Thomas Davey stepped out of the Old
Rainbow Tavern, Fleet Street, London, to take a vacation. The next
morning at eleven o'clock, instead of
carrying out this threat, he donned a
white apron in that ancient Arcadis
of healthy appetities known throughout the world as "Simpson's-in-theStrand." At that moment he came
into his own; and it is still his own.
and although the throne from which
he holds sway as chef of the mighty
Simpson's is situated two storeys below ground, in a little six by six rauggery of an office, he ranks with King
Nichelas of Montenegro, who rules
from many storeys above ground in
his tiny mountain fusiness, as one of
the veteran averseigns of Europe. On
the thirty-first of July "Davey"—he
lost the "Thomas" long ago—reached
seventy-one years of age, the same
age as King Nicholas. And again to
draw a comparison with the Balkan
ruler, he wields his despotic sceptre
with an arm that is unshaken by age
and yet with a democracy that has
brought all the great London Bohemlans of the last half century to bend
the knee before his chefs d'oeuvre of
cultinary art.

would not be guilty of such a Gailleculinary art.

Davey's motto is that "good English food is food." He has a negligent contempt for the menus of Paris and Berlin which have found their ways are not not be British. and Berlin which have found their way into many parts of the British metropolis. As he expresses it in his unalloyed Cockney — for Davey was born well within the sound of Bow Bells — "Wot's man eats makes a man. Well, look at them Frenchies and Germans, then tyke a look at an Englishman. That settles it. "One cockin" for me!"







A CRESTED DINOSAUR

A new dinosaus hitherto anknown to science, was found last summer in Alberts by an expedition from the Museum of Natural History. The fossil and most realistically displayed by a new method—that of a long panel mount. In this the actual bones are shown, still partly buried in the original rock from which they have been chiselled in relief, and for the most part in the position as found, excepting that the skeletom was lying horizontally on its right side.

When the dinosaur was found, ripply-marked sandstone surrounded the skull and a part of the akeletom. These ripples, in which are seen worn tracks and impressions of horsetails, or securing rushus, have been continued above the skeleton, as though the body had been washed in near shore, making a dam in the shallow water, and the shoreward side of the beach had dried up, forming mud cracks.

The skeleton, with pieces of skin elinging to it here and there, was evidently buried on a sandy beach with comparatively little disturbance of the bones. Finally the Red River, a comparatively recent watercourse, began to cut through these sediments, uncovering fessil treasures of the Cretaceous age, three or more million years ago. In the side of the canon, five hundred feet below the prairie surface, a few bonce were discovered protruding from the rocks, which proved to be the spines or vertebrae and the skill of the nearly complete skeleton here pictured.

This akeleton presents characters strikingly distinct from related forms and it has been made the type of a new genus, Saurclophus (meaning "crested saurian,") which is closely related to the well-known duck-bill Trachodon. The new dinosaur is distinguished by a great bony crest on the back of the skull, which is life syidently supported a leathery lobe of skin similar to the living lizard Basiliacus. Other distinctive characters are found in the hip bones the ischium of which resembles in genural structure that of the carnivorane dionsaurs and supported great cando-abdominal muscles. In life this animal was about thirty-two feet in length, and stood between fitteen and seventeen feet in height when erect. These measurements refer to the akeleton only, and do not include the akeleton only and do not include the erectal skin portion of the erest, which probably added considerably to the height during excitement, when the dinesaur must have been a most imposing creature. The monster was a herb-cater and without means of defence from the contemporary flesheating dinosaurs except in its power of swimming away from danger.

In subsidies to steamships the Canadian Government will pay this year \$2,-285,800. For this sum the mails are carried free, and freight and passenger service maintained on the ocean and coastal routes for the development of foreign and domestic trade.

The principal service is that on the Atlantic between Canada and Great Britain. Under the new contract made this year the government is paying \$1,000,000 annually for a tri-weekly service performed by 12 steamships, instead of \$600,000 a year for a weekly service by four steamships, as formerly. The new contract is with four companies: The Allans, the C. P. B., the Canadian Northern and the White Star-Dominion Line, in former years the contract was with the Allans, who divided up the subsidy and sulfnigs with the Canadian Pacific.

On the Pacific there are several ocean service contracts, their of which is that between Vancouvant ocean service contracts, chief of which is that between Vancouver and Hong Kong, China, with calls both ways at Yokohama, Japan. This service is performed by the Canadian Pacific Co., the yearly subsidy being \$225,000, of which Canada pays \$125,000 and Great Britain \$100,000.

A subsidy of \$180,000 yearly is paid for a monthly service between Vancouver and Auckland, New Zealand, 6,366 Popularizing Manufactures.
