Here and There

The value of Ontario's mineral production for the first quarter of the present year, as shown by a report of the Department of Mines, has increased \$2,333,000 over the corresponding quarter of last year, the total being \$11,575,151 and \$3,241,853 respectively. Silver was the only metal of importance to record decreased production during the period under review.

Among the presengers sailing on the Caradian Pacific liner "Montlaurier" for England on July 8th, its E. W. Beatty, Chairman and President of the Canadian Pacific Railway. While in England, Mr. Beatty is scheduled to address the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World on July 17th on the subject of "Building an Empire with Advertising."

Excelient reports as to the hunting in the Caribou district of British Columbia are being received. F. W. Pridham and Fred. Shaver recently returned from a month's snort in that district with an excellent specimen of grizz'y bear weighing about 1,400 pounds. They saw moose, caribou, deer, black bear, pheasants and grouse, and consider the district a hunter's paradise.

Addressing the annual meeting of the Bond Dealers' Association of Canada at Toronto recently, the President declared that during the 12 months ending May 1st, \$507, \$917,000 worth of Canadian bonds had been distributed; this being by far the largest total issued in the Dominion in any post-war year. The most striking feature in this connection is that about 89 per cent. was absorbed within the borders of Canada.

On June 18th Winnipeg, Man, relebrated the fiftieth anniversary of its incorporation. From a struggling frontier village of the 70s, Winnipeg has forged into the position of third largest city in the Dominion, with continental repute as a railroad centre. It is the Gateway of the West and 100,000,000 bushels of prairie grain pass through it to the head of the lakes, whence it goes to the markets of whence it goes to the markethe world.

Twenty-fice officers and 200 men of the Royal Navy, from the social service squadron headed by H.M.S. Hood, enjoyed a trip through the Rockies over the Canadian Pacific lines while their ships were anchored at Vancouver recently. The sailors, who made a point, in true naval style, of seeing and doing everything, were enthusiastic over the scenery at such show-places as Banff and Lake Louise, which they declared the most beautiful they had seen in all their world cruise.

To add encouragement to the raising of high-class swine which is being fostered by the governments of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Ganadian Pacific Railway is awarding a champion-shin cup to the Boys' and Girls' Swine Clubs winning the club competitions in these provinces. The cups are for annual competition, but will become the property of the club if won for three years' in succession. Medals will be awarded individual members. This year winning teams resident on the Company's lines will also be granted a free trip to the Royal stock snow at Toronto.

The Arts, Science and Letters Society of the Province of Quebec recently sent a questionnaire to the various parishes of Quebec and Montmorency counties, seeking information as to the age and size of families residing in those territories. It was discovered that the family of Ismael Bedard had remained on the same land at Charleshourg since 1629, that the largest family in Montmorency was that of Hector Laliberte, of St. Jean, Island of Orleans, who has 20 children living, and that Joseph Gagnon, St. Pierre, Island of Orleans, has the largest number of living descendants, 210.

On Men That Are Deemed To be Habitual Criminals

able criminal, and Winston Churchill who is credited with having establar prisons, is immensely proud. Indeed, it may be remembered to his credit when his other services to the state are forgosten. In England there are some 500 men listed by the police and recognized by the courts as habitual criminals, that is to say men—and a few women, too—wno upon their release trom jail immediately commit a crime, who have no desire to support themselves otherwise than as criminals. Five hundred is not a large number of habitual criminals for a country with England's population, but it is enough to give the police a lot of extra work and werry when any considerable percentage of them is at liberty. deed, it may be remembered to his

The re has been an increase in crimes of violence, including nurriders of passion, in the past ten of twelve years, but in the crimes by habitual effenders there has been a sharp reduction. Then there were 1,200 habitual criminals in the country. To-day there are 500. In fact, the habitual criminal is disappearing and a similar rate of decrease in the next decade will find no officially listed habitual criminals in England. This is believed to be due wholly to their treatment, not to any particulat increase in morality. The disease exists, but it can be cured; it is being cured, and by just such means as a lot of suspected molly coddles and sentimentalists have urged, namely, by kindness. Under the law which Winston Churchill sponsored, a man may be declared a habitual criminal after a certain number of offences.
