



OTTAWA, Jan. 6.-John Cowie, the fish curing expert from Scotland who came to Canada at the request of the minister of marine and fisheries to visit the leading fishing centres of the maritime provinces and instruct fishermen in the Scotch method of curing herring, has concluded his mission, and handed in his report to Mr. Prefontaine.
