
- VII. CHEMISTRY AND MINERALOGY :—*Mathematics ; English ; Latin or Greek.*
- VIII. NATURAL SCIENCES :—*Mathematics ; English ; Latin or Greek.*

I. REGULATIONS RELATING TO ALL UNDERGRADUATES.

Undergraduates are required to attend as Matriculated students, one of the Colleges affiliated to the University of Toronto, except in those cases in which the Senate, in consideration of peculiar circumstances, shall dispense with such attendance. All applications for such dispensation must be lodged with the Registrar before January 15th.

Every undergraduate who has not received such dispensation from the Senate for any particular year, must, before being admitted to examination, produce to the Registrar from the Head of the affiliated College which he has attended during the year, a certificate of attendance and of compliance with the requirements of that College.

Notice of the time of commencement of the undergraduate examinations will be given annually in January.

In case of students in affiliated Colleges, the Second and Third years' examinations are conducted by their respective professors, or lecturers, conjointly with associate examiners appointed by the senate; and such examinations are held at the same time as the examinations in the University.

Students of the Second and Third years attending lectures at an affiliated College are examined on the subjects of such lectures by the professors, or lecturers whose lectures are so attended, conjointly with the University associate examiners. Associate examiners are not appointed in the case of the theological options specified on page 151.

Students who have obtained special exemption from attending lectures in the Second or Third year, are examined as if they were students of University College, except in such cases as the Senate may, on application, otherwise direct.

Candidates in all the years are required to send to the Registrar of the University, at least three weeks before the commencement of each examination, an application for examination according to a printed form to be obtained from the Registrar, and such application must be accompanied by the fee of five dollars.

II. REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE PASS COURSE.

The subjects to be taken by those pursuing the pass course, with the options permitted, are set forth in the following schedule :

Undergraduates in the pass course in the Third and Fourth years may, in lieu of one or more of the subjects prescribed for each of these years, take certain of the following subjects, namely, Biblical Greek, Biblical Literature, Apologetics, and Church History, according to the following scheme :

BIBLICAL LITERATURE OR CHURCH HISTORY		May be substituted for the Modern History of the Political Science subject.

Undergraduates who exercise these options must present certificates of having attended lectures, and passed examinations in the subjects so selected at an affiliated or federating College or University other than University College. The minimum for passing at such examinations must not be less than the minimum required at the University examinations of the same year.

Undergraduates of any year, who have been rejected, or who have been prevented from attending the annual examinations in May by sickness, domestic affliction, or other causes beyond their control, may present themselves for examination in September, at the time of the Senior Matriculation examination. But candidates who have failed to attend at the May examinations, must prove to the satisfaction of the Vice-Chancellor, before presenting themselves in September, the existence and sufficiency of the alleged cause of absence, and all such cases shall be subsequently reported to the Senate.

A candidate for examination of any year in the pass course who has failed in not more than two subjects of the examination, may be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing Supplemental examinations in the subject or subjects only in which he has so failed; and a candidate for examination of any year in an honor department, who has failed in not more than one of the pass subjects attached to his honor department, may be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing supplemental examinations in that subject only in which he has so failed. No candidate whether in the pass or honor course shall be allowed to enter upon the next succeeding year of his course until he has passed the subject or subjects in which he has failed at the supplemental examination in September, or at the time of any succeeding annual examinations in May; but no candidate taking a supplemental examination at the time of the annual May examinations shall be allowed to present himself at the same examination in the subjects of any succeeding year of his course.

Candidates who were rejected must pay a fee of ten dollars before offering themselves for the supplemental examination.

A student who has been pursuing the pass course, but who has also succeeded in taking honors in some department in any year of his course, may apply to the Senate to be permitted to take such honor course, as if he had originally entered thereon; and such application may be granted, the Senate having due regard to the subjects on which he has already been examined.

III. REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE HONOR COURSE.

In this course there are eight honor departments, viz.: I. Classics; II. Modern Languages; III. Oriental Languages; IV. Political Science; V. Philosophy; VI. Mathematics and Physics; VII. Chemistry and Mineralogy; VIII. Natural Sciences.

Candidates pursuing department II will be allowed at and after the examinations of 1893 to take either Teutonic or Romance languages in their Fourth year.

Candidates pursuing department VI are allowed to take either Mathematics or Physics in their Fourth year.

Candidates pursuing department VIII are allowed to take either Division I or Division II in their Fourth year.

An undergraduate is entitled to admission to the degree of Bachelor of Arts, if in each year of his course he passes the examination in the pass and honor subjects of one of these departments (except in the department of Political Science of which the honor subjects only are required), and also the pass examinations in the subjects, and at the respective times mentioned in the following schedule:—

Undergraduates in the honor departments of Philosophy and Oriental Languages may, in the Third year, substitute Biblical Literature or Church History for History. Undergraduates in the Honor department of Philosophy may also substitute Biblical Greek for the pass classical Greek (Plato) to be taken in the Third

year, and Biblical Literature or Apologetics for the pass Economics of the Fourth year. Undergraduates in the honor department of Oriental Languages may also substitute Biblical Greek for the pass classical Greek of the Third and Fourth years. Those exercising these options must present certificates of having attended lectures and passed examinations in the subjects so selected at an affiliated College other than University College. The minimum for passing at such examinations must not be less than the minimum required at the University examinations of Third year. These examinations do not count for honors.

In the honor department of Philosophy two distinct examinations are held in the Fourth year upon the two systems of Philosophy taught in the confederating Arts Colleges.

A candidate for honors in any of these departments is required each year to take the pass papers set in the subjects of his department for that year, except in the department of Political Science, in which only the honor papers are required.

Candidates in the honor subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Biology, and Mineralogy and Geology, will be ranked in the class lists on practical work done in the laboratories of the respective departments during the session; and no candidate will be allowed to proceed to examination in any of these honor subjects unless he presents to the Registrar a certificate from the Professor that he has attained honor standing in the practical work of that subject.

A candidate pursuing the honor course in any one of these departments may, after passing in honors the examination of any year, apply for leave to take the pass course during the remainder of his undergraduateship.

A candidate pursuing the honor course, who fails to take honors in his department, shall not be considered to have passed the examination of the year, excepting that in the departments of Modern Languages, Political Science, Philosophy, Chemistry and Mineralogy, and Natural Sciences, a candidate who in any one branch has failed to obtain the full percentage requisite for ranking in honors may, on the special recommendation of the examiners, be allowed to proceed as an honor candidate in the department in the following year. A candidate who has failed may at his option again present himself for the examination in which he failed, or, upon application to the Senate, may be permitted to take the ordinary supplemental pass examination in September, with such of the previous pass subjects

as may appear requisite in view of the extent and character of the examinations he has already passed.

A candidate who competes for honors at the examination for B.A., and fails to obtain the requisite number of marks to entitle him to be classed in honors, may, on the recommendation of the examiners, be awarded a degree without honors; it being at the option of the candidate to accept the award of such a degree, or to wait until a subsequent examination and again compete for a degree in honors.

An undergraduate who has obtained honors in any one of these departments may transfer himself to any other department, and proceed therein, but as a prerequisite to obtaining the Degree of B.A. he must during his course have passed the examinations in pass subjects annexed to the honor department to which he is transferred.

DEGREE OF M.A.

Candidates for the Degree of M.A. must have been admitted to the Degree of B.A., must be of the standing of one year from admission to the Degree of B.A., and must have sent in an approved thesis upon some subject in one of the departments in the Faculty of Arts.

ADMISSION "AD EUNDEM GRADUM."

A graduate in the Faculty of Arts in any University in Great Britain or Ireland (if his degree be not an honorary one) may be admitted to the same degree in the University of Toronto.

Matriculated undergraduates who are registered students of University College, or of any federating University or College, may attend lectures of University professors and lecturers in the Faculty of Arts without payment of fees, except those imposed for laboratory work ; but such students must enter their names with the Registrar of the University.

The annual fees for all other students attending lectures in the Faculty of Arts are as follows :—

For a single course of lectures..... Six Dollars.

For two or three single courses of lectures .. Eleven “

For more than three single courses of lectures. Twenty “

N.B.—All the above fees are payable in advance, and in the case of fees for lectures if not paid during the month of October (or in the case of students attending in Easter term only, during the month of January), an additional fee of one dollar per month will be imposed until the whole amount is paid.

The fee for each examination must accompany the application to the Registrar.

The fee for admission *ad eundem statum*, for change of faculty, for admission to a higher year on the certificate of the Head of an affiliated college, for dispensation from attendance at lectures, or for certificates of honor, must be paid to the Registrar at the time of the application for such.

UNIVERSITY PRIZES AND SCHOLARSHIPS.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

The following scholarships have been founded and endowed in the University and are open for competition to all undergraduates in Arts, who are candidates for honors in the departments and years to which they are assigned :

GENERAL PROFICIENCY.

THE PRINCE OF WALES SCHOLARSHIP, of the value of \$50, the gift of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. It is awarded at the Junior Matriculation examination to the candidate, who, having obtained First Class honors in any two of the departments of Classics,

Mathematics, and Modern Languages, shall have obtained the highest aggregate number of marks in two departments; and in the event of such scholarship not being taken at any Junior Matriculation examination it will be awarded to the candidate (if any) at the ensuing First year's examination who shall answer the same conditions. This scholarship is tenable in conjunction with any other scholarship or scholarships.

In awarding this scholarship the comparative value of the several departments and sub-departments is estimated according to the following schedule :

POLITICAL SCIENCE.

THE BLAKE SCHOLARSHIPS, two of the value of \$75 each, and two of the value of \$50 each. The gift of the Chancellor of the University, Hon. Edward Blake. These scholarships are open for competition alike to students in Arts in the Honor department of Political Science, and to undergraduates in the Faculty of Law, taking the same examinations.

THE RAMSAY SCHOLARSHIP in Political Economy, of the value of \$60. The gift of Mr. William Ramsay. This scholarship is open for competition to all graduates or undergraduates who have been placed in the First Class in one of the Economic subjects of the Fourth year in the honor department of Political Science (Third year in the Faculty of Law); but not more than two years must have elapsed since the competitor passed the examination above named. The award is made upon an essay, the subject of which shall be some question in Economics or Finance of interest to the commercial community in Canada, to be announced in May of each year, and the competition shall close on the 15th of August thereafter, by which date the essays must be sent to the Registrar.

THE BANKERS' SCHOLARSHIP in Political Science of the value of \$70. The gift of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the Dominion, Imperial, Standard, and Traders' Banks, and the Union Bank of Lower Canada. Only such candidates are eligible as are of one year's standing and have passed the examination of the First year. A special examination on some special text-book of history or finance will be held at the time of the supplemental examinations in September. This scholarship is not tenable with any other.

CLASSICS.

THE MARY MULOCK CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIP, of the value of \$120. The gift of the late Mrs. Mulock.

THE MOSS CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIP, of the value of \$120. Founded by subscription in honor of the late Hon. Chief Justice Moss, Vice-Chancellor of the University.

For other scholarships and prizes in classics *vide* p.84-86 under University College.

MATHEMATICS AND PHYSICS.

THE WILLIAM MULOCK SCHOLARSHIP in Mathematics, of the value of \$60. The gift of William Mulock, M.A., Vice-Chancellor of the University.

Two scholarships in PHYSICS of the value of \$100 and \$45 respectively. The gift of the Local Committee for the Toronto meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. In awarding these scholarships, the theoretical and practical work in the department will be estimated in the proportion of three to one.

CHEMISTRY AND NATURAL SCIENCE.

THE DANIEL WILSON SCHOLARSHIPS, two of the value of \$60 each. The gift of a friend. In awarding the Daniel Wilson scholarships, the theoretical and practical work in the several subjects will be estimated as follows:—In Chemistry, in the proportion of two to one. In Biology, in the proportion of one to one. In Mineralogy and Geology, in the proportion of two to one.

THE 1851 EXHIBITION SCHOLARSHIP.

This post-graduate scholarship of £150 per annum, is the gift of the Commissioners for the Exhibition of 1851, open for competition only to honor candidates in the departments of Physics, and Chemis-

try and Mineralogy, Each candidate must on or before the 1st of March, 1892, send to the Registrar a thesis which must either furnish some evidence of originality, or show the nature of the original research which he proposes to undertake, with a complete historical sketch of the results which have been obtained by previous investigators, giving full references to the original papers. Upon the evidence of such thesis, a nomination will be made to the Commissioners for award of scholarship.

The Scholarship when awarded is tenable for two years, and may by special resolution of the Commissioners be extended to three years. The continuation, each year after the first, depends upon the work done in the previous year being satisfactory to the scientific committee appointed by the Commissioners. The scholarship when awarded is tenable in any University at home or abroad, or in some other institution to be approved of by the Commissioners. The holder must give an undertaking that he will wholly devote himself to the object of the scholarship (viz., the study of those branches of science, the extension of which is important for our national industries), and that he will not hold any position of emolument during its continuance.

All undergraduate scholars must sign a declaration of intention to proceed to a Degree in this University, and must attend lectures in some affiliated College for the academic year immediately following such examination; but the Senate may, upon satisfactory reasons being shewn, permit such scholar to postpone attendance upon lectures for a year, in which case the payment of the amount of the scholarship shall likewise be postponed. The scholarships are paid in three instalments—on the fifteenth November, the fifteenth January, and the fifteenth March; and each scholar is required to send to the Registrar a certificate of attendance upon lectures at least three days before the date of each payment.

No scholarship will be awarded to any candidate who has been placed lower than the First Class in the department, or in any of the departments or sub-departments to which the scholarship is attached.

DEGREE OF C. E.

By Statute of the University of Toronto, passed in 1884, graduates of the School of Practical Science in the department of Civil Engineering may be admitted to the degree of C. E. upon the following conditions:—

1. Candidates for the said degree shall hold the Diploma in Civil Engineering of the Ontario School of Practical Science.
2. Candidates shall have spent three years after receiving the said Diploma in the actual practice of the profession of Civil Engineering.
3. Candidates shall have spent at least two years of the said period in the construction and operation of engineering works, as distinguished from surveys merely.
4. Satisfactory evidence shall be offered as to the periods spent on the different classes of engineering employment, and intervals during which the candidate was not engaged in the construction or operation of engineering works, or in the prosecution of surveys, shall not be included as portions of the aforesaid period of three years.
5. It shall not be necessary that the several intervals required to make up the period of three years be consecutive.
6. Each candidate shall prepare for the approval of the Senate, an original essay on some engineering subject, accompanied with detailed explanations, drawings, specifications and estimates; he shall also be examined on the subject of the essay as well as on the work or works on which he has been engaged, unless exempted therefrom on the special recommendation of the examiner.
7. The subject of the said essay shall be forwarded to the Registrar for the approval of the Senate, not later than the first day of February.
8. Candidates shall notify the Registrar of their intention of proceeding to the degree of C.E., not later than the first day of April.
9. The evidence required in section 4, together with the essay, drawings and estimates, shall be sent to the Registrar not later than the first day of May.

CURRICULUM IN DENTISTRY.

MATRICULATION.

Candidates for the degree of D.D.S. must pass the matriculation examination hereinafter mentioned, unless they,

1st. Possess a degree in Arts, (not being an honorary degree) from some recognized University: or

2nd. Have already matriculated in the Faculty of Arts, or the Faculty of Law, or the Faculty of Medicine in this or some other University in Canada; or

3rd. Are matriculants in the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario; or

4th. Have passed the 1st, 2nd or 3rd class Departmental non-professional examinations in which the Latin option has been taken.

Candidates not possessing any of the above-named qualifications, will be required to pass the examination prescribed for matriculants in the Faculty of Medicine in this University, provided always, that candidates registered as matriculants of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario, on the first day of November, A.D. 1888, shall be admitted as matriculants in the Department of Dentistry.

UNDERGRADUATES.

Undergraduates (candidates for the degree) residents of the Province of Ontario, must have complied with all the requirements, prescribed from time to time by the Board of directors of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario for admission to examination for a certificate of license to practice dentistry in Ontario.

Undergraduates (candidates for the degree), not resident in Ontario, must:—

(1) Have devoted at least three full calendar years (not being engaged in any other business) to the study of dentistry.

(2) Must have attended at least two full courses of lectures, embracing all the subjects of the curriculum, of not less than five months each (exclusive of the time occupied in examination), and including the daily clinic at a dental school recognized by this University; the last of which must be at the School of Dentistry of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario.

(3) Must have spent that portion of time, when not in attendance at lectures and clinics at the School of Dentistry, as students in the office of an approved dentist.

EXAMINATIONS.

Candidates for the degree must pass two examinations : an intermediate and a final ; an interval of not less than one year intervening between them. Until further provision be made a certificate of having passed the intermediate examination of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario, will be accepted by this University.

Applicants for the final examination, which will be held at the same time as the annual examinations in the Faculty of Medicine, must present to the Registrar satisfactory certificates, covering all the requirements relating to undergraduates as given above, and of having passed the intermediate examination.

The subjects for final examination shall be

(a) Theory and practice of operative dentistry.

(b) Theory and practice of dental prosthetics.

(These examinations will be partly written, partly oral, and partly practical.)

(c) Dental pathology.

(d) Dental histology.

(e) Principles and practice of medicine and surgery as applied in dentistry.

(f) Dental materia medica and therapeutics.

(g) General anatomy and special anatomy of head and neck.

(h) Physiology.

(k) Chemistry.

(These Examinations will be written.)

No candidate shall be considered as having passed the examination who has not obtained 50 per cent. of the marks allotted ; nor shall a candidate be considered as having passed in any subject who has not obtained at least 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. of the marks allotted to such subject.

FEES.

The fee for matriculation examination shall be five dollars.

The fee for registration of a certificate accepted in lieu of said examination shall be five dollars.

The fee for final examination shall be five dollars.

The fee for the degree of D.D.S. shall be twenty dollars.

No fee shall be charged for transference from any Faculty of this University to the Department of Dentistry.

COURSE IN MUSIC.

Before being admitted to any of the following examinations, all candidates shall be required to give evidence of a sound practical knowledge of pianoforte or organ playing.

FIRST YEAR'S EXAMINATION.

Harmony.—Knowledge of chord formation and progression, harmonization of melodies and figured basses. Musical history with special reference to the early use of musical instruments, the development of Gregorian and Ambrosian chants, and the introduction of harmony and part writing.

Text Books: Steiner's Primer of Harmony; Jadassohn's Harmony; Banister's Text Book of Music; Bonavia Hunt, Naumann: Histories of Music.

SECOND YEAR'S EXAMINATION.

ELEMENTARY ACOUSTICS :

HARMONY.—The harmonization of melodies or chorales in four, five and six part harmony, the Cantus Fermus to be given alternately to the different parts. Counterpoint, simple and double up to five parts. Questions will also be given in three or four part counterpoint. Musical history and special reference to the development of the opera and oratorio, and the influence of the Italian, Netherlands, French, and German schools in the time of Bach.

Text Books : Banister's Text Book of Music (up to counterpoint); Bridge's Primer of Counterpoint and Double Counterpoint; Jadassohn, Simple and Double Counterpoint; Prout's Counterpoint.

THIRD YEAR'S EXAMINATION.

FUGUE, CANON AND FORM.—A fugue in not more than four parts to be composed on a given subject; a canon to be continued for a certain number of bars in the interval given. Explanation of musical forms to be given. Musical history from the beginning of the 18th century to the present time.

Text Books : J. Higgs' Primer of Fugue; Pauer's Primer of Musical Form; Bussler, Treatise on Musical Form; Prout's Primer of Instrumentation; Berlioz on Instrumentation; Hawkins, Naumann, Ambros: Histories of Music. For reference—Grove's Dictionary of Music and Musicians.

ANALYSIS OF FULL SCORE.—Beethoven's Symphony No. 1; Mendelssohn's Elijah.

In addition, for the final examination, an exercise in the shape of a composition either sacred or secular, will be required, containing five part harmony and fugal counterpoint with an accompaniment for at least a string band, and sufficiently long to occupy fifteen minutes in performance.

Every candidate for final examination before being allowed to enter for the examination shall present a certificate of having passed the full course of instruction, theoretical and practical, in all subjects of the above examination, in any affiliated or approved college of music.

Victoria University.

Victoria University was founded by resolution of the Conference of the Methodist Church in Canada, held in Kingston, in August, 1830. The institution was opened for students on the 18th of June, 1836, with the Rev. Matthew Ritchie, M.A., as Principal. On the 12th of October, 1836, letters patent were issued incorporating the institution as a Seminary of Learning, for the Province of Upper Canada, under the name of "The Upper Canada Academy."

In 1841, the Parliament of the united Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, being now first constituted by Act of the Imperial Parliament with authority to grant such a Charter, at its first Session held in the city of Kingston, passed an Act to incorporate the Upper Canada Academy under the name and style of "Victoria College, with power and authority to confer the degrees of Bachelor, Master, and Doctor of the various Arts and Faculties;" which Act was assented to by the Governor-General, on the twenty-seventh of August, 1841.

On the twenty-first of October, 1841, the Rev. Egerton Ryerson, having been appointed Principal, opened the first college session under the enlarged charter.

In the year 1844, the Rev. A. McNab, D.D., succeeded the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, as Principal, and occupied the office till 1849. At the close of his term the number of students in the college was 140.

In 1850, the Rev. S. S. Nelles, M.A., was appointed Principal and addressed himself to the task of organizing and enlarging the college to the status and work of a University. In the year 1854-55, the Faculty of Medicine was

added and established in Toronto. In 1860, the Faculty of Law was added, and in 1871, the Faculty of Theology.

In the years 1883-84, a commission appointed by the General Conference of the Methodist Church, arranged for the consolidation of Albert College, Belleville, with Victoria College, Cobourg, and legal effect was given to this consolidation by Act of the Legislature of Ontario, 47 Victoria, chap. 93.

The corporate name was, by this Act, changed to "Victoria University." The Government of the University was vested in a Board of Regents, Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor and Senate. To these bodies was given power to affiliate outlying colleges, and full university powers in all Faculties were continued. Rev. S. S. Nelles, D.D., LL.D., as President was *ex officio* first Chancellor, and William Kerr Q.C., LL.D. was elected Vice-Chancellor.

In 1887 the Rev. S. S. Nelles, D.D., LL.D., died, and the Rev. N. Burwash, S.T.D., was appointed President and Chancellor.

Under the provisions of the present charter the following colleges are affiliated in Arts with Victoria University: Albert College, Belleville; the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton; the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby; Alma College, St. Thomas.

On the twelfth of November, A.D. 1890, under the provisions of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, chap. 230, and the Acts amending the same, Victoria University was by proclamation of the Lieutenant-Governor federated with the University of Toronto.

By the provisions of the Federation Act, the President of Victoria University, a representative of the Senate of Victoria University, and five representatives of the graduates in Arts become members of the Senate of the University of Toronto.

ENTRANCE.

The examinations held under the authority of the Education Department in the month of July are the regular examinations for admission to the undergraduate work in Arts of Victoria University. All students holding certificates of having passed this examination will be registered without further fee for matriculation.

Supplementary examinations will be held by the University of Toronto and Victoria University in the month of September. These examinations which are conducted by a joint Board of Examiners will be held concurrently in Toronto and Cobourg, and all students passing these examinations will be admitted to either University. Students desiring to pursue special studies must by examination or otherwise give satisfactory evidence of preparation to enter the classes desired.

COURSES OF INSTRUCTION.

The following courses of Instruction are provided in the Faculty of Arts as permanently established under the Federation Act :—

DEPARTMENT OF CLASSICS.

Full lectures are given by Prof. Bell, Ph.D. (Breslau), and an assistant, in the Latin language and literature, the Greek language and literature, Ancient History, Greek and Roman antiquities. Lectures are also given by Prof. Badgley, LL.D., in Ancient Phil.

osophy, and by Dr. Burwash on Roman Law. Practical work in Latin and Greek Prose Composition is conducted under the supervision of Dr. Bell. Special attention is given to Grammar and Philology.

DEPARTMENT OF MODERN LANGUAGES.

English.—Lectures historical, critical and analytical are given by Prof. Reynar, LL.D., on all the subjects of the curriculum in English Literature. Prof. Horning, will devote special attention to Old English, Anglo-Saxon and Philology. Dr. Reynar will lecture on the principles of Rhetoric.

French.—Lectures on the subjects of the curriculum are given by Prof. Petch, M.A. Special attention is given to reading, writing, and conversation, leading to a practical acquaintance with the language.

German.—Prof. Horning, M.A., will lecture on all the subjects in the curriculum in the German Language and Literature. Special attention will be given to grammar, composition, and philology.

Supplementary lectures on the full curriculum in Italian and Spanish will be maintained until the consummation of federation by the removal of Victoria to Toronto.

DEPARTMENT OF ORIENTAL LANGUAGES.

In this department, which is in charge of Prof. Workman, Ph.D. (Leipzig), the instruction is specially adapted to the requirements of students who purpose entering the work of the ministry, and who contemplate taking a degree in Divinity, after completing their course in Arts.

In the first year, lectures are given on the essential elements of Hebrew Grammar, with practice in translation, punctuation, analysis and parsing. After the general principles of the language have been mastered, and a sufficient vocabulary has been gained, progressive exercises in prose writing and sight reading follow, accompanied by a concise sketch of Ancient Semitic History.

In the Second year, after a rapid review of the grammar (Green or Genesis), particular attention is given to Hebrew syntax and to sight reading, together with the literal translation of appropriate selections from the historic, the poetic, and the prophetic books of the Old Testament. This year's work also comprises a brief outline of Hebrew literature.

In the Third and Fourth years, sight translation and prose composition are continued in connection with the critical study of the language, in rendering into English the portions of the Old Testament assigned to be read. An important feature of the work of these two years consists in comparing the Massoretic with the Alexandrian text, and in retranslating the Greek of the Septuagint, into Hebrew. Special attention, indeed, is given to the subject of textual criticism throughout the entire course.

In the honor work of this department, instruction is given as it may be required, in Aramaic, Syriac, Arabic and Assyriology.

DEPARTMENT OF PHILOSOPHY.

Lectures will be given by Prof. Badgley, LL.D. on Psychology, Ethics, Metaphysics, History of Philosophy, and Theistic Philosophy.

Plato, Aristotle, and Cicero will be read in the original with Dr. Bell. A full course of Logic, Formal and Inductive, will be maintained until removal to Toronto.

THE PROFESSORIALTE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO.

On the completion of Federation the lectures of the professors of the University of Toronto in Natural Science, Philosophy, History, Political Science, Physics and Mathematics, will be open to all students of Victoria University free of charge. The laboratories of the University will also be available on payment of the ordinary laboratory fees. Until such removal, lectures will be maintained in all these departments at Cobourg, with laboratory advantages, meeting the full requirement of the present curriculum.

MEDALS AND PRIZES.

A gold and silver medal are offered for competition, at the end of the course, to honor students in each of the following departments:—I, Classics; II, Mathematics; III, English and Modern Languages; IV, Natural Science; V, Philosophy, Logic, Civil Polity. There are also a number of prizes subject to special conditions.

PRINCE OF WALES' MEDALS.

The medals founded by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales are offered for general proficiency to the members of the graduating class each year. Each competitor must meet the requirements of an honor candidate in some department. The medals are awarded on a final examination covering all the fixed subjects of the pass course.

DISCIPLINE.

Students connected with the College are expected to conduct themselves with propriety, and to observe all regulations imposed by the President and Faculty.

Students whose conduct or progress in study is unsatisfactory will not be allowed to remain in the University.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

All students are expected to attend Divine Services on the Lord's Day at such churches as their parents or guardians may prefer.

They are also required to attend Divine Service daily in the College Chapel.

Religious services will also be held in the College on each Lord's Day.

STUDENTS' RESIDENCE.

It is expected that a residence, constructed upon approved modern principles, and affording healthful and comfortable accommodation for one hundred students, will be erected on the new College site in the city of Toronto. In Cobourg, residence is furnished in private families, approved by the Faculty, at a cost of from \$3.00 to \$4.00 a week.

COLLEGE FEES.

Tuition (per annum) including the fees for regular examinations, \$25. Fees for laboratory work are regulated by the cost of gas and chemicals used by the class. Apparatus broken is charged to the individual student. A small fee for the use of microscopes is charged in the Biological laboratory.

This institution, founded in 1887, was affiliated with the University of Toronto in 1876. It subsequently became an affiliated College of Victoria University.

St. Michael's College.

St. Michael's College was established in 1852 by the Basilian Fathers from Annonay, France, at the request and under the patronage of the Most Rev. Dr. De Charbonnel, then Bishop of Toronto. For four years the College occupied the wing of St. Michael's Palace, on Church Street. In 1856 a more suitable edifice was erected on the present site, part of which was the gift of the late Hon. John Elmsley. Since that time the building has been more than doubled, and the chapel enlarged and improved.

The object of the institution is to impart a thorough Catholic training, moral and intellectual, so as to fit young men for any position in life which they may wish to occupy.

The studies advancing steadily with the educational progress of the country, it was deemed advantageous for those studying for the liberal professions to have the College affiliated with the Provincial University. In 1881 this affiliation was effected upon a basis similar to that of several of the Catholic Colleges of England and Ireland with the London University.

The course of study comprises, besides an Elementary department, three others, viz., Commercial, Classical and Philosophical. In the latter department lectures are delivered in the subjects of the department of Philosophy as prescribed by the curriculum of the University of Toronto.

Special lectures are also delivered upon the History required in the curriculum of the University.

Wycliffe College.

This federating College was founded 1877, and known at first as the Protestant Episcopal Divinity School. As that name implies, it is a Church of England theological college, and its work and methods are based upon the position of "distinctive evangelical teaching." It was affiliated with the University in 1885; and upon the passage of the University Federation Act became, in accordance with the terms of that Act, a Federating College, with additional representation on the Senate. The present building, completed this year, stands to the north-east of the main University building.

The theological course proper extends over a period of three years; the preparatory work consisting of the First year's work in Arts of the University, or its equivalent.

The first two years of the theological course may be taken concurrently with the Arts work of the University by means of the theological options, and by following the schedule laid down in the Calendar.

Graduates in Arts may so combine the three years' work, as to take the full Theological course in two years.

Knox College.

Knox College was established at Toronto in 1844, as a theological seminary in connection with the Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Canada or Free Synod, which had been organized in the same year. In 1858 it was incorporated by Act of Parliament. In 1861, in consequence of the Union of the Synod of the Free Church and that of the United Presbyterian Church, as the Synod of the Canada Presbyterian Church, the Theological Institute of the United Presbyterian Synod and Knox College were united.

After many changes of habitation the present buildings on Spadina Avenue were erected in 1875. It was affiliated with the University of Toronto in 1885, and in the University and University College its students receive instruction in the subjects of an Arts course prescribed for them as preliminary to the special work in Theology. These subjects are English, History, Logic and Rhetoric, Chemistry, Mental and Moral Philosophy, and Hebrew. The course in Theology extends over three years. A number of scholarships and prizes are offered for competition in each year.

School of Practical Science.

By Act of the Legislative Assembly in 1877 the School of Practical Science was founded, and an arrangement entered into with the Council of University College, whereby the students of the School received instructions in all the branches of science embraced in the work of the School. A building was erected to the south of the University lawn, and in 1890 great additions were made to it. In 1889 the School of Practical Science was affiliated with the University of Toronto, and at the same time the Faculty of the School was enlarged. It is now constituted as follows:—

The Toronto School of Medicine.

Woman's Medical College, Toronto.

Instruction is given in all subjects required by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario for admission to a license to practise, and also in all subjects required by the University of Toronto for Examinations in the Faculty of Medicine. The Woman's Medical College was affiliated with the University of Toronto in 1890.

Ontario Agricultural College.

The Institution known as the "Ontario Agricultural College and Experimental Farm," is situated about a mile to the south of the city of Guelph, in the centre of an extensive agricultural and noted stock-raising district, readily accessible by rail from all parts of the province. The farm consists of 550 acres, about 400 of which are cleared. It is composed of almost every variety of soil, and hence is well suited for the purpose for which it was selected.

The instruction given at the institution is embraced under two heads, a course of study and a course of apprenticeship. The latter is intended for special students who come in from practical farming for the autumn, winter and spring terms, during which they are employed in rotation in each of six departments of practical farm labour. The course of study is for two years, at the end of which time a diploma is granted. Holders of a diploma, who have obtained a certain standing in the theoretical and practical work of the first two years, may remain for a third year. In 1888 the College was affiliated with the University of Toronto, and an examination for the Degree of Bachelor of the Science of Agriculture was instituted, to which only students of the third year in the Ontario Agricultural College may be admitted. The curriculum of study for the degrees will be found on p. 167.

THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY.

On the evening of Feb. 14th, 1890, the library of the University, together with the greater portion of the main University building was destroyed by fire. The library then contained about 33,000 volumes, including many rare and valuable books, and complete sets of scientific periodicals.

The destruction of the University was no sooner known than active measures were taken to replace what was lost. A local committee was formed to solicit subscriptions and donations of books from the graduates and from friends of the University and higher education.

In England, a similar movement was organized and a committee formed under the Marquis of Lorne, as Chairman, Mr. Staveley Hill, Q.C., M.P., as Hon. Treasurer, and Sir George Baden-Powell, as Hon. Secretary. Another committee was formed in Germany, and owes its successful work almost entirely to the efforts of Herr John Landauer. The appeals sent out met with a prompt and hearty response. Among the many donors may be mentioned Her Majesty the Queen, the Duke of Devonshire, the Duke of Argyle; the governments of Great Britain, France, Italy, Switzerland, the Dominion of Canada, and several of its Provinces, of the United States, and many of the States of the Union; the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Dublin, Strassburg, Erlangen, Marburg, Münster, Upsala, Harvard, Columbia, Cornell, Johns Hopkins, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Melbourne and Calcutta; the cities of London, Birmingham, Toronto, New York, Boston and Melbourne; the leading publishers of Great Britain and the United States; the agents of the University abroad; learned societies, and very many private persons in all parts of the world. These donations have been so numerous that in the middle of May, 1891, there were nearly if not quite 31,000 volumes in the Library, and a mass of pamphlets estimated at fully 5,000.

Among the donations of books are several works of bibliographical interest. Among these may be mentioned sets of Chemical Societies' publications with the book plates of the Honorable Henry Cavendish, the great chemist, and several old books that once formed part of the library of the historian Gibbon.

At first the new Library found a home in the University Y. M. C. A., but that soon proved much too small. The books were then removed to the Biological department, where they remained until

September, when the need of the rooms in that building for the work of the session necessitated their removal to the present quarters in the School of Science, generously offered by the Minister of Education and the Faculty of the School.

The Library was opened to the students about the middle of October; and shortly afterwards two reading-rooms for male and female students were ready on the same floor in the School of Science.

Text-books and other works in frequent use are placed in a small room adjacent to the reading-rooms while in the larger stock-room about 17,500 volumes are on the shelves. The remainder after having been entered in the accession-book and valued, were repacked and stored in the basement to await more permanent arrangements.

Plans for a new library building have been adopted, and building operations will begin during the summer. The building will have the following distinctive features:

1. A fire-proof room to accommodate 120,000 volumes.
2. A reading-room to accommodate 200 students.
3. Seminary rooms for various departments of instruction.
4. Construction absolutely fire-proof for the book-room and approximately so for the rest of the building.

From October to June, the library is open between 10 a. m. to 5 p. m., or until sunset when that is before five; but is entirely closed on Sundays, Thanksgiving-day, Christmas-day, New Year's-day, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, the twenty-fourth of May, and the first of July. During the vacation the library is open from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m., for consultation and receipt of books.

An author card catalogue is in preparation and is expected to be ready for the beginning of the session 1891-92. When this is completed the more important and difficult task of preparing a subject catalogue will be entered upon: until it is finished readers are requested to refer to the assistants for any information which cannot be obtained from the author catalogue.

The library has already on its periodical list about 200 of the most important scientific and literary journals published. These periodicals are accessible to the students on application; but as in the case of serials, encyclopædias, and works of general reference, they cannot be taken from the building.

Lists of important additions will be posted in the reading-rooms from time to time. Students have the privilege of purchasing text-

RULES GOVERNING READERS.

The Library is primarily for the use of the whole University, although any person properly accredited may make use of it for consultation. All students who have made a deposit of \$2, which can be withdrawn at the end of the term, may take out not more than two books and retain them over night if they are text-books or books referred to by the staff of the University as bearing on the subjects of instruction. Books not in general demand may be retained for a period of four days, with the privilege of extension of time unless called for by others.

Books taken out must be returned on the reopening of the Library, and under any circumstances before a student leaves the city.

THE UNIVERSITY BIOLOGICAL MUSEUM.

The University Biological Museum forms the central portion of the buildings belonging to the Biological Department. It is as yet unfinished, but it is hoped that the rooms will be ready for occupation early in October. To the new museum will be transferred the various collections rescued from the old museum, together with the specimens and collections recently presented to the University.

In addition to the damage done by removal and by water to the mounted specimens (mammals, birds and skeletons), of the former museum, the most serious losses were in the direction of the collections contained in the gallery cases.

It is hoped that in the near future donations from friends of the Institution will assist in replacing the losses. Already considerable contributions have been received, and it is intended to issue shortly a rough list of the collections with the view of indicating the gaps which exist therein.

Fortunately, the extensive and valuable series of preparations and models used for illustrating the lectures in animal and vegetable morphology and embryology had been removed to the Biological Department before the fire, so that the teaching of the department is not crippled in this respect.

UNIVERSITY OF TORONTO, Y. M. C. A.

This company was formed during the excitement caused by the Trent affair in 1861, which may be said to have given birth to the present volunteer system of Canada. At the news of the possibility of war between Great Britain and the United States, offers of military service came from all parts of the country. Among the companies then formed was one consisting of professors and students of University College. The meeting at which the resolutions for the organization of such a company were passed was held in the Convocation Hall, and presided over by Rev. Dr. McCaul, then President of University College. The first officers chosen were Professor H. H. Croft, as captain, Professor J. B. Cherriman as Lieutenant and Mr.

Adam Crooks (afterwards Minister of Education for Ontario) as ensign; and among the privates enrolled were Sir Daniel (then Professor) Wilson, now President of the University, Professor Buckland and Mr. W. Mulock, now Vice-Chancellor of the University. The first uniform chosen was light gray, the company being then independent. In the year 1862 the company was incorporated with the 2nd Battalion, Queen's Own Rifles, when the present uniform was adopted.

In the year 1864 the company obtained the first prize, offered by Col. Mountain, Inspecting officer, for the most efficient and complete company in Canada.

When the Fenians invaded Canada in June, 1866, the company sent to the front forty-nine officers and men, of whom, however, only twenty-nine were present at the skirmish which took place at Limeridge on the 2nd of June, the greater portion of the members having left Toronto for their various homes at the close of the examinations in May. They were led into action by the late Lieutenant, Whitney, both Professor Croft and Professor Cherriman being detained in Toronto by order of the Government. They advanced farther towards the enemy than any other portion of the force in action, driving the enemy's left flank before them, and thus being the last to whom the order to retire reached. They lost three killed, four wounded, and three prisoners as shown in the following list:—

Killed.—Privates Malcolm Mackenzie, J. H. Mewburn, William F. Tempest.

Wounded.—Privates W. H. vanderSmussen, R. E. Kingsford, E. G. Patterson, E. T. Paul.

Taken Prisoner.—Corp. T. D. Delamere, Lance-Corp. W. H. Ellis, Private David Junor.

The prisoners not wounded were taken to Fort Erie where they were abandoned on the approach of the troops.

The University company also took part in the rebellion in the North-west, of 1885. The Queen's Own Rifles formed part of the column despatched under Lieut.-Col. Otter for the relief of Battleford. A successful engagement with the Indian chief Poundmaker, took place on May 2nd at Cut Knife creek, in which a detachment of K Company took part. On this occasion Private Lloyd was seriously wounded in rescuing a fallen comrade. No other member of the company received any injury.

APPENDIX.

JUNIOR MATRICULATION.

NOTE.—All candidates for Junior Matriculation must take the pass subjects in Latin, Mathematics, English, History and Geography, and in one of the following groups : (a) Greek ; (b) French and German ; (c) French and either Physics or Chemistry ; (d) German and either Physics or Chemistry.

A choice of questions will be allowed on each Pass paper.

Candidates intending to take during their University course in Arts any one of the following Honor departments, viz. Political Science, Mathematics and Physics, Chemistry and Mineralogy, Natural Sciences, are recommended to take French and German at Matriculation ; since these languages must be taken in connection with the above-named Honor departments. For a similar reason candidates intending to take during their University course either the Honor department of Philosophy or that of Oriental Languages are recommended to take Greek, French, and German at Junior Matriculation.

A knowledge of structure is required, such as can be obtained with the use of the compound microscope. Attention will be given in the examination to drawing and description of parts of plants supplied, and to the classification of these. Comparison of different organs, morphology of root, stem, leaves, and hair, parts of the flower, reproduction of flowering plants, pollination, fertilisation, and the nature of fruit and seeds.

2. ELEMENTS OF ZOOLOGY :—

Practical study of the subject as defined in *The High School Zoology*, but limited by the author's syllabus of work.

The percentage required for pass standing shall be 25 per cent. on each paper, and 40 per cent on the whole examination.

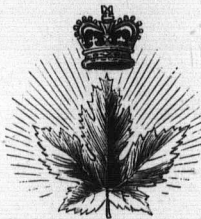

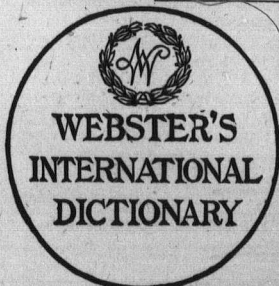

We have suggested that in future there be added to the present formula (given below) a small portion of some suitable lime-salt—perhaps the bi-sulphite of lime—believing that this addition will increase the solubility and usefulness of the remedy. Besides, the addition of arsenious acid and bi-sulphite of lime will tend to prevent sulphurous eruptions, which are liable to occur in some cases, while these basic substances are also valuable stomachic remedies themselves."

After a more extended use, and close observation of the therapeutic effects of the Compound Sulphur Lozenges, Dr. Smith finds his previous estimate of their value and usefulness increased and confirmed. When prepared according to the foregoing formula, he finds them admirably adapted to the relief of chronic pulmonary and hepatic diseases, cutaneous eruptions, and gastric and intestinal indigestion; and well suited as a pleasant laxative (not *purgative*), to relieve or cure chronic sluggish alvine functions.

[Formula of Q. C. SMITH, M.D., Austin, Texas], Sulphur, 5 grains; Cream Tartar, 2 grains; Ext. Ipecac, 1-100 grain; Ext. Capsicum, 1-500 grain; Acid Arsen., 1-1000 grain; Calcium Bi-Sulphite, 1-8 grain.

Put up in 1 lb. bottles - - - per lb. \$1.25

Put up in nickel screw cap bottles each containing 30 lozenges, - per doz. bottles, \$2.80
