

COL. DANIEL FERGUSON DIED MONDAY

The death of Colonel Daniel Ferguson, one of Chatham's oldest and most highly respected residents occurred Monday afternoon about three o'clock, at his residence, Henderson street, Chatham, after an illness of six weeks.

The late Mr. Ferguson was born at Athol House, Restigouche county, April 30th, 1826 of Scottish parentage. He received his education in Scotland at Perth and Mareschal College, Aberdeen. He studied law with Chipman Botsford, Campbellton, and George Botsford, Fredericton, and was for many years associated with Hon. George Kerr in the practice of law at Chatham. For forty years he held the position of Collector of Customs at Chatham, retiring in 1905.

Decided was for many years connected with the Canadian Militia and held the rank of Colonel with the 76th Northumberland battalion. He was a prominent member of the Highland Society of New Brunswick at Miramichi, being President for a number of years.

Decided was survived by two daughters, Mrs. F. F. Basteed of Vancouver, and Miss Ferguson at home; grand children and great grand children, nephews and nieces into the third and fourth generations. A nephew and five grand nephews of Col. Ferguson paid the supreme sacrifice in the World War.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon. Services at the house being conducted by Rev. Dr. Wyllie at 2 o'clock and the cortege leaving at 2.30 for Riverside cemetery where interment was made.—Commercial.






