POLICEMEN WANT MORE SALARY

Ask \$15. and \$10. Per Month Increase—Other Business.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Clerk's office Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presided. There were present Councillors Campbell, McKay, Matthews and Bissett. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
J. A. Frede, Clerk of Sussex wrote to increase in Telephone Rates. Laid on table.—Carried.
Peter Clinch wrote notifying the Council that the Board of N. B. underwriters approved of the action of the Council in ordering the pump but gave notice that the sixteen inch main would have to be extended through town before Aug. 1st. Placed on file.
Chief of Police J. H. Adams wrote asking for an increase of \$15.00 per month, also Policeman Smith, asking for increase of \$10.00 per month. Referred to the Police & License Committee.
The Clerk read two accounts from H. G. V. Farrer for services during November and December, \$236.00. This was outside his usual annual salary and was for being on duty to look after the fire engine.
Coun. Matthews explained that on a recent alarm of fire Mr. Farrer was not to be found to take out the engine. Coun. McKay said that he had some talk with Mr. Farrer and said that when he left he should leave some one in charge of engine. Farrer was paid an annual salary to look after the engine.
Coun. McKay moved that whereas the work of the manager of the Electric Department went behind while he was doing other work and extra help had to be employed to do such work, therefore resolved that the accounts be not entertained.—Carried.
The usual departmental reports were adopted and accounts ordered paid.
The communication of the Town Clerk of Sussex was then taken up. The members of the Council being unanimous in the opinion there should be no increase in telephone rates. Councillor McKay moved the following resolution which was seconded by Councillor Matthews and unanimously carried.
"That the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton strongly protest against the rate of telephone service charged by the N. B. Telephone Co. for telephone service, either local or long distance, and that notice of such protest be forwarded to the Secretary of the Public Utilities Commission which meets in St. John on the 21st inst."

On motion the town clerk was instructed to give Mr. Gertrude Murray notice that the town would vacate the Murray building on April 1st, next.
His Worship then called the attention of the Chairman of the various committees to the importance of having their annual reports ready for presentation to the council at its next meeting.
On motion the town solicitor was authorized to proceed with the preparation of any legislation which might be required for a new assessment law, similar to that now in operation in the City of St. John.
The Council then adjourned.

CAMPBELLTON VETS DEFEAT AMHERST

Good Exhibition of Hockey Witnessed by Big Crowd.

In one of the fastest exhibitions of hockey ever witnessed on local ice the Campbellton "Vets" defeated the Amherst Ramblers here on Monday night to the tune of 12 to 6. The visitors proved to be all the advance notices claimed and throughout the game played in brilliant style. There was no let up by either team from start to finish and the brand of hockey displayed had the spectators on their toes for the major portion of the game. Starrak for the "Vets" was the first to score, immediately after the face off, followed closely by two more tallies by McLean and Thomas, all in less than three minutes. This ended the scoring for the locals in this period as Amherst struck their stride and Chisholm and Lowther managed to annex two after both goals had several escapes. In the second period play was constantly in Amherst territory and resulted in goals by Mott, Starrak and Matthews for the locals while Simmons contributed one lone tally for the visitors. Numerous off sides occurred which slowed up the game slightly and the referee was also generous with his penalties. The final stanza started out with a rush with Amherst continually throwing in their spurs and Chisholm electrified the crowd with some stick work. Goals for the locals in this period, resulted by two end to end rushes by McLean and Starrak while Silliker and Chisholm notched one each for the visitors. The game ended with the puck in mid ice. Matthews and Starrak proved to be the chief aggressors for the locals registering together not less than 8 points while Chisholm and Lowther were the mainstay of Amherst, who got in some very good stick work.

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MEETING OF COUNTY COUNCIL

Matter of Protest Settled in Short Order—Other Business.

The County Council of Restigouche met on Tuesday morning at Dalhousie. The following councillors were present: Durham—John Lawlor, Arch. Murchie. Colborne—A. T. Arsenau. Balmoral—Henry Dittie, Ed. Savoy. Dalhousie—John Dickie, P. Dugas. Addington—H. C. Gillis W. D. Duncan. Eldon—Murdoch Firth, Jas. Hesser. Gougar—A. C. Levesque, Alex. Goucher.
Campbellton—Thos. N. Dickie. Dalhousie—W. S. Montgomery. Coun. Murchie was on motion of Coun. Lawlor appointed chairman.—Carried.
Chairman explained that the first thing to be done was to choose a warden.
Coun. John Dickie moved that Coun. Gillis be chosen warden.
Coun. Montgomery moved in amendment that Coun. Dittie be chosen warden.
Amendment carried.
Council then adjourned until 2 o'clock.
Tuesday Afternoon.
Warden Dittie took his seat at 2 o'clock. He thanked the Council for the honor done him. He was afraid he had not the ability to fill the position, but he would do the best he could and asked the Council to assist him to transact the business with as little delay as possible.
Coun. Montgomery moved that the minutes of the special session be not confirmed, but that the report of the special grain committee, with the accounts be sent to the auditor.
Dr. Desmond, Chairman of the District Board of Health addressed the Board in regard to Board of Health matters.
He asked for an assessment for Board of Health, Medical inspection of schools and collection of vital statistics for this year of the vicinity of \$3000.
Coun. John McLean, also laid up with a cut foot was excused from attendance.
A delegation composed of Mrs. Lawlor of St. John and Mrs. Doyle of Jacques River requested permission to address the councillors.
Mrs. Lawlor explained the work and object of the Women's Institute of the County Council to support the Provincial Health Act and thus provide for medical inspection of schools. This was a most important question and the women ask for your co-operation in this matter.
We, the women ask you to vote the estimates as asked for by the local Health Board. It is a case of throwing pennies which will later bring to you dollars. The Health Act is a great boon to the country, it shows defects in health and these can be rectified. There should be no politics in this Health Act and there is not. We have led in this matter as N. B. is the only province in the Dominion which has a compulsory health act. We trust that with this few words we can depend upon the Councilors to pass that appropriation asked for.—Applause.
The secretary treasurer read the request of the District Board for an Assessment of \$5,000 for the purposes of the Health Act.
The Secretary read a letter from Premier Foster re vision of Voters lists and the placing of the women's names therein.
Protest.
Nathan McDavid made a protest against the election of Coun. Dickie and Duncan of Addington. He claims that because of the word year was used instead of term, his name was not put in nomination, and that the above Councilors were duly declared elected.
Couns. Duncan and Gillis asked permission to retire while the matter was being discussed.—Granted.
Coun. Montgomery moved that this council considers there is sufficient ground in the election protest of Nathan McDavid just read.—Carried.
Couns. Montgomery, Levesque and Savoy were appointed a committee to investigate the protest charges.
Recess was taken to await the report of the committee.
Council reassembled.
The Protest Committee reported that nomination was filed in time, that W. D. Duncan was married to Jos. Duncan's, the Parish Clerk's sister, but she was now deceased, and that the matter of the right of Jos. Duncan to throw out the nomination paper of Nathan McDavid to the Council.
Dickie moved that the election of Couns. Gillis and Duncan be confirmed.
Montgomery moved in amendment that it is the opinion of this council that whereas Jos. Duncan, being a brother-in-law of W. D. Duncan acted illegally in rejecting the nomination paper of Nathan McDavid and not holding an election on same.
Legal adviser LeBlanc gave it as his opinion that Mr. Nathan McDavid's nomination was not a good and legal nomination paper, and Mr. Duncan did the right and proper thing in refusing it. The matter of relationship had no bearing on this until election day and is daily provided for in the act.—Motion carried.

BISHOP BARRY, CHATHAM, DEAD

Long and Honorable Career as Priest and Bishop Ended.

Consecrated Feb. 11, 1900—Aged 78 Years.
The Rt. Rev. Thomas Francis Barry D. D., second Bishop of Chatham, died at 1.30 p. m. Monday, of pneumonia. His Lordship was of Irish parentage and was born at Pokemouche, Gloucester Co., March 3, 1841. He was ordained priest at Montreal, August 5, 1866, and consecrated Bishop of Thugana, and conductor with right of succession to the Chatham See, on Feb. 16, 1900. He became Bishop of Chatham on August 2, 1902, on the resignation of Rt. Rev. James Rogers, D. D., the first Bishop of Chatham. Bishop Casey, now the Archbishop of Vancouver was consecrated at the same time.
For many years Bishop Barry was a resident of Bathurst and erected a handsome church and presbytery there, whilst Vicar General.
Owing to advancing years the Holy See, at his request, granted him an auxiliary and on Jan. 29, 1914 Rev. James Louis O'Leary, D. D., was consecrated.
Bishop Barry commenced his classical studies in the Academy, which stood in the rear of the St. John Cathedral in Archdiocese Connolly's time and afterwards attended the Sulpician Seminary, Montreal, finishing his theological studies at the Grand Seminary, in the same city. On returning to Chatham, he became parish priest of the pro-Cathedral and also rector of St. Nicholas College. His next charge was at Carleton Place, then he went to Madawaska and lastly to Bathurst. On four occasions he visited Europe and made two trips to the Holy Land, the last one in company with Bishop Casey.
With the late Bishop Sweeney he attended the Church Congress in Bathurst in 1899. He also was present at the Plenary Council, Quebec, September, 1909, and the Fucharic Congress to Montreal, in September, 1919.
The late Bishop Barry had a large number of friends in St. John. He was held in high regard and all will regret of his demise with deep regret. To his closing days his Lordship displayed untiring zeal and unflinching earnestness in the performance of his sacred duties. A theologian of great ability and fine presence, Monsignor Barry made an ideal Bishop.

FELL OVER CLIFF INTO RIVER.

Young French Canadian Met a Tragic Death a Few Miles From Bathurst.

Frederick Gleanor, Friday, Word reached here to-day of the tragic death of an unidentified French Canadian who fell over a cliff a distance of 100 feet into the waters of the Nepisiquet river a few miles from Bathurst.
The young man had come there recently from Quebec and was employed on the electrical development work being carried on at the Grand Falls by the Bathurst Lumber Company when in some unaccountable manner he fell over the cliff.
Workmen saw his body hit the water and came to the surface again, only to be swept under the ice by the swift current and carried over the falls. Although efforts have been made by his friends to locate the body it has been impossible to do so, and it may be that the remains will never be found.
The source from which The Graphic obtained its information was unable to furnish the name or residence of the deceased, but it was said he was only about 18 years old and there was no evidence that the case was other than a sad but thrilling accident.

The funeral was held Friday A. M. the 2nd inst., at 10.30 o'clock at Shigawake Anglican Church here. Very largely attended. The Rev. Stanley Wilson officiated.
The pall-bearers were his three sons, (that being their wish to carry their father to his last resting place.) Messrs. Harold Young and Wilson, Paul, his nephews, and Leonard Byers, his son-in-law.
Much sympathy is felt by all for the family in their bereavement.

The late Mr. Ferguson was born at Athol House, Restigouche county, April 30th, 1826 of Scottish parentage. He received his education in Scotland at Perth and Marischal College, Aberdeen. He studied law with Chipman Botsford, Campbellton, and George Botsford, Fredericton, and was for many years associated with Hon. George Kerr in the practice of law at Chatham. For forty years he held the position of Collector of Customs at Chatham, retiring in 1905.

Deceased was for many years connected with the Canadian Militia and held the rank of Colonel with the 76th Northumberland battalion. He was a prominent member of the Highland Society of New Brunswick at Miramichi, being President for a number of years.

Deceased is survived by two daughters, Mrs. F. F. Basteed of Vancouver, and Miss Ferguson at home; grand children and great grand children, nephews and nieces into the third and fourth generations. A nephew and five grand nephews of Col. Ferguson paid the supreme sacrifice in the World War.

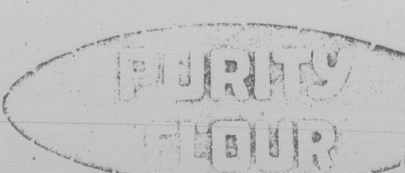

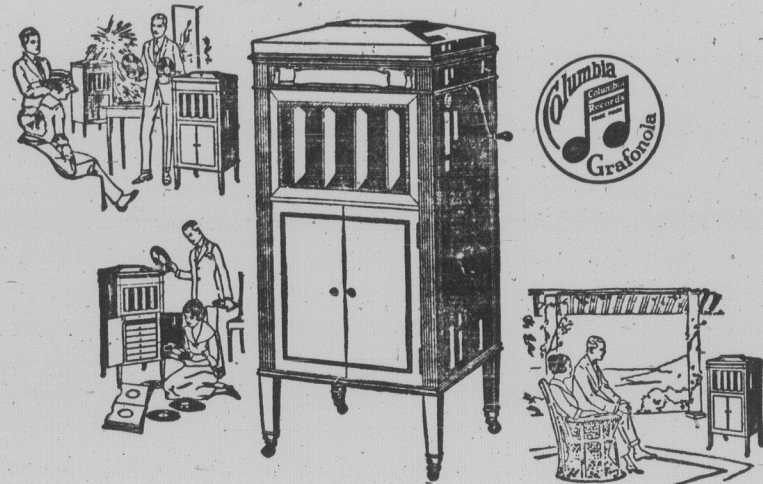

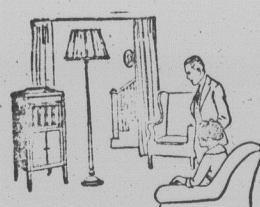
