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

It will be remembered that when the first Sand Point tenders were received the 45 cent offer of Mr. Mayes was rejected because he had no Canadian dredge ready as the conditions required. Then a new call was made without these conditions, and the Government paid 55 cents of which 5 1-2 cents went to Mr. Mcavity. Now the call for tenders under which Mr. Moore gets his contract contains the same conditions which caused the rejection of the 49 cent offer. Mr. Moore's company gets the contract on the condition that it has at the time when the tender is made a suitable dredge already in the country. This was the condition faced by the competing tenderers, including the Dominion Dredging Company, whose tender for Beacon Bar was lower than that of Mr. Moore's company. If Mr. Moore has bought the Toledo or any other Boston dredge, there must have been a departure from the conditions of the tender. Rather than make such a departure two or three years ago, the Government was ready to incur a large extra cost, all of which went to the middleman. Perhaps it is different now that the contractor is paying for Mr. Pugsley's newspaper organ. The customs duty on a \$400,000 dredge will be \$100,000, unless that should be remitted.

Meanwhile nothing is happening at Beacon Bar There is no dredging at the harbor entrance. The whol matter of harbor dredging and harbor improvement seems to be managed or left undone to suit the conver-ience of contractor John E. Moore and his associates.


