Armed Japs Among 40 Rebels Killed in Fighting at Tsinan-Fu in Province of Shantung

Von Briesen was president of the New York legal ald society, but was compelled to resign shortly after the outbreak of the war because of his violent pro-Germanism. Later, according to the revelations of the British secret service, Von Briesen identified himself with Herr G. D. Waeigold, a German trade expert who was sent to the self with Herr G. D. Waelgold, a German trade expert who was sent to the United States from Germany a few months before the beginning of hostilities. Waelgold was closely identified with Captain Von Papen, Dr. Dernburg and other Prussian leaders in the States, and, assisted by Von Briesen, who employed Jerome, began a campaign for the prevention of American munitions reaching the Allies.

Handled Propaganda Fund.

The money to finance the undertaking was provided by the Deutsche Bank of Berlin, and the funds were placed at the disposal of Von Briesen, who according to the revelations of last August, enlisted the service of lawyers and private detectives all over the country. It was in this connection that Jerome wrote his letter to Von Briesen, and which, at the time it was exposed, created a sensation in the United States. Ottawa, May 16.—F. B. Carvell is responsible for the loss to the country of the services of John Thompson, K.

C., one of the ablest young lawyers in the country, Because of the attacks made upon him in the House on Saturday by the member for Carleton, Mr. Thompson resigned his position this morning as counsel for the Davidson War Contracts Commission. Mr. Thompson is a son of the late Premier Sir John Thompson, and he has been Performing the duties of counsel for the commission free of charge. He has enlisted for overseas service.

Sir Charles Davidson received the resignation with deep regret,
When the commission opened, Captain Thomson made a statement. "There has been some adverse criticism," he sald, "in the House of Commons that I as an officer in the overseas forces, should conduct the inquiry. I fail to see why this in anyway should affect my prosecution. Ordinarily, I would pay no attention to such criticism. However, the criticism having been made, I would, with your permission, withdraw as counsel. If I had continued to act, I would have conducted it with the same thoroughness as I have conducted other matters inquired into by this commission.

"While we have been associated to-

"While we have been associated together, I have accepted advice from no one but yourself. I would like to thank you for the honor you paid me in having chosen me as counsel."

"Your decision to withdraw," replied Sir Charles, "causes me very keen regret. Under the terms of the Inquiries Act I had power to select counsel.
